Transfer Request - Full-time Parks Director

I have been committed to growing the budget to fund parks maintenance and capital improvements to meet long-standing and important needs City-wide. Over the years, I have also advocated for increasing parks staffing. With nearly 100 acres spread over 20 parks, I now believe that it is time for Newburyport to commit to formally establishing a Parks Department with a full-time Director. For the City to maximize its parks as assets, we need to establish a framework for growth and devote more human resources to moving that vision forward.

The City's current Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP), drafted in 2012, repeatedly references the need for increasing parks staffing (relevant sections attached). In fact, the first priority of the report's seven-year action plan is to "expand Park Administrator position to full time." The OSRP also states "increasing the staff hours ... is an important first step toward: 1) improving customer service by ensuring Parks staff is available during regular City Hall hours; 2) improving coordination of maintenance and scheduling of city fields and facilities."

Over the past seven years, Lisë Reid has been doing her best with limited resources of time and funding to meet the expectations of the community. In FY06, Lisë began working 12 hours a week as a contractor for the Parks Commission for \$6,660 a year. Now a City staff member being paid for 29 hours a week at \$37,047 annually, Lisë's workload continues to stretch well beyond her allotted hours. Her job currently entails: maintaining 20 parks including the Rail Trail; managing park improvement projects from grant writing to construction management; organizing and publicizing community events; public relations

for promotion of parks and events; field and facility scheduling and permitting for seasonal league requests as well as special events; general administration and financial management; managing volunteers through creation and management of support-a-spot program; coordinating with the Bartlett Mall and Moseley Woods Commissions; administering the Mayor Gayden W. Morrill Charitable Foundation (MGWMCF); managing the Newburyport Parks Conservancy; managing the dog waste contract and off leash program in conjunction with the Health Department.

In addition, Lisë's responsibilities have been expanded of late to include:

- Managing field improvement initiative. Coordinating improvements to existing
  fields and new construction projects, creating and managing centralized field
  scheduling, and oversight of City-wide field maintenance, including school athletic
  facilities.
- Managing Adult Recreation programs. Adult recreation was identified as a need by the recent Open Space and Recreation Plan study. The Parks Department is launching its first recreation programs this coming spring and summer.
- More active participation in Atkinson Park maintenance. The Atkinson Common Commissioners, also trustees of the Belleville Improvement Society, need more support from City staff and additional City funding and can no longer sustain their level of commitment the park.

A full job description of her current expanded role is attached.

Lisë has invested a tremendous amount of time building strong relationships with City staff, members of local foundations, and key school and athletic league personnel. She has worked with the trustees of the MGWMCF to shift their focus from only funding capital projects to supplementing ongoing parks maintenance needs. She has created the Newburyport Parks Conservancy as an important alternative funding vehicle. She has been key in moving the city forward in establishing improved athletic fields. She spearheaded the task force that studied the need for additional field space in Newburyport and continues to lead efforts to expand fields, improve existing fields, and establish solid maintenance plans to keep our facilities in better condition in the future.

Given this workload, it is no longer realistic to expect a part-time employee to deliver this level of service. We need to support the creation of a Director position with a salary more in line with similar positions around the state and with other City Department Heads. A survey of 15 cities and towns similar in population size to Newburyport revealed that FY2012 Parks Director salaries averaged about \$71,0001. Accordingly, I am proposing that

the new full-time Parks Director position will be funded at \$64,000 annually. The transfer request that I have submitted will cover Lisë's increased hours and pay rate effective March 1, 2014. If approved, she will not receive any COLA increases until July 1, 2015 at the earliest.

The Parks Commission strongly supports bringing on Lisë full-time (letter attached), as they are well aware of the dedication that she brings to the job and the value that she adds to the community. Residents have responded positively to the increased attention being given to our parks. They recognize that parks are essential to building a healthy and sustainable community. According to the National Recreation and Parks Association, living close to parks is consistently related to higher physical activity levels for both adults and youth. Increasing access to recreation facilities is an essential strategy for preventing childhood obesity as well. Economically, parks attract tourists and increase tax revenues. More than 30 studies nationwide have showed that placing a house next to a park increases that property's value by up to 25%.

We have all witnessed the many positive effects of having a sufficiently funded parks system and I am appreciative for the support that the Council has shown in increasing the Parks budget over the past several years. The difference that this funding has made in improving our parks has been impressive. I consider it to be a hallmark of my administration to date. I ask for your support in recognizing the need to have a full-time Parks Director and to compensate the position at a level in line with other similar positions in comparable communities in order to continue our commitment to enhancing our parks and field space.



