





Dear Mayor Holaday, President O'Brien and Members of the Council,

The License and Permits Committee convened the meeting with the Health Director and no follow up actions or deliberations have taken place. And now, as the Mayor has indicated a meeting with BOH chair, Robin Blair, is imminent, it is with a sense of urgency that this report is prepared without consultation or collaboration by others.

The purpose of this report is to provide a narrative for the councilors who were not present, to provide a reference for the Mayor and to continue the effort of helping the Health Director "draft an approach that presents Newburyport as a community welcoming to business."

Meeting notes:

1) The meeting failed to meet the objective of "draft[ing] an approach that presents Newburyport as a community welcoming to business." and resulted in the BOH declaring policy which further isolates the HD and the BOH from the business community.

BOH Chairman Blair's July 17th email response to a follow-up email question directed to the HD regarding his demand that Atomic Café employees wear uniforms serves as evidence of the further isolating policy -

I understand that you still have concerns regarding the policies and procedures of the Newburyport Dept. of Health. As discussed at the recent City Council subcommittee hearing, the BOH requests that these concerns be addressed by the Board rather than its employees, i.e. the Director. You are invited to present any concerns before the Board at its next scheduled meeting. You may contact the admin. asst. of the Board to be placed on the agenda. Also if an individual or establishment has concerns the Board would prefer to hear first hand what these concerns are rather than relying on hearsay.

Robin S. Blair, O.D. Chairman, BOH

The HD responded to my inquiry by sending a reference from the U.S Department of Health and Human Services Food and Drug Administration 1999, Federal Food Code Public Health Reasons / Administrative Guidelines where the word *uniform* does not appear.

Outer Clothing -2-304.11 Clean Condition.

Food employees shall wear clean outer clothing to prevent contamination of food, equipment, utensils, linens, and single-service and single-use articles. - Dirty clothing may harbor diseases that are transmissible through food. Food employees who inadvertently touch their dirty clothing may contaminate their hands. This could result in contamination of the food being prepared. Food may also be contaminated through direct contact with dirty clothing. In addition, employees wearing dirty clothes send a negative message to consumers about the level of sanitation in the establishment.

The HD also sent the follow-up email:

"In keeping with the positive spirt of the meeting and what was agreed upon on by all City Council and Board of Health members present as a consensus, was that any further questions or concerns be addresses in the proper manner and form to the proper board as those questions and concerns relate to."

The HD assertions that "what was agreed upon on by all City Council and Board of Health members present as a consensus", is not an accurate portrayal of what took place.

2) Though not invited, the BOH positioned themselves as participants and attempted to end the meeting before it began.

Both BOH Chair Blair and the Board's accompanying attorney (Cheryl Sbarra, Senior Staff Attorney, Massachusetts Association of Health Boards) declared the calling of the HD before Council as "being outside the purview of Council because the HD works for the BOH".

After receiving clarification from Peter Lombardi that the HD is a union-represented employee of the city and as such is subject to Section 2-7 of the Home Rule Charter, the meeting continued.

3) The HD was well prepared with stacks of detailed information on all the cases outlined in the Committee's letter addressed to him.

Unfortunately, the premise of the meeting —"There have been numerous concerns, questions, complaints and frustrations expressed to me by members of the community in regard to the manner of enforcement and approach by the Director of Public Health, Robert Bracey.", was never discussed because the BOH stepped in to response whenever possible.

4) The BOH collectively scoffed at the notion that business owners are afraid of retaliation by the FID if they complain publically and further scoffed at what was called anecdotal evidence presented by the Committee.

Despite every effort to convince the BOH that the business community's perception of the HD is far from positive and that it is retaliatory The Board refused to explore the idea that "perception is reality".

The BOH equated themselves to "being the [health] police, without guns" and shunned and was appalled at the notion that they should in any way "be like a Chamber of Commerce".

This cold, staunch enforcement and "if you want answers, get yourself on the agenda of our next meeting" approach is contrary to the goal of creating a business friendly environment that will attract and welcome businesses to Newburyport.

