

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Although this building is vernacular in style it has some interesting features of several of the styles popular during the mid-nineteenth century. The front entrance is Greek Revival in style, and is evidenced by the sidelights and pilasters that flank the door. The building's cornerboards are also characteristic of the Greek Revival style. The window lintels are a shallow pediment also a Greek features. The brackets under the eaves and in the cornice of the house are derived from the Italianate styles popular during the period.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The early owners of this house have yet to be documented. In 1924 the property was owned by Ellen Kelleher.
