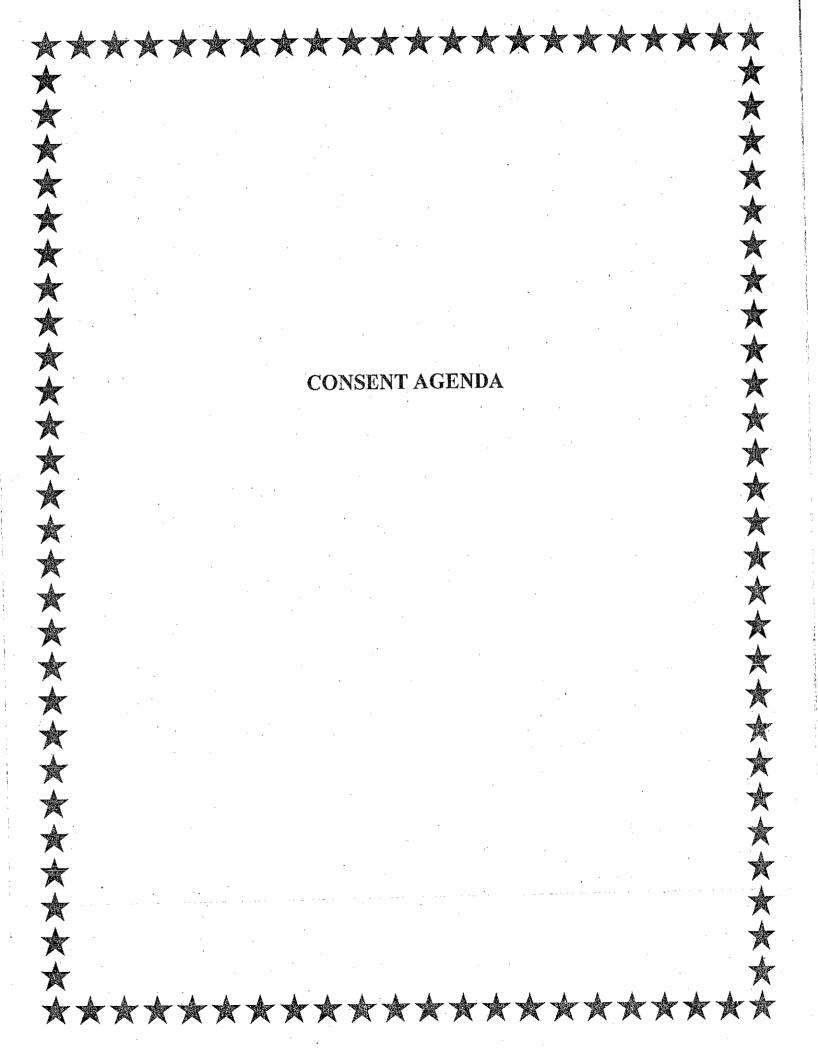

Administrative Assistant Negotiations – Tentative Agreement

The following is a summary of the agreement that has been reached in principle for FY14-FY16 with the Teamsters Administrative Assistant bargaining unit, Local 170. The City has agreed to the terms contained herein subject to appropriation by the City Council. The Local 170 voted to ratify the terms of this agreement on August 13, 2013.

Here is a synopsis of the terms agreed to through this collective bargaining process:

- 1.0% COLA effective July 1, 2014 1.5% COLA effective July 1, 2015 1.5% COLA effective July 1, 2016
- Vacation: 5 days less vacation time for all new employees
- Sick leave buyback: Eliminated for new employees; 5 days less buyback for senior employees; deadline for notification of retirement as it relates to buyback disbursement
- Sick leave: Strengthened language to address sick leave abuse
- Progressive discipline: Institute policy consistent with other City union contracts
- Additional issues: Language changes were made to clarify policies regarding vacation accrual, position upgrade evaluation processes, and health insurance benefits. To the extent that they are applicable, these changes are being instituted to ensure consistency across union contracts in the interest of uniformity and improved labor relations.

The 1.0% Cost of Living Adjustment for FY14 that has been agreed to in this contract has been accounted for in the FY14 Annual Budget under the Mayor's Office Budget Contingency, so no additional funds are needed for the balance of FY14.

Below are the terms in greater detail:

#### **BOTH PARTIES TENTATIVELY AGREE TO:**

- ARTICLE I Recognition and the Bargaining Unit (Page 1): Change to
  Administrative Assistant II Assessor, Administrative Assistant II City Clerk,
  Administrative Office Manager Health, Planner, and Facilities Maintenance
  Supervisor, with all other titles remaining as is.
- 2. ARTICLE VII Non-Reappointment and Discipline (Pages 7-8): Divide Article VII into Section A: Non-Reappointment and Section B: Discipline, including existing paragraph 1 in Section A and existing paragraph 2 into Section B.
- 3. ARTICLE VII Non-Reappointment and Discipline (Pages 7-8): Add the following to the new Section B:

"All employees shall be given a six (6) month probationary period. After completion of the probationary period, no employee shall be disciplined or discharged except for just cause. The Union shall be notified of all disciplinary actions, including discharge, within 24 hours.

In administrating the requirement of just cause, the Mayor or his/her designee shall observe the following procedures for warnings, suspensions, and discharges;

Step 1: An employee shall be given a verbal warning. The verbal warning, which has been reduced in writing, shall be removed from the employee's file six months after it is given if there are no infractions of any kind in that period.

Step 2: A written warning shall be given to the employee with a general description of the reason for the discipline. The warning will remain in effect for one year and shall be removed from the employee's personnel record on the one year anniversary date of the infraction if there are no infractions of any kind during that period.

Step 3: The employee shall be suspended for three days without pay. All suspensions shall remain in the employee's file. Suspensions issued more than five (5) years before a disciplinary action shall be given less weight in determining the degree of discipline.

Step 4: The employee shall be discharged and given the reason for said discharge in writing.

The City shall have the right to bypass any of the first three steps for serious misconduct or serious violations of work rules or safety practices.

For the purposes of this progressive discipline policy, the City shall refer to the Standards of Conduct as found in the Employee Handbook when determining when "serious misconduct" and/or "serious violations of work rules or safety practices" have occurred.

The City shall have the right to counsel employees who have had repetitive disciplinary problems regardless of whether or not the disciplinary notice for each such occasion remains on file."

- 4. ARTICLE VIII Compensation (Page 9): Add new paragraph as follows: "Employees seeking an adjustment to the grade at which their position is listed must provide written notification to their Department Head and Union Office of such intent by December 1. The Department Head will undertake an evaluation process of the changes/additions to the essential job functions/duties as outlined in the existing job description for the position. The Department Head will then submit the completed position evaluation form to the Human Resources Department and Mayor's Office by December 31 for their review and approval. All grade adjustments will be made effective on July 1 of the following fiscal year, pending appropriation through the annual budget process."
- 5. ARTICLE IX Hours of Work (Page 9): Add Section 1(c): "The Facilities Maintenance Supervisor's work week shall be forty (40) hours."
- 6. ARTICLE XI Health and Welfare Insurance Benefits (Page 10): Delete the first paragraph and replace with the following:

  "The current health insurance benefits are in accordance with the agreement negotiated by the City and the Public Employee Committee (PEC Agreement) pursuant to MGL Ch. 32B Section 19. The parties agree that any changes in the Health Insurance benefits for bargaining unit member shall be negotiated under MGL Ch. 32B."
- 7. ARTICLE XII Leaves (Page 13): Delete the first sentence after vacation schedule and the last sentence in the last paragraph of this section and replace with the following:

  "Vacation time will be prorated from the anniversary date of hire to the end of

"Vacation time will be prorated from the anniversary date of nire to the end of the fiscal year (June 30) for all anniversary years, whether it is the 1, 5, 10, or 15 year anniversary dates. Vacation time for the entire year is allocated on July 1 of that fiscal year."

- 8. ARTICLE XII Leaves (Page 14): Amend Section D4 under Sick Leave from "five (5)" to "three (3)" consecutive sick days after which a supervisor may request appropriate documentation from a physician.
- 9. APPENDICES (Pages 24-37): Keep Appendix A; Strike existing Appendix B and replace with new Position Upgrade Evaluation Form; Keep Appendix C Compensation Schedule (updated), but revise Wages table to include position title and respective grade (eliminating the other existing information); Strike existing Appendix D and replace with Job Descriptions reference currently in Appendix C; Keep Appendix E (updated); Keep Appendix F, adding Facilities Maintenance Supervisor to #4 (\$600 annual clothing allowance); Keep Appendix G.
- 10. ARTICLE XI Health and Welfare Insurance Benefits (Page 10): Eliminate Section A, striking out all references to different percentages paid by the City to cover part-time employee health insurance premiums.
- 11. ARTICLE XI Health and Welfare Insurance Benefits (Page 11): Delete Section D in its entirety.
- 12. ARTICLE XII Leaves (Pages 12-13): Amend Section 4 to the following: "Any new employee hired after July 1, 2013 with at least one (1) year continuous service shall be entitled to paid vacation during each fiscal year of employment in accordance with the following schedule:

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for one (1) year shall receive two (2) weeks vacation (10 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for five (5) years shall receive three (3) weeks vacation (15 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for ten (10) years shall receive four (4) weeks vacation (20 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for fifteen (15) years shall receive five (5) weeks vacation (25 days pay).

Any current employee as of July 1, 2013 shall be entitled to paid vacation during each fiscal year of employment in accordance with the following schedule:

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for one (1) year shall receive three (3) weeks vacation (15 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for five (5) years shall receive four (4) weeks vacation (20 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for ten (10) years shall receive five (5) weeks vacation (25 days pay).

All employees who have worked for the EMPLOYER for fifteen (15) years shall receive five (6) weeks vacation (30 days pay)."

- 13. ARTICLE XII Leaves (Page 14): Delete the first paragraph of Section D(1) under Sick Leave and replace with the following: "All permanent full-time employees will accrue one (1) sick day per month with a maximum accumulation of two hundred fifty (250) days."
- 14. ARTICLE XII Leaves (Page 14): Delete the second paragraph of Section D(2) under Sick Leave and replace with the following:

  "Any employee hired after July 1, 2013 shall not be eligible for sick leave buyback. Any current employee as of July 1, 2013 shall be eligible to receive payment for 50% buyback of unused accrued sick days, not to exceed seventy-five (75) days maximum, at his/her then current rate of pay upon retirement or death. Any member of the collective bargaining unit who was eligible for retirement as of June 30, 2013 shall be eligible to receive payment for 50% buyback of unused accrued sick days, not to exceed eighty-five (85) days maximum, at his/her then current rate of pay upon retirement or death.

Further, an employee who is eligible for sick leave buyback and wishes to retire in the next fiscal year shall provide written notice to the Mayor and Department Head by December 1 of the fiscal year prior to the fiscal year that he/she intends to retire, and shall specify a tentative date. An employee who gives the required notice in a timely fashion shall receive the sick leave buyback on or about the date of retirement. If the employee fails to give requisite notice by December 1, the City will have no obligation to make the buyback payment until the first full payroll period of the fiscal year for which the City has had the requisite notice and opportunity to budget for the necessary funds."

15. ARTICLE XVI - Wages (Pages 18):

FY14 - 1.0%

FY15 - 1.5%

FY16 - 1.5%

All cost of living wage increases go into effect on July 1 of the respective fiscal years referenced above.