If the BOH wishes to be in line with our police department, they may find it worthwhile to reference a recently published book titled Legendary Locals of Newburyport (Kathleen M. Downey; Arcadia Publishing 2014), where Marshal Thomas Howard comments on his approach to community policing: "Interacting with the community one-on-one is really great at breaking down barriers. I like to see what's going on and say hello to people. At the end of the day, what's important is helping fellow human beings".

5) Discussed was the fact that there is no or low attendance at BOH meetings. This was verbalized as "Where are all these complainers, no one comes to our meetings."

Further research on this point reveals that BOH meeting postings lack agenda items and, anecdotally, from those who attend the meetings, they are long, uneventful and most importantly, non-participatory.

And again, the board refuses to accept the notion that businesses are afraid of retaliation.

6) The discussion turned to the insistence by the HD that food businesses must have monthly rodent inspections and the following clause was presented -

(Spelling and tense as written) - 2.8.006 REQUIRED INTERGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT (IPM) All food establishments must employee a licensed pest control contractor for year round service to assure good integrated pest management practices. Receipts for services must be kept for one year. These receipts must be kept on premises for the inspector's review.

When questioned numerous times as to where the regulation states "monthly", the HD stated "That is the interpretation from the Board" and Blair responded, "If you want, I'll change 'year round' to monthly".

In conclusion, the Board and the HD refused to accept any notion that change was necessary. An entrenched BOH and an isolated HD have indicated no interest in anything other than staunch enforcement.

As late as six days earlier from the date of this report, the HD was heard telling a newly establishing food service operator "That's the way it is. If you want to apply to have it differently, you need to get on the agenda of the BOH and that will delay your opening".



Dear Mr. Carrigan:

New Ventures Associates, LLC ("New Ventures) is in receipt of your letter dated June 26, 2014 issued under Paragraph 27 of the Judgment, stating that the Department is considering exercising its rights under Paragraph 27 of the Final Judgment in the above-referenced matter with respect to the Landfill gas extraction and control system.

Please be advised that New Ventures representatives started the flare following receipt of the notice, started the flare again last weekend and again yesterday, July 9, 2014. The flare has run intermittently, influenced recently by the amount of gas available. The Department is well aware that the flare has been cycled for some time to reflect and adjust to the amount of gas remaining as well as the flow. In addition, New Ventures has retained Blue Granite Environmental Consultants to attempt to determine how to cycle the flare efficiently. New Ventures has spent considerable monies with Blue Granite and others to address the operation of the flare. To date, New Ventures has been able to cycle the flare on a periodic basis to avoid any public health impacts.

We believe that access by the Department under Paragraph 27 is premature for the following reasons:

1. The operation of the Landfill flare has been addressed on an ongoing basis by New Ventures. The system has been operating without any off-site odors. Further, Hugo walked the entire site yesterday, July 9, 2014 and did not smell any odors on-site at the Landfill.

- 2. The blower fan has been repaired and has not affected the Landfill gas system or the gas collection system and does not prevent the system from operating in full compliance. New Ventures has ordered parts for further repair.
- 3. The condensate knockout tank has been repaired. It is not preventing the Landfill gas system or the gas collection system from operating in compliance with the Order.
- 4. The auto dialer telephone line had recent problems. It has been programmed to contact the Department as well as the Operator with respect to the flare and shutdown. The auto dialer is not necessary to operate the flare and is not integral to the collection and treatment of Landfill gas or operating in compliance with the performance standards and Appendix B.*
- 5. The chart recorder merely records temperature and flow and is not necessary to the operation of the flare or the gas collection system to treat the gas.*
- 6. The flow meter also details information required by the Order and is not related to the actual functioning of the gas system or gas collection system.*
- 7. New Ventures will submit a report with respect to May 6, 2014.
- 8. New Ventures will take steps to bring the electrical connection up to code, if necessary.

New Ventures' personnel familiar with the flare and the Landfill went to the site again yesterday. The flare was started and ran for two (2) hours when the gas cycled off. During this time, Hugo walked the entire Landfill and did not smell any odors. New Ventures will continue to work with its technicians and personnel to adjust the cycling to reflect the amount of Landfill gas. New Ventures is committed to finding the correct balance for operating and cycling the flare.

