



## PortMedia Proposal for Upgrade of City Council Chambers Television Production Equipment

# on Production Equipment RECEIVED CITY CLERK'S OFFICE NEWBURYPORT, MA

#### **Executive Summary**

PortMedia is the local Public, Education, and Government cable television access **Wheth 19** P **2 14** Newburyport. Channels 8 and 9 are available in almost 7,000 households in Newburyport, as well as in schools, city buildings, local nursing homes, and Anna Jaques Hospital.

PortMedia presently cablecasts City Council Meetings and School Committee Meetings. The cameras in City Council Chamber are failing and the quality of the picture and audio is poor. PortMedia responds to messages about the previous night's poor audio or visual quality from residents on a regular basis on Tuesday mornings. It is especially important to note that the current equipment failed to record the April 30<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting. This exact issue occurred once before. We have not been able to recreate it, do not know its cause and expect it to happen again.

PortMedia proposes to upgrade and make permanent all the equipment used for the cablecasts from City Council Chambers, move the School Committee meeting venue to the Nock School Library, re-locate some of the existing City Council Chambers equipment to the library and replace the current mobile production computer. This will improve the quality of both the City Council Meeting and School Committee Meeting cablecasts. It will add an additional venue from which government meetings and civic events can be cablecast, while keeping upgrade costs as low as possible by only requiring the upgrade of one location.

If implemented, this proposal will increase the transparency into City government workings, educate and inform the residents of Newburyport, and encourage and enable a more open dialog between government and the public.

An RFP has been issued and a vendor with favorable pricing has been secured. The cost of the proposed upgrade will be \$67,486 (after camera rebates, \$65,986).

#### Overview

PortMedia cablecasts all City Council and School Committee meetings on Newburyport's Government Access Channel 9. The cablecasts of these meetings provide the residents of Newburyport with transparency into City government, informs and educates its residents, and encourages those residents that may not consider participating in or attending these meeting to do so.

Most often these meetings are cablecast live, though occasionally they are recorded for later cablecast. Some reasons that a meeting may not be cablecast live are, on the rare occasion when a City Council and School Committee Meeting occur simultaneously; or, if unforeseen technical issues prevent a live cablecast. Regardless of whether the meeting is originally cablecast live, or on a delayed basis, they are always also re-cablecast several times on various dates and times prior to the next scheduled meeting and uploaded to the internet for on-demand viewing via city, school and PortMedia websites.

#### Present

#### **City Council Meetings**

Presently, for the cablecast of City Council Meetings, City Council Chambers are served by ARCEIVED mount, robotically controlled standard definition video cameras of an unknown age. District ERK'S OFFICE controlled remotely from a newly-built control room in the City Hall Basement, roughly Name City PORT, MA Council Chambers.

City Council Chambers are served by 7 wired microphones, distributed as follows:

- City Clerk 1 wired microphone on a floor stand
- City Council President 1 wired microphone on a floor stand
- Public Comment 1 wired microphone on a floor stand
- 5 City Councilors, Left side of Chambers 2 shared, wired microphones on floor stands
- 5 City Councilors, Right side of Chambers 2 shared, wired microphones on floor stands

Audio mixing and distribution and audio/video modulation (i.e., the process by which audio and video signals are formatted for transmission to PortMedia's offices over the cable system) are handled by equipment permanently mounted and stored in the small control room in the City Hall basement.

Video and audio switching and recording are handled by a mobile computer recording and mixing system ("TriCaster"), which must, for each City Council Meeting, be transported to City Hall and set up prior to each meeting, and torn down and transported to the PortMedia office after each meeting. This system includes the TriCaster, computer monitor, keyboard, mouse, headphones, and a variety of cables. PortMedia has only one such system, so it cannot be stored at City Hall, as it is needed for School Committee Meetings, as well as other remote productions, such as High School athletic events, civic events, such as this autumn's City Councilor At-Large Candidate Debate, and High School Graduation, for instance. The equipment is of a size and weight that it is difficult, if not impossible, for some PortMedia volunteers and staff to carry into the basement of City Hall where it is needed for each meeting. The TriCaster has undergone several repairs and shows signs that failure is imminent. As such, in order to extend its life as much as possible, use of the TriCaster must be limited to only those "must do" cablecasts, and may only be operated by a small group of PortMedia staff and volunteers.