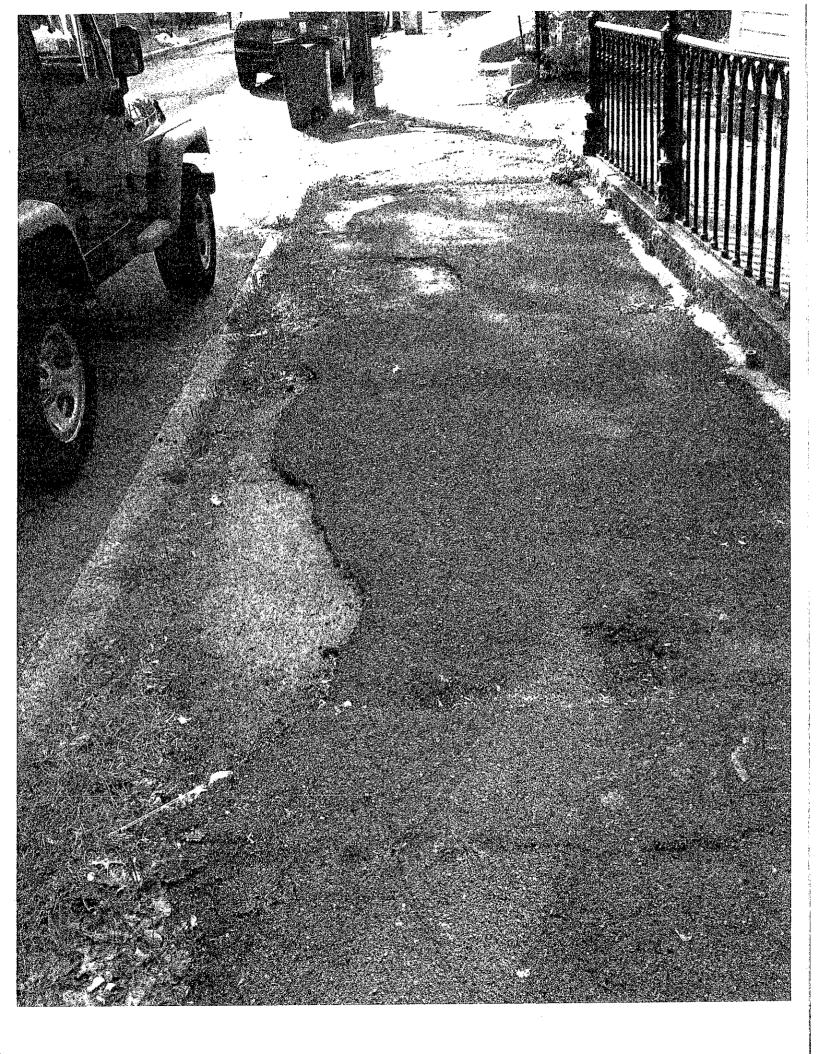

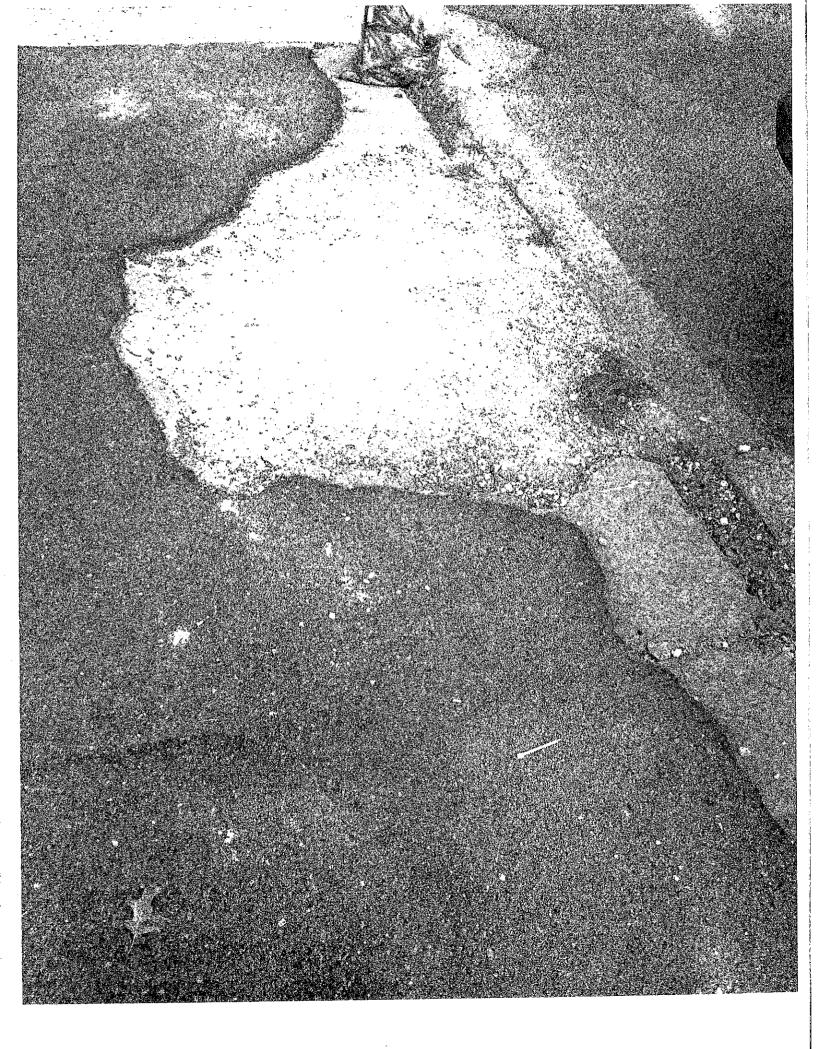

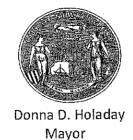

At the August 27<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Community Preservation Committee ('CPC'), Walt Thompson, Chair of the Bartlet Mall Commission, requested a modification to the Mall's proposed project, which is currently before you for a final vote on the CPC-recommended appropriation of \$12,000.

Mr. Thompson requested that the Project (No. 8 on your proposed Order) application be modified so that any appropriation may be applied to the project costs associated with the removal of algae from Frog Pond. He explained that the Commission has learned that the health of the Pond is at immediate risk due to high levels of bacteria and algal growth. Community events have had to be cancelled due to the poor quality of the water and the potential health risks associated with accidental ingestion of the water.

Mr. Thompson's request is prompted by the recently received private donation designated to cover the costs of the project as outlined in the original CPA grant application, which included purchase and installation of pond aerators, refurbishment of several benches and the addition of plantings around the George Washington statue.

The CPC unanimously voted to approve Mr. Thompson's request for modification. The Committee believes that improving the health of the Pond is an integral part of preserving the historical and recreational integrity of the Bartlet Mall.

The CPC respectfully requests that the attached revised description of Project No. 8 be substituted for the description for this project originally submitted to Council.

I will be in attendance at the Council's September 9<sup>th</sup> meeting if there are any questions about this modification.

## PROJECT NO. 8 FROG POND RESTORATION AT THE BARTLET MALL

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$12,000 to the Bartlet Mall Commission to be applied toward the cost of the Frog Pond Algae and Nutrient Removal project with the condition that prior to distribution of any funds the applicant secures full funding for this effort.

The CPA category for this project is Historic Resource and Recreation.

#### **Project Summary**

The Bartlet Mall is visited by thousands of people year-round. The Frog Pond, at the center of the park, is an ancient kettle hole left behind by the glaciers. Unfortunately, though named "Frog Pond" there are no frogs living in it due, in part, to high level of algae. The CPA funding will contribute to the total project costs associated with ridding the pond of the algae, which will improve the health of the pond for both the wildlife and for the community.

The health of the Pond is at immediate risk due to high levels of bacteria and algal growth. Community events have had to be cancelled due to the poor quality of the water and the potential health risks associated with accidental ingestion of the water. Improving the health of the Pond is an integral part of preserving the historical and recreational integrity of the Bartlet Mall.