We remain available to answer any other questions.





INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT HARBOR MASTER SERVICES

This Inter-Municipal Agreement (hereinafter "IMA" or "Agreement"), dated _______, 2014, by and between the City of Newburyport, acting through its Mayor and City Council (hereinafter "Newburyport"), the City of Amesbury, acting through its Mayor and City Council (hereinafter "Amesbury") and the Town of Salisbury, acting by and through its Board of Selectmen (hereinafter "Salisbury"), is entered into pursuant to G.L. c. 40 §4A, upon the following terms and conditions:

WHEREAS, under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Newburyport, Amesbury and Salisbury (hereinafter collectively referred to as "the signatory municipalities") each presently employ a Harbormaster and Deputy and/or Assistant Harbormasters (hereinafter "Harbormasters") within their respective harbormaster departments;

WHEREAS, the signatory municipalities and their harbormaster departments have determined that the provision of multi-jurisdictional harbormaster services will increase their ability to provide adequate and professional harbormaster services for their communities;

WHEREAS, the signatory municipalities desire to enter into an agreement which sets forth mutually agreeable terms and conditions for the furnishing of harbormaster services by the Harbormaster and Assistant Harbormasters of each municipal jurisdiction.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties to this AGREEMENT agree as follows:

I. <u>Definitions</u>

- a. "Sending Department" shall mean the municipality sending harbormaster aid and assistance to a participating municipality.
- b. "Requesting Department" shall mean the municipality requesting and receiving harbormaster aid and assistance from a participating municipality.
- c. "Mutual Aid" shall mean the provision of manpower and logistical support requested by a harbormaster department to meet its immediate requirements when its then-available resources are not sufficient to cope with existing circumstances.
- d. "Harbormaster-in-Charge" shall mean the harbormaster having been designated with command authority during a particular shift.

II. General Services and Jurisdiction

The provisions of this Agreement apply to general and complete harbormaster jurisdiction within each signatory municipality. The Agreement generally authorizes On-Duty harbormasters and/or deputy/assistant harbormasters in any signatory municipality to exercise full harbormaster powers in each contiguous municipality in the following circumstances:

- When involved in a fresh and/or immediate investigative inquiry or action initiated from an observation or incident within the territorial and jurisdictional boundaries of the harbormaster's municipality;
- When enforcing or investigating any water-related incident or violation (Civil or Criminal) that originally occurred within the territorial and jurisdictional boundaries of the harbormaster's municipality;
- When services have been requested by the Harbormaster-in-Charge of one of the signatory municipalities and thereafter authorized by the Harbormaster-in-Charge of the of the Sending Department;
- During any other "Fresh Pursuit" or "Exigent Circumstance" authorized by existing law.

III. Requesting Aid

The procedure for requesting aid under this Agreement shall be as follows:

- a. The Requesting Department's Harbormaster- in-Charge shall contact the Sending Department's Harbormaster- in-Charge to request aid for a particular period of time.
- b. The request shall state the nature of the assistance sought.
- c. Requests shall be made with sufficient advance notice.
- d. The Sending Department's Harbormaster- in-Charge may authorize the provision of one or more harbormasters based upon the resources of the Sending Department.
- e. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as imposing an obligation upon any signatory municipality to respond to a request for harbormaster services or provide Mutual Aid. The extent of assistance to be furnished under this Agreement shall be determined solely by the Sending Department, and it is understood and agreed that the assistance furnished may be recalled at the sole discretion of the Sending Department.

IV. Powers of Harbormasters

Harbormasters from a member of a Sending Department, while acting pursuant to this Agreement beyond the territorial jurisdiction of their own department, shall have all harbormaster powers (including the powers of arrest and the enforcement of boating laws) as applied in Massachusetts General Laws and Massachusetts Common Law. The parties acknowledge that any mutual aid exercised under this Agreement may include actions as authorized by the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90 B, as it applies to

harbormaster services. The Harbormaster-in-Charge of the Requesting Department shall be in charge and have the jurisdictional authority to relieve such Mutual Aid as long as this relief is lawful, reasonable and consistent with the Agreement.

