I have decided to purchase a single cab for myself and I wanted to take this opportunity to inform the council and address any concerns or questions that you may have.

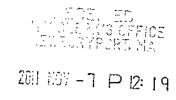

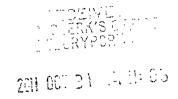

## Newburyport Waterfront Trust 2011 Annual Report to the Mayor

#### **Background**

The area comprising Market Landing Park and the Waterfront/Boardwalk Promenade and adjacent public and private acreage was taken by eminent domain by the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority (NRA) as part of an urban renewal project in 1968. The site was first developed into a park over a several year period, beginning in the early 1970's. In January 1991, the Newburyport Waterfront Trust (the Trust) was established to hold, manage, maintain, conserve, and utilize these lands for the use and enjoyment of the citizens of Newburyport, Newbury, and West Newbury. The granted lands total approximately 4.4 acres and consist of Market Landing Park, Riverside Park, approximately 1,100 feet of riverfront boardwalk, Somerby's Landing, and the six (6) Ways to the Water (Somerby Landing Way within Riverside Park, Central Wharf Way, Railroad Avenue west of the Firehouse, Railroad Avenue east of the Firehouse, Ferry Wharf Way [administered by the NRA but obligated for transfer to the Waterfront Trust], and Custom House Way). These lands were granted to the Trust to be held in perpetuity allowing the public free access forever.

In accordance with the Declaration of Trust, there are five Trustees who are appointed by the Mayor of Newburyport with the approval of the City Council to a maximum of two, five-year terms. Under this Declaration, the Trustees have absolute control of the Trust property with the exception of restrictions placed on certain portions of the property, including the duty to keep the public ways and Boardwalk "open" for benefit of the general public. In agreeing to the Declaration, the City of Newburyport accepted responsibilities for the funding of the maintenance of the Trust lands, and to indemnify the Trustees of liability associated with the ownership and management of the Trust lands. Over the years and using income from leases, rentals, use permits, and donor gifts, the Trust has assumed the primary responsibility for park maintenance and contracts this work to a commercial landscape company. The City's Department of Public Services provides valuable supplemental services for Trust properties, including trash removal, tree work, and the plowing of Riverside Park. The Trust employs a part-time Park Manager to coordinate these maintenance activities and provide liaison between the Trustees, park users, the DPS, the landscaping contractor, and various volunteer groups who help from time to time.

By contrast, major improvements to the Park and its infrastructure have been supported by funds raised in collaboration with the City, the Planning Department in particular. Examples of this include a \$2.4 million dollar improvement (2002/2003) comprised of approximately \$1.3 million in city funds, \$800,000 in federal and state grants, and \$300,000 from local businesses and individuals for the refurbishment and extension of the Waterfront/Boardwalk Promenade, the improvements along Somerby's Way, repairs to the pilings along the Merrimack River bulkhead, and improvements to the infrastructure of the Park.

#### Trust Property Description (See Attachment A, Trust Land Map)

Market Landing Park is located between Merrimac Street and the water near Market Square. The Firehouse Center is located at the Southeast corner of the Park. Park circulation is paved

with brick and lined with granite curbing. Lush green space is plentiful and flowerbeds abound. A black cast iron fence separates the street sidewalk and the Park. Earth mounds provide a buffer zone between the Park and adjacent parking lots. A granite railing and performance stage separate Market Landing Park from the Waterfront/Boardwalk Promenade.

The Promenade is a wooden wharf supported by steel caissons. The entire Promenade was rebuilt and completed in June, 2003 using robust Ipe decking. Railings on the waterside of the Promenade also serve as benches. Sturdy steel and wood benches line the landside of the wharf. The Promenade is straight, paralleling the river with the exception of an embayment that aligns with Market Landing Park.

Riverside Park is the western-most portion of the Trust's properties. It was originally dedicated in 1889 as city park land consisting of a ball field and recreational space, but in 1948 the City turned it into a parking lot to accommodate downtown parking needs. It was rededicated as a park when the Waterfront Trust was created in 1991 with parking allowed as a "permitted use." Today it's primarily a paved parking lot providing 64 spaces with some trees and greenery. It also serves as an optional entrance to two abutting parking lots and further entrance to the nearby boat yards and marine facilities. Since the 1990's the Trustees to have articulated the goal of giving Riverside Park a more park-like appearance. Plantings along Somerby Landing Way were added in 2003 with additional plantings and improved signage for the Park currently under consideration.

In the summer, the Trust allows the Harbormaster Department to place floating docks along the east end face of the Waterfront/Boardwalk Promenade for public docking. Additional floating docking and a public dingy dock are seasonally located in the embayment.

The Trust hosts public charter boats along the Promenade to the west of the embayment, informally known as a Transportation Docking area. These vessels operate in the summer and include a whale-watch boat, a harbor cruise, and a sailing catamaran. These vessels operate on a regularly scheduled basis for whale watches and harbor cruises as well as for special-event charters. These three tour-boat operations collectively are responsible for their own floats and ramps and their seasonal installation and removal. In the winter, the Trust hosts a small fleet of commercial fishing vessels in the embayment, as it offers welcome protection from river ice.

The Park and the Promenade are well maintained and provide an attractive draw to Newburyport's waterfront and nearby downtown area. A well-managed program of tree maintenance and pruning keeps the Park attractive and visible while providing shade. The Waterfront Promenade experiences heavy tourist traffic in the summer months. Market Landing Park is used as an access way to the Promenade and is also home to summer concerts and special events. It is also frequently used as a wedding venue.

#### **Collaborations**

The Trust furthers its purpose by collaborating with and hosting activities that encourage and facilitate the connection of the public to its property and to the Merrimack River. An example of this is the three aforementioned tour boat operations and includes the placement of a cooperative ticket kiosk to facilitate their operation.