#### **School Committee Meetings**

Presently, School Committee Meetings are held in Room 118 at Newburyport High School. Room 118 is not served by any equipment stored or mounted at the High School. All audio and video equipment needed for the cablecast of School Committee Meetings, for every meeting, must be transported to the High School and set up prior to each meeting, and torn down and transported to the PortMedia office after each meeting. Not counting the actual meeting time, transporting, setup and striking the equipment generally takes 2 – 2.5 "person hours."

School Committee Meetings require the following equipment for the cablecast of meetings:

- 1 Canon GL2 video camera, and required cables
- 1 Tripod
- 1 Audio Mixing Board
- 1 TriCaster mobile computer recording and mixing system (as described above)

1 Video monitor

1 Audio "snake" cable (actually, a number of cables wraphenties bermanently, with numerous audio connectors, designed to more easily run audio cable from a 7817 JUN 19 P 2:444 number of microphones to an audio mixing board)

- 12 wired lavaliere, desktop, and handheld microphones (one each for 9 committee members, Superintendent of Schools, Assistant Superintendent, Public Comment)
- 1 large duffel bag of needed additional audio cables, video cables, power cables, etc.

#### Video Storage and Archiving

All meeting video footage is presently stored for playback and archived on a variety of non-redundant hard disk drives. As a reference point, for each hour of video shot, storage requirements are approximately five gigabytes of hard disk space.

#### Discussion

The cameras located in City Council Chambers have limited remaining life. Viewing video from these cameras makes it obvious that the quality of the video is marginal, with one camera in particular being worse than the other two. Due to a lack of equipment, it is presently impossible to avoid the need to store most of the equipment needed for the cablecasting of meetings at PortMedia's offices, and transport the equipment to/from each meeting site, and set up (at least as far as the School Committee Meetings are concerned) a complete mobile production studio for each and every meeting. This adds unnecessarily to the wear and tear of equipment, resulting in progressively poorer production qualities of the meetings. It is inefficient, and limits the pool of qualified staff and volunteers capable of producing, shooting, and directing these meetings. Furthermore, due to a lack of equipment it is impossible to shoot and cablecast more than one meeting at any given time. Finally, because of the configuration of Room 118 at the High School, and the inability to effectively use more than one camera to shoot School Committee Meetings, the production qualities of the cablecasts of School Committee Meetings are very low, making the meetings, as described by more than one person that has communicated with PortMedia, "unwatchable." Nock School staff is confident that a location for the permanent storage and use of the equipment is available.

#### Proposal

After numerous internal discussions among PortMedia staff and volunteers involved in producing the meeting cablecasts, as well as discussions with the Mayor, Superintendent of Schools, and Vice-Chairman of the School Committee, PortMedia has come to the conclusion that: (a) the most efficient use of human and equipment resources; (b) the most cost-effective manner of covering City Council and School Committee Meetings; (c) the most effective manner of improving the production qualities of the meeting cablecasts; and, (d) the most effective way of increasing public viewing of and participation in City government is to:

- 1. Upgrade the equipment used to produce cablecasts of the meetings held in City Council Chambers, as discussed below.
- 2. Move School Committee Meetings from the High School to the Nock School Library.
- 3. Move some of the equipment that presently serves City Council Chambers to the Nock School Library.

4. Replace the current mobile production computer.

By implementing this multi-faceted approach, several goals are met, the City's need and decrease the communicate with the public is better served, and PortMedia's ability to provide quality gyntle and civic programming is improved, as follows:

- School Committee Meetings will be more watchable
  - The meetings will be covered by 3 controllable, rather than 1 stationary camera.
  - The sound quality will be improved.
  - o Public commenters will, unlike now, be within the frame of the picture.
  - In the event of a meeting with a larger attendance than usual, unlike Room 118 at the High School, the library can accommodate the influx of people.
- City Council Meeting cablecasts will improve
  - The video quality will improve with new cameras.
  - The sound quality will improve due to the use of wireless microphones, so when Councilors stand and move within Chambers, they will not go "off mic."
  - The appearance, inconvenience, and safety issue caused by wired microphones will improve.
- Nock School Library will become a viable site for occasional meetings and events to be cablecast
  - Presently, cablecasting from any site other than PortMedia requires a great deal of setup and "jury-rigging" of equipment, with less than ideal production quality.
  - Civic and government events not normally seen beyond the walls of the Nock School Library could be cablecast live and archived for future use.
  - In the rare circumstance when it occurs, simultaneous events in City Council Chambers and the Nock School Library could be recorded and cablecast.
- City Hall Auditorium will become a more viable location from which events may be cablecast
  - Presently, in order to cablecast an event from the Auditorium, the setting up and tearing down of equipment is similar to, and in some respects, greater than that to cablecast from City Council Chambers. Permanently installed equipment in the PortMedia room in the City Hall Basement will significantly reduce the setup needed to cablecast from the Auditorium.
  - With the recent renovation of the Auditorium, this venue can be better used for cablecast events, increasing the visibility into City Hall, increasing the number of events that may be viewed by Newburyport residents, and increasing civic pride resulting from these events.
- By permanently storing equipment in control stations at City Hall and the Nock School Library:
  - More people will be qualified to produce live cablecasts and pre-recorded programming from City Hall Chambers and the Nock School Library (because no extensive setup and break down will be required).
  - More events from City Hall and the Nock School Library may be cablecast.
  - No conflicts of equipment scheduling will occur.
  - Graduation, sports, inaugurations, parades and other live events may be covered by a less fatigued, more reliable mobile production unit.

Transfer Request - Virginia Lane Drainage Improvements

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide additional background regarding the above referenced Transfer Request which is before the Council on June 25, 2012.

For several years now the City has monitored a drainage problem in the vegetated swale located between two culverts on Virginia Lane and Storeybrooke Road. The swale was originally designed to convey stormwater from the piped municipal stormwater system in the Storybrooke Subdivision toward the forested I-95 corridor. In recent years the swale has become overgrown with invasive wetland species thereby collecting sediment and blocking the proper flow of water. As a result the Hennigar family at 13 Virginia Lane has experienced an increase in flooding both to their adjacent driveway and even at times into their garage and basement.

A plan was prepared by Oak Engineers to remove the built-up sediment and invasive phragmites vegetation in the swale, replacing it with a rip-rap stone channel. The relocated drainage pipes and repaired outfalls along with a stone channel will allow the municipal stormwater to travel through this swale without causing flooding and erosion issues on adjacent properties.

Your assistance is requested with this transfer (\$32,000) to allow us to proceed with this project, addressing a long-standing drainage problem in the area. The Department of Public Services will be completing the clearing and grading work in order to reduce costs to the City by approximately \$18,000. Thank you in advance for your consideration. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions regarding this, or any other, projects.

**RE:** Purchase of Used Cruisers

Referencing the above captioned matter, I want to advise you of the status of two of our unmarked cruisers. As you are aware from my conversation with you last week, there is some money left in the purchase cruiser account from a crash on Route One in Newbury when a Newbury ambulance hit us on black ice.

This funding is not enough to purchase a new cruiser, however I have found two decent used marked cruisers with approximately 45,000 miles on both of them. We have negotiated a price of \$12,000 for the pair of them with most of the equipment being retained in them. There is some additional cost (approximately \$2,000) to have them lettered and install our radios. I believe these cars will be able to provide service to Newburyport for the next two years with a substantial savings.

There was also \$6,000 transferred into this cruiser account as part of a supplemental budget to purchase used unmarked cruiser for the inspector's office. This cruiser would replace a 2004 Dodge Interpret that has over 100.000 miles and needs extensive repairs. The cost of used cars has skyrocketed and this funding amount is insufficient to make a purchase.

The mechanics at the DPS have also notified the department the cruiser assigned to Lt Siemasko has serious rotting of its frame, a slipping transmission and will not meet the standards for its state inspection.

Using some of the funding left from the crash cruiser account coupled with the supplemental budgeted \$6,000 and the remaining \$15,000 in the Officer Holiday Account, I believe would be enough funding to by two late model used unmarked cruisers.

In summary, using the \$6,000 from the supplemental budget and the remaining \$15,000 in Holiday pay could be enough funding to purchase the two needed unmarked (used) cruisers.

RE: Malfunctioning Holsters

Referencing the above captioned matter, I want to advise you of a major safety concern involving our firearm holsters. Sergeant Maguire, our firearm instructor, detected a large number of the safety locking devices on our firearm holsters failed during testing at the firearm range last week.

These holsters are made by a company named Strong and are model H345-490 with a thumb safety switch, which is designed to stop the weapon from being accessed by a suspect. This safety switch reduces the risk of an officer's weapon being accessible by an adversary.