V. <u>Liability and Immunity</u>

- a. Each department shall be liable for all salaries of its personnel while rendering harbormaster services under this Agreement. All compensation and other benefits enjoyed by harbormasters in their own jurisdictions shall be extended to the services they perform under this Agreement. Thus, such items as medical and death benefits, payable as a result of exercising assistance under this Agreement, will be the expense of the officer's own Department.
- b. Harbormasters injured or killed while responding to or furnishing harbormaster services to another community pursuant to this Agreement shall be considered to be on active duty for his or her own department. Thus, all compensation, responsibility and liability will be of the officer's own department.
- c. Each party to this Agreement shall waive against any and all other parties hereto any and all claims which may arise out of the activities of responding harbormasters of each party while rendering or receiving harbormaster services, except for intentional injuries and acts outside the harbormaster authority.
- d. All immunities from liability enjoyed by each signatory municipality within its own jurisdiction shall extend to its participation in rendering mutual harbormaster assistance under this Agreement outside its boundaries to the extent authorized by law.

VI. Liability to Third Parties

- a. Each Requesting Department under this Agreement agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless any Sending Department from any civil liability claimed or incurred on account of any alleged injuries, violation of rights or injury or death claimed to result from the responding harbormasters good faith compliance with the orders of any superior harbormaster of the Requesting Department or from the negligent acts or misconduct of the Requesting Department.
- b. Each Sending Department under this Agreement agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless any receiver from any civil liability claimed or incurred on account of alleged injuries, violation of rights or injury or death claimed to result from failure by a harbormaster from a Sending Department to comply in good faith with the orders of any superior harbormaster of the Sending Department or from the negligent acts or misconduct of the Sending Department.

VII. Term


This Agreement shall take effect on _____ and continue in effect until withdrawal from this Agreement by any one party hereto, which shall be made by giving forty-five (45) days of said notice in writing to the member departments' Harbormaster. Said withdrawal by one department shall not terminate this Agreement among the remaining parties. In accordance with the terms of G.L. c. 40, §4A, this Agreement, including any extensions thereof, shall remain in effect for no more than twenty-five (25) years.

VIII. Miscellaneous

- a. Entire Agreement. The terms, together with any attachments referenced herein, shall constitute the entire agreement among the Parties and shall supersede all previous communications, representations, or agreements, either oral or written among the Parties with respect to the subject matter.
- b. Amendment. This Agreement may only be amended or modified by written document signed by the Mayor and majority of the City Council in Newburyport, the Mayor and majority of the City Council in Amesbury, and the Town Manager and Board of Selectmen in Salisbury.
- a. Fiscal Year. The term Fiscal Year hereunder shall be as that term is defined by Massachusetts Governmental law.
- b. Governing Law. This Agreement shall be governed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and any dispute hereunder shall be directed to the appropriate court within Essex County.
- c. Severability. If any provision, section, phrase or word contained herein is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable, for any reason, or beyond the scope of the statutory provisions of Chapter 40, Section 4A of the General Laws, as amended, then it is the intention of the parties that, for public purposes, the remaining provisions thereof shall continue in full force and effect.





Short Title: Road Races, Walkathons and Bicycle events

13-98 Purpose and intent

The use of city streets and sidewalks for the purpose of road races, walkathons or bicycle tours are positive events that promote exercise, general good health and Newburyport as a destination. These events do from time to time create hardships, impacting neighborhoods and traffic. To create a balance between conflicting interests, by safeguarding participants, residents, visitors and the City of Newburyport, this ordinance will define and codify the procedure for the benefit of all 13-99 Definitions

"Road race", a competitive or non-competitive running event that utilizes the streets, sidewalks and/or crosses over streets or sidewalks within city limits and in which an entry fee is required or charitable donation is solicited or suggested.

