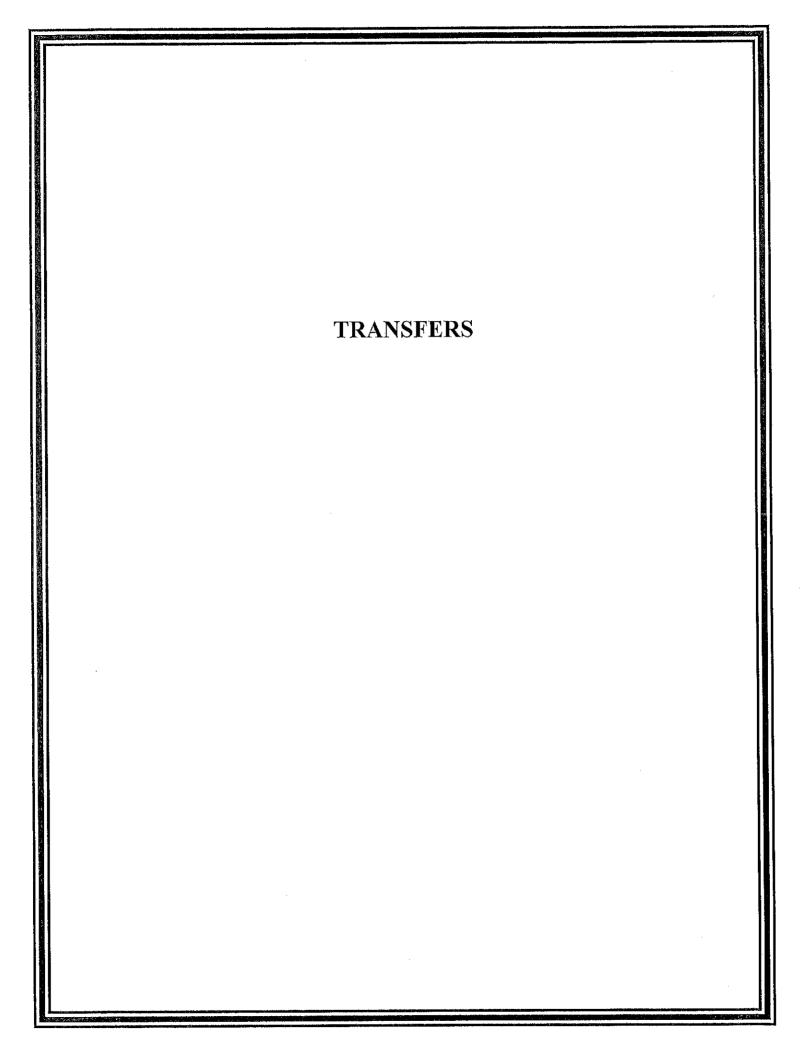

We have not done any significant repairs to the park in the 12 years since it was built. Annual maintenance and patch work repairs have done their job but these repairs are long overdue. The Friends of the Skate Park are contributing \$2,000 to this project.

The second transfer is for the purchase of some park elements including ramps and rails for a temporary park to be created. 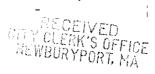

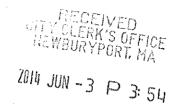

FY14 Capital Transfer Request – Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds

The following requests were submitted in the FY2014 Capital Improvement Program for the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds. These capital needs were reviewed by the Water and Sewer Commission, submitted in FY2014 budget requests to the City Council and attached are requests to transfer the funds from Retained Earnings into appropriate accounts.

METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM – The city conducted a system-wide meter replacement program in 2008 at a cost of over one million dollars. Given that the meters have a life expectancy of 12 – 15 years; it is recommended that \$50,000 be funded each year from both the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds until 2023.

<u>WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT</u> - Annual funding is needed to execute scheduled improvements to the City's aging water distribution infrastructure. In an effort to minimize the impact on the operating budget, funds have been designated each year to this capital account. It is requested to transfer \$200,000 to this account.

<u>WEST END EASEMENT</u> - This project is necessary so that, in the event of a sewer line break or backup, the DPS Sewer Division will be able to access the line and prevent sewer from entering the drinking water supply. It is requested to transfer \$150,000 to this account.

<u>VACUUM TRUCK</u> - The Vactor truck, used to clean sewer lines, is at the end of its useful life. Total cost is \$400,000 of which \$200,000 was transferred in FY2013 and the balance of \$200,000 is requested to be transferred to fully fund the purchase.

At the end of FY2014, the Department of Revenue certified a healthy retained earnings balance for the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds. For Water, \$1,609,481 was

certified. The attached transfer request uses \$250,000 in water retained earnings, leaving a balance of \$1,359,481. Likewise for sewer, \$1,768,057 was certified. The attached transfer request uses \$400,000 in sewer retained earnings, leaving a balance of \$1,368,057.

As we approach the beginning of the new fiscal year, the Water and Sewer Commissions are actively discussing rates for FY2015 and, as in past years, will approve rates in June based on final approved expenditures. Despite significant increases to debt service in recent years, a major goal of the Water and Sewer Boards is to continue to ensure the stability of rates; made possible by healthy retained earnings balances. As such, it is expected that further transfers will be requested into budget reserve line items as to mitigate the rate increases needed to service debt payments. Such transfers, however, cannot be submitted until the final budget is approved by City Council.

