



Capital Transfer Requests - Water & Sewer Enterprise Funds

Over the past few months, we have worked hard to identify and prioritize, both long-term and short-term, capital needs for the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds. After meeting with the Water and Sewer Commissions, the following projects have been identified as a priority for the upcoming fiscal year. These requests are consistent with the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) that was included in the FY2014 budget:

DPS Facility Expansion

The current DPS Facility at 16A Perry Way is over-capacity. Staff members, including the water distribution crew, sewer maintenance crew, and engineering office, have been working out of two trailers, which were meant to be temporary, but have been in place for over seven years now. The expansion of the DPS Facility would replace the trailers with a building of approximately 1,500 square feet and would also house the Water/Sewer Business Office.

The project is currently in the design phase, however construction could begin as early as the fall. The total cost is estimated at \$1.2 million to be funded by the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds.

HVAC Improvements

As part of the FY2013 budget, funds were appropriated to replace the HVAC at the garage, which houses the majority of the vehicles and equipment used by DPS. The work was unable to be completed in FY2013 due to a busy winter season. It is recommended that the \$33,000 budgeted by both divisions be transferred into a CIP account so that the necessary work can be completed as planned.

MaintStar Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS)

For the past year and a half, the City has been working with communities in the Merrimack Valley Planning Commission (MVPC) to identify the best software package to bring a CMMS to the municipalities in the region. After reviewing many systems, MaintStar was selected as

the preferred vendor. The City currently lacks a robust work order system and has operated based on an old Access database, which is no longer sustainable TY CLERK'S DEFICE NEWBURYPORT, MA

By participating in the MVPC agreement, the City will be able to gain access to a comprehensive work order system at a much discounted rate. This new work order system will have capability to link work orders to specific geographic locations using our existing GIS databank. It will also be flexible enough to be used to manage the variety of tasks carried out by the Highway, Water and Sewer divisions on any given day. Our goal is that this will greatly improve the tracking capability of incoming work requests and ultimately improve the customer experience.

The total initial set-up costs are \$50,500, \$20,000 of which will be covered by Community Innovation Challenge grant funding that the City of Newburyport in partnership with the MVPC received earlier this year. The \$30,500 balance will be funded by Water and Sewer Retained Earnings and General Fund Free Cash. The system will cost approximately \$5,000 annually to maintain and operate; this funding has been accounted for in the FY 2014 budget and will be divided evenly between the 3 DPS Divisions.

Meter Replacement Program

The City conducted a system-wide meter replacement program in 2008 at a cost of over one million dollars. Given that the meters have a life expectancy of 12-15 years, it is recommended that \$50,000 be funded each year from both the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds until 2023.

Vacuum Truck

The 1999 Vactor truck, used to clean out sewer lines, will be nearing the end of its useful life. Given the replacement cost of \$400,000, it is recommended that we create a CIP account with \$200,000 and fund the balance out of next year's retained earnings balance.

Water Main Replacement

Annual funding is needed to execute scheduled improvements to the City's aging water distribution infrastructure. In an effort to minimize the impact on the operating budget, funds have been designated each year to this capital account. As part of the roadwork project on Merrill Street, the City will be replacing the water main running down the street as early as July 2013. The water main replacement is estimated at \$100,000.

WWTF Security Fence

As you are aware, the \$32.65 million rehabilitation of the Wastewater Treatment Facility is at 80% completion. There are two major expenditures, which remain to be completed. Those include the replacement of the primary clarifiers and the installation of a fence around the new facility. It was originally anticipated that \$200,000 would be needed to replace the primary clarifiers and the same amount to install the fence. Funds were appropriated for the clarifiers, but have not been appropriated for the fence. Given the current budget status, the replacement of the primary clarifiers is now able to be funded out of the overall project budget. Therefore, it is recommended that those funds be reallocated to fund the installation of a fence once the project nears completion later this year.

The current fence at the facility has deteriorated over the years and is rusted with many gaps. There is a moderate amount of foot traffic along the trail adjacent to the facility, which would dramatically increase should the Rail Trail Extension Project take place. Given the number of exposed processes required to treat the wastewater, installing a secure fence around the entire facility would prevent unauthorized access and would greatly improve the appearance of this piece of City property on the waterfront.