"Walkathon", a competitive or non-competitive walk event that utilizes the streets, sidewalks and/or crosses over streets or sidewalks within city limits and in which an entry fee is required or charitable donation is solicited or suggested.

"Bicycle Race", a competitive or non-competitive bicycling event that utilizes the streets, sidewalks and/or crosses over streets or sidewalks within city limits and in which an entry fee is required or charitable donation is solicited or suggested.

"Multi-disciplined event", a competitive or non-competitive event requiring or offering running, walking, biking, swimming or any combination thereof in which an entry fee is required or a charitable donation is solicited or suggested.

13-100 Limitations

(a) "Procedure" All road racing, walkathon, bicycle, or swimming events shall, through that event's organizer, board of directors, charity foundation or designee apply for authorization to hold the event through the Office of the City Clerk. The City Clerk upon review of the completed form will place the application on the regular City Council agenda. Upon following the procedures of the Council, as deemed appropriated in the sole judgment of the Council, the application will be considered approved if the Council votes favorably by majority. The event will name one person responsible on the application and shall provide contact information to include name, address and telephone number.

(b) "Exemptions" Each event organizer or organization shall comply with this ordinance and no

exemptions will be permitted.

- (c) "Course map", All applications shall be accompanied by a course map showing the event route, water stops, refreshment stops, and so-called "porta-potties". The course map shall also include any road closures, detours and parking areas. The course map shall be approved by Police, Fire, Department of Public Services, Parks Commission and Harbormasters Departments prior to submission to the City Clerk.
- (d) "Electronic Amplifier" Electronic amplifiers, loudspeakers and bullhorn use shall be requested at time of application. Under no circumstances will they be used for public address announcements or music before 8:00 A.M., except for Sundays when electronic amplifiers, loud speakers or bullhorns will not be used for public address announcements or music before 9:00 AM.
- (e) "Road Closure" No ways, public or private, boat ramps or parking lots controlled or patrolled by the city shall be closed without authorization. Authorization shall be considered granted only if said closure(s) are contained in the approved permit. It is the sole responsibility of the race organizers to notify residents ten (10) days in advance that neighborhood roads will be closed if no alternate route is available to those residents. Notification shall be made by race organizers by informational packet drop-off at all residences that may be impacted. In the case of multi-family residences with so-called security doors, notification will be sufficient at said security door. Press releases and other media type notifications are encouraged.
- (f) "Insurance" All events shall have an insurance policy or rider in effect for the event naming the "City of Newburyport" as an additional insured. The policy shall be no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000,00).
- (g) "Event termination" If in the judgment of the City Marshal, Fire Chief or Department of Public Services (DPS) Director or designees thereof determine that an event is unsafe due to existing conditions, that event may be stopped, terminated or suspended. In the case of a multidiscipline event such as a triathlon, the Harbormaster or his/her designee may likewise stop, terminate or suspend the swimming portion for cause.
- (h) "Event and traffic Security" The City Marshal, Fire Chief, DPS Director or in the case of a triathlon, the Harbormaster can require special duty personnel to assist in the organizing and coordinating the safety and security of the event. All special duty assignments will be paid by the event organizers.
- (i) "Clean-up" The event organizers shall be responsible for post event trash collection, removal of signage, directional arrows, advertisements or other promotional material associated with the event.

13-101 Enforcement

- (a) "Regulations" Consistent with this ordinance, the city shall promulgate regulations to enforce and otherwise implement the provisions of this ordinance upon passage by the City Council. Any event previously approved by City Council shall be deemed permitted.
- (b) "Warning" In the circumstance that this ordinance is violated, the enforcement may consist of a warning. Any warnings issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and may be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.
- (c) "Noncriminal Disposition" If the city determines that a violation has occurred in which a noncriminal violation is issued, the named event organizer shall be penalized by a noncriminal disposition as provided bin Massachusetts General Law as adopted by the City of Newburyport as a general ordinance in Subsection 1-17 of Chapter 1 of the Code or Ordinances of the City of Newburyport in the amounts set herein in 13-101(d)
- (d) "Violation" The non-criminal violation shall be \$100.00 for the first offense and \$250.00 for second and subsequent offenses. Any non-criminal citations issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and shall be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.

