Recycling and Trash Collection For Residents & Businesses with Municipal Trash Collection

Trash is collected once a week. Recyclables are picked up every other week. Holidays which cause one-day delays in 2016-2017 are Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day. (See pages 8-9 for a street-by-street schedule, including holiday delays.)

Residents are required to separate recyclable material from trash. (On City website, search for "Ordinances," then see Health and Sanitation Ordinance, Chapter 8, Article III, Division 1.)

The materials which must be recycled are cardboard, paper, glass bottles and jars, metal cans and aluminum foil/foil pans, and plastics with recycle numbers 1 through 7. (Sec. 8-93 Enforcement & Penalties. Failure to comply with recycling ordinance carries a \$100 fine.)

Every household received one 64-gallon recycling cart. It is green with a black lid (see photo). **Please label it with your address.** The carts belong to the house and **must be left at the house in the event of a**

move. If the cart is missing, residents may use any barrel which is clearly marked "Recycle." The City Health Department can provide you with such labels.

Please remember to **place the recycle carts three feet from other objects, with the wheels toward the house.**

Trash Reminders

- Bulky items like furniture and carpet (cut in 4-foot sections) must have a bulk sticker attached. Bulk stickers can be purchased at Health Dept. in City Hall for \$5 per item, one item out per week. No large appliances or metal items allowed. Fees subject to change.
 - Construction materials (including toilets and sinks) are not allowed in the trash and must be taken to a disposal site.
 - Latex paint can be dried and thrown out in your trash without a lid; use kitty litter for fast drying.
 - Trash is limited to 5 bags or 3 (35 gal) barrels per household each week. Barrels 64 gallons and larger will not be picked up.
 - No large wood items will be accepted at the curb.
 - Trash pick up may be delayed during Bagged Leaf and Christmas Tree weeks.
 - Put trash out after 5 pm or before 7 am.
- Mattresses and box springs need \$15 stickers in order to be picked up as trash. However, some mattresses in excellent condition may qualify for re-use (free pick-up), and nearly all qualify for recycling, which costs \$10. Call 978-499-0413 for details.

No Plastic bags of any type in the recycling barrel. Please recycle plastic bags at the grocery store.

Additional recycling may be placed in bins clearly marked RECYCLING. Free recycling stickers may be picked up at City Hall.

Curbside Recycling Reminders

- Recycling is mandatory and will be enforced.
- Recycling is single stream; place all recyclables in one container. Set recycling carts and trash out by 7:00 am on collection day.
- **No plastic bags of any kind in recycling carts, even if they have a recycle number.** The place to recycle plastic bags is in a supermarket's specially marked bin.
- Large cardboard can be recycled. It must be bundled, tied and left next to your container. Waxed cardboard is okay to recycle.
- No textiles (i.e. fabric, clothing) in recycling carts. Take to EcoSmith bin (see page 4).
- Containers must be rinsed or wiped out, but do not have to be completely clean.
- No clothes hangers in recycle carts. Wire hangers may be taken to dry cleaners.
- No electronics, batteries, cell phones, oil, oil-based paint, fluorescent bulbs (including CFLs), large appliances, plastic bags or Styrofoam in recycling carts. These items can be recycled at the Crow Lane Recycle Center (see p. 3 for hours).
- Glass bottles/jars must be clear, green, or brown. No broken glass or other glass such as light bulbs, window or auto glass, dishes, glasses or Pyrex. (see p. 4)
- No pots and pans in carts.
- Plastic containers which have recycle symbols 1 - 7 are allowed. No un-numbered plastics. Leave plastic caps/lids on plastic bottles.
- **No Styrofoam, even if labeled "recyclable."** Put in trash or take to Crow Lane Recycle Center (see p. 3).
- Paper- Recycle all your clean paper! "If it rips, recycle it."
- Styrofoam peanuts can go to Pak Mail.
- Tin, steel, and aluminum: Food cans and lids, deposit and non-deposit beverage cans (can be flattened), clean aluminum foil and foil pans, and empty aerosol cans. No cans which contained hazardous material or paint.
- You may use an overflow barrel if clearly marked and placed close to recycling cart.

- Yearly vehicle sticker required. Purchase at the Yard Waste Facility. Bring proof of residency.

Bagged Leaves & Christmas Trees

Leaves and trees must be curbside by 6 am

- Bagged leaf collections will take place on your regular trash day the following weeks **Oct. 24, Nov. 14, Nov. 27 (2016) and April 8, May 22 (2017)**.
- Place leaves in brown leaf bags or loose in a marked barrel. Please do not overfill bags.
- Leaves will be going to a farm for composting so please keep trash out of the leaf bags.
- Christmas Tree Collections will take place on regular trash day during the month of January only.
- Trees over 6 feet must be cut down in size.
- Trash pick up may be delayed by up to two hours on leaf collection days and Christmas Tree weeks.
- Bring wreaths to Crow Lane Yard Waste Facility or Recycling Center

Hard to Dispose of Items and Where to Bring Them

*Crow Lane Recycling Center is open the first Saturday of every month, 8 am to 12 pm.
Call for additional weekday hours. 978-499-0413 *Fees subject to change.