At the end of FY2012, the Department of Revenue certified healthy retained earning balances for both the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds. For water, \$1,356,971 was certified, of which \$13,806 has been used year-to-date. The attached transfer request uses \$410,133 in water retained earnings, leaving a balance of \$933,033. Likewise for sewer, \$1,871,203 was certified, of which \$17,734 has been used year-to-date. The attached transfer request uses \$610,133 in sewer retained earnings, leaving a balance of \$1,243,336.

As we approach the beginning of a new fiscal year, the Water and Sewer Commissions are actively discussing rates for FY2014 and, as in years past, will approve new rates in June based on final approved expenditures. Despite significant increases to debt service in FY2014, a major goal of both boards is to ensure the stability of rates over the next several years; made possible by healthy retained earnings balances. As such, it is expected that further transfers will be requested into budget reserve line items, as to mitigate the rate increases needed to service the FY2014 debt payments. Such transfers, however, cannot be submitted until the final budget is approved by the City Council.

Re: Newburyport Library Archival Center Accomplishments

The mission of the Newburyport Archival Center is to preserve the historical heritage of Newburyport (and early Newbury) from the 1600s to the present through its large collection of books, manuscripts, photographs and other printed materials. Among the Center's expanded mission is the archival storage of City Hall records that extend back to the establishment of Newburyport in 1764.

This mission supports increased focus by Newburyport on its historical and cultural heritage to aid in economic development, tourism, educational outreach, enrichment and diversity. A Profile Complied by the Newburyport Archival Center Friends, May 2013

The Newburyport Archival Center has the mission within the Newburyport Public Library to preserve the historical heritage of Newburyport (and Newbury) from the 1600s to the present through its large collection of books, manuscripts, photographs and other printed materials.

This mission supports the increased focus by Newburyport on its historical and cultural heritage to aid in economic development, tourism, educational outreach, enrichment and diversity. Examples are the Newburyport Clipper Heritage Trail, Newburyport Cultural District, historical signage on the Clipper City Rail Trail and Harbor Walk, and histories supporting the application to the United States Coast Guard for designation as a Coast Guard City.

Annually, over 1,100 users visit the Newburyport Archival Center. Ten percent came from out of town, including two countries (Canada and England).

Among users are a group of authors, historians, genealogists and friends that have formed the *Archival Center Friends* to support and promote the mission of the Newburyport Archival Center. This group has compiled the attached profile and accomplishments of the Center.

The Center's collection of books, pamphlets, photographs, manuscripts, Unitarian church records, diaries, ephemera, microfilms, and internet access are outstanding testaments to Newburyport's rich history. Among the Center's expanded mission is the archival storage of records from City Hall that extend back to the establishment of Newburyport in 1764. The Center is open thirty-three hours over five and one-half days a week.

Newburyport Archival Center Friends: A group of authors, historians, genealogists and friends have formed the *Archival Center Friends* to support and promote the mission of the Newburyport Archival Center. This group has compiled this profile.

Users: The largest percentages of users are local. But others come from thirty-five towns and cities in Massachusetts, and over ten percent are from twenty-two other states. Two countries are represented — Canada and United Kingdom. Out of town users stay, dine, and shop when doing their research. (See attachment.)

Why Users Come: Among the users are city employees from the Office of Planning and Development; United States Coast Guard Station personnel, and newspaper reporters. Favorite topics are genealogies; cemetery records; house histories; children's projects; graduate thesis; photographs; Plum Island; fires; city directories; and veteran's records. (See attachment.)

Published Work: Over the last decade, there have been twenty-eight books and over one hundred newspaper articles published by Newburyport Archival Center users. Chris Enos, photographer, *Plum Island Collages and Homes 1994-2005*. Over 700 photographs taken by Chris Enos covering the years 1994-2005 were donated by her as part of a project she was working on to show the changes occurring to homes on Plum Island. The Newburyport Archival center is working with the community to document these Plum Island cottages. As development on the island intensifies this project will serve to document the history of Plum Island people and their homes. Chris Enos is a national recognized photographer who now lives in New Mexico. Marge Motes contacted Chris about here photographs, which she sent back to Newburyport for the archival center. With the assistance of Michael Bulger, of Plum Island, Skip and Marge Motes these were put together into three large notebooks. There is another book for the St. James Church.