Delete Section V-G, entitled "Temporary Moratorium on Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers" in its entirety and replace said Section with the following:

V-G: Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers

A. Purpose

Pursuant to Chapter 40A of the Massachusetts General Laws, as well as under the home-rule powers of the city pursuant to Sections 1 and 6 of Article II of the Articles of Amendment of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, as amended by Article LXXXIX of said Articles of Amendment, a Medical Marijuana Overlay District (MMOD) and a discretionary Medical Marijuana Treatment Center (MMTC) special permit (MMTC-SP) are hereby established due to the unique potential secondary adverse impacts of so-called "Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers" in the City of Newburyport.

The purpose of this section is to provide for the placement of MMTC, in accordance with the Humanitarian Medical Use of Marijuana Act, G.L. c.94C, App. §1-1, et seq., in locations suitable for lawful medical marijuana facilities and to minimize adverse impacts of MMTC on adjacent properties, residential neighborhoods, schools, playgrounds and other locations where minors congregate by regulating the siting, design, placement, security, and removal of MMTC.

B. Definitions

Where not expressly defined in the Zoning Ordinance, terms used in this section (V-G) shall be interpreted as defined in the Humanitarian Medical Use of Marijuana Act, G.L. c.94C, App. §1-1, et seq. and the Department of Public Health Regulations promulgated thereunder, 105 CMR 725.001, et seq., and otherwise by their plain language.

"Medical Marijuana Treatment Center": A not-for-profit entity and/or facility, as defined by Massachusetts law only, registered by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) under 105 CMR 725.100, that acquires, cultivates, possesses, manufactures, processes (including development of related products such as edible marijuana-infused products ("MIPs"), tinctures, aerosols, oils, or ointments), transfers, transports, sells, distributes, delivers, dispenses, or administers marijuana, products containing marijuana, related supplies, or educational materials to registered qualifying patients or their personal caregivers. Unless otherwise specified, MMTC refers to all site(s) of dispensing, cultivation, and preparation of marijuana.

C. Establishment

<u>Medical Marijuana Overlay District</u>: A Medical Marijuana Overlay District (MMOD) is hereby established as an overlay zoning district consisting of all such parcels of land depicted on the Newburyport zoning map within the following areas:

- 1. All that portion of the I1B District North of Hale Street; and
- 2. All that portion of the I1 District South of Stanley Tucker Drive, North of Parker Street and West of Malcolm Hoyt Road.

<u>Underlying Zoning</u>: Within the MMOD, all the other provisions of the zoning ordinance, including, but not limited to, those specific to any underlying districts, shall remain in full force and effect except to the extent that the provisions of this section apply, in which case the requirements of the MMOD shall control.

Land within the MMOD may be used either for:

- i. A MMTC, in which case the requirements set forth in this section shall apply; or
- ii. A use allowed in the underlying district, in which case the requirements of the underlying district shall apply.

If the provisions of the MMOD are silent on a zoning regulation, the requirements of the underlying district shall apply. To the extent that there is a conflict between other provisions of the zoning ordinance and the provisions of this section, then the provisions of this section shall control.

<u>SPGA</u>: Consistent with Subsection V-G(D), the zoning board of appeals shall serve as the special permit granting authority (SPGA) in administering this section.

D. Permitting Procedure and Criteria

Special Permit Required: Medical Marijuana Treatment Centers may be permitted in the MMOD but only pursuant to a Special Permit hereunder. The zoning board of appeal shall act as the SPGA for purposes of this section, and it shall review and may deny, approve, or approve with conditions all applications hereunder in accordance with the procedures listed in Subsection X-H.8. The SPGA shall approve a MMTC-SP if the SPGA determines that the proposed use as described in the application meets all the requirements of this section and, in addition, the special permit criteria of Subsection X-H.7. Application for a special permit shall be submitted to the SPGA pursuant to the submission requirements, and procedures contained in Section X-H.7.