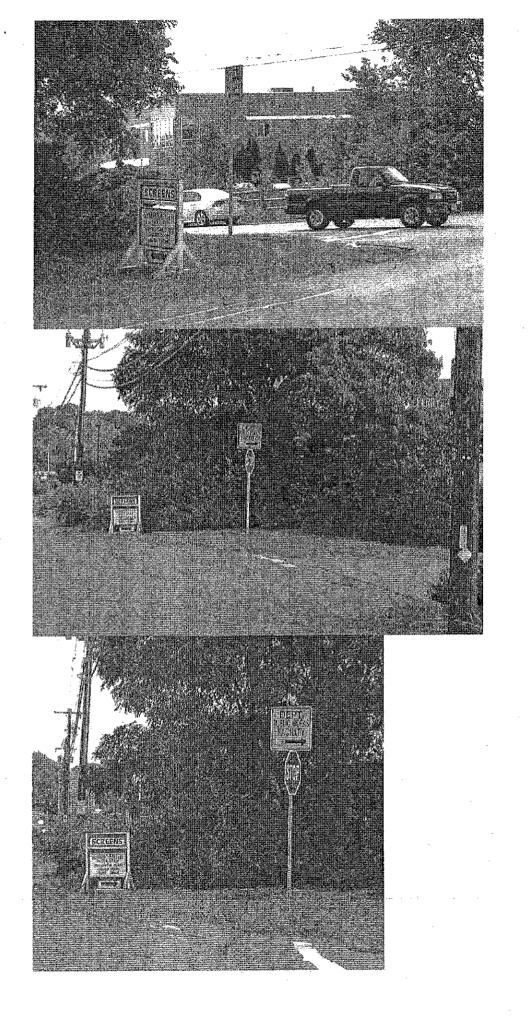

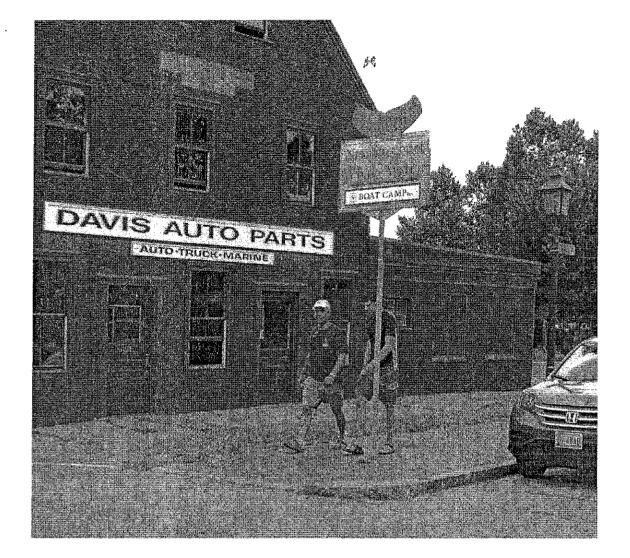


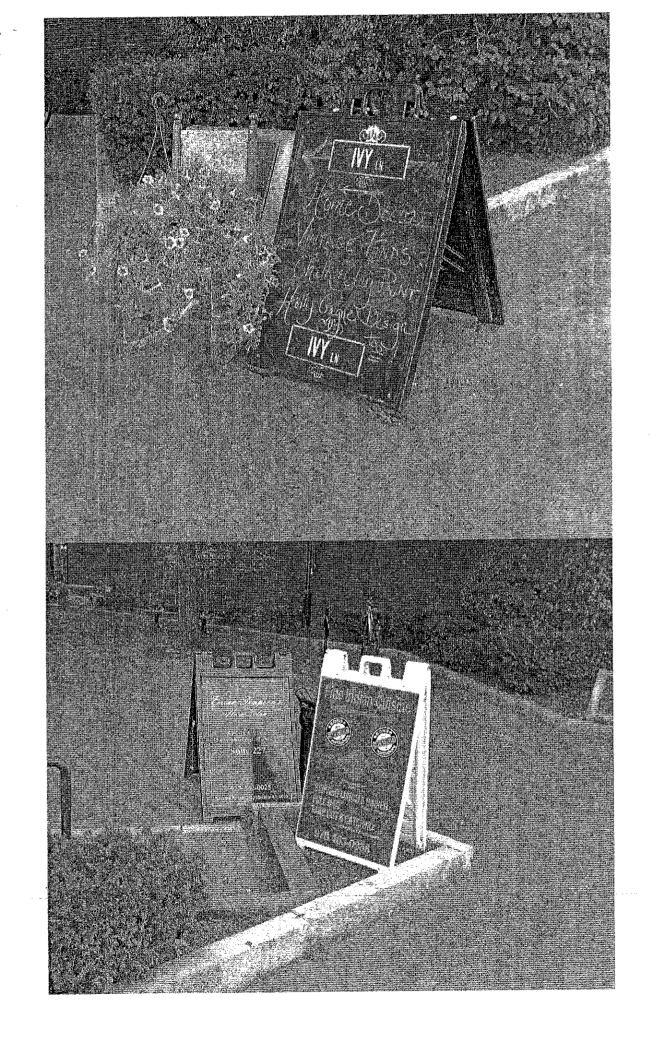

I'm requesting the follow individuals be appointed special police officers. Each of these individuals has been or is currently employed in some capacity with the Newburyport Police Department. As I stated at the department head meeting the demand for traffic details in Newburyport has increased significantly with construction projects throughout the City. This situation continues to strain our workforce with the start of a five year Whittier Bridge replacement project. This project alone will be requiring large numbers of officers daily.

Our staffing level with both reserve and special officers has diminished to five officers. This situation has been caused by delays in the Civil Service entrance exams, and the loss of special officers due to age restrictions and required annual training and firearm qualifications. An example of the situation was felt Sunday when traffic details for the Yankee Homecoming parade were unable to be filled causing a dangerous situation.

In an effort to meet our demand for traffic officers and to meet the state training requirements, I have reached out to retired officers and those retiring to hire trained and qualified officers for detail work. The following individuals have shown an interest in working as traffic detail officers for the police department

Craig Goodrich, DOB 8-11-1971 of 3 Del-Logan Drive Salisbury, Mass, is a fulltime dispatcher with the police department. Dispatchers are routinely the only personnel in the station during a shift. Dispatchers are responsible for the communications section, 911 center, handling walk-in traffic & complaints, and for monitoring persons held in custody. Having only dispatch personnel assigned to the station during a shift, places them with the responsibility of the station and those held in custody. Additionally, we want to utilize him on traffic details as well.

The second person is Sergeant Allen Maguire, DOB September 15, 1960, of 15 Lincoln Ave Salisbury, Mass. Sergeant Maguire has just notified the department of his intention to retire on September 28, 2013. He is willing to continue to be called upon to assist the department with traffic detail work. Again this officer has worked with the department for many years with no disciplinary record.

It is my recommendation that these persons are appointed as special police officers for traffic duty. As a department I prefer to utilize Newburyport police officers on traffic details where I have clear control and expectations of them. When we are forced because of limited officers to hire detail officers from outside agencies we do not have the same control over who we get.

I ask for your support to move this process forward so we can begin to update their training and make them available for traffic work. Thank you for your consideration and assistance with this matter. If you have any questions, please contract my office.

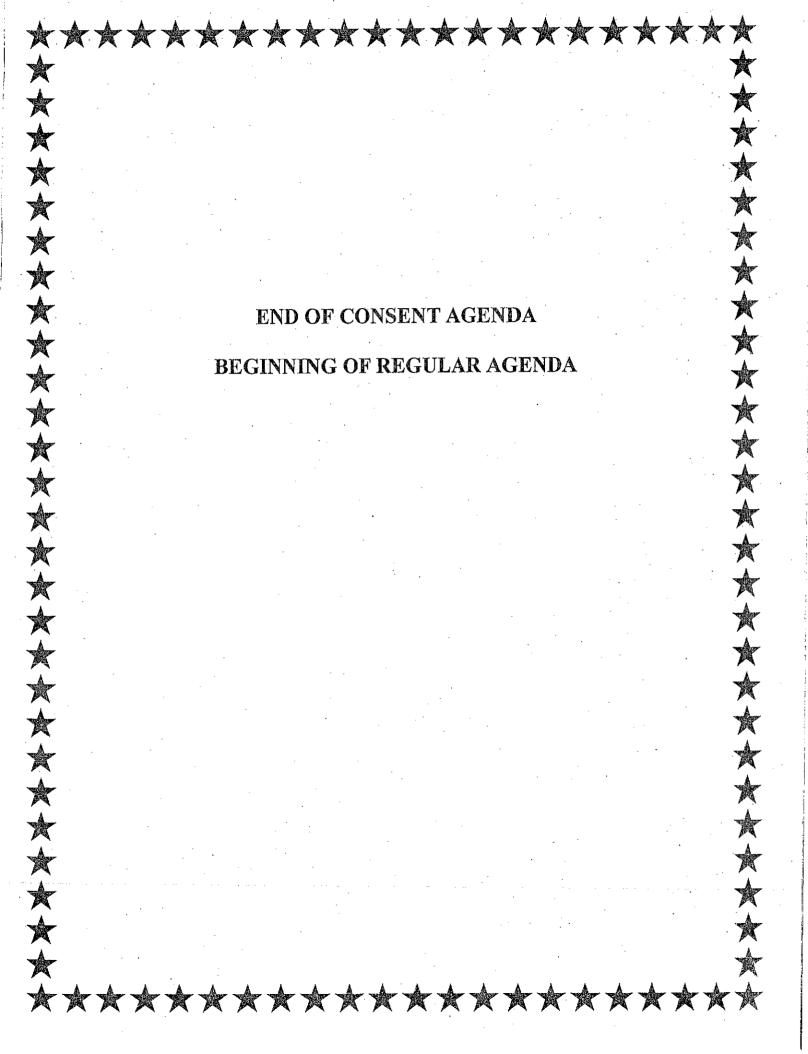

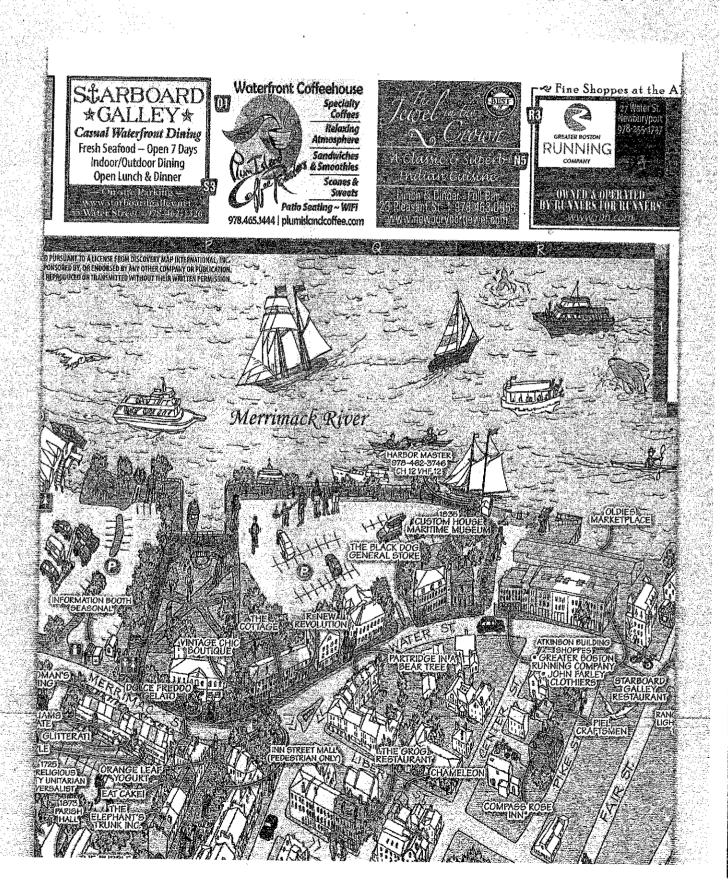

Dear President O'Brien and City Councilors:

This letter is to inform you of my veto of the Order of August 12, 2013 regarding the use of the name. "City of Newburyport" with respect to the approval of plans, events, or organizations without the endorsement of the City Council by majority vote.

The reasons for my veto are as follows. First, is the over breadth of this order. As written, it would appear to prevent the Mayor or Planning Department of the City from expressing a position regarding a plan or program submitted to those offices for consideration. As such, this order may intrude into the executive authority of the mayor and the administration of the City.

I bring to your attention the provisions of M.G.L. c. 268 s.35, which states as follows:

"Whoever, without being duly authorized thereto, prints, stamps, engraves or affixes, or causes to be printed, stamped, engraved or affixed to any paper or other article a representation of the seal of a town in the commonwealth, with intent to give to such paper or article an official character which it does not possess, or, without being duly authorized thereto, and with intent to assume an official character which he does not possess, casts, stamps, engraves, makes or has in his possession a badge or thing in the likeness of an official badge of a police officer, member of a fire department, or other officer appointed by a town in the commonwealth, or by any department of such town, shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars."

This statute prohibits the unauthorized use of the City seal or any other official representation of the City without authorization. This order is, therefore, unnecessary.

Secondly, there is the issue of enforcement. The name of the City itself is a matter of public domain. With respect to the order as issued by the Council, enforcement of the prohibition would be very difficult unless a usage is found to violate the provisions of the statute above. There may also be usage consistent with common usage of the City name or may be an action of the administration in the ordinary course of business. An effort by a group or individual to misuse the name of the City with respect to the promotion of an activity or event, with the suggestion that such activity or event is sponsored or endorsed by the City, may be subject to action as indicated by M.G.L. In consultation with Kopelman and Paige, our City Solicitor shares my concern that the order as written is vague, overbroad, and unenforceable, and may impact appropriate uses of the City name.

The purpose of this communication is to request that the Council adopt the recently completed Newburyport Affordable Housing Plan (Housing Production Plan).

As you know the Office of Planning & Development is responsible for conducting long-range planning studies and preparing comprehensive plans to address city-wide issues in compliance with state standards. During the past year, we worked with the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust and housing consultants Karen Sunnarborg and Abacus Architects and Planners to create a comprehensive "Housing Production Plan" as required by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD).

A lengthy process was undertaken to analyze housing trends and affordable housing needs in Newburyport, as well as to identify goals and objectives for the creation and preservation of affordable housing in the future. This process involved much public participation, and a number of meetings with the general public, city officials and key stakeholders. Much of the content and structure of our final Housing Production Plan is mandated by state regulations administered by DHCD.