While engaged in training at the firearm range, a number of officers detected the switch failed to secure the weapon from being taken away during a confrontation. This failure of the switch allowed the free access to the weapon. The design of this safety switch has caused serious concern for officer safety and need to be replaced.

Upon learning of this failure I had our firearm instructors' research a number of holsters to determine the best solution for replacing these holsters with a more secure and safe style holster. The Safariland model 6390 has been selected as the replacement. It is a level-II retention holster with and automatic locking system, which secures the weapon once holstered. It also allows for simple straight up draw once the thumb release is activated.

These holsters are on the State bid list for \$75.00 per holster. There are 40 holsters that need to be replaced at a total cost of \$3,000.

The police department has funding within our salary of officers which could be transferred to fund these holsters.

Please advise at your earliest convenience how you want to proceed with situation.

Referencing the above captioned matter, I want to advise you of an equipment improvement needed by our dive team. As you are aware from the age and condition of the dive suits earlier this year the some of the dive team equipment was purchased in 1998. The age along with saltwater has brought some of the safety equipment to the end of its life.

The first item Buoyancy Control Device is a stab jacket containing a bladder which is worn by divers to establish neutral buoyancy underwater and positive buoyancy on the surface, when needed. The buoyancy is controlled by adjusting the volume of air in the bladder. This equipment allows a diver to submerge himself into the water and as a means to resurface.


The second item air tanks, range from 15-18 years old. They have also been subjected to years of diving in saltwater and the having air compressed into them over and over. These tanks ore inspected according to state mandated inspections and tests. Each officer has two tanks assigned to them and are fully charged in the ready mode at the police station. Due to the failure to several of these tanks, officers are now limited to one tank and in some instances are sharing tanks. With more of the tanks slated to have their certification to expire we need to replace them.

The purchase of this equipment will help insure the safety and availability of our dive team in the future. These officers train monthly and are called upon often to perform operations with the waters around Newburyport.

Dive tanks (10) \$300.00 \$3,000







RE: Traffic Hazards Posed by Visibility Issues on Woodman Way

I am wiring to you to respectfully request that action be taken to mitigate the traffic hazards posed by lack of a clear sight-line created by landscaping at the edge of the property abutting the driveway exit from Provident Bank and Institution for Savings.

The shrubberies placed at the edge of the property make it impossible and impractical for vehicles exiting the bank driveway onto Woodman Way to stop without encroaching onto the sidewalk.

In order to properly see vehicles traveling on Woodman Way from the right toward Storey Avenue, a car must block the sidewalk to come to a stop on Woodman Way. This is a dangerous situation for pedestrians, joggers and cyclists who may be using the sidewalk.

As a customer of The Provident Bank I occasionally use the Storey Avenue branch. On two separate occasions while rolling to a stop at the exit, I have been surprised by a pedestrian with a baby carriage and a distracted cyclist wearing ear buds. Since there is no clear way to see vehicle or pedestrian traffic approaching from the right without encroaching onto the sidewalk, this poses a significant risk to drivers and pedestrians alike.

I urge you to reconsider a reconfiguration of the landscaping at this area or at least a sign advising drivers exiting the driveway to honk their horns.

This incident was particularly jarring for me as I was transporting my infant son and am a cyclist sensitive to the need to share the road.

I do not know who has responsibility for this particular parcel where these incidents occur so I have forwarded this letter to the management of both banks and the neighborhood's city councilor in hopes that a coordinated effort may help improve traffic safety in this area.

I sincerely appreciate your prompt attention to this matter for all our sakes.

Dear Mayor Moak:

You have requested an opinion as to the purpose for which a portion of City-owned land known as Cushing Park is held and what board or officer has custody of such portion. You have also asked whether the reuse of such portion for a senior center would require legislative approval under Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution ("Article 97").

It is my opinion, for the reasons set forth in this letter, that:

- the portion of the land known as Cushing Park that is proposed for senior center purposes (the "Property") was acquired for general municipal purposes and has been held since 1954 to the present in the care, custody, management and control of the Mayor for municipal parking purposes;
- (2) because the Property was acquired for general municipal purpose and has been held for municipal parking purposes since 1954, it is not subject to the protection of Article 97 and thus no legislative approval is required to use the Property for a senior center; and

(3) to use the property for a senior center, you must determine that the Property is no longer needed for municipal parking purposes or solely for municipal parking purposes and the City Council must vote by a two-thirds vote of its members to transfer the Property from the Mayor for municipal parking purposes to the Mayor for senior center purposes or for senior center purposes and municipal parking purposes.