<u>Documentation Required to Support an Application</u>: To support a MMTC-SP application, the applicant shall provide as part of the application to the SPGA the following documentation:

- 1. A copy of its registration as a MMTC from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health ("DPH");
- 2. A letter from the owner of the property on which the proposed MMTC is to be located indicating approval of the proposed use and submission of the application to the SPGA.
- 3. A detailed floor plan of the premises of the proposed MMTC that identifies the square footage available and describes the functional areas of the MMTC, including but not limited to areas for any preparation of Marijuana Infused Products:
- 4. Detailed site plans that include the following information:
 - a. Compliance with the requirements for parking and loading spaces, for lot size, frontage, yards and heights and coverage of buildings, and all other provisions of this Ordinance;
 - b. Convenience and safety of vehicular and pedestrian movement on the site and for the location of driveway openings in relation to street traffic;
 - c. Convenience and safety of vehicular and pedestrian movement off the site, if vehicular and pedestrian traffic off-site can reasonably be expected to be substantially affected by on-site changes;
 - d. Adequacy as to the arrangement and the number of parking and loading spaces in relation to the proposed use of the premises (and anticipated number of visitors), including designated parking for employees and home delivery vehicle(s), as applicable;
 - e. Design and appearance of proposed buildings, structures, freestanding signs, screening and landscaping; and
 - f. Adequacy of water and electrical supply, surface and subsurface drainage and site lighting.
- 5. A description of the security measures, including employee security policies, approved by DPH for the proposed MMTC:
- 6. A copy of the emergency procedures approved by DPH for the proposed MMTC;
- 7. A copy of the policies and procedures for patient or personal caregiver home-delivery approved by DPH for the proposed MMTC:
- 8. A copy of the policies and procedures for the transfer, acquisition, or sale of marijuana between MMTCs approved by DPH;
- 9. A copy of proposed waste disposal procedures for the proposed MMTC;
- 10. A description of any waivers from DPH regulations issued for the MMTC.
- 11. A detailed description of the applicants proposed measures to advertise services available at the proposed MMTC including but not limited to the use of websites, local media and signage.
- 12. A Traffic Impact Analysis (Traffic Study) for the proposed use and site consistent with the requirements of Section XV-E(b)(4) of this Ordinance; and
- 13. Documentation regarding the projected use of public and private utilities and infrastructure for operation of the proposed facility, including, but not limited to:
 - a. Water
 - b. Wastewater
 - c. Electricity

These materials shall be in addition to those submission materials required in section X-H(7) "Special Permits."

Traffic & Impact Studies: To aid the SPGA in its review, the owner shall pay all costs for the SPGA to engage a properly licensed traffic engineer, consulting engineer or other professionals experienced in the review of traffic studies and/or community impact reports, deemed necessary in the opinion of the SPGA to ensure that the proposed MMTC will not unduly burden the City's water and wastewater systems or result in undue traffic congestion or safety concerns in the immediate vicinity of the proposed facility and/or site. The portions of this section (and its regulations, if any) requiring the payment of consultant fees are promulgated under the concurrent authority of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53G.

Location: A MMTC may not be located within 1000 feet of the following:

- A. School, including a public or private elementary, vocational, or secondary school or a public or private college, junior college, or university;
- B. Child Care Facility;
- C. Library
- D. Playground
- E. Public Park
- F. Youth center
- G. Public swimming pool or
- H. Similar facility in which minors commonly congregate.

The distance under this section shall be measured in a straight line from the nearest point of the property line of the protected uses identified above to the nearest point of the property line of the proposed MMTC.

<u>Signage</u>: All signage shall conform to the requirements of the Newburyport Zoning Ordinance. The SPGA may impose additional restrictions on signage as appropriate to mitigate any aesthetic impacts.

<u>Departmental Review</u>: The SPGA shall refer copies of the application to the Building Department, Fire Department, Police Department, Board of Health, and the Department of Public Works. These boards/departments shall review the application and shall submit their written recommendations to the SPGA. Failure to make recommendations within 45 days of referral of the application shall be deemed lack of opposition.