The Trust also hosts the Somerby's Landing Sculpture Park, an area at the waterside portion of Riverside Park and the western end of the Waterfront/Boardwalk Promenade. A cluster of sculptures has been established; some relatively permanent, others that rotate on an annual basis.

The Trust works closely with the Greater Newburyport Chamber of Commerce & Industry in the planning and hosting of numerous summertime events. This typically includes an early-season spring festival, occasional evening events throughout the summer, a large Riverfront concert, and a fall harvest festival. The Trust is also exploring options to identify nearby businesses on signposts that are consistent with the rededication of Riverside Park as a park.

Market Landing Park was improved and expanded in the early 1970's and again in the early 1990's with federal, state, and City funds, along with local donations. It is the traditional location for the concerts and events associated with Yankee Homecoming, a major city-wide, week-long summer celebration. These activities bring many visitors to the downtown and waterfront and make a significant impact to the grounds. Careful coordination with Yankee Homecoming organizers ensures that cleanup and repairs after each event are done in a timely way and the condition of the Park is not compromised.

The Trust and the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority (NRA) have shared interests in the functioning of the waterfront. The NRA property is effectively surrounded by the Trust's property and the two groups share extensive borders. There is a planning process in place to transition the NRA land, presently two gravel parking lots accommodating approximately 400 cars, to a higher purpose. The timing and ultimate mix of activities remains unclear; however it is essential that the Trust work closely with the NRA to ensure that the Trust property remains freely accessible to the general public.

In 2007, the Trust and the NRA implemented a collaborative paid parking program that generated revenue on weekends and during Yankee Homecoming. This program involved a fee collection subcontractor and resulted in approximately \$7,000 per year in revenue for the Trust for the two years the arrangement was in effect. More importantly, the collaboration offered the Trust a better sense of the revenue that could be generated by charging for its spaces in Riverside Park.

In 2009, the Trust implemented the first pay-and-display parking program within the City. This required the installation of a payment machine, signage, and a credit-card servicing arrangement. Installed in October 2009, the program grossed over \$37,000 in receipts during the first year of operation. This revenue came in spite of free weekday parking in the neighboring NRA lot and with the absence of any enforcement. Not only did this program prove highly profitable, it facilitated the short-term use of Trust parking spaces by the public rather than their historical all-day use by the employees of nearby businesses. The success of the Trust's paid parking plan may have helped motivate the City to implement a consolidated parking plan for the downtown and waterfront. This plan was finalized in the spring of 2011 and the Trust has agreed to allow

the City to administer paid parking in Riverside Park in return for an annual fee of \$30,000 for the two-year agreement.

#### Trust Sources of Revenue

The Trust, acting in accordance with Article IV, Section 3 of the Declaration of Trust, is required to "in all matters relating to the administration of the Trust hereunder and the exercise of power hereby conferred, the Trust may act by majority of their members" and do so on all fiscal matters.

Under the Declaration of Trust, agreed upon by both the City of Newburyport and the Waterfront Trust, the City made a commitment to pay all reasonable expenses including the maintenance and landscaping of the Waterfront Park and Boardwalk. Over time the City has reduced its funding obligation requiring the Trust to rely more on income it generated through parking receipts, tour boat dock rentals and leasing arrangements. The City's Department of Public Works, however, continues to provide the Trust with such work as refuse removal, tree pruning, plowing, and walk repair on its property.

The Trustees are also able to generate revenue by charging fees for the occasional and regular use of the Park. In addition to this revenue stream, the Trust receives occasional donations in accordance with its 501 (C) 3 tax status, from the public as well as businesses that value the mission of the Trust.

The Trust's operating budget is based primarily on recurring sources of income. The following describes those sources and their basis. Details of the Trust's current net worth and income and expenses for FY2011 as well as projections for FY 2012 are included in Attachment B, C, & D. 2011 WFT report and vision

a) Paid parking: \$30,000 - Under a two-year agreement with the City of Newburyport, the City administers parking in Riverside Park and collects all parking fees and revenues from enforcement ticketing and in return they compensate the Trust.

- b) Summer tour boat tie-up fees: \$16,000 The Trust hosts the M/V Prince of Whales (a whale watch cruise), the M/V Yankee Clipper (a harbor tour and water taxi vessel), and the S/V Ninth Wave (a sailing catamaran cruise). The Trust charges \$80 per foot for the summer season and the vessels provide their own cooperative ticket kiosk.
- c) Firehouse patio lease: \$6,683 The Trust owns the land upon which the Firehouse patio was built. A lease by the Trust to the Society for the Development of the Arts and Humanities (SDAH) allows that nonprofit to profitably sublease the patio to their tenant first-floor restaurant.
- d) Market Landing Park Event Fees: \$5,200 Events organized by the Chamber, Yankee Homecoming, and others are charged a fee based on the number of attendees and the duration of the event. These fees are intended to support the additional grounds-keeping expenses associated with the impact of the event.
- e) Reserved parking for Riverside Park abutters: \$3,000 With the implementation of paid parking in Riverside Park in 2007, parking for tenants and customers of the Browns Wharf building became strained. The Trust allows the dedicated use of the six parking spaces abutting that building by employees and customers of the tenant businesses. The fees for these spaces are based on revenues collected for the rest of the Riverside Park spaces.
- f) Fishing Vessel winter tie-up fees: \$2,100 Our fleet of fishing vessels has diminished over the years, as has the number of participants in local fishing industry. Presently, three commercial trawlers tie up in the waterfront embayment during the winter at \$700 each for the season.
- g) Bank donations: \$1,000 for maintenance of the flowerbeds on the berms that were funded by the Institution for Savings and the Newburyport Five Cents Savings.
- h) Private weddings: \$800 The setting and high level of maintenance of Market Landing Park makes it a popular setting for weddings. We average six such events each year and charge a fee of \$100 or \$200 depending on the size of the gathering.
- i) Transportation Dock Fuel deliveries: \$600 The Trust permits tenant vessels to fuel up at the Transportation dock, charging 5 cents per gallon.