- **Air conditioners, refrigerators, and dehumidifiers** contain Freon. For pick-up call refrigeration company like Foucault Appliance for removal 978-372-6117 or bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fee applies.*
- **Antifreeze** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center, no fee. *
- **Appliances** - Bring to scrap metal dealer or to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fee applies.*
- **Asphalt, brick, concrete, or clean fill** - Miles River, 978-356-2290
- **Automotive Fluids** – Some (motor oil, brake fluid, hydraulic oil, transmission fluid and antifreeze) can be brought for recycling to Crow Lane Recycling Center* Others, especially flammable liquids, will be accepted on Household Hazardous Waste Days (see p. 3).
- **Batteries:** Bring to City Hall Health Dept., or to Crow Lane Recycle Center*.
- **Books** - Donate to local libraries for book sales, or offer to Jabberwocky Bookstore for credit. If books are not accepted, drop in Recycle That containers at Kent Street park or Crow Lane Recycle Center*.
- **Cardboard** - Bring large amounts to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Secure and bind small amounts and put curbside.
- **Carpets and rugs** - Put out on trash day with bulk sticker that can be purchased for \$5 each at City Hall in Health Department. Please cut or roll and tie into 4-foot sections. No more than four rolls per sticker. Only one item per week.
- **Cell phones and ink jet cartridges** – Bring to Health Department in City Hall or to Crow Lane Recycling Center.*
- **Clothing/Textiles** - Clothing (stains or rips OK), shoes, blankets, textiles, stuffed animal etc. leave in white recycling bins at Nock/Molin School or Bresnahan School Parking Lot or Yard Waste Facility.
- **Confidential Material** – Save for next shredding day: Saturday, September 10, 2016 (16A Perry Way) or May 6, 2017 (Crow Lane).
- **Construction material, toilets and non-metal sinks and doors** - Call disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Electronics** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fee applies for larger items.*
- **Fluorescent light bulbs** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center.*
- **Foam Plastics** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center.*
- **Furniture (non-metal)** - Put out on trash day with bulk sticker that can be purchased downstairs at City Hall. For alternatives see bottom of pg 2.
- **Gas grills** - Remove propane tank and briquettes/rocks bring to scrap metal dealer or Recycling Center first Saturday of every month.
- **Glass** - Jars and bottles go in curbside. Incandescent bulbs go in the trash. Fluorescent bulbs go to Crow Lane Recycle Center*. Windows, see below. Wrap broken glass for the trash. Offer glasses, Pyrex, and dishes for re-use. See bottom of page 2.
- **Gutters** - Aluminum gutters may be brought to scrap metal dealer or brought to Crow Lane Recycling Center.* Wood gutters may be brought to disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Helium Tanks** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fees may apply.*
- **Latex paints** - Remove lids, dry out paint, and throw in trash. Use kitty litter for fast drying.
- **Lumber** - Call disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Mattress and boxspring** - Call Recycling Department for a bulk sticker for \$15 or for info on donating/recycling, call 978-499-0413
- **Medical Syringes/Lancets** - Must be disposed of properly. See page 7.
- **Mercury products**– Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center.*
- **Metal Goods** – Appliances, bikes, water heaters, etc. go to scrap metal dealer or Crow Lane Recycle Center*. Fees may apply.
- **Microwaves** - Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Small fee applies.*
- **Motor oil (used)** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center, no fee.*
- **Needles/Syringes/Lancets:** Must be disposed of properly. See page 7.
- **Oil-based paint** - Bring to one of Household Hazardous Waste Days (see p. 3). Fee applies.
- **Plastic Bags** - All plastic bags must be recycled at supermarkets.
- **Propane tanks** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. Fee applies.*
- **Recyclables** - Large quantities of recyclable containers and newspapers may be brought to Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- **Smoke Detectors** – Bring to City Hall Health Department or Crow Lane Recycle Center*.
- **Solvents, chemicals, pesticides, etc** - Bring to next Household Hazardous Waste Day (see page 3) Fees apply.
- **Styrofoam food containers** - must be wiped clean and have a #6. Please remove stickers/tape. Bring to the Crow Lane Recycling Center.*
- **Styrofoam peanuts** - Bring to Pak Mail, 25 Storey Ave, Nbpt. Must be clean and bagged.
- **Televisions** – working flatscreen TVs can be donated to Goodwill in Seabrook. Best Buy accepts some TVs for a \$25 fee (call to verify). Any TV can be dropped off at the Crow Lane Recycle Center*. Fees range from \$5 to \$30 (subject to change)
- **Textiles** - Old clothing, shoes, blankets, textiles, stuffed animal etc. leave in white recycling bins at Nock/Molin School or Bresnahan School Parking Lot or Yard Waste Facility. Items in good condition will be reused. Others will be recycled.
- **Tires** – Bring to Crow Lane Recycling Center. \$3 fee per tire.*
- **Toxic/Hazardous Chemicals** - Bring to one of Household Hazardous Waste Days – see p. 3. Fees apply.
- **Windows** - Disposal company like Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.