E. Decision and Conditions of Approval

<u>Public Hearing and Decision</u>: After notice and public hearing (in accordance with Section X-H(7) and consideration of application materials, consultant reviews, public comments, and the recommendations of other City boards and departments, the SPGA may act upon such a permit.

<u>Required Findings</u>: The SPGA may approve a MMTC-SP application only if it makes written findings based upon evidence in the record that the applicant has satisfied the requirements of this section and section X-H(7)(A).

Special Permit Conditions: The SPGA shall impose conditions upon the issuance of a MMTC-SP reasonably appropriate to improve site design, traffic flow, public safety, protect water quality, air quality, and significant environmental resources, preserve the character of the surrounding area and otherwise serve the purpose of this section. In addition to any specific conditions applicable to the applicant's MMTC, the SPGA shall include the following conditions in any special permit granted under this Section:

- i. Hours of Operation
- ii. The permit holder shall file a copy of any Incident Report required under 105 CMR 725.110(F) with the Building Inspector, Director of Planning and Development, Director of Public Health, Police and Fire Departments and the SPGA within 24 hours of creation by the MMTC. Such reports may be redacted as necessary to comply with any applicable state or federal laws and regulations.
- iii. The permit holder shall file a copy of any cease and desist order, quarantine order, suspension order, order limiting sales, notice of a hearing, or final action issued by DPH or the Division of Administrative Law Appeals, as applicable, regarding the MMTC with the Building Inspector, Director of Planning and Development, Director of Public Health and SPGA within 48 hours of receipt by the MMTC.
- iv. The permit holder shall provide to the Building Inspector, Director of Planning and Development, Director of Public Health, Fire Chief and Police Marshal, the name, telephone number and electronic mail address of a contact person in the event that such person needs to be contacted after regular business hours to address an urgent issue. Such contact information shall be kept updated by the permit holder.
- v. The special permit authorizing the establishment of a MMTC shall be valid only for the specific registered entity to which the special permit was issued, and only for the site on which the MMTC has been authorized by special permit. If the registration for the MMTC has been revoked by the DPH or if the


MMTC registration is to be transferred to another controlling entity, or is to be relocated to a different site within the MMOD, a new special permit shall be required.


- vi. An MMTC shall be located only in a permanent building and not within any mobile facility. All sales shall be conducted either within the building or by home deliveries to qualified clients pursuant to applicable state and local regulations.
- vii. The special permit shall lapse upon the expiration or termination of the applicant's registration by DPH.
- viii. The permit holder shall notify the Building Inspector, Director of Planning and Development, Director of Public Health, Fire Chief and Police Marshal and the SPGA in writing within 48 hours of the cessation of operation of the MMTC or the expiration or termination of the permit holder's registration with DPH.
- ix. The permit holder shall at all times comply with regulations regarding MMTCs promulgated by the Board of Health.
- x. The Police Department, Fire Department, Building Inspector and Director of Public Health shall have the right to inspect the subject premises to assure compliance with the special permit.
- xi. Prohibition Against Nuisances: No use or operation shall be allowed at any MMTC which creates a nuisance to abutters or to the surrounding area, or which creates any hazard, including but not limited to, fire, explosion, fumes, gas, smoke, odors, obnoxious dust, vapors, offensive noise or vibration, flashes, glare, objectionable effluent or electrical interference, which may impair the normal use and peaceful enjoyment of any property, structure or dwelling in the area.

F. Severability

The provisions of this section are severable. If any of its provisions, sections, subsections, paragraphs, sentences, or clauses, or the application thereof to any person, entity, establishment, or circumstances shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, then the remainder of this section shall continue to be in full force and effect.


For reference please see the following section of the Home Rule Charter:

I am writing to ask for your permission to hold the 4th 5K run/walk (the actual name of the race will be determined later this month) in honor of Jackie Poor and Paula Holm in Newburyport, MA on Sunday September 28th, 2014 from 10:30 – 1pm. The event, was previously called the Jackie Poor Memorial Walk.