### Trust Expenses

The Trust's primary recurring expense is for the maintenance of its properties, the landscaping and upkeep of the Park grounds and the boardwalk promenade. Most of this work is done under a contract with ND Landscaping for approximately \$22,000 per year. Additional, non-recurring work includes various grounds upgrades and tree pruning and/or removal is handled by the City DPS or by other contractors.

The Trust employs a Manager to oversee routine maintenance and special event logistics costing approximately \$7,500 per year. A handyman is used for repairs and minor upgrades

and those annual costs have risen lately to \$6,500 largely due to the boardwalk requiring an increased level of maintenance as the Ipe decking ages and twists. The cause seems to be either inadequate fasteners or degrading stringers to which they are nailed. The edges of uneven boards are planned to reduce trip hazards and refastened. Other routine costs include support and professional fees for a note taker, engineer, greens keeper, accountant, and a fund manager totaling \$5,600 annually.

#### **Recent Issues and Policy Decisions**

The waterfront is a dynamic environment and like all things, its needs and the needs of its surrounding community change over time. The Trust property is governed by the Trustees in accordance with a Declaration of Trust crafted in the wake of litigation between 1972 and 1980, resulting in a Stipulation that was substantially executed by creation of the Waterfront Trust after completion of land registration in the year 1988. This has required both inventiveness and compromise in order to meet current needs while honoring the language of the Declaration established by its authors in 1991 and fulfilling the intent and spirit of the Trust purposes as viewed by the City, the Commonwealth, the NRA, and public intervenors.

The Tour Boat Ticket Kiosk - An example of this was the placement of the tour boat ticket kiosk on the Boardwalk promenade where no structures previously existed. This 10' x 7' structure was originally located on the Transportation Docking section of the Boardwalk in 2007 to serve the needs of the Trust's tenant vessels. However, it was determined that such a placement was viewed as violating the Declaration's covenant against the leasing of certain Trust lands, and the duty to keep the Boardwalk areas "open" under Article XIII. Following a review of location options, the Trustees voted to move the kiosk to a location previously used in part by the sculpture park abutting the Waterfront/Boardwalk promenade. The Trust will continue to pursue a more suitable and permanent location for this structure. The location on Trust property of a ticket kiosk to serve the information and ticket-selling needs of tenant and river community interests prompted a review by the Trustees on limitations placed on structures located on the Waterfront/Boardwalk promenade. Through this discussion, it became apparent that the City has both challenges and opportunities as it endeavors to provide information to tourists, visitors, and residents. At the heart of this, is the need to offer public access boating opportunities, public transportation, adequate public restroom facilities, and related facilities for boaters.

Transportation Dock Tenant Vessel Fueling - At the request of tenant vessels advocating that they were being financially hurt by non-competitive pricing of fuel along the Newburyport waterfront, a fueling plan was developed in collaboration with the Newburyport Fire Marshall, the City Solicitor, and other stakeholders. The Trust charges five cents per gallon of diesel fuel delivered and requires record keeping. Currently, the Waterfront Trust is in the discussion phase with the Newburyport Harbor Commission and the Harbormaster to determine if a more suitable location is available for this activity.

Accommodating Commercial Interests - The Trust's mission of encouraging public use of the waterfront can be furthered by partnering with commercial organizations. An example of this is a recent spate of requests by health and fitness organizations. Striking a proper arrangement with these groups can be challenging and depends on anticipated impacts to the Park and on whether the organization charges its participants. Fee determinations depend on whether the activity involves profit or non-profit permittees, imposes charges upon participants, imposes additional park maintenance burdens for which the Trustees seek cost recovery, or serves compelling needs of the City.

Valuing Leased Properties – The Declaration of Trust requires the Trustees to obtain full and fair market value for any leased properties. This has not been easy given the unique and encumbered nature of these locations.

Scaport Grant Funding – Through the efforts of the City's Planning and Development Department, Newburyport was awarded a \$1.98 million dollar grant by the Massachusetts Scaport Advisory Council in April of 2011 to restore its bulkhead, pilings, and boardwalk at the waterfront. Funds for the planning/design phase are expected to be released in 2013 and construction is expected to begin in 2014. Trustees are anxious to work with the City in this endeavor.

#### Routine Planning

The Trustees handle routine matters through deliberations at monthly public meetings and in concert with the Trust's park manager. The coordination and short-term planning matters include:

- Increasing the sophistication of gardens and intense landscaping in keeping with the Trust's financial resources.
- 2. Developing a tree replacement program to replace lost trees due to damage or disease, and implementing fertilizer and pruning programs.
- 2. Balancing the merits of a vibrant vs. a more passive setting.
- 3. Increasing the Trust's financial resources by competing for grants and encouraging private and commercial donations.

#### Vision Statement

The Newburyport Waterfront Trust envisions a waterfront that is both responsive and proactive; shaped by both recognized needs and emerging opportunities, and guided by a respect for its origins and historical significance. As active stewards of this environment, the Trustees believe that waterfront activities should be innovative, sustainable, and enhance the overall quality of life for the community. The waterfront is a shared and precious resource that must remain accessible to all and preserved for all time.