# Parks Director Job Description

### **Position Purpose:**

The Parks Director will plan, direct, manage, develop and oversee the activities and operations of the Parks Department including maintenance, rehabilitation and expansion of all municipal parks and trails, programs and capital projects; will provide project management for parks projects; supervise, assign, coordinate, review, and promote the work of staff, volunteers and contractors responsible for providing recreation programs, services, and activities; develop and manage volunteer programs; plan special events; contribute to local master planning; and provide highly responsible and complex support to the Office of the Mayor while professionally and effectively managing department resources within the policies and standards prescribed by the Mayor, City Council and Newburyport Parks Commission. This position will coordinate activities with other City departments, commissions and outside agencies and coordinate with local community members and businesses. This position will be directly responsible for organizing, coordinating and overseeing the Newburyport Parks Conservancy and for organizing, coordinating and overseeing the city's administrative responsibilities and relationship with The Mayor Gayden W. Morrill Charitable Foundation.

### **Supervision:**

Supervision Scope:

Performs a variety of responsible functions of a supervisory, administrative, and technical nature requiring the exercise of judgment, diplomacy, and self-direction; work at this level requires a working knowledge of departmental operations, local and state laws; work involves both standard and non-standard practices and techniques providing highly responsible and complex support to the Office of the Mayor, professionally and effectively managing department resources within the policies and standards prescribed by the Mayor, City Council and Newburyport Parks Commission.

### Supervision Received:

Works under the general direction of the Mayor; follows established general and special orders, rules, regulations, policies and procedures of the City and general laws of the State of Massachusetts.

#### Supervision Given:

Provides supervision to parks staff, volunteers and contractors.

### **Job Environment:**

Parks Director position is performed both outdoors in city parks and in a moderately noisy office with regular interruptions during the day from the general public to deal with citizens' or volunteers or contractors issues and problems;

Make constant and periodic contact with other municipal departments, vendors, attorneys, engineers, construction contractors, developers, various state agencies, various boards and commissions and the general public; communication is frequently in person, by telephone, and e-mail

### **Essential Functions:**

(The essential functions or duties listed below are intended only as illustrations of the various types of work that may be performed. The omission of specific statements of duties does not exclude them from the position if the work is similar, related or a logical assignment to the position.)

- Maintain and manage 20+ parks including coordinating with Department of Public Services,
   Essex County Sherriff's Department and managing private contracts
- Manage and supervise parks staff, volunteers and contractors
- Manage park improvement projects including planning and design, grant writing, procurement, permitting and construction management
- Organize, publicize, and execute community and fundraising events such as Clean Sweep,
   Winter Carnival, other parks cleanups and annual conservancy Wine Tasting
- Perform public relations ongoing for promotion of parks and events using all media including press, social media, video and television
- Schedule and permit fields and other facilities under Parks Commission jurisdiction for seasonal league requests as well as special events
- Perform general administrative and financial management
- Administer The Mayor Gayden W. Morrill Charitable Foundation (MGWMCF) managing relationships with trustees, organizing their annual meeting with the city and maintaining cyclic procedures for receiving their annual donation; developing and designing presentation materials for city's recommendations to foundation; publicizing and processing grant round applications.
- Recruit and manage volunteers to fill labor gaps for parks projects and management of Support-a-Spot program
- Oversee satellite parks commissions for Atkinson Common, Bartlet Mall and Moseley Woods
- Manage Park Conservancy administration, bookkeeping, reporting, web design and maintenance, publicity, fundraising and event organization, creation of and coordination with a conservancy board
- Manage dog waste contract and off leash program in conjunction with the Health Department
- Manage city-wide parks and non-parks field improvement initiative including managing field improvement projects
- Manage centralized field scheduling
- Work with schools to oversee city-wide field maintenance
- Create and manage adult recreation programs in cooperation with Youth Services and Council on Aging as necessary
- Attend regular public and non-public meetings during business and non-business hours
- Identify and secure sources of funding for park improvement projects, ongoing maintenance, and recreation programming
- Respond to the public's inquiries and comments

### **Other Functions:**

Provide web design and content

- Provide graphic design services for Newburyport Parks and Newburyport Parks Conservancy fundraising and public relations initiatives, recreation promotion and programming, parks events, etc.
- Create and produce video programming and coordinate with public access TV to publicize parks activities

# **Education, Training and Experience:**

The Park's Director work history must include well rounded experience across parks with five (5) or more years of successful and progressive levels of responsibility culminating in a role equivalent to Director or an Assistant or Division Director. The highest regional demand for new facilities included playgrounds, neighborhood parks, and golf courses, and better access to agricultural lands, lakes and ponds, rivers and streams, and coastal beaches. Need was nearly as strongly expressed for bikeways and trails or greenways.