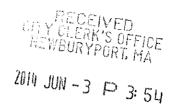

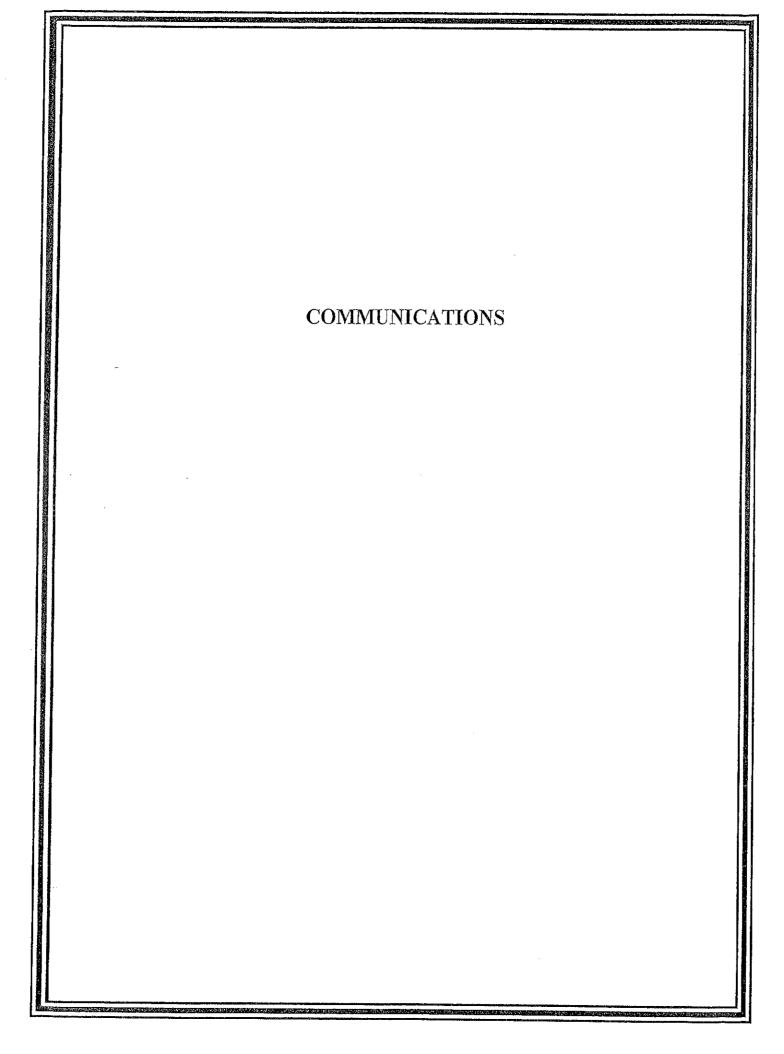
FY14 Capital Transfer Request - DPS Administration Building

The Water and Sewer Business Office has reviewed all existing Water and Sewer Capital Accounts and identified five capital accounts whose projects are complete and currently have remaining balances, which may be transferred to close out the accounts. Simultaneously, the Water and Sewer Commissioners, DPS Director and Business Office have reviewed updated quotes relative to the DPS Administration Building. The original capital request for the DPS Building was approved in 2011 for \$1.2M and, based on delays in moving forward with this project, design changes based on CSS architect recommendations, and in conjunction with the Conservation Commission suggestions, and prevailing wage estimates, the project has an increased cost of \$443,000.00.

The five capital accounts that are finalized and have surplus funds total \$337,203.22. To minimize the impact on water and sewer retained earnings, it is our recommendation that these five accounts are closed and the balance transferred to the DPS Administration Building capital account. This will bridge the gap required for funding. If approved, an additional \$105,796 would need approval to be transferred from Retained Earnings (Water \$14,425 and Sewer \$91,371). Retained Earnings for the Water and Sewer Fund were certified by the Department of Revenue in the amount of \$1,768,057 for Sewer and for \$1,609,481 for Water.

I am asking that you consider transfer requests for the aforementioned amounts to fully fund the DPS Administration Building on Perry Way.

We expect to break ground on the new building in the September 2014 timeframe for completion by April 1, 2015.