You provided certain records from the City's archives and I conducted limited research of land and probate records of the Essex County Registry of Deeds and Registry of Probate. This research yielded a will executed by John Greenleaf on September 25, 1827, appointing Robert Jenkins as Executor and bestowing upon him the power of sale of Mr. Greenleaf's property; I also found a deed from Robert Jenkins, Executor of the Estate of John Greenleaf, to the Town of Newburyport, dated October 1, 1831, for property bounded by Buck Street, Congress Street and Kent Street in Newburyport, of which a portion is the Property. Neither the will nor the deed imposes any trust upon the municipality (then a town, now a city) to use the Property for any specific public purpose. It appears from the City records you provided that said land was not acquired for any stated specific purpose, but rather it can be assumed to have been purchased for general municipal purposes.

Based on the following analysis, although the Property appears to have been dedicated to park purposes by formal Council vote in 1899, its use was changed in 1954, again by formal Council vote, to municipal parking purposes. For this reason, the Property is not subject to the restrictions of Article 97 regarding the sale or change in use of public parkland. However, the City must still follow the process outlined in G.L. c.40, §15A to change the purpose for which the Property is held.

# History of Acquisition and Use of the Property

As mentioned above, the Property is part of a larger parcel that was acquired by deed from Robert Jenkins, executor of the will of John Greenleaf, dated October 1, 1831, recorded with the Essex Registry of Deeds in Book 262, Page 149. The deed does not mention any specific public purpose for which the land was acquired. You have indicated that Town Meeting records of that era show an appropriation of money to purchase the land, but no specific public purpose is stated for which the land would be used, although mention is made in historical accounts of the town authorities being in want of gravel for the roads and using the land initially as a gravel source.

A public way now known as Washington Street was laid out across the land from Buck Street to Kent Street by order of the Aldermen on December 30, 1861. The Property is now bounded on three sides by Buck Street, Washington Street and Kent Street and on the third side

by a playground and by improved parcels of land that were conveyed by the City to private parties.

On January 3, 1889, the Council heard a report of the committee on public property giving a value for the land then known as "Kent street common: of \$6,006.00. On January 23, 1899, by joint action of the Board of Aldermen and the Common Council, an order was approved changing the name of Kent street common to Cushing Park. According to a contemporaneous newspaper report, note was made at the meeting of "improvements" having been made, that in the coming year the park would be "beautified" and that it would be named for the first mayor of Newburyport, Caleb Cushing.

On June 16, 1906, according to a contemporaneous newspaper report, a fountain (now gone) was formally dedicated at Cushing Park to the memory of the late William H. Bartlett. The fountain was a gift from Mr. Bartlett's family to the City.

On December 6, 1954, according to a contemporaneous newspaper report, the Council adopted an order authorizing the removal of two buildings, a highway barn and a building used for voting purposes, from Cushing Park and providing that a portion of Cushing Park would be "taken" for a municipally owned and operated metered parking lot in order to provide parking for the nearby CBS Hytron plant. You provided a copy of the plan that was then presented to show the parking area.

A portion of the Cushing Park land, to the south of the parking lot, on the corner of Buck Street and Congress Street, was not part of the land transferred to parking lot purposes, but remained as a small park known as Ayer's Playground. This playground is presently improved with children's' play equipment and you have indicated that no portion of Ayers Playground will be used for the senior center.

You provided a narrative regarding Cushing Park and Ayers Playground indicating that at some point after CBS Hytron ceased to operate, a basketball court was installed at the Buck Street end of the parking lot. You indicated that the basketball court area would be used for parking when there were events at the senior center that would attract a large crowd, but that the basketball court would otherwise continue in use. You provided a sketch plan showing the new senior center building to be erected along the Kent Street side of the Property, with parking in the middle portion of the Property, and the basketball court/auxiliary parking area at the Buck Street end of the Property.

In my opinion, based on the above facts, the portion of Cushing Park that is shown on the 1954 parking lot plan is held in the care, custody, management and control of the Mayor for

municipal parking purposes. This opinion is based on the information you have provided and I have done no independent research.

# Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution

Article 97 of the Amendments to the Massachusetts Constitution prohibits the sale or change in use of public parkland without special legislative approval granted by a super-majority vote. Article 97 provides, in pertinent part, as follows: "Land and easements taken or acquired for such purposes shall not be used for other purposes or otherwise disposed of except by laws enacted by a two thirds vote, taken by yeas and nays, of each branch of the general court."

By its express terms, this prohibition applies to all public land that was "taken or acquired" for the conservation purposes, including park purposes, that Article 97 was designed to protect. If land was "taken or acquired" for such purposes, then Article 97 approval must be obtained. Conversely, if land was not "taken or acquired" for such purposes, then Article 97 does not apply. Pursuant to a recent case in the Supreme Judicial Court, Board of Selectmen of Hanson v. Lindsay, 444 Mass, 502, 508-509 (2005), Article 97 may also apply in cases where, although the land was not "taken or acquired" for conservation purposes, it was later dedicated by the town for as such, as long as a deed or other instrument is recorded that formally imposes such a restriction on the land.

Here, Cushing Park was not "taken or acquired" for park purposes, nor is the portion of Cushing Park to be used for the senior center and related parking being held for such purposes presently, as discussed above. Because the Property is not held for park purposes, compliance with the provisions of Article 97 is not required and the City need not obtain legislative approval for a change of its use. See Lindsay, 444 Mass. at 509. However, in order to change the use of the property from a municipal parking lot to the site of a senior center, the Mayor and the City Council must follow the procedures set forth in G.L. c.40, §15A, as outlined below.

# Massachusetts General Laws c.40, §15A

G.L. c.40, §15A establishes the process by which the care, custody, management and control of certain land held by a city for a specific municipal purpose is transferred from one municipal board or officer to the same or another board or officer for another specific purpose. Pursuant to this statute, the board or officer having charge of the land must first determine that the land is no longer needed for the specific purpose for which it is held, or solely for that purpose, and must give notice of such determination to the city council, which may then transfer the land upon a two-thirds vote of all of its members.

Accordingly, in order for the City to proceed with its construction of a senior center on the parking-lot portion of the Cushing Park land, the Mayor, being the officer with custody and control over the Property, must first determine that the Property is no longer needed for the purpose for which it is currently held, municipal parking, or that the Property is no longer needed solely for that purpose. Once the Mayor gives notice to the City Council of this determination, the City Council may vote to transfer the Property from the Mayor for the purposes of municipal parking to the Mayor for the purposes of a senior center. Alternatively, the Council could vote to transfer the Property from the Mayor solely for municipal parking purposes to the Mayor for purposes of a senior center and municipal parking. As long as the City Council achieves a vote of two-thirds of all of its members, the transfer will be valid under G.L. c.40, §15A.

For all of the reasons set forth above, it is my opinion that the portion of the land known as Cushing Park proposed to be used for senior center purposes was not "taken or acquired" for public parkland purposes and has not been formally held for such purposes since 1954. As land held for municipal parking, it is not subject to the restrictions of Article 97. In order to change the use of the Property from a parking lot to the site of a senior center, the Mayor must determine that the property is no longer needed for its present use (or solely for its present use) and the City Council must vote, by two-thirds of all of its members, to change its specified use.





Dear Mayor Holaday:

I am writing this letter to report to you that the Harbor Commission, by unanimous vote at our last meeting, vigorously supports Paul Hogg as he undergoes his regular performance review with you and, in particular, to support, as much as is it is possible to support, a significant increase in his annual compensation. We strongly support Mr. Hogg and believe that he has done an outstanding job as our Harbormaster. We further offer the following specific points in support of an increase in his compensation:

- 1. First and foremost, Mr. Hogg has done an excellent job of ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all who transit our waterways and visit our beaches. While I believe the Coast Guard is generally prohibited from offering official opinions in such matters, I can assert with authority that Mr. Hogg's working relationship with Station Merrimack River is in excellent condition and is far superior to that of his predecessor. It is also the Commission's firm belief that after reviewing the Harbormaster Department's involvement in many emergency responses, we believe Mr. Hogg has done an outstanding job of ensuring the safety and wellbeing of boaters and beach goers alike.
- 2. In further regard to the issue of public safety, we would draw your attention specifically to the excellent work Mr. Hogg performed with his swift and expert resolution of the shoaling hazard that formed at the mouth of the Merrimack River earlier this year. We believe that by working effectively with you, members of the City Council, Station Merrimack River, and the Massachusetts Environmental Police, Mr. Hogg did a great deal to prevent a potential disaster.
- 3. With respect to less dramatic but also important operational issues, Mr. Hogg exercised impressive fiscal responsibility and personnel management throughout his Department.