In response to funding preferences, residents support improving access for people with disabilities more strongly than in any other region. Support for maintaining existing facilities ranks at the top of this region's priority list, as is also the case statewide. Adding park staff received the lowest priority ranking, but still exceeds a two-thirds majority.

# Management Needs

It is important for an Open Space and Recreation Plan to outline specific recommendations that will help the city meet its open space and recreation goals in a strategic manner. Specifically, it is necessary for the city to have the tools and policies, staff capacity, and financial availability at hand to implement the recommendations of the plan.

Like many other Essex County communities, Newburyport faces imminent development pressure in many locations at once. Perhaps the greatest management challenge in meeting goals under these circumstances involves limits on resources — both financial limits and limits in the time city employees, officials, and volunteer board members can work on these goals. Finding opportunities to help various city boards and officials understand open space and recreation issues, methods, and priorities is a substantial challenge. Sketching out ways to find bridge financing, additional sources of local "match" money, and otherwise leveraging funds is also a challenge.

### PARKS MANAGEMENT

The management and maintenance of parks within Newburyport are the responsibility of seven commissions. The Department of Public Services provides a basic level of maintenance support, including mowing and trash removal, at most parks. Atkinson Common is further supported by a dedicated non-profit organization that provides multiple services and generates income, and all parks and open spaces are eligible for financial support from the Mayor Gayden W. Morrill Charitable Foundation for capital improvements. Playgrounds and fields on school properties are the responsibility of the schools.

Many of the city's parks, in particular those with athletic fields and facilities, are programmed with city school, Youth Services and sports league activities. In addition, a number of parks one-day events. Requests for use of the fields and facilities are the responsibility of the various commissions and in one case (Bartlet Mall) the City Council, but the actual programming of the events is the responsibility of more than ten leagues in addition to school teams, Newburyport Youth Services and single day users.

### Parks Staff

Currently, the city employs a part-time Parks Coordinator which the Mayor has increased from 13 hours per week to 25 hours per week with the goal to increase to full-time by 2013. The Parks Commission, Office of Planning and Development, and stakeholder groups have all expressed support for expanding that position to full-time. Proposed responsibilities are outlined in the Appendix. While increasing the staff hours and responsibilities would not solve all of the park management and maintenance issues, it is an important first step toward: 1) improving customer service by ensuring Parks staff is available during regular City Hall hours; 2) improving coordination of maintenance and scheduling of city fields and facilities.

### Maintenance Staff

Maintenance of the city's parks, playgrounds and school grounds is the responsibility of the Department of Public Services. The Parks Commission also shares responsibility for parks and playgrounds and, for some parks, the responsibility is also shared with a commission or trust (as outlined below). The Parks Commission and other city commissions and trusts do not have staff to perform park maintenance duties, but rather coordinate with DPS regarding issues beyond routine mowing and trash removal.

The Department of Public Services (DPS) currently employs 17 full time employees (down from more than 40 employees 30 years ago) and six part time seasonal (May through August) employees (down from eight in the recent past). The Department's other major duties include: storm drain maintenance, street and sidewalk maintenance, street line painting, street sweeping, snow and ice removal, city cemetery maintenance and burials, tree planting and trimming, beach raking, and city-wide trash clean up. The staff and time dedicated to routine maintenance of parks, playgrounds and school grounds is highly variable, as it is dependent on and often subsidiary to the city's other maintenance needs as well as the weather. While the Department attempts to follow a weekly schedule for mowing and trash removal, calls for additional services, such as tree pruning or removal, playground and court equipment maintenance, and general clean-up, are difficult for the Department to respond to.

Due to serious budget cuts for maintenance beginning in 2002, it has been increasingly challenging to continue a high level of maintenance for the city's recreational resources. Maintenance is further challenged by the need to coordinate with various responsible commissions and other organizations that request services to support recreational facilities and programs.