Chris Enos, photographer, *St. James Church*, *Plum Island:* photographs 1994-2008. These images document the building site, interior and exterior of St. James, a Catholic Church that was located on the Northern Blvd., Plum Island. The photographs also document the demolition of the church in 2001, while the alt image; taken in 2008 shows the house that now stand on the site formerly occupied by the church.

Bill Lane, photographer, Collection: Photographs of Newburyport and vicinity, 1964-2000.

These images document life in Newburyport, Mass., a small seaport town. The majority of images document the 1960's through the 1980's. RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF NEWBURYPORT TO THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY IN SUPPORT OF REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS POLLUTION UNDER THE CLEAN AIR ACT

WHEREAS, the decade from 2000 to 2010 was the warmest on record1, 2005 and 2010 tied for the hottest years on record2; and 2012 was the hottest year on record for the contiguous U.S.3; and

WHEREAS, the current level of CO2 in the atmosphere is approximately 397 parts per million4 (ppm); and

WHEREAS, one of the world's leading climate scientists, Dr. James Hansen, stated in 2008: "If humanity wishes to preserve a planet similar to that on which civilization developed and to which life on Earth is adapted, paleoclimate evidence and climate change suggest that CO2 will need to be reduced from its current 385 ppm to at most 350 ppm5; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Protection Agency determined that current and future greenhouse gas concentrations endanger public health6, and according to the Global Humanitarian Forum climate change is already responsible every year for some 300,000 deaths, 325 million people seriously affected, and economic losses worldwide of U.S. \$125 billion7; and

WHEREAS, extreme weather events, most notably heat waves and precipitation extremes, are striking with increased frequency8, with deadly consequences for people and wildlife; in the United States in 2011 alone, a record 14 weather and climate disasters occurred, including droughts, heat waves, and floods, that cost at least \$1 billion each in damages and loss of human lives9; and

WHEREAS, climate change creates conditions that lead to more destructive storms like 2012's Superstorm Sandy10, by loading storms with more energy and more rainfall11, raising sea levels and causing storm surge to ride on a higher sea surface so that more coastline floods12, and warming the Arctic and melting sea ice, which causes changes in the jet stream that are bringing more extreme weather to the U.S.13; and

WHEREAS, climate change is affecting food security by reducing the growth and yields of important crops14; droughts, floods and changes in snowpack are altering water supplies15; as of October 2, 2012, 64.6 percent of the contiguous U.S. was experiencing moderate-to-exceptional drought16; and in 2012, the U.S. Department of Agriculture designated more than half (50.3 percent) of all U.S. counties disaster areas, mainly due to drought17; and

WHEREAS, scientists have concluded that by 2100 as many as one in 10 species may be on the verge of extinction due to climate change 18; and

WHEREAS, the world's land-based ice is rapidly melting, threatening water supplies in many regions and raising sea levels19, and Arctic summer sea ice extent has decreased to about half what it was several decades ago20, and reached a record low in 201221, with an accompanying drastic reduction in sea-ice thickness and volume22, which is severely jeopardizing ice-dependent animals23; and

WHEREAS, global sea level is rising 60 percent faster than projected by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change24; the U.S. East Coast is a hotspot for sea level rise with rates three to four times faster than the global average25; sea level rise is accelerating in pace26; and sea level could rise by one to two meters in this century, threatening millions of Americans with severe flooding27; and

WHEREAS, for four decades, the Clean Air Act has protected the air we breathe through a proven, comprehensive, successful system of pollution control that saves lives and creates economic benefits exceeding its costs by many times28; and

WHEREAS, with the Clean Air Act, air quality in this country has improved significantly since 1970, despite major growth both in our economy and industrial production; and