Attached for your reference is a copy of the executive summary and key excerpts from the Housing Production Plan. In general, the plan recommends that the City of Newburyport undertake the following initiatives during the next five to ten years:

# Capacity Building Strategies:

- 1. Ensure sufficient Professional Support for housing programs and initiatives
- 2. Conduct ongoing Community Education regarding the importance of affordable housing
- 3. Increase funding for the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust programs

# Zoning Strategies:

- 1. Modify the in-law apartment ordinance
- 2. Pursue a 40R smart growth zoning district
- 3. Modify Section VI-C of the Newburyport Zoning Ordinance
- 4. Allow two-family structures in all residential zoning districts
- 5. Insure inclusion of affordable units in waterfront development
- 6. Promote mixed-use development in more locations including affordable housing
- 7. Adopt inclusionary zoning requirements

# Housing Development Strategies:

- 1. Continue to partner with private Developers
- 2. Continue to make suitable public land available for affordable housing

While we may not complete each initiative recommended in the plan, adoption of the plan signifies that the City is taking a proactive effort to address affordable housing needs. Formal adoption of the final Housing Production Plan is required by DHCD, so that the City of Newburyport can take credit for planning activities associated with affordable housing. This, in turn, gives the City broader authority to approve or deny so-called "40B" proposals, wherein a developer who creates some affordable housing units can override local zoning requirements. As the City has less than 10% of year-round housing units classified by the state as "affordable" we are required to create and adopt a Housing Production Plan and to make yearly progress toward the creation of more affordable housing. Most importantly, the Housing Production Plan serves as a guidance document for these efforts during the coming years.

With your adoption of the final plan we will be better prepared to create and preserve affordable housing units within the City of Newburyport. Subsequent approval of the plan by DHCD (for which Council adoption is a prerequisite) will also give us an additional tool in the defense against unwanted 40B proposals from private developers. Attached for your convenience is a draft Council Order for the intended purpose.

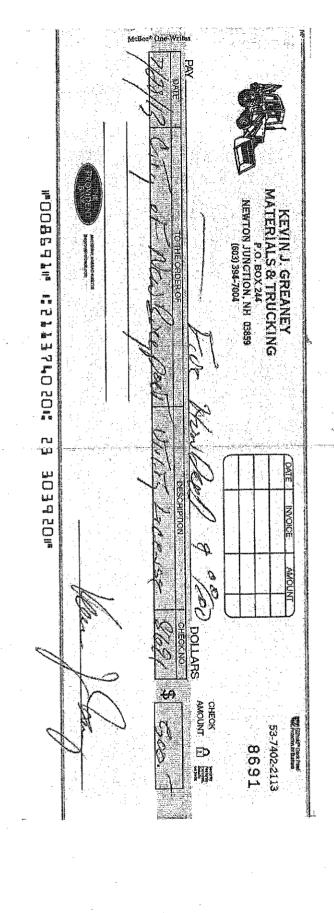

# NEWBURYPORT COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FY14 APPROPRIATIONS AND RESERVATIONS

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee recommends that the City Council appropriate or reserve \$928,507 from Community Preservation Fund Revenues for the projects, in the amounts, in the categories, and subject to the conditions hereinafter described.

The following CONDITIONS are common to all recommended projects:

- A. Each recipient of funds is required to submit to the CPC a written report on the status of the project by each October 15, January 15, April 15 and July 15 following appropriation and until final completion of the project.
- B. If a project is not completed within twelve (12) months of appropriation, the grantee must submit a written request to the CPC for an extension of the grant. Otherwise, funds may be subject to recision and returned to Community Preservation Fund Reserves (applicable to appropriations, not to reservations).
- C. Full funding is conditioned upon the receipt of state matching funds, estimated to be 26.83% of local revenue, expected in October 2013.

- One page summary spreadsheet of CPC recommendations.
- 2. Recommendations for appropriation or reservation numbers 1-16, with project summaries for each.
- 3. Criteria for project evaluation adopted and published by the CPC.

Estimated Community Preservation Fund Revenues available for appropriation or reservation in FY 2014 total approximately \$955,911. This figure includes estimated receipts of the local CPA surcharge during fiscal year 2014, accumulated interest, the anticipated 26.83% state matching funds to be received in October 2013, current uncommitted funds and returned funds from completed and closed-out projects.

Applications for all projects are available for review in the Office of Planning and Development.

#### PROJECT NO. 1 CLIPPER CITY RAIL TRAIL AND HARBORWALK, PHASE II

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$100,000 to the City of Newburyport's Office of Planning and Community Development to complete the preliminary design phase and enter into the construction engineering phase of Phase II of the project, which encompasses the area from the eastern edge of the waterfront to Parker Street in Newbury.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation and Open Space.

The City of Newburyport has been working on the Clipper City Rail Trail for well over a decade, but conversion of the old Eastern Line railroad corridor into a multiuse, recreation trail was finally completed 2010. This first phase of the Rail Trail Project now allows people to walk, run and bike between the commuter rail station and the Merrimack River.

Phase II of the Rail Trail will extend 1 ½ miles between the eastern edge of Newburyport's central waterfront and Parker Street in Newbury, travelling along the shoreline of the Merrimack River, through the South End residential neighborhood, and through a woodland. The trail will primarily run along the corridor of the old City Branch Rail Line. This funding will support the completion of the design phase, which involves permitting, consultation with abutters and the public, negotiation with National Grid, design, specifications and cost estimates and develop a "shovel-ready" project.

#### PROJECT NO. 2 NEWBURYPORT HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$75,000 to the City of Newburyport to support the Newburyport Housing Rehabilitation Program, managed by the Community Development Department. This appropriation is made with a condition that any rebates or refunds received back from the Housing Rehabilitation Program grantees resulting from the application of existing CDBG policies, shall be returned to the Community Preservation Affordable Housing Reserve Fund.

The CPA category for this project is Community Housing and Historic Preservation.

**Project Summary** 

The Newburyport Housing Rehabilitation Program addresses housing needs of low and moderate income households within the city. The Program provides technical and financial assistance to bring properties up to current state and federal codes. Community Development staff assist homeowners through the entire rehabilitation process, including: income qualifying the applicant according to HUD guidelines; preparing cost estimates to bring properties up to code; securing approval as necessary from the Newburyport Historical Commission; managing the bid process; providing contract review; and supervising construction.

Allocation of CPA funds to the Housing Rehabilitation Program allows local residents to safely and securely stay in their homes. Simultaneously, the program helps the city retain its historic character through rehabilitation of older homes. The recommended appropriation will minimally yield seven to eight rehab projects. Each individual housing rehabilitation project is secured through a 15-year lien on the property.

#### PROJECT NO. 3 NEWBURYPORT AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$75,000 to the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust (the "Trust") to preserve, create, and support affordable housing opportunities throughout the City.

The CPA category for this project is Community Housing.

The recommended funding will support CPA-eligible activities of the Trust. The Trust has undertaken two major initiatives with its past Community Preservation grants. First, the Trust designed and implemented the Down Payment Assistance and MLS Input Only Listing Services Programs in a targeted effort to retain the city's existing affordable housing inventory. Second, the Trust completed a comprehensive planning exercise to study the city's housing needs and develop policies, projects, initiatives and regulatory changes that were incorporated into the City's Housing Production Plan (the "Plan"), that, once accepted by the City, will help guide housing efforts over the next five years.

This funding will support the Trust's efforts in beginning to implement the strategies and goal identified in the Plan as well as create a subsidy program for private developers who want to incorporate an affordable unit(s), but are restricted due to the high costs associated with developing housing. This new program will enable the Trust to provide a forgivable loan in an amount that is meaningful to the project, likely to be in the \$50,000 range, to a developer in return for a deed restricted, affordable unit within his/her project that can be listed on the State's Subsidized Housing Inventory and officially counted towards Newburyport's affordable housing stock.

#### PROJECT NO. 4 JOPPA PARK RENOVATION, PHASE II

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$20,000 to the City of Newburyport to support the Newburyport Parks Commission continued work on the ongoing Joppa Park renovation. This phase will focus on critically needed improvements to infrastructure bordering the seawall, including the walkway and amenities at the walkway's edge.

The primary CPA category for this project is Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

Phase I of the Joppa Park Renovation Project, completed in Spring 2012, included the installation of a granite bollard and chain fence accompanied by a rose hedge along Water Street with four cobblestone pedestrian entry points leading from the Water Street sidewalk to the park. Phase II will involve the replacement of the badly damaged and unsafe asphalt walkway along the sea wall with sand colored concrete. The walkway, which is prone to sinkholes as a result of tidal activity that draws out subsurface måterial, will be fortified beneath its subsurface to remove the threat of future sinkholes. Additionally, Phase Il will include the replacement of the lawn with low-maintenance turf-grass, the addition of new plantings, the reconfiguration of the parking area so that it is more visually-pleasing and safer for pedestrians, the installation of two, new water fountains, and the replacement of the old, warped benches with new, handicap-accessible ones. High quality interpretive panels that bring to life the history of Joppa are in the design phase and are expected to be installed in summer 2013.

### PROJECT NO. 5 CHERRY HILL SOCCER FIELD

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$50,000 to Newburyport Youth Soccer Association (NYSA) to redesign and improve "Parcel B" at the Cherry Hill Soccer Park. The re-design will address the parking issues and transform the open space area into another high quality soccer field to accommodate future growth of the NYSA. While its use will be primarily focused on youth soccer, the field will continue to be available for other activities including Special Olympics and High School soccer.

The CPA category for this project is Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

Due to the significant growth of its league, NYSA has been using an open space area (Parcel 'B') adjacent to the existing soccer field (Parcel 'C') at Cherry Hill NYSA Soccer Park as a practice field. Currently, Parcel 'B' is being used as both a parking lot and a practice field; its surface is uneven and marred with tire tracks. The turf is a combination of crabgrass, grass and weeds where a player could easily be injured. The area is not suitable for use as a practice field, nor as a parking lot.

The NYSA and the Newburyport Parks Commission have initiated a private/public collaboration to re-design Cherry Hill NYSA Park. Along with other fundraising efforts, CPA funding will support the design, construction, management and oversight during construction and maintenance following construction. Field use will not be exclusive to NYSA, but the organization will have first priority given their substantial commitment. The two groups envision a proposed license agreement similar in terms and conditions to the current license agreement between the City of Newburyport and NYSA for the current field at Cherry Hill NYSA Park on Daniel Lucy Way.

### PROJECT NO. 6 ATWOOD PARK IMPROVEMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$20,000 to the Newburyport Parks Commission on behalf of the Friends of Atwood Park to be used for the repair or replacement of damaged areas and to provide additional forms of recreation at Atwood Park, located in Newburyport's South End between Atwood and School Streets. The park is under the care and custody of the Newburyport Parks Commission.

The CPA category for this project is Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

Atwood Park is the only open space available to the residents of this South End neighborhood. This project's mission is to improve the poor conditions of the park and provide the locals with a more enjoyable place for recreation.

The recommended grant would offset costs to complete the following projects:

- · Repave the former tennis court and paint the surface with games and activities,
- Replace the chain link fence,
- Repair the damaged brick retaining wall, and
- Improve and add other park amenities such as backgammon/chess tables, a concrete table tennis table, add trees and replace the fence along the School Street side and recondition the turf and improve soil conditions.

#### PROJECT NO. 7 KELLEHER PARK PLAYGROUND

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$6,000 to the Central Congregational Church for the purchase, installation and donation of playground equipment, benches and picnic tables at Kelleher Park.

The CPA category for this project is Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

Kelleher Park is a property owned by the Newburyport Housing Authority. It provides subsidized housing to 42 low-income families. In 2010, the 25-year-old playground equipment was deemed unsafe and was removed from the property. In the three years that have passed, there has been no equipment, no picnic tables and no park benches in Kelleher Park.