#### Long-term Planning

Although in the past, the financial limitations have tempered the Trust's ability to "think big," the proceeds from paid parking, even under the current collaboration with the City, enables the Trust to envision and pursue meaningful improvements to Trust properties by using these additional funds as match for grants and gifts. Improvements under consideration include:

- 1. Continue to work with other entities to manage the hazards and opportunities associated with the commercial development of neighboring parcels.
- 2. Complete the process with the NRA and the City to locate, mark, and transfer to the Waterfront Trust, the two final Rights of Ways to the Waterfront, specifically Ferry Wharf Way and Central Wharf Way.
- Work cooperatively with the Newburyport Maritime Society Board, the City of Newburyport, and the NRA with a shared interest in reopening the second Custom House Way (formally a registered public way) and providing a more direct access to the City Fishing Pier.
- 4. Work cooperatively with the Newburyport Maritime Society Board, the City of Newburyport, Newburyport Harbor Commission and the NRA with a shared interest to improve waterfront docking that will enable routine visits by historic ships and ship replicas for the purpose of providing ship-based educational programs and to encourage a broader range of visitors.
- 5. Work with the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority (NRA) to assist in the conversion of portions of the-gravel parking lots into park and other higher-use activities.
- 6. Integrate, as appropriate, additional NRA park land with the Waterfront Trust Park to create a seamless park, both in appearance and management.
- 7. Plan and construct a bikeway to accommodate rail-trail traffic across the park.
- 8. Work=with charter boat operators to establish a permanent location for the ticket kiosk.
- 9. Improve the appearance of Riverside Park through the addition of trees and other plantings. Ultimately, reestablish Riverside Park as a formal park.
- 10. Increase the vitality and the range of visitor offerings by a measured enhancement of attractions and partnerships with commercial ventures.

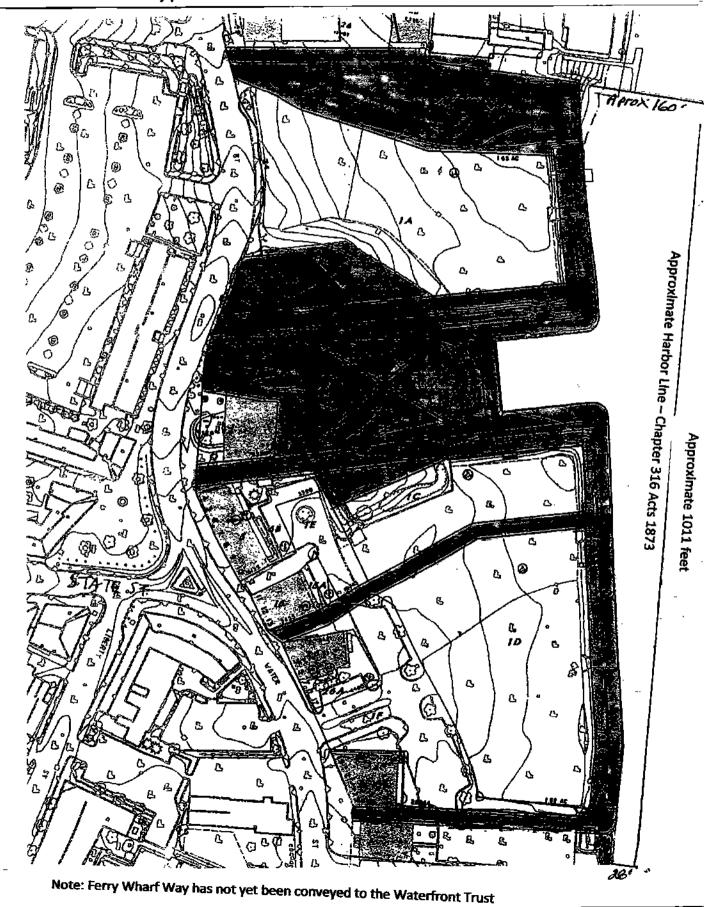
- 11. Provide additional public boating opportunities along unused portions of the Promenade west of the embayment.
- 12. Collaborate with the City to raise funds to support substantial projected expenses related to the predictable deterioration of the bulkhead caissons, pilings, and Boardwalk support structure.
- 13. Consider including sculpture and additional forms of art to areas of Trust property in addition to the existing sculpture park.
- 14. Add additional benches where needed and of a design that is consistent with the existing
- 15. Engage professional landscape architects and enhance Waterfront Park with additional and appropriate plantings.

 52.02 The vote by a political subdivision to implement changes in group health insurance benefits under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23

(1) Advance notice of intent to vote.

At least two calendar days in advance of any vote electing to change group health insurance under the process authorized by M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23, the appropriate public authority shall send a notice to each collective bargaining unit to which the authority provides health insurance benefits and to the Retired State, County Municipal Employees Association (RSCME) that the political subdivision intends to vote on whether to implement the process. The vote of the political subdivision under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 21(a) may be in the following form: "The [name of political subdivision] elects to engage in the process to change health insurance benefits under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23."

- (2) Notice of vote, request for name and contact information for public employee committee representatives, and number of eligible unit members.
  - (a) A political subdivision which has elected under M.G.L. c. 32B, §21(a) to change health insurance benefits under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 22-23, shall, before implementing any changes, evaluate its health insurance coverage and determine the savings that may be realized after the first 12 months of implementation of cost-sharing plan design changes or upon transfer of its subscribers to the commission. The appropriate public authority shall then notify its insurance advisory committee, or such committee's regional or district equivalent, of its estimated savings. The notice shall include all the information required in section 52.03. In any political subdivision in which an insurance advisory committee has not already been established under M.G.L. c. 32B, §3, the appropriate public authority shall notify the president of each organization of employees affected and shall designate and notify a retiree of a governmental unit as a member of the committee. The insurance advisory committee, within 10 days after receiving this notice, shall meet with the appropriate public authority to discuss its estimated savings and any reports or other documentation requested by the insurance advisory committee before that meeting. If the committee does not meet within 10 days after receiving proper notice, it shall be considered to have discussed the matter with the appropriate public authority.