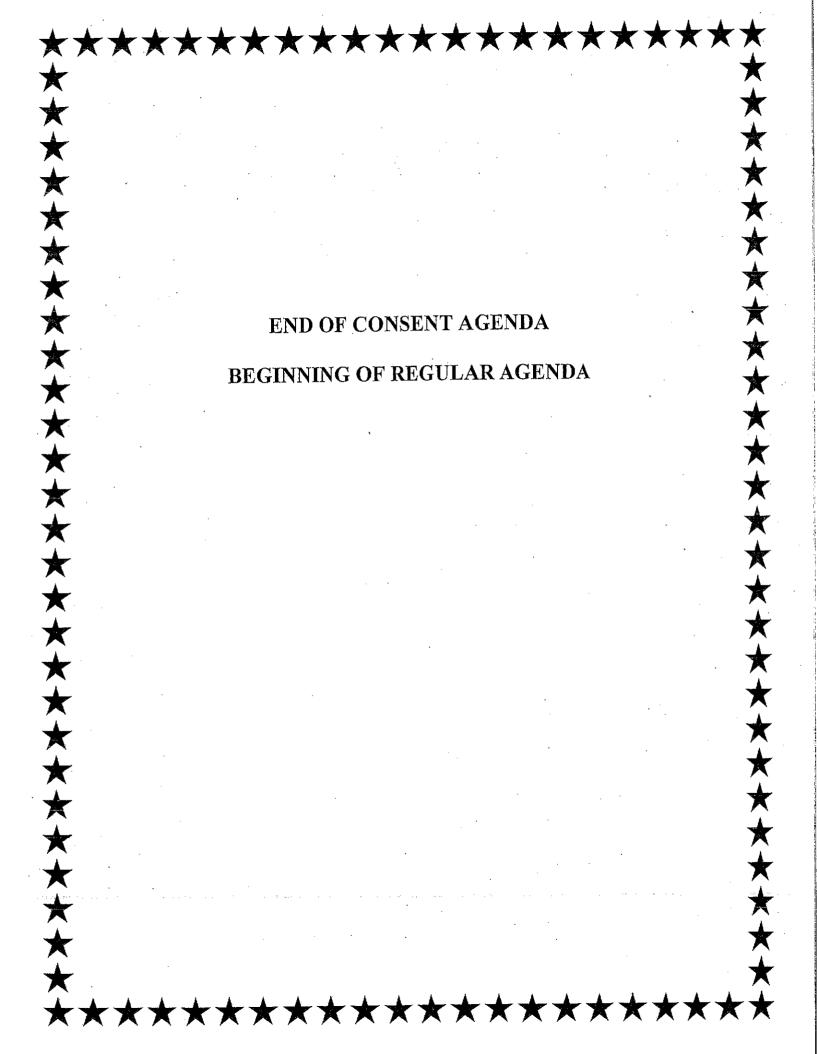

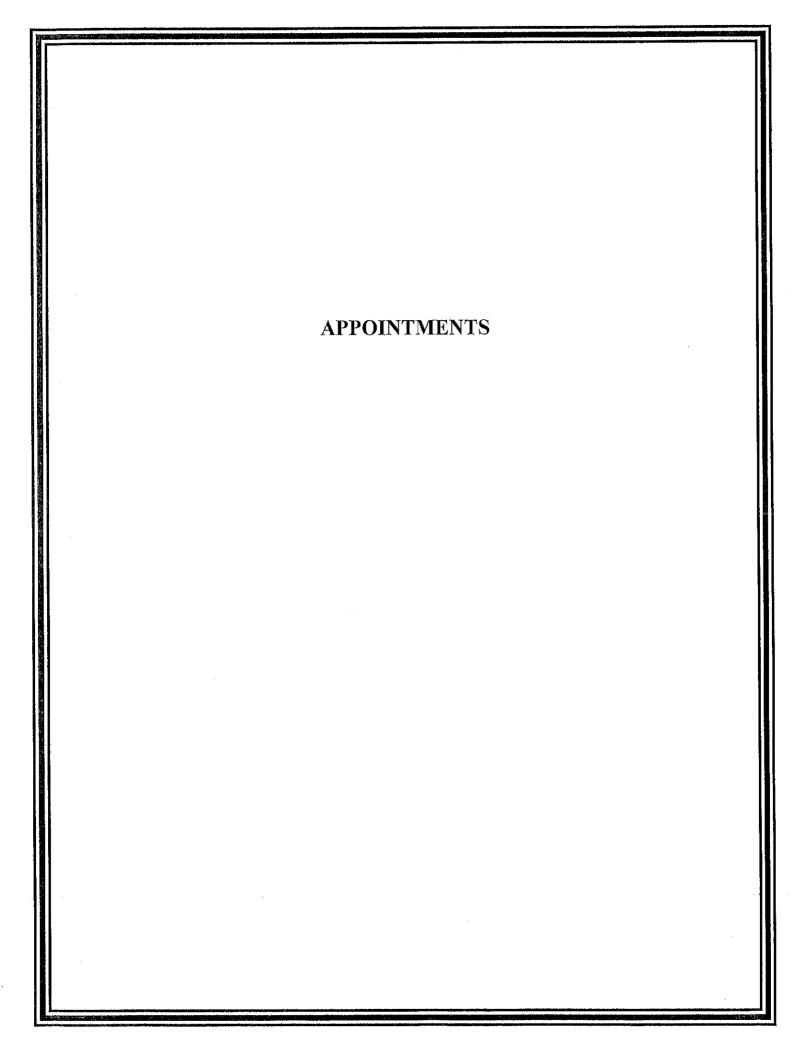

Dear Mayor Holaday:

This letter is intended to convey my interest in one of the open positions on the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority (NRA).

It is after much consideration and deliberation that I submit this letter. It is also with the acknowledgement and appreciation for the diligent and selfless efforts of those who have voluntarily served the NRA to date that I submit this letter of interest.

The past 50 years has provided numerous opportunities for the city, its residents and various stakeholders to consider and debate the program and vision for our central waterfront. These conversations through time have further defined the constraints and identified the opportunities for these parcels. I look forward being a part of the opportunity at hand to both refine that vision and to focus on making it a reality.

Why should I be appointed? I present three reasons: (1) my perspective as an active 24 year resident and volunteer in the community; (2) my understanding as an 18 year member and Chair of the Parks Commission of the city budget and staffing challenges as it relates to capital improvements and maintenance; and (3) my 30 years of experience as a landscape architect of urban parks, mixed use waterfronts and active pedestrian areas.

I share some of my own guiding principals based on both my observations of the efforts to date and successful projects I have been apart of in the past. I hope these can be beneficial to our process and guide our conversation as we move forward:

>Think Holistically: to be successful we must look at the area from east to west holistically and collaboratively not as individual pieces by as a whole.

>Be Overtly Public: the central waterfront is to be designed to continue to be public and welcoming.