The CPA funds, when combined with the applicants' extensive private fundraising efforts, will be used for the purchase and installation of playground equipment, benches and picnic tables at the park. The project will meet the need for playground equipment for the 43 children that live at Kelleher Park and an additional 130 low-income children that attend the Newburyport schools who are eligible for, and potentially would, participate in academic support and recreational programming offered by the Newburyport Learning Enrichment Center located at Kelleher Park.

#### PROJECT NO. 8 FROG POND RESTORATION AT THE BARTLET MALL

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$12,000 to the Bartlet Mall Commission to install four underwater aerators in the Frog Pond to increase the pond's oxygen levels, reduce the high levels of algae growth and further purify the water without the use of chemicals.

The CPA category for this project is Historic Resource and Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

The Bartlet Mall is visited by thousands of people year-round. The Frog Pond, at the center of the park, is an ancient kettle hole left behind by the glaciers. Unfortunately, though named "Frog Pond" there are no frogs living in it due, in part, to high level of algae. To address low oxygen levels and help reduce the algae, the Frog Pond needs to aeration. The CPA funding will support the following:

The purchase and installation of four underwater aerators with a small compressor (there will be no

visible display of the functioning aerators);

The purchase of a pump and new piping to bring the fountain up to full working capacity, which will further aerate the pond;

The repair and refinishing of the 32 benches at Bartlet Mall; and

The planting of hearty dwarf lavender at the base of the flagpole and at the George Washington statue.

#### PROJECT NO. 9 **OPEN SPACE RESERVE**

The CPC recommends the reservation of \$50,000 to the Community Preservation Open Space Reserve Fund. Use of reserve funds are subject to future CPC recommendation and City Council appropriation for specific projects.

The CPA category for this reservation is Open Space.

**Project Summary** 

This recommendation is in response to an application from the City's Open Space Committee indicating there are potential opportunities for open space acquisitions and/or conservation restrictions of land. These potential projects require confidentiality. Supplemental information will be submitted as individual projects enter more public phases and are presented to the CPC and the City Council for project specific funding from the reserve.

### PROJECT NO. 10 EXTERIOR WOODWORK RESTORATION, PHASES I & II NEWBURYPORT HIGH SCHOOL

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$150,000 to the Newburyport Public Schools for Phase I and II of exterior woodwork rehabilitation project with the following condition:

• The Chair of the Newburyport Historical Commission shall review and approve the Request for Proposals (RFP) prior to its issuance.

The CPA category is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

This project will rehabilitate and restore the exterior woodwork on the historic Newburyport High School. Age and exposure to weather have caused a variety of issues with the exterior woodwork, necessitating a well-planned historic restoration guided by The Secretary of the Interior's Standard for Rehabilitation and Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings.

The project is divided into four phases. The CPA funding will be combined with a School Department budget item of \$80,000 to accomplish the first two phases of the project, which focus on the front façade of the structure. The north-facing façade is not only the most prominent portion of the building, but it is also the most urgent in need of rehabilitation and restoration.

#### PROJECT NO. 11 NEWBURYPORT NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES SIGNAGE

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$6,500 to the Newburyport Preservation Trust for the design, manufacture and installation of five signs at gateway entries into the Newburyport Historic District.

The CPA category is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

CPA funding, which represents half of the project cost with the remaining funds coming from a private donor, will be used to create and install the five gateway signs. Each sign will announce the assignment of the district by the Secretary of the Interior with a declaration to residents and visitors alike that they are entering a National Register of Historic Place. The proposed locations, subject to approval by the City Council are:

- The eastern side of High Street at the Newbury border;
- The western side after the three-corner intersection at the start of High Street;
- The intersection of Water and Union Streets;
- On Merrimac Street, just before Ashland Street; and
- On State Street, just to the north of Oak Hill Cemetery.

#### PROJECT NO. 12 LITTLE RIVER NATURE TRAIL KIOSKS

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$8,000 to the Parker River Clean Water Association for the design, manufacture and installation of two kiosks to be placed at the entrances to the Little River Nature Trail to provide a source of information that visitors can consult before entering the habitat area.

The CPA category is Recreation.

**Project Summary** 

In 2001, the Parker River Clean Water Association (PRCWA) proposed and received permission from the Newburyport Mayor, City Council and Conservation Commission to construct a nature trail on land donated to the City by Mass Highway. This land was to be used for observation, exercise, jogging and cross-country skiing in the winter. The purpose was to provide both residents and tourists an opportunity to explore and enjoy this relatively wild area so close to a densely developed area. It roughly follows the Little River, which is a major tributary to the Parker River and contributes to the well-being of the Common Pasture and the Great Marsh.

The Little River Nature Trail is over a mile of interesting terrain through meadows, forests and wetlands. Many visitors are hesitant to travel the trails because they are uncertain to what extent the commitment is required to traverse the entire length. By having an informative central location where a Plexiglas enclosure can be on display will provide the necessary information and maps.

#### PROJECT NO. 13 HISTORIC LANDSCAPE PRESERVATION AT ATKINSON COMMON

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$20,000 to the Belleville Improvement Society to further implement their 2010 "Urgent Tree/Shrub Care and Replacement Project" to ensure the longevity of the existing trees and adopt a method of replacement for the portions that have been lost due to recent extreme weather events.

The CPA category is Historic Resource.

**Project Summary** 

The Belleville Improvement Society's 2010 study documented the necessity of preventative cabling, fertilizing and pruning of the impressive stand of Heritage Trees within the park. In the absence of this proactive arboriculture, the park continues to lose portions of the Pinetum; most recently, during the "Blizzard of 2013", the park sustained substantial damage once again.

CPA funding will be used to address priority action items to repair damaged trees and to prevent further damage from weather events and from pests. Preservation, restoration and repair of this historic resource are paramount to the continued use and enjoyment of this property on a cultural, recreational, artistic, athletic and educational basis.

#### PROJECT NO. 14 CITY HALL BOND DEBT PAYMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$195,187.50 to the City of Newburyport for the seventh annual payment of interest and principal on the City Hall Restoration Bond.

The CPA category is Historic Preservation.

#### **Project Summary**

In December 2005, the City Council authorized issuance of a \$1,950,000 bond against future CPA revenue for the City Hall Restoration Project. Work on City Hall is now largely complete, though debt payments will continue through 2019. The CPC is advised that it is necessary to appropriate the debt service payments on an annual basis.

# PROJECT NO. 15 OPEN SPACE ACQUISITIONS BOND DEBT PAYMENT

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$128,818.75 to the City of Newburyport for the seventh annual payment of interest and principal on the Open Space Acquisitions Bond.

The CPA category is Open Space.

#### **Project Summary**

In December 2005, the City Council authorized bonding up to \$1,775,000 against future CPA revenue for open space acquisitions, including the Cooper North Pasture and the former Guilford properties. Under this authorization, the City Treasurer conservatively borrowed \$1,275,000 to fund the acquisition costs. Debt payments on the bond will continue through 2019. The CPC is advised that it is necessary to appropriate the debt service payments on an annual basis.

## PROJECT NO. 12 CPA ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$12,000 to fund the Community Preservation Committee's expected administrative costs. These costs include a stipend for the CPC administration liaison position in the Planning Office, annual membership dues in the statewide community preservation coalition, and other recurring expenses including note taking at meetings, legal advertising, and city solicitor review of legal documents when necessary. Excess funds remaining in this account at the end of the fiscal year revert to general Community Preservation Funds.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Administration.

### COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE

#### EVALUATION CRITERIA

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee gives preference to proposals which address as many of the following general criteria as possible:

- 1. Eligible for Community Preservation Act (CPA) funding according to the requirements described in the CPA legislation (Chapter 44B of Mass. General Laws).
- 2. Consistent with the Master Plan, Open Space and Recreation Plan, Land Use and other planning documents that have received public scrutiny and input.
- 3. Preserve and enhance the essential character of the city.
- 4. Protect resources that would otherwise be threatened.
- 5. Serve more than one CPA purpose or demonstrate why serving multiple needs is not feasible.
- 6. Demonstrate practicality and feasibility, and that the project can be implemented within budget and on schedule.
- 7. Produce an advantageous cost/benefit value.
- 8. Leverage additional public and/or private funds (eg. qualify the project for additional grants from other sources) or receive partial funding from other sources and/or voluntary contributions of goods or services.
- Preserve or improve utility of currently owned city assets.
- 10. Receive endorsement by other municipal boards or departments and broad-based support from community members.

#### CATEGORY SPECIFIC CRITERIA

The Community Preservation Act funds three key community interests: open space, historic preservation, and affordable housing. Public recreation projects may also be funded.

- 1. Open Space proposals which address as many of the following specific criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Permanently protect important wildlife habitat, particularly areas that include:
    - locally significant blodiversity;
    - variety of habitats with a diversity of geologic features and types of vegetation;
    - Endangered habitat or species of plant or animal.
  - Preserve active agricultural use.
  - Provide opportunities for passive recreation and environmental education.
  - Protect or enhance wildlife corridors, promote connectivity of habitat or prevent fragmentation of habitats.
  - Provide connections with existing trails, protected open space or potential trail linkages.
  - Preserve scenic views.
  - Border a scenic road.
  - Protect drinking water quantity and quality.
  - Provide flood control/storage.
  - Preserve and protect important surface water bodies, including streams, wetlands, vernal pools or riparian zones.
  - Buffer for protected open space, or historic resources.

- 2. Historic Preservation proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate historic, cultural, architectural or archaeological resources of significance, especially those that are threatened.
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate city-owned properties, features or resources of historical significance.
  - Protect, preserve, enhance, restore and/or rehabilitate the historical function of a property or site.
  - Demonstrates a public benefit.
  - Ability to provide permanent protection for the historic resource.
- 3. Affordable Housing proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Contribute to the goal of 10% affordability as defined by chapter 40B of Mass. General Laws.
  - Promote a socioeconomic environment that encourages a diversity of income.
  - Provide housing that is harmonious in design and scale with the surrounding community.
  - Intermingle affordable and market rate housing at levels that exceed state requirements for percentage of affordable units pursuant to chapter 40B.
  - Ensure long-term affordability.
  - Address the needs of range of qualified household, including very low, low and low-to moderate income families and individuals.
  - Provide affordable rental and affordable ownership opportunities.
  - Promote use of existing buildings or construction on previously-developed or city-owned sites.
  - Convert market rate to affordable units.
- 4. Recreation proposals which address as many of the following criteria as possible will receive preference for funding:
  - Support multiple recreation uses.
  - Serve a significant number of residents.
  - Expand the range of recreational opportunities available to city residents of all ages.
  - Jointly benefit Conservation Commission and Parks Commission initiatives by promoting recreation, such as hiking, biking, and cross-country skiing.
  - Maximize the utility of land already owned by city (e.g. school property).
  - Promote the creative use of railway and other corridors to create safe and healthful nonmotorized transportation opportunities.

Intermunicipal Agreement for Veterans' Services

Attached is an intermunicipal agreement for the regional delivery of veterans' services under Massachusetts General Law Chapter 40 Section 4A. After meeting with officials from Newbury, Merrimac, Amesbury, and Salisbury for the past several months, we have reached consensus on implementing this regional approach.