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- (b) Not later than 2 business days after the insurance advisory committee meets with the appropriate public authority or 10 days after the insurance advisory committee receives notice from the appropriate public authority, whichever occurs first, a political subdivision which has elected under M.G.L. c. 32B, & 21(a) to make changes under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 22 or 23 shall, provide a notice of its decision, in writing, to the president or designee of each collective bargaining unit and to the RSCME and shall include the number of employees eligible for health insurance under M.G.L. c. 32B employed in each bargaining unit of the political subdivision.
- (c) In any political subdivision which has not previously formed a public employee committee under M.G.L. c. 32B, §19 of this chapter, the notice shall request that each of the collective bargaining units and the RSCME provide the name, address, phone number, and email address of its designated public employee committee representative.
- (d) Where a public employee committee already exists under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 19, each collective bargaining unit and RSCME shall, within 2 business days of receipt of notice under this section, provide the appropriate public authority with the name, address, phone number and email address of its designated public employee committee representative. If no public employee committee exists at the time of receipt of the notice, each collective bargaining unit and RSCME shall designate a representative to a public employee committee exclusively to negotiate changes under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§21-23 and provide the appropriate public authority with the name, address, phone number and email address of its designated public employee committee representative within 5 business days after receipt of notice under 801 CMR 52.02(3). If no public employee committee exists at the time of receipt of notice from the political subdivision and the appropriate public authority has not received this information from a collective bargaining unit or RSCME within 5 business days, the collective bargaining unit's principal officer shall be the unit's representative on the public employee committee, the president of the RSCME shall be its representative on the public employee committee, and the appropriate public authority shall send the notice specified under 801 CMR 52.03 to the collective bargaining unit's principal officer and to RSCME's president.

The appropriate public authority shall give the written notice required in M.G.L. c. 32B, § 21(b) to the insurance advisory committee in accordance with Section 52.02(2)(a) and, not later than 2 business days following the appropriate public authority's receipt of notice of the representatives of the public employee committee under Section 52.02(2)(d), to each public employee committee representative identified by the

collective bargaining units and the RSCME. The notice shall include the following information:

- (a) the proposed changes to the political subdivision's health insurance benefits, including:
  - (i) a description of the political subdivision's current health insurance plans and each plan's co-pays, deductibles and other cost-sharing plan design features, enrollment (broken out by enrollment in individual, individual plus one, and family plans), annual premium total cost, and percentage of premium total cost paid by political subdivision;
  - (ii) a description of the proposed changes, including:(a) the earliest practical date for implementing the changes under law;(b) each plan to be offered, and the projected enrollment under each plan, including continued projected enrollment for subscribers covered by existing collective bargaining agreements that specify plan design features; retirees enrolled and being transferred for the first time to Medicare under M.G. L. c. 32B, § 18A and Medicare supplemental health insurance plans; and subscribers moved to the new, proposed insurance plans; and (c) the proposed dollar amounts for each plan's co-pays, deductibles and other cost-sharing plan design features. A proposal shall not include a health benefit plan design feature which seeks to achieve premium savings by offering a limited network of providers unless the appropriate public authority also offers a health benefit plan to all subscribers that does not contain a limited network of providers.
- (b). the co-payments, deductibles, tiered provider network co-payments and other cost-sharing plan design features for the same or most similar benefits of the non-Medicare plan and the co-payments, deductibles, and other cost-sharing plan design features for the same or most similar benefits of the Medicare-extension plan with the largest subscriber enrollment offered by the Commission, as provided by the Commission under M.G.L. c. 32B, §28;
- (c). the appropriate public authority's estimate of anticipated savings of such changes and the supporting information and analysis, including but not limited to:
  - i. the total projected premium costs and enrollment of plans under the existing coverage for the first 12-month period in which the appropriate public authority seeks to make changes as if no such changes were made,

ii. the anticipated total projected premium costs of plans, including plans with the proposed changes, and anticipated enrollment for the same 12-month period,

iii. the analysis that the appropriate public authority has to support its estimate of savings and the projected premium costs which may include quotes or bids from any insurance plan, third party administrator or insurance broker regarding the total premium cost of such plans with and without the proposed changes; demographic data regarding the number of employees, the number of subscribers, the number of subscribers enrolled in non-Medicare plans (by coverage -family or individual) and Medicare-extension plans; any data regarding out-of-pocket costs paid by subscribers; and any other factors relied upon by the appropriate public authority, including any information provided by an actuary or other consultant in developing the savings estimate.

If the appropriate public authority has indicated that it is considering transferring to the commission, it shall include in its analysis the estimates regarding plan choice that subscribers will make if transferred to the commission.

The savings estimate shall not take into account: savings resulting from transferring eligible retirees to Medicare under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 18A, but the savings estimate shall include savings due to proposed increases in dollar amounts for co-pays and deductibles for Medicare-extension plans under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 22 or the savings resulting from the transfer to Commission's medicare extension plans under M.G.L. c. 32B, §23.

The savings estimate shall be calculated based on the number of subscribers who will be covered under the proposed plans, including subscribers covered by existing collective bargaining agreements for whom implementation of the proposed changes would be delayed under St. 2011, c. 69, § 4. The appropriate public authority shall allocate funds to the mitigation plan in proportion to the number of total subscribers who will be covered under the proposed plan, with additional funds allocated when the plan changes are implemented for additional subscribers. Subscribers will not be eligible for mitigation funds before they are transferred to the new plans.

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### (1) Creation of the panel

- (a) The appropriate public authority shall notify the Secretary in writing within 3 business days after the beginning of the 30-day negotiation period under 801 CMR 52.04. The notice shall include the start and end dates of the 30-day negotiation period, and the name and contact information of the public authority's representative for the health insurance review panel. The appropriate public authority shall provide each member of the public employee committee with a copy of the notice to the Secretary.
- (b) Within 3 business days after receiving copies of notice to the Secretary under (a), the public employee committee shall select one representative for the panel and give notice to the appropriate public authority and the Secretary. Within 10 days after receiving this notice, the Secretary shall provide the appropriate public authority, the public employee committee, and the public authority and public employee committee representatives ("the parties") with a list ("the list") of 3 qualified, impartial potential members available to serve on the review panel. Impartial members shall have professional experience in dispute mediation and professional experience in municipal finance or municipal health benefits. The Secretary shall also provide the parties with the name of an actuary selected by the Commission to assist the panel in verifying the savings calculations if no agreement is reached within the 30-day period and a panel is convened.