>Activate the edges and Create a Year Round Destination: Our harborwalk is a seasonal destination, our Ways to the Water provide pleasant connections from downtown to the boardwalk and Market Landing Park, provides a flexible open space which responds to a variety of scaled uses. However, aside from the Fire House Performing Arts Center, none of the buildings participate in the activation of the civic open spaces. Their backs all face the park. We should seek to activate the non-participating edges to create invitations. To make the park more viable and usable during the shoulder seasons of Spring and Autumn and aim to also create destinations and opportunities to draw people to the waterfront during the winter months.

>Successful Parks around the nation are a balance of Public and Private Investment: Post Office Square and Bryant Park are a few examples. The interfaces between public open space and buildings is where people gather. The main attraction for people is other people. The park should be an asset that brings in more business to Newburyport.

>Create a reliable Funding Stream: we need to establish a designated and continuous funding source for capital improvements and more importantly for ongoing maintenance, which has been a long time shortcoming of our city budget.

>Aim high: as this is our central waterfront, the focus of our city and attention – as evidenced by the attention given to the discussion – it should be nothing less than world class.

>Work Collaboratively: It is essential for our community to succeed both in its parks and other civic endeavors that we work together and optimistically.

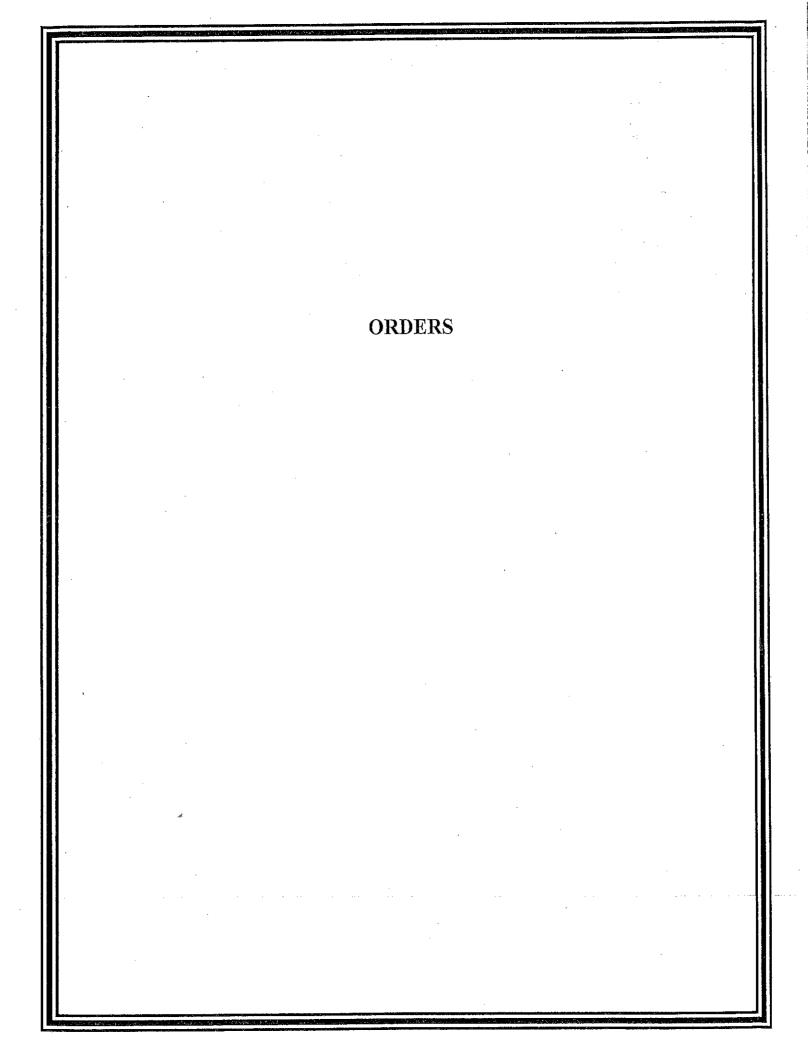

### NEWBURYPORT COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FY15 APPROPRIATIONS AND RESERVATIONS

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee recommends that the City Council appropriate or reserve \$1,236,006.26 from Community Preservation Fund Revenues for the projects, in the amounts, in the categories, and subject to the conditions hereinafter described.

The following CONDITIONS are common to recommended projects #1 through #11:

- A. Each recipient of funds is required to submit to the CPC a written report on the status of the project by each October 15, January 15, April 15 and July 15 following appropriation and until final completion of the project.
- B. If a project is not completed within twelve (12) months of appropriation, the grantee must submit a written request to the CPC for an extension of the grant. Otherwise, funds may be subject to recision and returned to Community Preservation Fund Reserves (applicable to appropriations, not to reservations).
- C. Full funding is conditioned upon the receipt of state matching funds, estimated to be 23% of local revenue, expected in October 2014.

- 1. One page summary spreadsheet of CPC recommendations.
- 2. Recommendations for appropriation or reservation numbers 1-14, with project summaries for each.
- 3. Criteria for project evaluation adopted and published by the CPC.

Estimated Community Preservation Fund Revenues available for appropriation or reservation in FY 2015 total approximately \$1,243,564. This figure includes estimated receipts of the local CPA surcharge through fiscal year end 2014, accumulated interest, the anticipated 23% state matching funds to be received in October 2014, current uncommitted funds and returned funds from completed and closed-out projects.

### PROJECT NO. 1 OPEN SPACE RESERVE

The CPC recommends the reservation of \$50,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Community Preservation Open Space Reserve Fund. Use of reserve funds are subject to future CPC recommendation and City Council appropriation for specific projects.

The CPA category for this reservation is Open Space.