Since 2010, MGL Chapter 115 Section 10 has provided a mechanism that allows municipalities to form a regional veterans' district. However, the statutory language specifies that the district shall be comprised of *one* city and surrounding towns. Accordingly, we must initiate a Home Rule Petition to allow the two cities (Amesbury and Newburyport) to participate in this newly proposed Hines/Shay Veterans' District. A combined population cap of 50,000 for the two cities has been incorporated into the Petition to alleviate any broader political concerns about the precedent set by allowing two cities to participate in a district.

Once the Act is approved by the legislature, the participating communities will then submit an application to the Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Services seeking formal recognition as a regional veterans' district. Before that application is submitted, the City Council will have to approve a different, slightly revised intermunicipal agreement that is more closely aligned with the statutory provisions of Chapter 115.

In the meantime, Newburyport will be the lead community under this interim arrangement, with Kevin Hunt fulfilling all duties as the Veterans Service Officer. Each community will pay an apportionment based on the population of the municipality as of the 2010 federal census. Although it will be pro-rated for FY14, the annual expense (exempting Chapter 115 veterans benefits) for Newburyport to participate in this regional agreement will be

\$37,781.12. By way of comparison, the City Council appropriated \$52,523 in the FY14 Operating Budget for the veterans' service line items that will be covered under this regional agreement. Accordingly, the City is projected to save approximately \$15,000 annually by formally joining with these other municipalities in providing these services. This funding schedule will remain the same once the district has been approved.

It is important to note that Mr. Hunt has been performing these services on behalf of Newbury and Merrimac for several years. He has also been fulfilling these duties for Amesbury on an interim basis since their VSO resigned earlier this year. Approving this agreement will allow the City to hire a part-time position (less than 20 hours per week) to help Mr. Hunt with much needed clerical and administrative support. This additional personnel is required to meet minimum staffing standards established by the Commonwealth around this regional districting option. Funding for this position has been included in the assessment schedule.

Mr. Hunt will split his time between Newburyport City Hall and the Costello Center in Amesbury. Under the interim intermunicipal agreement, Mr. Hunt and his administrative assistant will be City of Newburyport employees. Once the district is approved, all personnel will be employees of that district.

Chapter 40, §4A, the Agent shall provide each of the Municipalities with periodic financial statements that shall include: accurate and comprehensive records of the services performed under this agreement; the costs incurred; and the reimbursements and contributions received. Such reports shall be compiled and distributed by the Agent on a quarterly basis.
- (8) A Municipality may withdraw from this Agreement by vote of the appropriate City Council or Board of Selectmen not less than one hundred and eighty (180) days prior to the close of the then fiscal year and notice of the vote must be filed with the other Municipalities which are parties to this Agreement.
- (9) This agreement may be amended to permit the addition of adjoining municipalities. The apportionment of the expenses of such adjoining municipality and of all current district municipalities shall be accomplished in compliance with the provisions of G.L. c. 115, §11.
- (10) This agreement shall remain in effect until dissolved by unanimous vote of the Municipalities, but in no event for longer than twenty-five (25) years. A vote to

Intermunicipal Agreement with West Newbury for Animal Control Services

Attached is an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of West Newbury for animal control services. Newburyport will be the lead community under this arrangement. The West Newbury Board of Selectman has recently approved the terms of this agreement. It includes an initial one year term, with options to extend out for two additional one year periods.

As you may remember, \$20,000 was added to the FY14 budget on the revenue side under Other Department Revenue based on the projected payments made by West Newbury in anticipation of this agreement. In addition, \$10,000 was added to the Health Department Budget under the Assistant Animal Control line item to cover the costs associated with bringing on additional personnel to provide these services to both communities. Accordingly, the City will save approximately \$10,000 annually employing this regional approach to animal control services. We will also recoup any boarding fees when West Newbury animals are housed in our Animal Shelter and will have access to their Animal Control vehicle, a 2005 Ford Van with less than 10,000 miles on it.

While cost savings are a motivating factor in deciding to regionalize any municipal service, maintaining or improving the quality and delivery of those services is equally important. We believe that this regional effort will provide those results. In order to do so, based on our assessment of the workload, we plan on hiring a part-time, on-call Animal Control Officer who will cover both communities when our current Animal Control Officer is out for vacation, sick, personal, bereavement, etc. or is indisposed responding to another incident. The current stipended, on-call position that is responsible for responding to emergencies every other weekend will remain in place under this regional agreement. Both individuals currently holding these positions have been certified through the Massachusetts Animal Control Officers Association of Massachusetts. Any new employees will have similar training or will be certified within two years after being hired by the City.

#### TOWN OF WEST NEWBURY

### INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT FOR THE ADMINSTRATION OF SHARED ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

#### Article 1. Purpose

This agreement is entered into, pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40, Section 4A, by and between the City of Newburyport, as authorized by its City Council and approved by its Mayor, and the Town of West Newbury, as authorized by its Board of Selectmen.

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury are each obligated to provide animal control services to their residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury have determined that their residents can more efficiently and effectively be served with such services through a joint undertaking between the communities; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury have determined to join together to establish and administer a program of shared Animal Control Services.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

#### Article 2. Definitions

Participating Governmental Units: the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury.

Animal Control Services: Any and all services as required of an Animal Control Officer under applicable Massachusetts Laws and regulations, including but not limited to MGL Chapter 140, Section 151 et seq. and MGL Chapter 129, Section 15 et seq.

#### Article 3. Term

This Agreement shall take effect on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of July 2013, for a one year term that may be extended by up to two additional one year terms commencing on July 1, 2014 and July 1, 2015. Any such extension term shall be subject to approval by the City of Newburyport, as authorized by its City Council and approved by its Mayor, and the Town of West Newbury, as authorized by its Board of Selectmen. The Participating Governmental Units shall give each other notice of whether or not they wish to extend this initial one year term at least ninety days prior to the annual Town Meeting of the Town of West Newbury but no later than ninety days prior to June 1<sup>st</sup> of the then-current term, unless another date is mutually agreed upon in writing. Should the

parties fail to extend this Agreement by written addendum hereto, the agreement shall terminate upon the last day of the then-current term.

#### Article 4. Lead City

The City of Newburyport shall act as the "lead city" for the Participating Governmental Units, by employing the necessary officers and providing the necessary equipment, vehicles and kennel to perform said Animal Control Services. Said officers shall be considered employees of the City of Newburyport and be accorded all applicable benefits enjoyed by other Newburyport municipal employees as they are or shall be established. Each such officer must be a Massachusetts certified Animal Control Officer (excepting that new employees may acquire such certification within two years of the commencement of employment). Said certification must be maintained during the term of this Agreement. The office where such officers shall be primarily located will be in Newburyport.

#### **Article 5. Funding Contribution**

During the Fiscal Year 2014 (July 1, 2013 – June 30, 2014), the Town of West Newbury shall pay the City of Newburyport for animal control services a total sum of \$20,000.00 to be paid in four equal quarterly payments of \$5,000.00 on or before August 1, November 1, February 1, and May 1 (provided that such sum will be prorated as of the date of approval of this Agreement by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of West Newbury and the Mayor of the City of Newburyport). This payment shall include all applicable expenses incurred by the City of Newburyport in providing Animal Control Services on behalf of the Participating Governmental Units, including, but not limited to, salaries, group health insurance, workers' compensation insurance, and all other applicable benefits. Nothing herein shall prevent the parties from mutually agreeing in writing to change the funding contribution during the initial term or any extended term of this agreement, subject to available appropriation.

#### Article 6 Financial Safeguards

Under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 40, §4A, the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health shall provide to the Town of Newbury periodic financial statements that shall include: accurate and comprehensive records of the services performed under this agreement; the costs incurred; and the reimbursements and contributions received. Such reports shall be compiled and distributed by the Health Director on a quarterly basis. In addition, all bills and payrolls submitted for work done under this regional agreement shall be plainly marked to indicate that the work was done under the authority of this agreement.

The accounting records of the Newburyport Animal Control Services, working under the direction of the Newburyport Director of Public Health, shall be subject to the City's annual audit process and shall be subject to periodic audit by the Newburyport City Auditor as is current practice.

#### Article 7 Hours of Services and Service Requirements

The City of Newburyport shall provide Animal Control Services under this Agreement on an asneeded basis, seven days a week, twenty four hours a day. Animal Control Services shall be provided on an equal basis between the communities.

#### Article 8 Vehicle Usage

The City of Newburyport shall provide a 2003 Ford Crown Victoria and the Town of West Newbury shall provide a 2005 Ford Van. Both vehicles shall be made available for the use of the Animal Control Officers. Collision and liability insurance for both vehicles shall continue to be paid by each respective Participating Governmental Units. Each Participating Governmental Units shall be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of its own vehicles (excluding gasoline, oil changes and tires which will be provided in accordance with Article 4 hereof).

#### **Article 9 Fines**

Any fines, exempting boarding fees, collected will be collected on behalf of and returned to the Participating Governmental Unit from within the municipal boundaries of which the animal was taken, or in the case of an animal not taken, returned to the Participating Governmental Unit in which the animal resides or is kept.

#### **Article 10 Indemnification**

In the event that any claims, demands, suits, causes of action, costs, and expenses arise with respect to the services provided pursuant to this 'agreement, and to the extent permitted by Massachusetts General Laws chapter 258 and other applicable law, a Participating Governmental Unit shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other participating Government Unit form and against any such claims, demands, suits, causes of actions, costs and expends, including reasonable attorneys' fees and legal costs, but only to the extent that they arise from or relate to the negligent acts or omissions of the first Participating Governmental Unit, or its agents, servants, or employees, By entering into this Agreement, neither of the parties have waived any governmental immunity or limitation of liability or damages which may be extended to them by operation of law. This Agreement is by and between the municipalities which have executed it and each states that this is intended for their mutual benefit alone and is not intended to confer any express or implied benefits on any other person. This Agreement is not intended to confer third party beneficiary status on any person.

#### **Article 11 Operation of Animal Shelter Facilities**

The City of Newburyport shall maintain and operate an Animal Shelter Facility under the following terms and conditions.

#### I. OPERATIONS:

- a. The Animal Shelter Facility shall be accessible to the citizens of each Participating Governmental Unit for the retrieval of impounded animals during normal business hours, Monday through Friday 8AM to 4PM by appointment. Weekend hours will be provided by appointment only. Notice shall be posted conspicuously and in a readily accessible format in the main municipal building of both Participating Governmental Units which states the hours of operation and an emergency telephone number for use by residents to retrieve their pets. Such information shall also be made available on each respective Participating Governmental Unit website. The animal shelter shall be able to accept impounded animals 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
- b. Newburyport will provide daily supervision, food, water and humane care to animals boarded at the shelter.
- c. All Animal Control Officers will log in each time they enter the Animal Shelter Facility. The sign-in sheets will be submitted monthly to the Director of Public Health.
- d. The Animal Shelter Facility is to be solely used for the impounding of animals and to be used by Animal Control Officers only. There shall be no entry of other persons in the shelter without the consent of the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health.
- e. Newburyport will be responsible for the Animal Shelter Facility cleaning/sanitizing supplies, maintenance, heat, water, electric and other utility costs incurred in connection with the operation of the Facility.
- f. Newburyport will be responsible to keep the Animal Shelter Facility and associated kennels maintained, clean, and sanitary on a daily basis. Excreta and food waste shall be removed from primary enclosures daily and from under enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the animals contained in the enclosures, and to reduce disease, hazards, insects, pests, and odors. The condition of the kennels and quality of care is to be of a high caliber and performed to the standards established by the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health.