- (c) Within 3 business days after receiving the list, the appropriate public authority and the public employee committee shall jointly select the third member for the panel from the list and shall notify the Secretary of their joint selection.
- (d) If the appropriate public authority and the public employee committee cannot agree within 3 business days on which person from the list to select as the third member of the review panel, the notice by the public authority to the Secretary shall include notification that the parties have been unable to reach agreement of the selection of a name from the list of potential impartial panel members. If the public authority and the public employee committee cannot agree, the Secretary shall appoint the impartial member from the list and notify the parties not later than the end of the 30-day negotiation period.
- (2) If the appropriate public authority and the public employee committee are unable to reach a written agreement on the public authority's proposal within 30 calendar days, the matter shall be submitted to the municipal health insurance review panel. The appropriate public authority shall submit its original proposal to the panel within 3 business days after the end of the 30-day negotiation period, with a copy sent to the Secretary and each member of the public employee committee. The appropriate public authority shall submit to the panel the same proposal that it made to the public employee committee. If the proposal includes the introduction of a limited network plan, the appropriate public authority shall provide an enrollment survey, a determination of which subscribers would enroll in a broad plan and which subscribers would enroll in a limited network plan, and the effect that the addition of a limited network plan would have on total premium costs and on disproportionately affected subscribers. The results of the enrollment survey shall be considered in the savings analysis.
- (3) The public employee committee shall also submit any alternate mitigation proposal to the panel and any other information the public employee committee wants the panel to consider with respect to any other matters before them within 3 business days after the end of the 30-day negotiation period, with a copy sent to the Secretary and the other parties.
- (4) Any fee or compensation provided to the impartial panel member for service on the panel shall be shared equally between the public employee committee and the appropriate public authority. The impartial members selected from the lists provided by the Secretary will be reimbursed only for reasonable travel expenses.
- 52.06 The health insurance review panel review process

- (1) At any time before the panel has made decisions in accordance with this section, the parties may agree in writing, with copies to the panel and the Secretary, to terminate or suspend the review process for a stated period of time because they have reached an agreement, would like additional time to negotiate an agreement under Section 52.04, have mutually decided to return to collective bargaining pursuant to M.G.L. c. 150E or have mutually decided to resume negotiations under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 19.
- (2) If both parties have not mutually agreed to terminate the review process, within 2 business days after receipt of notice of submission to the panel, the impartial member of the review panel shall fix a time, date, and place for the panel to convene and shall give notice to the parties.
- (3) Meetings of the panel shall be conducted under the Open Meeting Law. The impartial member shall chair the panel's meetings and shall arrange for suitable records to be kept. The impartial member shall ensure that each member receives advance notice of the time, place and agenda for each meeting. All decisions shall be by recorded vote.
- (4) When the panel convenes on the date and time set by the impartial panel member, the panel shall do the following:
  - (a) Review the public authority's proposed changes
    - (1) Determine within 10 days whether the proposed increased dollar amounts for co-payments, deductibles, and other costsharing plan design features for the non-Medicare plan under M.G.L. c. 32B, § 22 exceed the dollar amounts of the plan design features for the same or most similar benefits offered by the commission for the non-Medicare plan under section 4 of M.G.L. c.32A with the largest subscriber enrollment,. If such increased amounts do not exceed the dollar amounts of the plan design features for the same or most similar benefits offered by the commission for the non-Medicare plan under section 4 of chapter 32A with the largest subscriber enrollment, the panel shall approve the appropriate public authority's immediate implementation of the proposed changes under M.G.L. c. 32b, § 22, subject to Section 52.07. Where the political subdivision is not proposing a tiered provider network, the determination shall be made by comparing the savings that would result if the dollar amounts of the co-pays. deductibles and other cost-sharing plan design features in the political subdivision's plan equaled the dollar amounts of the copays, deductibles and other cost-sharing plan design features under tier 2 of the commission's most-subscribed plan. Where the political subdivision currently is proposing a tiered provider

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543 544 545 network that is tiered differently from the tiering in the commission's most-subscribed plan, the determination shall be made by assuming the co-pays, deductibles and cost-sharing plan design features in each tier of the political subdivision's plan are equal to those in the same tier of the commission's most-subscribed plan, beginning with a comparison of the highest tier. Any health reimbursement arrangements created under a mitigation proposal shall be administered by the appropriate public authority and shall not be the responsibility of the Commission.
- (3) In no case shall the municipal health insurance review panel designate more than 25 percent of the estimated savings to subscribers.
- (4) All obligations on behalf of the appropriate public authority related to the mitigation proposal shall expire after the initial amount of estimated savings designated by the panel to be distributed to subscribers has been expended.
- (5) In reaching a decision on the proposal under this subsection, the municipal health insurance review panel may consider: (a) any alternative proposal from the public employee committee to mitigate, moderate or cap the impact of these changes for subscribers, (b) discrepancies between the percentage contributed by retirees, surviving spouses and their dependent and the percentage contributed by other subscribers, and (c) the impact of the changes on subscribers, including in particular the impact on retirees, low-income subscribers and subscribers with high out-of-pocket costs.
- (6) The panel's decision shall incorporate any agreements made by the parties, and shall constitute the written agreement between the public employee committee and the appropriate public authority. The agreement shall be binding on all subscribers and their representatives.

(d) Once the panel has taken the actions required above, the panel shall be considered dissolved.

