New Business:

Tina Los

Update from Tina Los of the Essex County Asset Builder Network, which serves greater Newburyport area.

- Beacon Coalition 13 years old
- Connected communities to ensure there's no duplication and share successes and resources
- 1 on 1 program
- Community campaigns to target youth or adults, etc. plan potential programs around needs
- 3 year privately funded grant by Tower Foundation
- Private grant more flexibility in terms of creativity of programs and how to fund
- Historically prevention was not seen as a community effort
- PYD youth have a voice that needs to be heard.
- All youth are at risk all the time so need to work with them to prevent instead of focusing on crisis management using 40 assets-based model

Asset Builder Network

- Police Department and Schools on board
- Individuals and organizations can get involved

Attitudes and Behavior Survey

- Part I measures 40 developmental assets
- Part II focuses on risk behaviors and to asses potential for risk
- Sample questions might include:
 - "Have you used drugs in the past 30 days?"
 - "Have you been in a car with alcohol over the past 30 days?"
- Grades 6-12 surveyed in all local communities

O. Davis described the 40 Assets:

- Series of questions to define "safety"
- Anonymous survey

- Will debrief the students after the survey –maybe in a classroom, maybe through the Youth Leadership Council, maybe a group of students nominated by teachers
- Sometimes they debrief a sample of convenience e.g., rec center students
- But try to hear from a wide, diverse group of students

T. Los -

- there is not prescribed way that you have to go about evaluating the data
- Data presented at a public forum right after youth evaluate it at the <u>Youth Data Retreat</u> and choose what data they deem relevant or significant (Owen is part of this)
- Selected Youth Committee present final data in a public forum (sometime in Feb or March)
- HRC could possibly offer a small grant or support the forum in some other way

How Survey Results can be used by the HRC

- HRC could look at specific questions that address issues related to the HRC's Mission (e.g., conflict resolution, cultural competencies)
- We could put together an initiative/campaign/forum based on the responses/survey data
- To either build up assets or draw attention to and combat risky behaviors

Cultural Competencies Survey Section

- A bit bare
- Only 3 questions currently
- Sample Question: "How would your friends or family rate you on these 3 things?"
 - o Hanging out with people of different races

- Regional Report looking at trends rather than comparing city by city

NHS Youth Council

- Campaign to raise awareness about "cutting" and high levels of depression in student
- Develop programs to support youths suffering from depression

- Public presentation in early March

- Question posed about the sexual behavior section and gender based violence on the survey
- T. Los said that on alternate years questions about gender and sexual behavior are included
- 6-8th grade students have option to opt out
- T. Los will send links
- One way HRC could use data is to develop programing on gender-related issues:

- o targeting parent education or parent-centric programs,
- o or positive family communication,
- o or how to interact with a trusted adult
- o or target families