**Project Summary** 

This recommendation is in response to an application from the City's Open Space Committee indicating there are potential opportunities for open space acquisitions and/or conservation restrictions of land. These potential projects require confidentiality. Supplemental information will be submitted as individual projects enter more public phases and are presented to the CPC and the City Council for project specific funding from the reserve. Continued savings will better enable the City to make timely responses and attract acquisition partners to open space opportunities as they arise.

### PROJECT NO. 2 YWCA WOMEN'S RESIDENCE ROOF REPLACEMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$54,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Greater Newburyport YWCA for the replacement of the existing roof on the rear portion of the building and add "ice breaks" to the new roof on the front portion of the building.

The CPA category for this reservation is Community Housing

**Project Summary** 

The YWCA is committed to keeping the rents of this building affordable to the women who reside there. Affordable rents barely cover the operating costs of the housing and do not provide any additional reserves to cover the cost of major capital repairs or improvements. In order for the YWCA to continue to offer affordable rental opportunities for the residents at 13 Market Street, the organization relies upon grant funding to support major capital repairs and improvements. This funding will allow the organization to repair the roof and also create a safer environment for both the residents and the community during the winter months with the installation of the "ice breaks."

### PROJECT NO. 3 BELLEVILLE CONGREATIONAL CHURCH RESTORATION PROJECT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$15,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Belleville Congregational Church to restore and paint the East, West, and North façades of the Meeting House. This appropriation is made with a condition that CPA funding be used solely for the painting of the façades and any associated carpentry and construction work necessary to prepare said façades for paint.

The CPA category for this project is Historic Preservation.

**Project Summary** 

The Belleville Congregational Church has served the community in many ways – as a place of religious worship and also as a community space that hosts a variety of cultural events throughout the year. The congregation has made significant strides in fundraising for capital improvements, which is supported by this recommended appropriation. Funding shall be utilized to strip, scrap, and sand the exterior wood surfaces of the Meeting House and the subsequent application of an oil-based prime coat. These efforts will not only improve the external appearance of the structure, but also help to guard against weather-associated deterioration of this historic structure.

### PROJECT NO. 4 CLIPPER CITY RAIL TRAIL AND HARBORWALK, PHASE II

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$115,000 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance to the City of Newburyport through its Office of Planning and Community Development to support the completion of the final design phase as well as fund the construction administration costs for Phase II of the Rail Trail.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation and Open Space.

**Project Summary** 

The City of Newburyport has been working on the Clipper City Rail Trail for well over a decade, but conversion of the old Eastern Line railroad corridor into a multiuse, recreation trail was finally completed 2010. This first phase of the Rail Trail Project now allows people to walk, run and bike between the commuter rail station and the Merrimack River.

Phase II of the Rail Trail will extend 1 ½ miles between the eastern edge of Newburyport's central waterfront and Parker Street in Newbury, travelling along the shoreline of the Merrimack River, through the South End residential neighborhood, and through a woodland. The trail will primarily run along the corridor of the old City Branch Rail Line. This funding will support the completion of the design phase, which involves permitting, consultation with abutters and the public, negotiation with National Grid, design, specifications and cost estimates and develop a "shovel-ready" project. Design completion is necessary in order to apply for construction funding.

# PROJECT NO. 5 DOWN PAYMENT ASSISTANCE AND MLS INPUT-ONLY LISTING SERVICES

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$75,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust (NAHT) to support its Down Payment Assistance and its Multiple Listing Services (MLS), Input-Only, Listing Services programs.

The CPA category for this project is Community Housing

**Project Summary** 

The NAHT designed and initiated both of these programs in an effort to retain the City's existing affordable housing inventory. The City's affordable units are at greater risk now than in the past in large part due to the downturn in the housing market and accompanying economic crash, which resulted in both a smaller gap between market rate and affordable prices and a tightened lending climate that make it more difficult to attract qualified buyers of existing deed-restricted units.

The Down Payment Assistance Program helps lower income buyers who are able to afford monthly mortgage payments but do not have enough capital to pay the initial home purchase costs. The NAHT offers up to \$15,000 to each eligible buyer to put toward down payment and/or closing costs for the purchase of a deed-restricted resale unit. The assistance is considered a deferred payment loan and secured through a second mortgage.

The Multiple Listing Services Program (MLS) is offered to sellers of deed restricted units. The MLS reaches a broader pool of potential buyers than more traditional methods such as newspaper ads and the city website. The NAHT assumes a small flat fee for inputting the real estate listing on MLS on behalf of the seller, who in exchange agrees to extend the period of time during which the unit is marketed exclusively to income-eligible buyers.

### PROJECT NO. 6 NEWBURYPORT AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$220,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust (NAHT) to be placed in its Affordable Housing Trust Fund (the "Fund") so the NAHT may continue its efforts to support, develop and manage affordable housing for low and moderate income households

The CPA category for this project is Community Housing.

**Project Summary** 

The NAHT has been entrusted by the community to watch over the Fund and judiciously allocate funding to projects and initiatives that promote affordable housing in Newburyport, educate the community on the benefits of having a diverse housing stock, and advocate for both public and private housing development projects that include affordable units. This funding will allow the NAHT to grow the Fund to allow for prompt action when affordable housing opportunities present themselves, in a similar way as when open space purchase opportunities arise. Funding may be used to prevent the loss of income-restricted units, support individuals and families in Newburyport with low to moderate incomes, and also to provide a local financial match for a housing development project.