WHEREAS, between 1970 and 1990, the six main pollutants covered by the Clean Air Act — particulate matter and ground-level ozone (both of which contribute to smog and asthma), carbon monoxide, lead, sulfur and nitrogen oxides (the pollutants that cause acid rain) — were reduced by between 47 percent and 93 percent, and airborne lead was virtually eliminated; and


WHEREAS, the Clean Air Act has produced economic benefits valued at \$2 trillion or 30 times the cost of regulation; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in *Massachusetts vs. EPA* (2007) that greenhouse gases are "air pollutants" as defined by the Clean Air Act and the Environmental Protection Agency has the authority to regulate them; and

WHEREAS, The city of Newburyport prides itself on being a leader in the fight against climate change and for clean air.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that climate change is not an abstract problem for the future or one that will only affect far-distant places but rather climate change is happening now, we are causing it, and the longer we wait to act, the more we lose and the more difficult the problem will be to solve; and we, the Newburyport City Council, on behalf of the residents of Newburyport, do hereby urge the administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency and President Barack Obama to move swiftly to fully employ and enforce the Clean Air Act to do our part to reduce carbon in our atmosphere to no more than 350 parts per million.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk shall forward a copy of this resolution To the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency and President Barack Obama.

Section V: Use Regulations

Insert a new section "V-G" after Section V-F (Prohibited Uses) as follows:

V-G: Temporary Moratorium on Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers

A. Purpose

By vote at the State election on November 6, 2012, the voters of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts approved a law regulating the cultivation, distribution, possession and use of marijuana for medical purposes. The law provides that it is effective on January 1, 2013 and the State Department of Public Health is required to issue regulations regarding implementation within 120 days of the law's effective date. Currently under the Newburyport Zoning Ordinance, a Medical Marijuana Treatment Center is not a permitted use in the City and any regulations promulgated by the State Department of Public Health are expected to provide guidance to the City in regulating medical marijuana, including Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers. The regulation of medical marijuana raises novel and complex legal, planning, and public safety issues and the City needs time to study and consider the regulation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and address such novel and complex issues (including the potential for adverse secondary impacts from such uses or establishments in the community), as well as to address the potential impact of the State regulations on local zoning (and health regulations) and to undertake a planning process to consider amending the Zoning Ordinance regarding regulation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and other uses related to the regulation of medical marijuana. The City intends to adopt a temporary moratorium on the use of land and structures in the City for Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers so as to allow the City sufficient time to engage in a planning process to address the effects of such structures and uses in the City and to enact Ordinances (or regulations) in a manner consistent with sound land use planning goals and objectives.

B. Definition

"Medical Marijuana Treatment Center" shall mean a "not-for-profit entity, as defined by Massachusetts law only, registered by the Department of Public Health, that acquires, cultivates, possesses, processes (including development of related products such as food, tinctures, aerosols, oils or ointments), transfers, transports, sells distributes, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to qualifying patients or their personal caregivers."

C. Temporary Moratorium

For the reasons set forth above and notwithstanding any other provision of this Zoning Ordinance to the contrary, the City hereby adopts a temporary moratorium on the use of land or structures within the City for a Medical Marijuana Treatment Center. The moratorium shall be in effect through June 30, 2014. During the moratorium period, the City shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of medical marijuana in the City, consider the Department of Public Health regulations regarding Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and related uses, and shall consider adopting new Zoning Ordinances (or regulations) to address the impact and operation of Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers and related uses within the City.



Re: Transfer of funds for Fuller Field Survey

I ask that you consider the transfer of funds in the amount of \$4,900 to cover the cost of surveying Bradley Fuller Field. The survey is required to complete a master plan to construct a baseball diamond at the back of the field.

Construction of the new 90' baseball diamond is the highest priority identified by the Field Space Task Force in the effort to solve the severe lack of athletic field space in the city. Loss of fields at the Bresnahan has compounded the problem and left the high school JV team playing on fields in West Newbury this spring. It has also added serious strain on the already-overscheduled Perkins and Cashman softball fields. I have turned away several leagues who sought field space this season.

