I am writing on behalf of Global Companies LLC, as their managing agent, regarding the gas station Global owns at 76 Storey Avenue, Newburyport, MA. The underground storage tanks at that location are reaching their "end of life", prompting us to replace them in the near future. It would be very beneficial to us if during the replacement process we were able to expand the capacity of the underground storage tanks from 26,000 gallons to 32,000 gallons by replacing the current tanks with slightly larger tanks.



RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS AND DECISION FOR A USE VARIANCE

The application was filed at the City Clerk's Office on 6/2/2011 under the Zoning Ordinance Section X-H.3 Powers of the Board and Section V.D Table of Uses.

The application is for the premises at **76 Storey Avenue** in the **B1** Zoning District, as indicated in the Newburyport Assessor's Office as map and parcel **109-35** and recorded in the Essex South District Registry of Deeds as Book and Page **29752-587**. The newspaper notices for the public hearing were posted on **6/13/2011** and **6/20/2011** in the Newburyport Daily News.

A public hearing was held for the above application on 6/28/2011 at 7:15 p.m. at which time the Board heard the petition for a Use Variance. After the close of the hearing on 6/28/2011, upon motion made by Member Charles Ciovacco and duly seconded by Member Duncan LaBay, the Board voted to APPROVE the petition for the Use Variance.

Having received the necessary two-thirds super majority vote or all the members of the ZBA, in accordance with M.G.L. c.40A, Section 10, as adopted, the petition for the Use Variance was therefore APPROVED.

This decision was filed with the Newburyport City Clerk on 6/30/2011 and sent registered mail to the applicant and by regular mail to the Parties in Interest and the abutting Municipalities.

FINDINGS

After the public hearing, in accordance with the criteria set forth in the City of Newburyport Zoning Ordinance Section X-H-6 Variances, the Newburyport Zoning Board of Appeals made the following findings:

- 1. Conditions and circumstances are related to the soil conditions, shape, topography of such land or structures especially affecting the property for which the Dimensional Variance is sought, and generally do not affect the Zoning District in which the property is located. The shape of this lot and the layout of the structure upon the lot create a unique set of problems.
- 2. There is a substantial hardship, financial or otherwise, which results from the literal enforcement of the applicable zoning restrictions with respect to the land or building for which the variance is sought. Adjacent and facing lots are non-conforming as to either one or more of setback, lot size and use.
- 3. Refief sought will be desirable and without substantial detriment to the public good. This additional use provides benefits to the owner and public through the provision of a new service without significant detriment.
- 4. Conditions and circumstances are unique to applicant's lot, structure, or building and do not apply to the neighboring lands, structures, or buildings in the same district. The shape of this lot and placement and design of the structure create a unique problem.
- 5. Strict application of the Ordinance would deprive the applicant of reasonable use of the lot, structure, or building in a manner equivalent to the use permitted to be made by other owners of their neighboring lands, structure, or structures in the same district. This additional use provides benefits to the owner and public through the provision of a new service without significant impact.
- Relief sought may be given without nullifying or substantially derogating from the intent or purpose of the Ordinance.,
- 7. The unique conditions and circumstances are not the result of the actions of the applicant taken subsequent to the adoption of the Ordinance. The building predates the Ordinance by approximately 150 years.
- 8. Relief will not constitute a grant of special privilege inconsistent with the limitations upon other properties in the District. This relief is not inconsistent with that provided to other properties in the area.

CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

The following conditions do not limit any other rights and remedies the City of Newburyport may have.

1. As a condition of the Variance, the petitioner shall record a certified copy of this Use Variance in the Essex South District Registry of Deeds and notify the Zoning Board of Appeals of such recording.

- 2. No Variance, or any extension, modification, or renewal thereof, can take effect until a copy of the decision bearing the certification of the City Clerk of Newburyport is recorded in the Essex County South Registry of Deeds under the name of the owner of record or is recorded and noted on the owner's certification of title. The fee for recording or registering shall be paid by the owner or applicant.
- 3. The decision will lapse if the Variance is not exercised within one year.
- 4. As a condition of approval, the construction and/or use of these premises shall conform to the plans, information, conditions, and any revisions as approved by the Zoning Board of Appeals. All approved plans and or documents shall bear the signature of a Zoning Board member and the stamp of the City Clerk indicating the date of filing of the plans with the decision.
- 5. In accordance with the approval of this Use Variance, the applicant shall not exercise any rights under this decision until the applicant supplies any additional required plans and information, as signed by a Zoning Board Member and recorded with the City Clerk and the Essex county South Registry of Deeds.



Please find below a draft of an ordinance entitled "Ordinance for the Friends of the Highland Cemetery Commission" for review and discussion.

Ordinance for the Friends of the Highland Cemetery Commission

Establishment.

There is hereby established a Friends of the Highland Cemetery Commission for the purpose of assisting in preserving and enhancing the Highland Cemetery; in a shared stewardship with the public and municipal departments.

Board of Commissioners; term of office.

The Mayor shall appoint five (5) members to constitute the Board of Commissioners of Friends of the Highland Cemetery. Members must be residents and registered voters of the City and shall serve without pay. Each commissioner of said Commission shall be appointed for a term of not in excess of three (3) years and the appointments shall be made so that the terms of not more than two commissioners shall expire in a single year. The appointments shall be made on or before the first Monday of February. All members shall hold office until their respective successors are appointed. Additionally, the Mayor may from time to time appoint an ex-officio member.

Promulgation of Rules.

The Board of Commissioners of the Friends of the Highland Cemetery are hereby authorized to promulgate reasonable rules for the use by the public of Highland Cemetery. Such rules may include, but are not limited to, hours of use, conduct of visitors, and manners of use of certain areas. The Friends of the Highland Cemetery shall consult with the Mayor and City Council prior to such promulgation.

Financial Matters.


All money received for the account of the Friends of the Highland Cemetery Commission shall be deposited with the City Treasurer/Collector, in trust, subject to withdrawal by the majority of the Board of Commissioners only for expenditures on the Highland Cemetery; and the accounts of the Friends of the Highland Cemetery Commission shall be kept by the City Treasurer/Collector in such form and manner as the Commissioners may direct.

Annual Report of Commission.


Project Summary

The 1835 Custom House holds a prominent place in the City: physically, the building anchors Market Square and historically, it serves as a reminder of our maritime past. The building is also subject to a historic preservation restriction, held by the Newburyport Historical Commission.

The recommended reallocation of funding will more directly support historic preservation of the Custom House, including:

- Slate roof restoration and flashing repair.
- Masonry re-pointing and flashing at the four observatory chimneys;
- Observatory quardrail restoration:
- Building security assessment:
- Existing HVAC system repairs; and
- Basement window restoration for operability, moisture mitigation and ventilation improvements.

These "brick and mortar" type projects are in contrast to the previously approved grant to complete a feasibility study. The Maritime Museum hoped to better understand through the study the tradeoffs associated with making HVAC and ADA improvements with and without adding additional space to the building for programming or a potential new Visitor's Center, but found itself unable to undertake the project at the present time given recent tumover on both the staff and Building Committee and these more pressing restoration needs.