52.07 Implementation of agreements reached pursuant to M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23

- (1) Subject to St. 2011, c. 69, § 4, a political subdivision shall implement changes to benefits for all subscribers as soon as practicable upon completing the process provided in M.G.L. c. 32B, § 21 and these regulations, but the public authority shall give subscribers at least 60 days notice before implementing any changes in health insurance benefits under these regulations. Implementation of changes under M.G.L. c. 32B, §22 shall occur not later than 90 days after a written agreement has been signed under 801 CMR 52.04 or 52.06 or, if the appropriate public authority and the public employee committee mutually determine that a mid-year change time would produce an undue burden, at the end of the current health insurance policy year. Implementation of transfer of subscribers to the commission shall be in accordance with the Commission's procedures. If a political subdivision provides notice to the commission by October 1, 2011 that it is transferring its subscribers to the commission and complies with the notice requirements provided by the Commission, the Commission shall allow the political subdivision to transfer its subscribers to the commission on or before January 1, 2012.
  - (2) Any political subdivision which does not seek to make changes under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23, including any political subdivision which votes against adopting G.L. c. 32B, §§ 21-23, shall file with the Executive Office for Administration and Finance a report by June 30, 2012 comparing existing plan design to the maximum possible savings available if health benefit changes were made pursuant to M.G.L. c. 32B, §21-23. To maintain comprehensive records of political subdivisions that make use of this process, savings in health insurance costs that resulted, and potential savings not achieved, and to measure the extent to which political subdivisions took advantage of this process, each political subdivision shall file an annual report by June 30 of each year with the Secretary showing:
  - (i) the health insurance plans that it offers and the number of subscribers in each;
  - (ii) whether it made use of M.G.L. c. 32B, § 19 or §§ 21-23;
  - (iii) if it did not make use of these processes, the maximum possible savings available if health benefit changes were made pursuant to M.G.L. c. 32B, §21-23.
- (3) A political subdivision whose subscribers are currently covered by the commission shall not implement changes under this procedure until it has followed the procedure for withdrawal from coverage by the commission under the process set forth in the commission's regulations.
- (4) If a political subdivision initiated the process for implementing changes in its group health insurance benefits under M.G.L. c. 32B, §§21 -23 before the effective date of these regulations and has proceeded in a manner inconsistent with any provision of these regulations, the Secretary may waive or modify those inconsistent provisions for that political subdivision provided that the political subdivision comply with all requirements

Attached please find the FY2012 Supplemental Budget and FY2012 revised revenue estimates. We were pleased to learn last week that New Growth which was initially projected at \$350,179 was certified by the Department of Revenue at \$547,402. The Supplemental Budget request is \$244,842 plus \$150,000 that must be appropriated from General Fund revenues to the sidewalk account. \$150,000 is equal to fifty percent of the revenue generated from the City Council's adoption of the local option meals tax, however, Massachusetts General Laws require revenue generated from the tax to be deposited into the general fund. By appropriating these funds we will be able to continue our sidewalk work.

In addition to New Growth being certified higher than anticipated, the City also received a \$155,975 increase in local aid. The increases in local receipts, state aid, and new growth estimates have eliminated the need to use \$500,000 from the Stabilization Account to supplement the original FY2012 budget. The budget will now use \$300,000 from Free Cash to balance, however, please note that this is an \$85,000 reduction in reserves used to balance the FY2011 budget.

The supplemental budget must be passed before we set the tax rate on November 28<sup>th</sup>. Please refer to the following explanations of the items in the supplemental budget. They are categorized by department and request:

## Fire Department - \$62,569.00

The City and Firefighter union agreed to terms of a new collective bargaining agreement after the FY2012 budget was approved. \$62,569 will cover the costs associated with the new agreement including a 2% wage increase (which also requires a 2% increase in holiday pay and longevity line items) in FY12. The new agreement also included a \$250 increase in clothing allowances and

increases in hazardous material stipends and education incentives. The city also agreed to cover the cost of hepatitis vaccinations which is an appropriate expenditure and this practice has become commonplace for municipalities. Please note that this appropriation will cover the only guaranteed financial increases in the four year agreement between the city and the union.

As you are aware, the union agreed to vacation restrictions as part of the agreement. I am pleased to report that as a result of those restrictions, the fire department has only expended 34.4% of its overtime budget to date.

#### Police Department - \$ 89,600.00

The City Council transferred funds from the police department personnel salary line item into the retirement account to fund pay outs for two unexpected retirements; \$36,100.00 is needed to replenish the salary account.

The unexpected retirements resulted in a transitional period in which the police department interviewed and eventually filled those positions. As a result of the vacant positions, the department exceeded normal overtime expenditures. In addition, at my direction, the police department incurred significant overtime costs during Yankee Homecoming. Given the increased concern over violent activity during the week, I determined that increased personnel were absolutely necessary. The cost overtime costs associated with Yankee Homecoming was \$16,057.97 Appropriating \$25,000 should sufficiently fund the overtime account for the balance of the fiscal year.

The Marshal has taken one marked cruiser out of service because of extraordinary maintenance costs that would exceed the value of the vehicle. The department also has an unmarked detective car that failed inspection and also needs repairs that exceed its value. The leasing costs of two of the current cruisers has come offline and the FY2012 budget anticipated the acquisition of two new cruisers. The \$13,500 requested appropriation will fund radio equipment for these two new cruisers and the purchase of one used unmarked cruiser to replace the detectives' vehicle.

Fuel costs over the summer were higher than what was anticipated during the budget process. While the city increased fuel appropriations across departments in the FY12 budget, the police department will need to increase its appropriation by \$15,000. The Marshal has implemented strict mileage limitations in order to control fuel consumption.

### Health Department - \$5,250.00

The Health Department requested in an increased appropriation in both the care of animals and removal of animals line items. The Health Department had an increased its rabies testing on bats and skunks and incurred the costs of beaver removal at Doe Run.

The Health Department also has requested an increased appropriation in the per diem inspection line item. The Department conducted several ground water tests at the National Grid remediation site and launched the Dog Ambassador Program in response to the new off leash program. Both the ground water testing and Dog Ambassador Program depleted this line item. The \$2,500 increased appropriation will cover sidewalk snow removal and recycling enforcement.