After consulting with high school athletic director John Daileanes, high school coaches, Planning Director Andrew Port, other members of the Field Space Task Force, and athletic facility designer Chris Huntress we determined the back portion of Bradley Fuller Field to be the most desirable location for the new diamond.

I have included for your reference a copy of the Field Space Task Force's findings report of January 2013.

Re: Traffic Calming on Turkey Hill Road

Dear City Council of Newburyport,

I am a resident of 70 Turkey Hill Road and I am writing you to express several of my concerns regarding the speed of traffic and commercial use of Turkey Hill Road.

As I am sure you know, Turkey Hill Road is a thoroughfare of the West End of Newburyport from Storey Avenue to Hale Street and Plummer Spring Road to West Newbury. Many residents of neighboring streets use Turkey Hill Road to and from their homes. Additionally, Turkey Hill road is extensively used by pedestrians, dog-walkers, runners, cyclists and children for recreational purposes. Many school-aged children also use this road accessing their school buses.

Turkey Hill Road is a narrow, single lined traffic flow road with no shoulder areas. The current posted speed limit is 30 mph. Since I live on Turkey Hill Road, I am very aware of the traffic climate. Although I have observed many law abiding drivers, I have also observed periods of heavy traffic flow of vehicles traveling at speeds in excess of the current posted speed limit. I have also witnessed Newburyport Police patrolling the road but seldom see the speed limit enforced in this thickly settled area. It is my opinion that the posted speed limit is too high and needs to be lowered. Lowering the accepted speed limit is the right decision to make this area safer and will reduce road noise. Lowering the speed limit to 25mph is consistent with other areas of Newburyport and would make a significant difference.

An additional problem is the commercial and commuter use of Turkey Hill Road to and from the industrial area off of Hale Street. The road is frequently used by 53' tractor-trailer trucks and other commercial vehicles to access the industrial park area. It is my understanding that this is not permitted however commercial use of Turkey Hill Road continues to be a significant problem. Commuters also use our road to access the industrial park off of Hale Street, and they frequently go 10-20 miles over the speed limit. Turkey Hill Road is a residential neighborhood

and is not suited for such commercial or commuter traffic. This unintended use causes avoidable wear of our road and protects the bordering trees of the road, which give this neighborhood its character, not to mention making the road significantly unsafe for its residents.

I ask that the elected City Councilors with authority of the traffic ordinances and regulations governing Turkey Hill Road review my concerns and take the appropriate corrective actions. I would ask that in this review the following measures be considered and placed into effect for the purpose of traffic calming and increasing the safety of Turkey Hill Road for the benefit of our residents and children.

- · Perform a traffic calming study for Turkey Hill Road to determine feasibility of options.
- Decrease posted speed limit from 30mph to 25mph. This is consistent with other residential areas, such as Daniel Lucy Way.
- Establish several STOP signs on Turkey Hill Road (or other traffic calming measures) at multiple intersections to break the flow of traffic and to discourage commercial use.
- Posting of signs at each end of Turkey Hill Road that state commercial traffic is prohibited.
- Public notice to industrial park businesses that commercial access via Turkey Hill Road is prohibited.
- Increase traffic monitoring by City of Newburyport police department to enforce above actions.

I appreciate your time in considering this matter. I understand there are many other issues facing the City at this time and there may be barriers present to effect these changes. As a father of a young child and one on the way, I am very troubled with this issue and am very determined in seeing the safety of Turkey Hill Road improved and the discouragement of further commercial use. Speaking with some of my neighbors, I know I am not alone with these concerns. I firmly believe actions are necessary to prevent further degradation of the safety of our children and pedestrians and the quality of life for this community. I am certainly open to hearing your thoughts on this subject or other options and would greatly appreciate a response to my letter. The Coastal Trails Coalition respectfully asks the Council to consider our request to hold a Yankee Homecoming event on Pleasant Street between Green and Titcomb Streets-between City Hall and Brown Square. Our proposal is to run the Slow Bike Race fundraiser on Pleasant Street on Wednesday July 31 from 530 pm to 7:30 pm.