### PROJECT NO. 7 INN STREET FOUNTAIN AND INTERPRETIVE SIGNAGE

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$50,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the City of Newburyport through its Office of Planning & Community Development to support the restoration of the Inn Street Fountain through the improvement and upgrade of the water filtration system, installation of artistic up-lighting, and creation and installation of interpretive historic signage conveying downtown Newburyport's story of urban renewal.

The CPA category for this project is Historic Preservation

**Project Summary** 

The Inn Street Fountain is designated as a state-listed historic resource by the Massachusetts Historical Commission. This Inn Street focal point has been out of operation for several years due to excessive water usage and public concerns regarding water quality. This project will upgrade the fountain pump and filtration system with a full treatment, self-contained unit that recycles municipal water, thereby eliminating the concerns that led to the shutting down of the fountain. The project will also feature two to three interpretive signs that tell the story of the fountain and of Newburyport's urban renewal and downtown preservation efforts of the 1960s and 70s.

### PROJECT NO. 8 GREEN STREE TREE RESTORATION PROJECT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$21,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the City of Newburyport through the Newburyport Tree Commission to restore Green Street's historic tree-lined streetscape. The initiative will be managed by the Commission in collaboration with the City's Tree Warden and the Department of Public Services.

The primary CPA category for this project is Historic Preservation.

**Project Summary** 

The Tree Commission continues its efforts to restore and enhance the visual importance and uniqueness of Green Street as the principal entryway to downtown Newburyport by planting site-appropriate and diverse trees. In contrast to tree-lined High Street, the current Green Street tree-scape has suffered from years of deterioration. Recent restoration at Garrison Park and tree plantings alongside of City Hall and in front of the Police Station strongly demonstrate the positive impact of continuing a unified design and coordinated planting to extend this renewal further up Green Street.

The project has two phases, which will be completed as funding allows. Phase I will include the planting of 16 trees from Harris Street to Pleasant Street, which is expected to be completed in Spring 2014. Phase II includes the planting of 14 trees from High Street to Harris Street and Pleasant Street to Merrimac Street. The timing of this phase depends on funding availability with the goal to have it completed, if not in Spring 2014, then Spring 2015.

# PROJECT NO. 9 FIRST RELIGIOUS SOCIETY MEETINGHOUSE AND STEEPLE PRESERVATION AND PAINTING

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$200,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the First Religious Society Unitarian Universalist (FRS) to be used for the preservation and restoration of the steeple and meetinghouse windows and doors as well as maintenance and upgrades to the structures systems. This recommendation comes with the following condition:

• The applicant shall execute a Preservation Restriction on the exterior façade of the structure.

The CPA category for this project is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

The FRS' historic meetinghouse, with its majestic steeple has been a centerpiece of our city and over time, has been recognized as an outstanding example of Federal style architecture. The upkeep and maintenance of a building of this scale and historic importance are expensive propositions and because of its architectural and historical importance and civic prominence, community support is imperative. Funding shall be used to repair and/or replace in-kind exterior elements on both the steeple and the meetinghouse. This work shall be guided by *The Secretary of the Interior's Standard for Rehabilitation and Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings*.

# PROJECT NO. 10 EXTERIOR WOODWORK RESTORATION, PHASE II AT NEWBURYPORT HIGH SCHOOL

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$100,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Newburyport Public Schools for Phase II of exterior woodwork rehabilitation project with the following condition:

• The applicant shall execute a Preservation Restriction on the exterior façade of the structure.

The CPA category is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

This project will rehabilitate and restore the exterior woodwork on the historic Newburyport High School. Age and exposure to weather have caused a variety of issues with the exterior woodwork, necessitating a well-planned historic restoration guided by *The Secretary of the Interior's Standard for Rehabilitation and Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings*.

The project is divided into four phases. This recommendation will be combined with \$150,000 in CPA funding from FY 2014 as well as a School Department budget item of \$80,000 to accomplish the first two phases of the project, which focus on the front façade of the structure. The north-facing façade is not only the most prominent portion of the building, but it is also the most urgent in need of rehabilitation and restoration.

### PROJECT NO. 11 ATKINSON COMMON HISTORIC LANDSCAPE PRESERVATION, PHASE II

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$15,000 from the FY 2015 Estimated Revenues to the Belleville Improvement Society to further implement their 2010 "Urgent Tree/Shrub Care and Replacement Project" to ensure the longevity of the existing trees, remove hazardous conditions and improve public safety for the visitors to this diverse heritage landscape.

The CPA category is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

The Belleville Improvement Society continues to diligently implement its plan address the overwhelming needs to protect and preserve this historic landmark. Preservation, restoration and repair of this natural resource are paramount to the continued use and enjoyment of this property on a cultural, recreational, artistic, athletic and educational basis. This funding will support the Society in its efforts to remove hazardous trees, prune existing vegetation and plant new trees so that this park will continue to be a beautiful and safe community amenity.

### PROJECT NO. 12 CITY HALL BOND DEBT PAYMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$189,187.50 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance to the City of Newburyport for the eighth annual payment of interest and principal on the City Hall Restoration Bond.

The CPA category is Historic Preservation.

#### **Project Summary**

In December 2005, the City Council authorized issuance of a \$1,950,000 bond against future CPA revenue for the City Hall Restoration Project. Work on City Hall is now largely complete, though debt payments will continue through 2019. The CPC is advised that it is necessary to appropriate the debt service payments on an annual basis.

### PROJECT NO. 13 OPEN SPACE ACQUISITIONS BOND DEBT PAYMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$119,818.76 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance to the City of Newburyport for the eighth annual payment of interest and principal on the Open Space Acquisitions Bond.