#### Youth Services - \$10,500.00

Youth Services has consistently increased its enrollment over the past several years and now manages cash receipts in excess of \$250,000 annually. The Department is in need of professional accounting support. This appropriation will fund a part time five hour per week book keeper position to assist with reconciliation, warrant preparation and grant management.

The Skate Guard line item was reduced by \$3,000 during the budget process. The hope was that 12,000 would cover the costs for FY12, however, the good weather during the summer months resulted in extensive use of the skate park and there is a need to increase the appropriation in order to provide adequate coverage for the remainder of the year.

Youth Services needs to increase its Kelley School expense line item by \$2,500 to fund the building's utility costs. The original appropriation of \$18,000 has remained fixed since before NYS moved into the building and is not reflective of the true costs of operating the building.

Mayor's Office - \$19,310.00

Nancy Earls serves as the Director of the Learning Enrichment Center. Ms. Earls has a contract with the City which pays her an annual salary of \$53,560. \$20,000 was appropriated in both the City and School Department budget, but an increase of \$13,560 is needed in order to adhere to the contract.

Jennifer Lamarre, Human Resources Coordinator has done a tremendous job at organizing the City's personnel files. Upon her review, Ms. Lamarre identified several critical needs including the City's obligation to comply with HIPAA regulations. \$5,000 is requested to complete the organization of both the active and retired employee medical files by a HIPAA-qualified professional. This work has begun, but there is no budget to complete it. The City could potentially be fined for non-compliance unless this work is completed. The City remains confident that file organization should result in potential savings when discrepancies are identified and corrected during the process.

The Mayor's Office decreased its postage appropriation during the budget process. It appears the line item will not quite cover the annual costs and as a result \$750 needs to be appropriated to cover postage costs.

## Library - \$7,900.00

The Library had one retirement this year, two employees on leave under the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and has had to incur overtime costs in order to backfill positions. The Head Librarian estimates that the personnel salary line item will need to be increased by \$3,900 in order to cover personnel costs for the remainder of the fiscal year.

The Library has also incurred significant maintenance costs associated (\$3,656 to date) with the aging HVAC system. \$4,000 is needed to continue maintaining the HVAC system and other equipment in the Library.

#### Veteran Services - \$20,000.00

Similar to FY11, the demand for veteran benefits has exceeded original estimates. Kevin Hunt, Director of Veteran Services requested \$80,000 to cover the remainder of the year, but we decided to fund this line item incrementally considering how demand can fluctuate during the year.

## Council On Aging - \$1,300.00

The Council on Aging is jointly purchasing a van with the Town of Salisbury to be shared by the two communities. Newburyport's contribution to this purchase will require a \$1,300 appropriation.

### Parks Commission - \$2,250.00

The Parks Commission has to fund the removal of invasive weeds at the Bartlett Mall. This is estimated to cost \$2,250 and will need to be completed at the beginning of the spring.

## Information Technology - \$15,000.00

The new IT system and phone system will be in place by the beginning of the calendar year. The new systems will require backup monitoring and support services which will cost approximately \$2,500 per month. This request will fund these services from January 1, 2012 through June 30, 2012.

# Planning & Development - \$11,163.00

An \$11,163.00 request for appropriation is needed to fund a part time 15 hour per week Conservation Agent effective December 1, 2011.

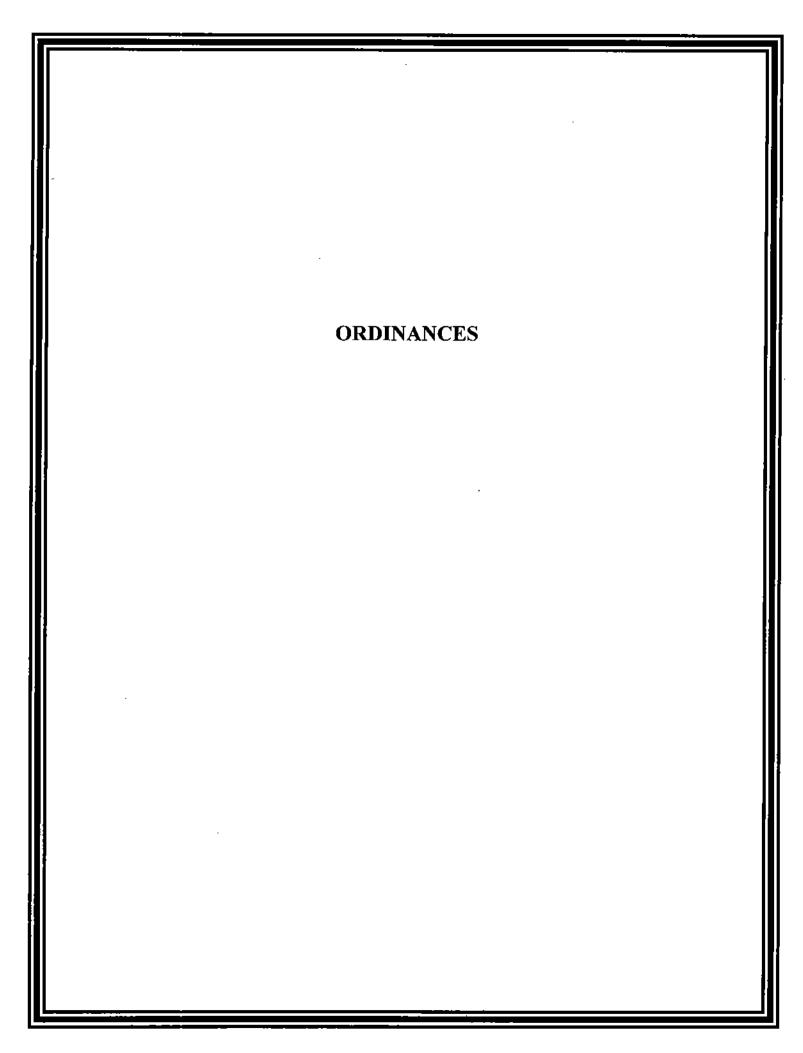