In particular, for the first time ever the Plum Island parking lot reported positive cash flow in FY 2011 and receipts for that facility increased 14% when compared to the average of the previous five years. In addition, we are aware that Mr. Hogg and the Harbormaster's Department received numerous compliments and positive feedback from Plum Island residents on the conduct of the lot, its related facilities, and the lifeguards at Plum Island Point who are under his authority.

- 4. In FY 2011 the Harbormaster sold just over 1,400 waterways stickers, a 12% increase over FY 2010 and a 24% increase over the highest number collected in any year prior to Mr. Hogg's appointment as Harbormaster. We believe these impressive results are the direct result of the Harbormaster's more effective enforcement of the legal requirement to acquire these stickers and reflect great credit upon his diligence.
- 5. As a result of the Harbormaster more effectively enforcing compliance with the citations he has issued, the Harbormaster's Department has witnessed a significant increase in the fees generated from the tickets he and his Department have written.
- 6. Again as a result of Mr. Hogg more effectively executing his professional duties, the Harbormaster's Department has witnessed a significant increase in the fees collected from the docking of vessels at the Central Waterfront. Specifically, in the past 5 years the greatest total of fees collected in any one year at the Central Waterfront was \$38,531 which took place in FY 2006. In only the first five months of FY 2012 (July, August, September, October and November of 2011) the Harbormaster's Department has collected \$41,933 in fees at the central waterfront which greatly exceeds the prior peak result of 2006.
- 7. Mr. Hogg just recently installed an inexpensive but effective ticket collection system at Cashman Park at no cost to the City. As a result, we are seeing the early signs of increased revenue at Cashman and are projecting this positive trend to continue. Mr. Hogg personally monitors this lot every day, several times a day during high season and we think his good judgment and diligent effort will likely reap significant rewards in this regard.
- 8. Prior to Mr. Hogg's appointment, there was no system in place to ensure that boating related excise taxes were paid to the City prior to the purchase of a waterways permit. Mr. Hogg is correcting this problem and is, in fact, in the process of collecting fees from delinquent boaters from the 2009 and 2010 seasons which so far have totaled \$22,892.
- 9. To summarize these impressive fiscal results it is instructive to review 2011, the first full fiscal year Mr. Hogg was our Harbormaster. In that year, his department generated income of \$339,172 and had expenses of \$252,364. In addition, for that year the department, with the assistance of the Harbor Commission, budgeted expenses \$304,354. Therefore, the combination of Mr. Hogg more effectively collecting a variety of fees and better managing his department (which was \$51,720 below budget) added \$86,358 to the Retained Earnings of the Harbormaster's Department.
- 10. It is also important to note that Mr. Hogg has done an excellent job of better managing the mooring fields and plans to add a minimum of 15 people to the fields from the waiting list.

In this discussion it is important to review the compensation of similar harbormasters departments in the Commonwealth and we have learned the following:

We would also note that in none of the above listed locations does the Harbormaster have their beaches and lifeguards as part of the harbormaster's responsibility and, in the summer, Mr. Hogg has 40 employees reporting to him which is much larger than any of the departments listed above. I have also learned that Paul is working three jobs in order to support his family.

I look forward to discussing this matter with you or anyone else in this process as needed and thank you very much for the opportunity to express the Harbor Commission's opinion on this important matter.



As we discussed in the budget meeting we must narrow band our radio system by January 1, 2013. All of the area departments have narrow banded already or are preparing to do so.

We have applied for and received our narrow band license. We can't complete our change-over because our present pagers, Minitor IV's, are not narrow band capable. These pagers are over nine (9) years old. We wish to purchase the newer Minitor V, which is narrow band capable and compliant with the new federal standard.

I have attached the quote from TCS communications in Salisbury who is on the State and Plymouth County Bid list which we are a member of.

The price for the pagers, spare battery, chargers, carrying case and the five year warranty is \$32,847.50. The cost includes the extended 5 year warranty which we had in the past and is worth the purchase.

The fifty (50) pagers requested we replace the full time and call firefighter pagers and give us a couple of spares.

I have also attached an informational sheet on the Minitor V for you.