The CPA category is Open Space.

#### **Project Summary**

In December 2005, the City Council authorized bonding up to \$1,775,000 against future CPA revenue for open space acquisitions, including the Cooper North Pasture and the former Guilford properties. Under this authorization, the City Treasurer conservatively borrowed \$1,275,000 to fund the acquisition costs. Debt payments on the bond will continue through 2019. The CPC is advised that it is necessary to appropriate the debt service payments on an annual basis.

### PROJECT NO. 14 CPA ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$12,000 from the Community Preservation Fund Balance to fund the Community Preservation Committee's expected administrative costs. These costs include a stipend for the CPC administration liaison position in the Planning Office, annual membership dues in the statewide community preservation coalition, and other recurring expenses including note taking at meetings, legal advertising, and city solicitor review of legal documents when necessary. Excess funds remaining in this account at the end of the fiscal year revert to general Community Preservation Funds.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Administration.

#### COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

#### **EVALUATION CRITERIA**

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee gives preference to proposals which address as many of the following general criteria as possible:

- 1. Eligible for Community Preservation Act (CPA) funding according to the requirements described in the CPA legislation (Chapter 44B of Mass. General Laws).
- 2. Consistent with the Master Plan, Open Space and Recreation Plan, Land Use and other planning documents that have received public scrutiny and input.
- 3. Preserve and enhance the essential character of the city.
- 4. Protect resources that would otherwise be threatened.
- 5. Serve more than one CPA purpose or demonstrate why serving multiple needs is not feasible.
- 6. Demonstrate practicality and feasibility, and that the project can be implemented within budget and on schedule
- 7. Produce an advantageous cost/benefit value.
- 8. Leverage additional public and/or private funds (eg. qualify the project for additional grants from other sources) or receive partial funding from other sources and/or voluntary contributions of goods or services.
- 9. Preserve or improve utility of currently owned city assets.
- 10. Receive endorsement by other municipal boards or departments and broad-based support from community members.

#### **CATEGORY SPECIFIC CRITERIA**

The Community Preservation Act funds three key community interests: open space, historic preservation, and affordable housing. Public recreation projects may also be funded.

- 1. Open Space proposals which address as many of the following specific criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Permanently protect important wildlife habitat, particularly areas that include:
    - locally significant biodiversity;
    - variety of habitats with a diversity of geologic features and types of vegetation;
    - Endangered habitat or species of plant or animal.
  - Preserve active agricultural use.
  - Provide opportunities for passive recreation and environmental education.
  - Protect or enhance wildlife corridors, promote connectivity of habitat or prevent fragmentation of habitats.
  - Provide connections with existing trails, protected open space or potential trail linkages.
  - Preserve scenic views.
  - Border a scenic road.
  - Protect drinking water quantity and quality.
  - Provide flood control/storage.
  - Preserve and protect important surface water bodies, including streams, wetlands, vernal pools
    or riparian zones.
  - Buffer for protected open space, or historic resources.

- 2. Historic Preservation proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate historic, cultural, architectural or archaeological resources of significance, especially those that are threatened.
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate city-owned properties, features or resources of historical significance.
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate the historical function of a property or site.
  - Demonstrates a public benefit.
  - Ability to provide permanent protection for the historic resource.
- 3. Affordable Housing proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Contribute to the goal of 10% affordability as defined by chapter 40B of Mass. General Laws.
  - Promote a socioeconomic environment that encourages a diversity of income.
  - Provide housing that is harmonious in design and scale with the surrounding community.
  - Intermingle affordable and market rate housing at levels that exceed state requirements for percentage of affordable units pursuant to chapter 40B.
  - Ensure long-term affordability.
  - Address the needs of range of qualified household, including very low, low and low-to moderate income families and individuals.
  - Provide affordable rental and affordable ownership opportunities.
  - Promote use of existing buildings or construction on previously-developed or city-owned sites.
  - Convert market rate to affordable units.
- **4. Recreation** proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Support multiple recreation uses.
  - Serve a significant number of residents.
  - Expand the range of recreational opportunities available to city residents of all ages.
  - Jointly benefit Conservation Commission and Parks Commission initiatives by promoting recreation, such as hiking, biking, and cross-country skiing.
  - Maximize the utility of land already owned by city (e.g. school property).
  - Promote the creative use of railway and other corridors to create safe and healthful nonmotorized transportation opportunities.