### Commissions and Trusts

The Parks Commission, a five member appointed commission was established in 1994. It is responsible for all municipal parks in Newburyport that are not part of a school property or under control of the Waterfront Trust. Approximately 15 parks (102 acres) fall under the jurisdiction of the Parks Commission and are maintained with the support of the city's Division of Public Services, the Board of Commissioners, and athletic leagues. Constraints of budget and staff capacity mean that regular maintenance provided by DPS is generally limited to lawn mowing and trash pick. An ongoing concern for the Parks Commission is lack of consistent funding or capacity to provide

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) provides grants through the *Drinking Water Supply Protection Grant Program*. The Department of Fish and Game (DFG) administers grants through the *Landowner Incentive Program*.

Other state grants include the Agricultural Environmental Enhancement Program (AEEP), Environmental Education Grants (EEG), Massachusetts Environmental Trust General Grants, and the Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund (MPPF).

In addition, funding for transportation projects is available through *Chapter 90 Local Aid Funding* and the *Transportation Enhancement Program* (TEP).

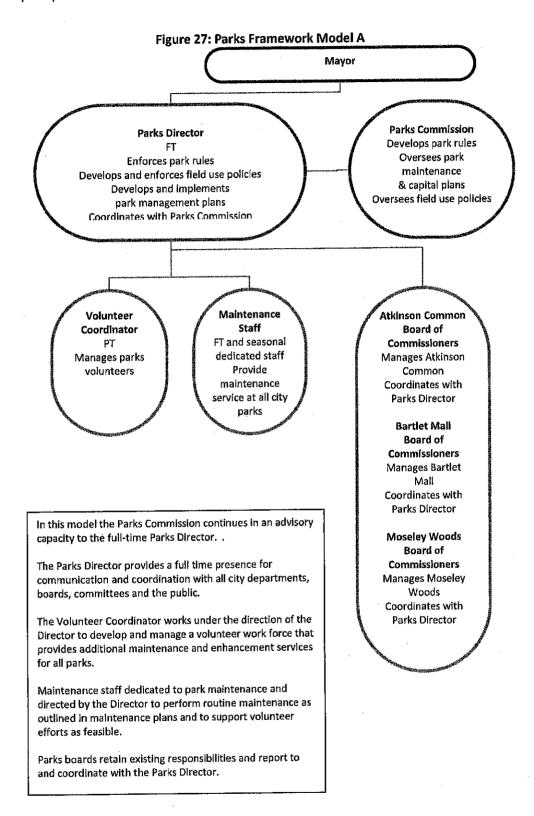
### POTENTIAL MODELS FOR PARK MANAGEMENT

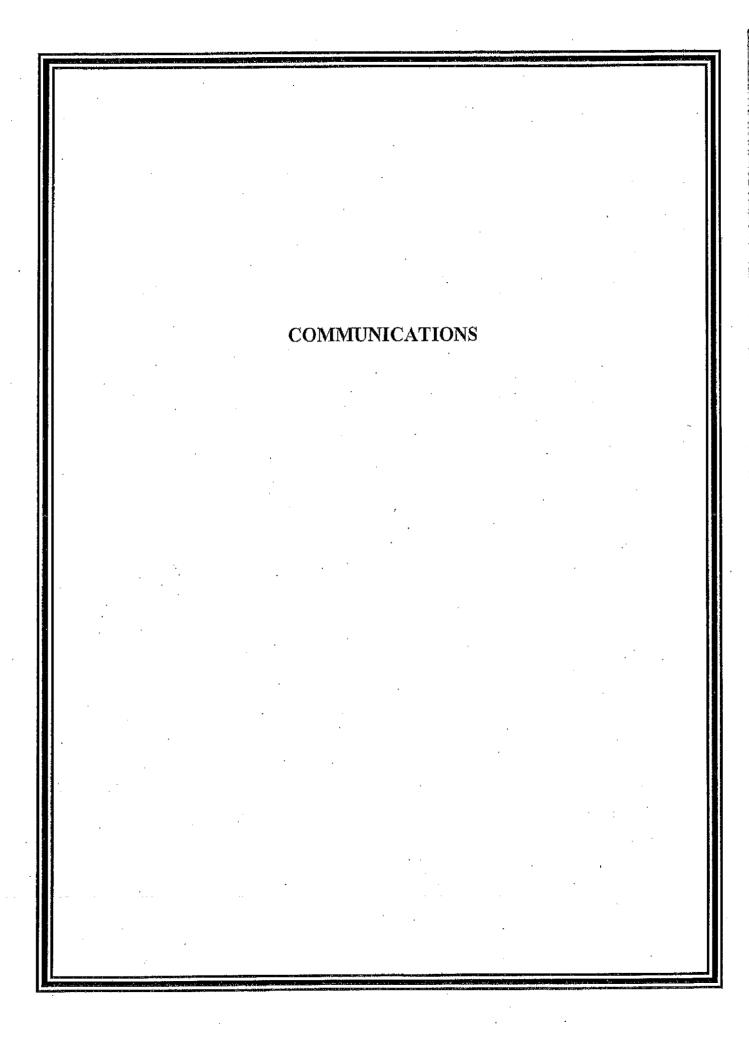
The following two models for a park management framework keep the general components of Newburyport's current framework and adjust with realignments and additions. In both instances, the Parks Commission has oversight responsibilities for the City's parks system and advises a Parks Director who is supported by staff capable of day-to-day management that will improve the condition of the system and lead to long-term sustainability.