- g. Boarding facilities shall include a sheltered kennel unit with cages and/or runs that protect the animals from precipitation, and extreme hot (100°F or greater) and cold (45°F or less) conditions. Except in emergency situations, as determined by the Newburyport Animal Control Officer, no more than one adult animal shall be kept per cage.
- h. Newburyport will be responsible for ensuring that an ill or injured animal is treated promptly by the respective Participating Governmental Unit's contracted licensed veterinarian, depending on the nature and/or seriousness of the illness or injury, and that any prescribed medication is promptly obtained and administered.

#### II. FEES:

- a. Owners who reclaim animal(s) shall make payment to the City of Newburyport prior to reclaiming their animal(s) for all boarding fees (\$35.00 per day for each animal) and all other fees related to shelter services provided per day per animal.
- b. Newburyport shall provide invoices, collect monies and keep records of all required fees received from owners. Invoices provided to owners who are retrieving their animal shall include the date that the animal was delivered to the shelter, the per day shelter rate, the number of days that the animal was sheltered, medical bills as applicable, and total fee due and collected.
- c. Each Participating Governmental Unit shall be responsible for the direct costs to care for the animals which originate from said community, including but not limited to flea treatments and any veterinary costs. For the purposes of this agreement, "veterinary costs" shall include rabies vaccinations, health evaluation, treatment of minor curable diseases and euthanasia.
- d. Each Participating Governmental Unit shall pay any additional costs associated with the transport and removal of animals from their community if an animal is not claimed or is injured.
- e. Newburyport may add a surcharge of up to ten (10) percent (not to exceed \$25.00) to medical bills to cover certain incidental costs relating to

transportation of an animal to a veterinarian's office, telephone expenses incurred in connection with medical treatment, and any special care involved. Bills must support all medical charges and receipts bearing the name of the veterinarian or firm from whom they were obtained.

- f. Fees for animals that are unclaimed by the owner at the end of the maximum seven (7) day holding period shall be paid by the Participating Governmental Unit where the animal originated.
- g. All fees and receipts from boarding and all other services related to the shelter shall be submitted monthly to the City of Newburyport Health Department.
- III. RECORD KEEPING: Each Participating Governmental Unit's Animal Control Officers shall maintain an impound record on each animal delivered to the Animal Shelter Facility. The impound record will be prepared and filled out by the appropriate Animal Control Officer and delivered to the Facility with the animal.

Upon discharge, one (1) copy of the animal's completed record shall be provided to the person claiming the animal and one (1) copy of each discharged animal's record shall be provided to Newburyport. If the agreement is terminated, all impound records shall transmitted to the appropriate town.

#### IV. DISCHARGE:

a. Claimed animals: Each Participating Governmental Unit will require the person claiming the animal to show identification (preferably a driver's license). In the case of a dog, a certificate of license is required of all dogs six (6) months of age or older for release.

In the event of non-licensure of a dog, the owner or person claiming the dog will be required to show proof of licensure prior to release by the Animal Control Officer. The Animal Control Officer will not be responsible for ensuring licensure of the dog.

In addition, the Animal Control Officer will provide the person claiming the animal with a full disclosure of any medical treatment rendered by a veterinarian and/or the Animal Shelter Facility and by whom it was rendered

and a complete identification of any prescription or non-prescription medicine(s) administered to the animal while in custody. Finally, the Animal Shelter Facility must obtain the signature and the driver's license number of the person to whom the animal is released on the Impound Record.

b. Unclaimed animals: Unless requested by the Newburyport Director of Public Health or West Newbury Police Chief to retain the animal for a longer period (2 to 4 additional days), animals will be picked up on or immediately following the seventh (7th) day of confinement by the Animal Control Officer. The written notice to extend shelter services from the Newburyport Director of Public Health or West Newbury Police Chief must accompany the reports to the city or town. The shelter may place such animals as are deemed suitable up for adoption in accordance with MGL Chapter 140, section 136A.

#### Article 12 Miscellaneous

- a. This agreement may be amended in writing by vote of both of the Participating Governmental Units. Should additional municipalities seek to join this program of shared Animal Control Services, the terms agreed to herein, including apportionment of expenses, for such additional municipalities shall be negotiated and approved by both of the Participating Governmental Units.
- b. This agreement represents the entire understanding of the parties with respect to its subject matter.
- c. This agreement shall be governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- d. If any of the provisions of this agreement is declared to be illegal, unenforceable, or void, then both parties shall be relieved of all obligations under such provision, provided, however, that the remainder of the Agreement shall be enforced.

Order Relative to Legislation Creating a new Regional Veterans' Services' District to Include the City of Newburyport, the City of Amesbury, the Town of Salisbury, the Town of Merrimac and the Town of Newbury

Whereas, the City of Newburyport and one of more of its neighboring communities, which may include the City of Amesbury, the Town of Salisbury, the Town of Merrimac and the Town of Newbury, wish to create a new regional veterans' services district, and

Whereas, Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 115, Section10 limits participation in such a regional district to adjacent municipalities and only one city per district, and

Whereas, said communities are in essential agreement as to the terms of an Intermunicipal Agreement for operation of such new regional veterans' services district,

Now therefore, be it Ordered that:

The City Council of the City of Newburyport hereby authorizes the Mayor, on behalf of the City, to submit a Petition to the General Court of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to enact an Act creating a new regional veterans' services district, including the City of Newburyport and one of more of its neighboring communities, which may include the City of Amesbury, the Town of Salisbury, the Town of Merrimac and the Town of Newbury, provided, however, that the General Court may make clerical or editorial changes of form only to the bill, unless the Mayor approves amendments to the bill before enactment by the General Court, and to further authorize the Mayor to act on behalf of the City relative to any inquiries and/or changes made by the General Court concerning the proposed Act, and to approve amendments which shall be within the scope of the general public objectives of the petition and to cooperate with the City of Amesbury, the Town of Salisbury, the Town of Merrimac and the Town of Newbury in jointly submitting such petition, as needed:

Mother Gerster Weakler Leber Control Post Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. The cities of Newburyport and Amesbury and the towns of Salisbury, Newbury and Merrimac, or any two or more of them, may establish a regional veterans' services district under the provisions of section 10 of chapter 115 of the General Laws, notwithstanding that said section 10 limits participation in such a district to adjacent municipalities and only one city per district. Such district shall, other than as set forth herein, comply with the provisions of said section 10 and shall be known as The Hines/Shay Veterans' District.

SECTION 2. Said district may continue so long as the combined population of the cities of Newburyport and Amesbury shall not, by reference to the most recent US Census data, exceed 50,000. In any year in which the combined population of the cities of Newburyport and Amesbury is determined, by reference to the most recent US Census data, to exceed 50,000, the members of said district shall convene a district meeting. The purpose of such district meeting shall be to address a method of reforming the district in compliance with the population requirements of this Act and to establish a reasonable time frame in which to accomplish the transition necessary to such reformation without sacrificing services to the veterans of each community involved in such transition.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Reference is made to the above captioned matter. In that connection, I represent Atomic Coffee Company of Newburyport, LLC relative to the enclosed application for a Food Establishment Outdoor Seating Permit. The applicant has entered into a lease agreement for the premises located at 56 State Street, (the "Premises"), where they intend to operate a café serving food, wine, local, and craft beers, coffee, and other nonalcoholic beverages. Atomic Coffee Company of Newburyport, LLC is leasing the Premises from Eastern Yacht Sales & Charters, Inc. The agreement notes that the use of the premises will be that of a restaurant/coffee, beer, and wine bar, and for the retail sale of foods and beverages and related items.

#### Background

The Atomic Coffee Company of Newburyport, LLC was formed by Andrew Mahoney, John Mahoney, and Mike Vien. The Mahoney brothers have owned and operated the Atomic Café in Beverly, MA, for seventeen (17) years and the Atomic Café in Marblehead for seven (7) years. From 2002 to 2006, both Andrew and John also operated McSwiggin's Pub and Restaurant in Salem, MA, where operations included an interest in a license to sell alcoholic beverages. Andrew Mahoney will be managing this Café.

A simple survey of the communities in which the Atomic Café operates will reveal that the company provides a professional, well respected and popular enterprise. Currently the company employs approximately twenty four individuals between its roasting business and cafes.

The owners are excited about the prospect of opening a Café in Newburyport and will surely add to the City's popularity as a food and drink destination. With that in mind, the hours of operation are proposed to be 7:00 a.m. -10:00 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 7:00 a.m. through 7:00 p.m. on Sunday.

The Premises is located in the B2 zoning district, situated between The Book Rack and Agave and consists of approximately 2,509 square feet, with approximately 2,186 square feet dedicated to service space of which there are 1,482 square feet of indoor space and 323 square feet of outdoor restaurant space.

#### Outdoor Seating Requirements:

The Café will include 66 seats consisting of café tables and booths as well as proposed outdoor seating. There will be 42 seats inside the Café and a proposed 24 seats are being proposed for outdoor seating. The Applicant has submitted its application for a malt and wine license as well as a Common Victualler license which will be heard on August 13, 2013.

All outdoor seating will be controlled/demarcated as required by the City Council rules with separations of a stanchion and rail system with fabric skirting. As you can see on the plan there is a 5.6 foot passage way for pedestrian clearance on the sidewalk and nearby amenities. You will note on the plan, there is no interference with the doorways, fire escapes or curbing.

The applicant will take full responsibility for the out door seating, tables and separators and at all times keep in good repair and out of the public way. The applicant understands its responsibility to secure the seating and tables at night and to assure their availability during business hours. All seating will comply with local, state and federal laws.

Once approved and prior to the issuance of the permit, the Applicant will provide to the City evidence of liability insurance as required by the City Council Requirements.

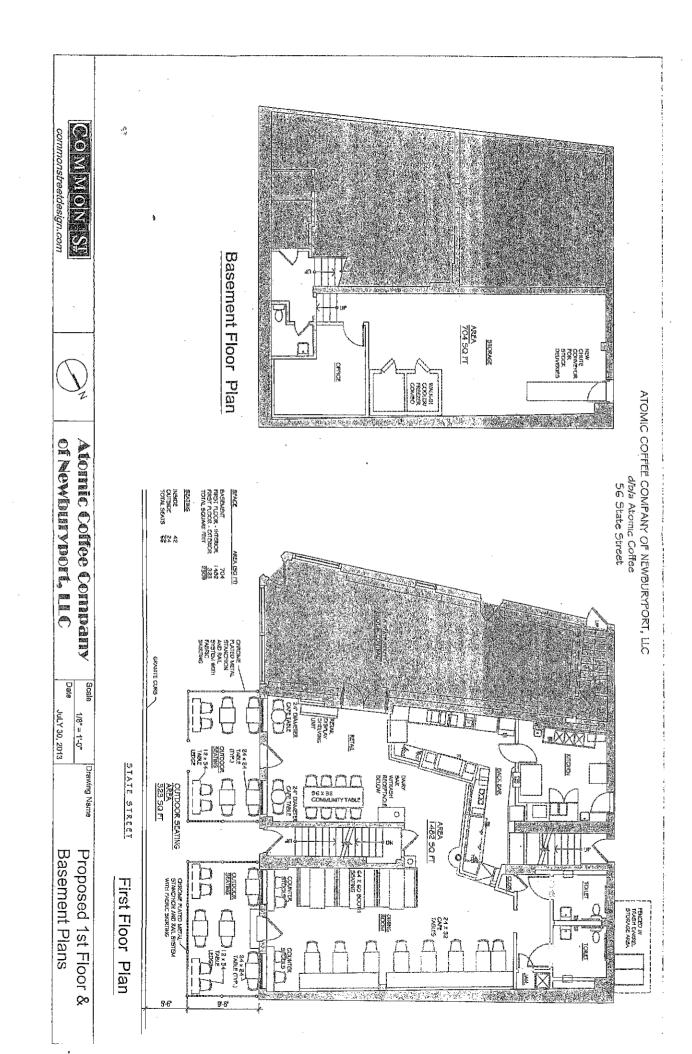

Shellfish Management Plan

The Division of Marine Fisheries intends to open approximately 250 acres in Joppa Flats out to Woodbridge Island for shellfishing (see attached map). Since these flats are designated as moderately contaminated, all shellfish harvested from this area are required to be processed at the Shellfish Purification Plant. Given the accessibility of this area to the general public, the Division of Marine Fisheries is concerned that without proper education and consistent enforcement, unlicensed shellfishing may occur. Attached is a shellfish management plan that has been drafted to address those concerns.