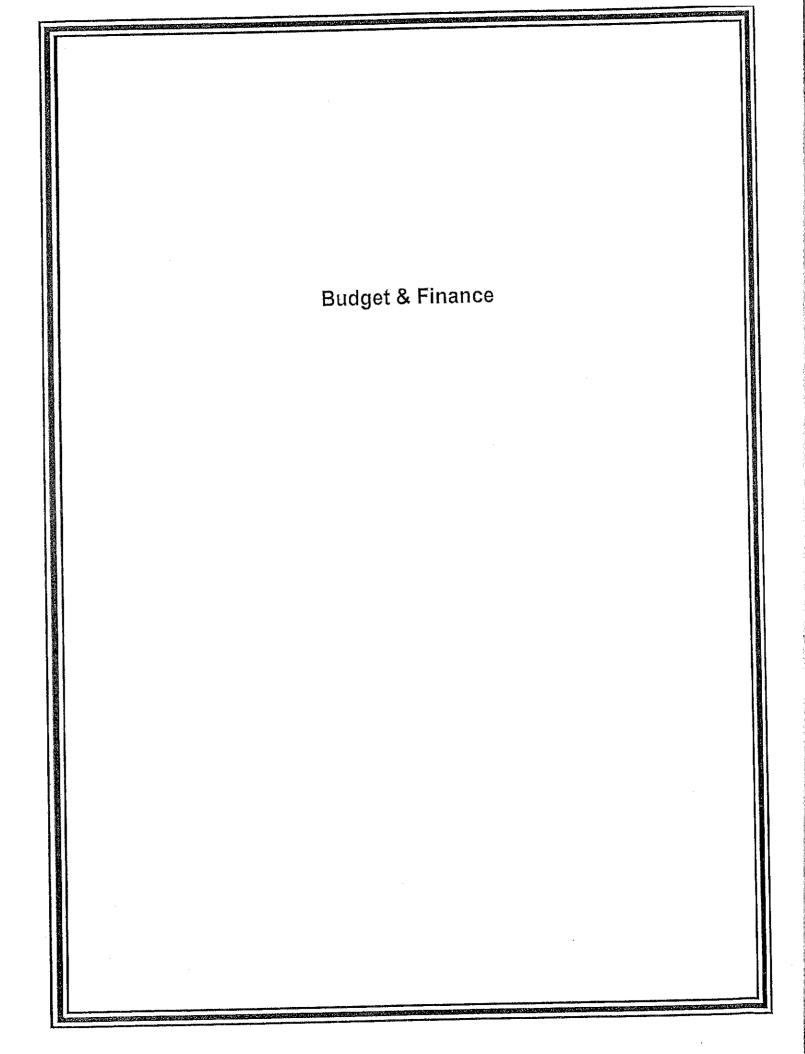

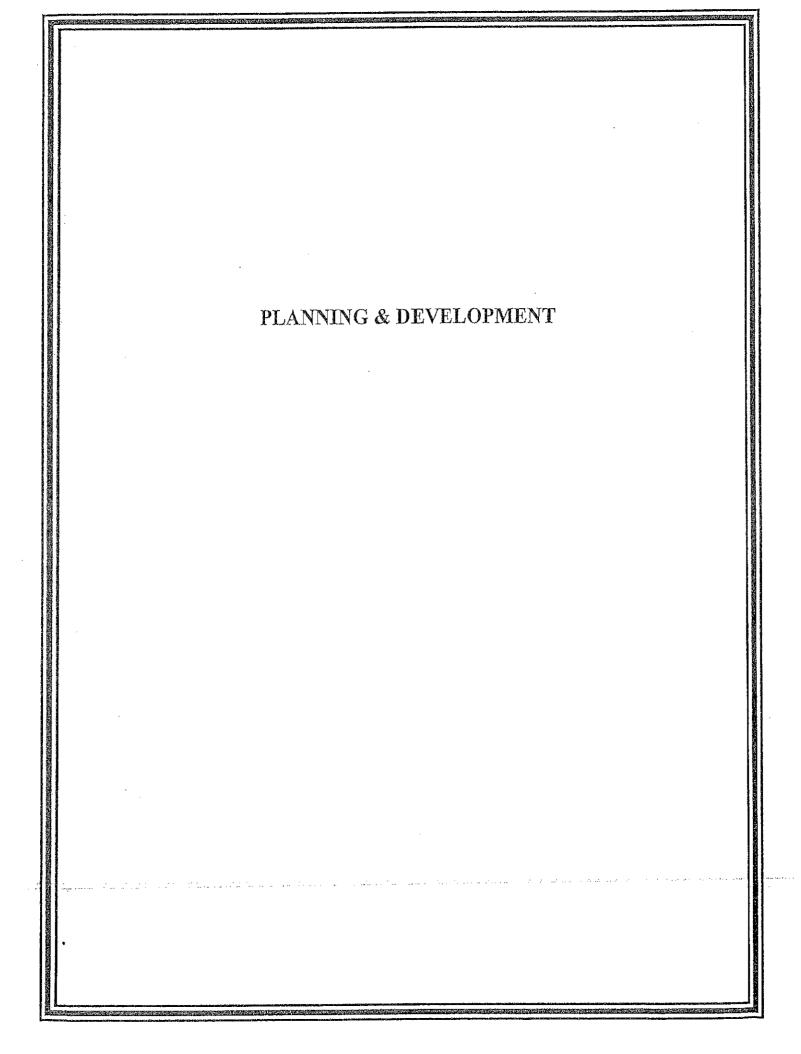

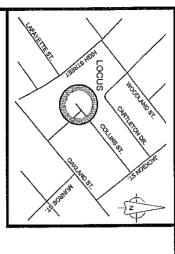

Per your request of April 30, 2014, a title examination was conducted on the 1,664 square foot parcel on Collins Street in Newburyport that abuts the Clothey parcels. The purpose of this examination was to provide any and all information that would affect this parcel, including Collins Street. This would include, but not be limited to the City Council order to accept the street and to outline any takings, easements and exceptions.

I spoke with Anthony J. Furnari, City of Newburyport Director of Public Services. He had no information regarding when Collins Street was accepted as a public street. He did state it is a public street and that the City Clerk's office should have those records. I was also told by Mr. Furnari that the 1,664 square foot parcel in question has no easements on it.

I also spoke with Richard Jones, City of Newburyport City Clerk. At my request Mr. Jones conducted a due diligence search of when the city took the street as a public way. His reply via e-mail on May 6, 2014 was that he could not locate a City Council Order or a date when the street was accepted as a public way. Mr. Jones did state that he does have a sheet dated 2002 from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts showing Collins Street as a public way in Newburyport.