The models also retain existing satellite park boards that have varying degrees of responsibility and capacity. Consideration should be given to eliminating boards whose responsibilities can be assumed by friends' groups and the Parks Commission. Eliminating redundancy within the management framework will create greater efficiency and less confusion.

The models assume that city funding will be appropriated to fund the expanded and new positions. However the models also create a framework that will increase the city's capacity to maintain and improve parks and increase resident and business involvement through the development of a volunteer work force.

Another model to consider, as recommended by this Plan, would be a Parks and Recreation Department with a paid director and other staff and with or without advisory boards (Parks, Atkinson Common, Moseley and Bartlet Mall).

**DRAFT Contract** Between The City Council And Richard B. Jones, City Clerk

This Agreement is made this 31st day of January by and between the City Council (herein after City Council) and Richard B. Jones (herein after City Clerk).

The City Council and the City Clerk hereby agree that the following terms and conditions shall govern, subject to annual appropriation, the salary and fringe benefits to which Richard B. Jones shall be entitled as City Clerk for the City of Newburyport.

# 1. Term of Contract and Termination

# A. Term of Contract and Probation Period

This agreement is for a term of three years commencing on January 31, 2014 and ending on January 31, 2017. Reappointment is subject to the majority vote of City Council. In the event the City Clerk is re-appointed for another three (3) year term, this contract can be extended and amended with terms that are agreeable to the City Council and the City Clerk. This contract is also subject to amendment in the event of any significant changes in job responsibilities or duties.

If the City Clerk decides to resign from the position at any time during the three (3) year contract, the City Clerk shall provide the City at least sixty (60) calendar days written notice of said resignation.

# Disciplinary Action and Dismissal

The City Council reserve and retain the right to discharge, suspend, or otherwise discipline for just cause the employee covered by this agreement. The City Council shall provide the City Clerk with written notification of any contemplated discipline or dismissal for just cause.

# Non-Reappointment

The City Clerk position is subject to appointment. In the event that the City Clerk is not to be reappointed, the City Council shall ordinarily notify the City Clerk, in writing, ninety (90) days in advance. In the event such appointment is made by other City authorities, the appropriate City authority shall provide such said written notice. Such notice shall be hand delivered to the City Clerk with signed confirmation by the City Council President. The City shall provide one month severance pay to the City

Clerk if the ninety (90) days advance written notice of non-appointment is not provided by the City Council to the City Clerk.

### 2. Hours of Work

The City Clerk is a salaried position requiring at least a 40 hour work week. The days worked include all week days and also weekends as part of the Clerk's responsibilities extend to managing the paid parking program and its enforcement officers. The total hours worked will be based on the fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities of the position with full understanding the total number of hours of work may vary from week to week. The City Clerk is expected to attend evening and weekend meetings and events.

### 3. Essential Functions

The City Clerk serves as the official keeper of the municipal records. The City Clerk assembles the agenda packets with supporting documents for the City Council Meetings. The City Clerk is also responsible for overseeing local, state, and federal elections, maintaining financial records, serving as registrar of vital statistics, serving as a passport office manager, assuring the transparency of the munipality's conduct of business, and enforcement of Conflict of Interest policies.