The area will be opened as soon as this management plan is approved. It will remain open on a year-round basis, but will be closed after any moderate to significant rain event. The Division of Marine Fisheries estimates that the flats will be open from between 45 to 120 days a year, depending on how frequently it has to be closed due to rain.

Under this management agreement, the City will be able to charge between \$100 and \$200 per license and \$2 per rack. Based on their projections, the Division of Marine Fisheries believes that approximately 3000 bushels will be harvested on an annual basis from these flats. Accordingly, the City anticipates collecting between \$6500 and \$7500 annually in fees once this area is opened. These fees will be deposited into the Harbor Enterprise Fund.

The plan establishes the Newburyport Shellfish Constable as the enforcement authority. Consistent with what many other coastal municipalities do around the state, the Mayor has appointed the Harbormaster to this position, subject to your confirmation. Mr. Hogg's responsibilities under this new plan will be as follows:

 Inspect racks of shellfish harvested with respect to MGL Chapter 130 section 52, 69 and CMR 322 section 10.04 • Maintain a daily record tracking the number of racks harvested by each Master Digger

• Patrol the area when shellfish are being harvested and monitor shellfish areas and landing sites during closures

• Notify the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries' Shellfish Purification Plant each Friday with the proposed digging schedule and landing site schedule for the following week

The Shellfish Constable will earn a \$2500 annual stipend which will be paid in equal biweekly installments to account for these additional duties. Based on the projected revenue from opening these new flats, the City will see a net increase of between \$4000 and \$5000 annually. Mr. Hogg plans on attending the Massachusetts Shellfish Constable Training program held down at Massachusetts Maritime Academy in January 2014. Both the terms of the management plan as well as the stipend rate will be revisited once the flats have been opened for one full year.

# CITY OF NEWBURYPORT SHELLFISH MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR MODERATELY CONTAMINATED SHELLFISH AREAS

- 1.) PURPOSE: The following plan is intended for the City of Newburyport as a management, conservation, and law enforcement cooperative measure. This plan is meant to insure adequate control of moderately contaminated shellfish harvest, under the authority of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 130, Section 52, 74, 74a, 75, 80, 98, and CMR 322 Section 10. For the purpose of this management plan, shellfish shall be defined as soft-shell clams (*Mya arenaria*).
- 2.) LICENSES: Every digger, Master and Subordinate, shall buy a Commercial Shellfish License from the City of Newburyport, City Clerk. Shellfish Licenses shall be valid for one (1) year commencing January 1<sup>st</sup> and expiring December 31<sup>st</sup>. Necessary proof of residence must be to the satisfaction of the City Clerk and shall be in the form of 2 or more of the following instruments, but not limited to: driver's license, voter registration, real estate tax bill, utility bill, school enrollment and/or vehicle registration. Applicants for a Newburyport Shellfish License must possess a valid Master or Subordinate Digger permit issued by the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries. License applicants must submit a signed statement on forms supplied by the City of Newburyport that the applicant has read, is familiar with, and agrees to fully comply with provisions of this management plan.
- 3.) LICENSE FEES shall be set as follows and may be subject to change in subsequent calendar years by City of Newburyport in consultation with the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries. The City of Newburyport may at any time during a calendar year pro-rate license fees.

Newburyport Residents (Resident License) \$100.00 Massachusetts Residents (Non-resident License) \$200.00 Rack Fee \$2.00/Rack

4.) TRANSACTION CARDS & CLEAN SHELLFISH PERMITS: No digger, Master and Subordinate may have in his or her possession during his or her moderately contaminated shellfish activities a clean shellfish permit, a shellfish endorsement on his or her commercial fishermen permit or a shellfish transaction card. In addition, Master Diggers so engaged in moderately contaminated shellfish activities must surrender any clean shellfish permit, shellfish Page 1 of 4

endorsement on his or her commercial fishermen permit or a shellish transaction card of the massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries.

- 5.) ENFORCEMENT: The Shellfish Constable and/or Deputy Shellfish Constable, appointed by the Mayor of the City of Newburyport will enforce the provisions of this management plan and all statutes in accordance with provisions of section 98 Chapter 130 of the Massachusetts General Laws. Officers of the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Law Enforcement will have the authority to enforce the provisions of this management plan.
- 6.) RACK TRACEABILITY: The Shellfish Constable will maintain a daily record with the number of racks harvested by each Master Digger. Such records will contain, but not be limited to the following information:

a.) The date and proper designation of the shellfish area harvested.

b.) The name of the Master Digger or Supervisor and the permit number of the Master Digger.

c.) The number of racks collected by Master Digger or his/her Supervisor.

- d.) The true names and permit numbers of the Subordinate Diggers harvesting that day and numbers of racks each Subordinate dug.
- 7.) RACK LIMITS: A daily rack limit may be imposed upon each digger when the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries and the City of Newburyport agree a limit is necessary. Any rack limit may also be based upon the capacity of the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries Shellfish Purification Plant. No Master Digger or Subordinate will exceed any such rack limit. The City of Newburyport and the Massachusetts Division of Marine fisheries may agree to set rack limits in shellfishing areas for conservation purposes.
- 8.) WASHING AND CULLING: Shellfish shall be thoroughly washed with water from the harvest area and dead or broken shellfish or foreign matter removed from the catch prior to loading onto the transport vehicle in accordance with provisions of 322 Code of Massachusetts Regulations 10.04 (3, 4).
- 9.) HARVEST MONITORING AND PATROL: The Shellfish Constable shall review the Master Diggers Report on a daily basis for completeness, sign and retain the canary colored copy prior to transport. The Shellfish Constable will inspect racks of shellfish harvested with respect to MGL Chapter 130 section 52, 69 and CMR 322 section 10.04. Patrol of the City of Newburyport waterways by the Shellfish Constable must be provided on days that shellfish are being harvested. In addition, the City will adequately patrol or monitor shellfish areas and landing sites during closures.
- 10.) POSTINGS: The City of Newburyport shall install and maintain orange markers clearly delineating the boundaries between classification areas. *Marine Fisheries* will provide the City of Newburyport with a list and description of the classification areas in the City of Newburyport including information on the classification and locations for installing red/orange markers. In addition, signs will be used to notify the public that the area is contaminated and shellfishing is not permitted. Signs shall be posted by the City of Newburyport at commonly used and/or public access points. The City of Newburyport shall provide postings locations to *Marine Fisheries*.
- 11.) PROHIBITED: The following are prohibited practices:
  - a.) No digger, Master or Subordinate, shall contribute to the catch of another digger.

- b.) No Master Digger or Subordinate Digger shall exceed a daily limit imposed by the City of Newburyport and/or the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries.
- c.) No Master Digger or Subordinate Digger shall be in the possession of seed clams.
- 12.) HARVESTING SCHEDULE: No more than one conditionally restricted area may be harvested per day. The City and Division of Marine Fisheries may wish to partition the available flats into harvest areas. The conditionally restricted area's status shall be "Open" to clamming by the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries prior to harvest. It is at the discretion of the Shellfish Constable to assign the digging area. The Shellfish Constable will notify the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries' Shellfish Purification Plant each Friday with the proposed digging schedule for the following week. Changes to the digging schedule may be made with the prior approval of the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries. The Shellfish Constable must notify the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Law Enforcement and the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries' Shellfish Purification Plant of a schedule change, due to weather or unpredictable circumstances.
- 13.) TRANSPORTATION: Shellfish from conditionally restricted areas open to harvest shall be transported to the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries Shellfish Purification Plant via prescribed routes designated by the Division. In a qualified emergency, the Shellfish Constable may make a temporary route change, within their town, with the approval of the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Law Enforcement. The Division of Marine Fisheries Shellfish Purification Plant will be notified immediately upon the temporary change.
- 14.) HOLD OVER: All shellfish harvested on any "digging day" shall be transported immediately to the Shellfish Purification Plant. Shellfish may be held overnight in an emergency. "Hold over" shellfish will only be allowed with the agreement of Massachusetts Office of Environmental Law Enforcement. The Shellfish Purification Plant will be immediately notified and all conditions of CMR 322 Section 10.06 will be met. Massachusetts Division of Law Enforcement will designate a secure location for "hold over" shellfish. The shellfish will be transported to the Shellfish Purification Plant the next morning. No other shellfish will be transported with "hold over" shellfish.
- 15.) LANDING SITES: Landing sites shall be designated as follows:

  Cashman Park Boating Ramp

  Ring's Island Town Pier

  Salisbury State Reservation Boating Ramp

It is at the discretion of the Shellfish Constable to assign a landing site. No more than one landing site shall be assigned on any one day when any conditionally restricted area is open to harvest within the City of Newburyport. The Shellfish Constable will notify the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries' Shellfish Purification Plant each Friday with the proposed landing site schedule for the following week. Changes in the landing site schedule by the Shellfish Constable may be made with the approval of Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries. The Shellfish Constable will notify the Massachusetts Office of Environmental Law Enforcement on changes in the landing site schedule. It is the responsibility of the City of Newburyport to arrange the use of designated landing sites not under city control.

16.) RESOURCE MANAGEMENT: The City of Newburyport may assess shellfish areas to determine the extent of the shellfish resource. The Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries may, as time permits, assist in the resource assessment. The results will be used as a

recommendation to the Newburyport Mayor. Based upon recommendations, the Newburyport Mayor, with the approval of Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries, may institute a management closure of a shellfish area, or portion there of, in accordance with the MGL Chapter 130, Section 52 & 54. The Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries reserves the right to institute public health closures in accordance with MGL Chapter 130, Sections 74 & 74A.

- 17.) PENALTIES: Whoever violates any provision made under the authority of this management plan shall be subject to the penalties established by the City of Newburyport and in accordance with the MGL Chapter 130.
- 18.) CHANGES AND REVIEW: This plan shall be reviewed annually by the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries and the Shellfish Constable. Changes may be made at any time upon written request and mutual concurrence of a majority of the Newburyport City Council and Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries.
- 19.) SEVERABILITY: In the event any provision, section, or clause of these rules and regulations is found to be invalid, it shall not affect the validity of the remaining rules and regulations. Should this agreement become burdensome or unmanageable to either party, the agreement may be canceled upon 30 days written notice.