The City Clerk manages four full-time employees (Assistant City Clerk, Administrative Assistant I, and Administrative Assistant II, Parking Enforcement Officer), 4 – 6 part-time Parking Enforcement Officers, and 40 election workers (event-related).

The City Clerk is also the Parking Clerk and therefore manages the Parking Department. The Parking Department includes the full-time parking enforcement officer and the parttime enforcement officers as well as the paid parking program. The paid parking program includes agreements to manage certain parking lots for the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority and the Waterfront Trust in addition to the City parking lots.

Additionally, the City Clerk manages the Passport Program which has two agents and one assistant.

The City Clerk shall perform his duties in accordance with all applicable local, state, and federal; regulations, laws, ordinances, and City Charter provisions.

# 4. Compensation

Subject to annual appropriation, the City Clerk currently receives \$90,000 annually. The budget for this salary comes from the following areas:

5. Professional Development

Consistent with existing practice the City shall grant reasonable time off without loss of pay and without charge to any other leave to attend conferences, seminars, or professional meetings, which are directly related to improving the City Clerk's knowledge and skills in his particular position. A request for such time off shall be made to the City Council as soon as practicable and shall outline the nature and extent of the proposed leave. Attendance at such conference on non-scheduled workdays shall not entitle the employee to any additional compensation or additional time off. The City may appropriate funds for tuition and related expenses for attending conferences.

The City will reimburse the City Clerk for the cost of attendance at seminars, conferences, and other meetings attended by employees, with prior approval of the Mayor. Mileage for travel shall be reimbursed at the current IRS rate.

### 6. Education

The City Clerk shall hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. A law degree is preferred.

# 7. Longevity

The City Clerk hereby waives any and all claim to longevity pay.

### 8. Insurance

The City Clerk is eligible for all health insurance benefits in accordance with the agreement negotiated the City and the Public Employee Committee (PEC agreement) pursuant to MGL Chapter 32B, Section 19. The city will pay seventy-five percent (75%) of the premium for the first \$2000.00 worth of Life insurance and the employee will pay twenty-five (25%) of the cost for the first \$2000.00 worth of Life insurance. The difference between the \$2000.00 life insurance and the \$5000 life insurance will be paid 100% by the City.

# 10. Vacation, Personal, Bereavement, Sick, and Jury Duty

### A. Vacation

The City Clerk will be entitled to five (5) week s vacation, each Fiscal Year. Vacation for the fiscal year is provided on July 1 of that Fiscal Year. With the City Council President's permission, the City Clerk may carry over ten (10) days of unused vacation from one fiscal year to the next. Upon termination of employment, the City Clerk shall be paid for any unused vacation previously accrued. If termination is caused by death, such payment shall be made to the City Clerk's spouse or beneficiary.

### B. Personal

The City Clerk shall be entitled to four (4) personal days per Fiscal Year. Unused personal days shall not be carried from year to year. Personal days are not cumulative form one Fiscal Year to the next and unused amounts are not eligible for buy-back upon retirement or termination of employment.

### C. Bereavement Leave

The City Clerk shall be entitled to five (5) days of paid bereavement time, without loss of pay, vacation, or other leave. This time off will be granted upon the death of an immediate family member (spouse, parent, child, step-child, foster-child, brother, sister, mother and father in-law, grandmother, grandfather, spouse's mother father grandmother, grandfather). Should the death occur during the City Clerk's scheduled vacation or days off, then the five (5) days of bereavement leave will be substituted for said vacation or days off, and the vacation.

### D. Sick Leave

The City Clerk has accumulated sick leave and will continue to accumulate 1.25 days of sick leave each month. Sick leave is cumulative and carried forward from one Fiscal Year to the next. Upon retirement, the City Clerk will be paid 50% of the number of unused sick days with a maximum of days paid not to exceed eighty-five (85) days. There will be no buy-back of sick leave if the employee resigns or is terminated.

### E. Jury Duty

If the City Clerk is requested for Jury Duty, he shall be given the time off without the loss of pay.

### 11. Holidays

The City Clerk shall be entitled to twelve (12) paid holidays. These are:

With your sponsorship, the Assessor's office would like to submit this order to the City Council for local acceptance. We currently have two veteran servicemen that this order would affect, and we would like to be able to grant an exemption for these two servicemen and any future veteran applicants who would qualify for this exemption in the future.

# Explanation:

The current eligibility for a Veteran exemption is that a serviceman would have had to have residency in Massachusetts for at least 6 months before entering into the service. If the veteran was not a resident of Massachusetts before entering into the service they would not be eligible for an exemption until they had resided in Massachusetts for 5 years after leaving the service. This provision will change the residency requirement from 5 years to 1 year of residency. This provision would apply to all veteran's exemptions (Clauses 22, 22A-22E) and would commence in Fiscal Year 2015.

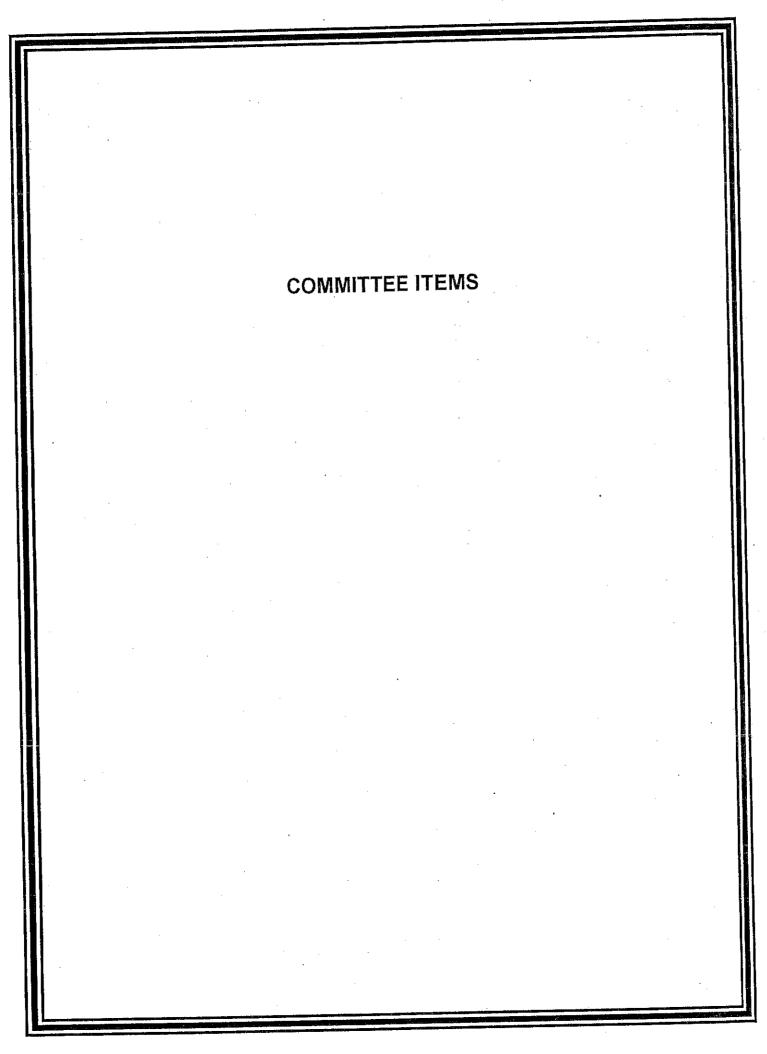

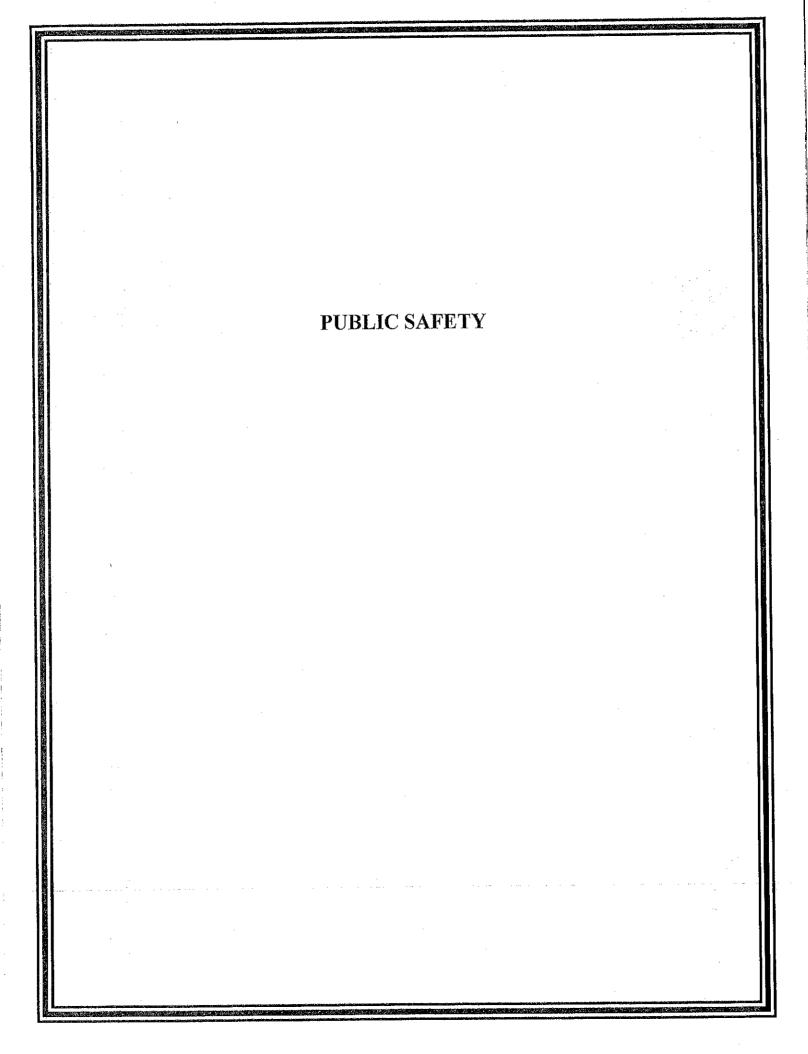

On Sunday, May 18, 2014, the American Diabetes Association is hosting the North Shore Tour de Cure - our annual one-day, non-competitive cycling event that begins and ends at the Topsfield Fair Grounds, Topsfield, MA. Funds raised from this event support the Association's mission: to prevent and cure diabetes and to improve the lives of all people affected by diabetes. I am writing to you today because we are in the process of organizing our 2014 routes, and our current plan will take our cyclists through Newburyport that day.

Tour de Cure is a fully-supported ride, not a race. All participants are required to sign waivers, wear helmets and follow the rules of the road. In addition they are all briefed multiple times leading up to, and the morning of the event on bicycle safety and Tour de Cure safety protocol. All routes will be clearly marked and we will have HAM radio operators, medical volunteers, and support vehicles to provide additional safety for our riders.

The ride has four routes (15mi, 31mi, 62ml and 100mi) and will begin at 7:00 a.m. and all riders must be off the route by 3:00 p.m. Our routes will be clearly marked and we will have route marshals dispersed along the ride to provide additional direction to cyclists. 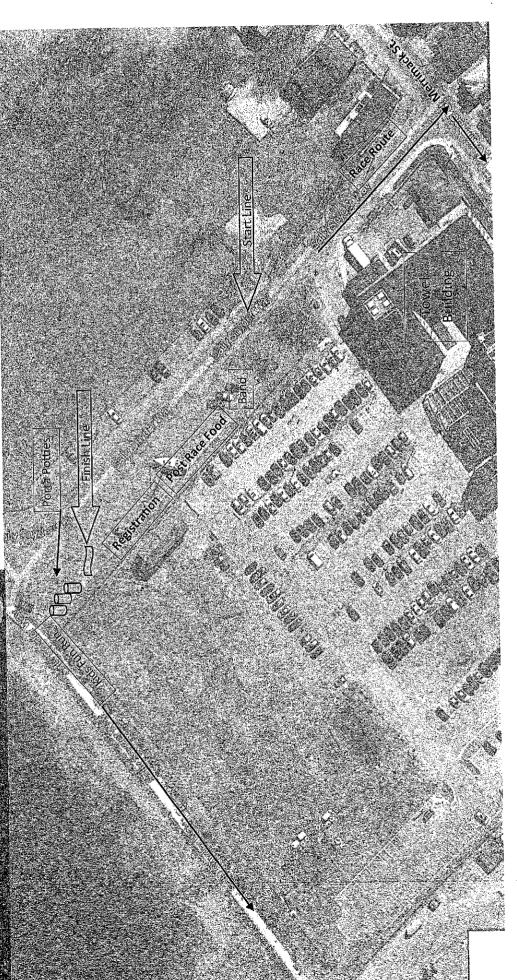

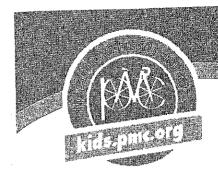