Burning

The season for open burning is from January 15 to May 1 from 10 am to 4 pm. Property owners must obtain a valid permit from the fire department (978-465-4427) before conducting any open burning. Permits allow the burning of brush, cane, driftwood, and forest debris but prohibit the burning of grass, hay, leaves and tires.

Burning must be conducted on land near the location of the materials to be burned, and at least 75 feet from a dwelling. Those conducting open burns are encouraged to keep fire

suppression tools handy and monitor the burn closely until it is dead out. For more information

on open burning regulations and permitting, go to www.mass.gov/dcr and click on conservation then forest fire control.



Keep an eye out for EcoSmith bins to recycle clothing and textiles.

Clothing and textiles placed in EcoSmith bins get re-used or recycled. Stains or rips are OK. At Bresnahan and Nock/Molin schools, and at Yard Waste Facility.

Environmental Safety

In an emergency, such as a chemical spill, immediately contact your local fire department and call Massachusetts Department of Protection (DEP) 24-hour emergency response section at 1-888-304-1133. In addition, if you see or suspect illegal activity such as sewer or illegal dumping of hazardous material that is placing people's health or natural resources at risk, call interagency Environmental Strike Force at 888-846-

5283. To report an environmental health issue, first contact the Newburyport Health Office at 978-465-4410 or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health at 617-727-2700. For coastal environmental emergencies, contact Coastal Zone Management at 617-727-9530 or the Department of Environmental Management at 617-727-3159.

Exclusion of Properties from Pesticide Application

Residents who wish to have their properties excluded from pesticide application must submit their requests in accordance with Mass State Law 333, CMR 13:00. The law requires that requests be made by certified letter to the City Clerk by March 1 and must include name, address, and telephone number (if any) of the person requesting the exclusion, the address of the property to be excluded, and a description of the types of pesticide application programs for which exclusion is requested. Designation for exclusion must be made prior to March 1st of each year and shall be effective from April 1st of that year through March 31st of the following year. Animal Control Services

The Animal Control Officer (ACO) is responsible for ensuring compliance and enforcement of the Massachusetts State Sanitary Code 330 CMR 10.00 "Prevention of the Spread of Rabies", The Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources-Animal Health, Commonwealth of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 129 and the City of Newburyport leash law and proper disposal of animal waste. The ACO is also an Animal Inspector responsible for investigating animal bites and working with local veterinarians to determine an appropriate quarantine procedure to monitor or rule out any possible exposure to the rabies virus.

Dog Licenses: All dogs six months of age or older must be licensed with the City through the City Clerk’s Office by April 1 each year (after June 1, late fees will apply.) Proof of current rabies vaccination is required for licensing. License tags must be worn on a collar at all times. **License Fees:** Neutered/Spayed Dogs: \$10; Reproductively Intact Dogs: \$15. Fee is waived for Senior Citizens age 65 and over; and for individuals who are blind, deaf or mobility impaired

Lost & Found Pets: To report a lost or found pet, call the ACO at 978-465-4410 . On nights and weekends, contact the Police Department at 978-462-4411. Residents may wish to post notice on Facebook at: <https://www.facebook.com/NBPTAreaLostandFoundPets>.

Leash Law Section 3-26: No person shall own or keep in the City, outside the confines of the owner’s or keeper’s property, any dog which is not held firmly on a leash. Failure to comply with subsection (a) shall be punishable by the following schedule of fines: First offense \$50.00 Second offense \$75.00 Third offense \$100.00

Dogs On Beaches: The owner or person in control of a dog or any other animal shall not allow it to be on any part of the public beach between May 15 and September 15 of each year. From September 16 through May 14 dogs are allowed on beach; however, they must be held firmly on a leash at all times.

Pet Waste Disposal: Pet waste should be contained in a sealed bag and disposed of in small amounts with household trash. The City provides dog waste receptacles and bag dispensers at various locations throughout the City. (See map.) Dog waste must **never** be thrown in someone else’s trash or in Recycle Containers or Solar Big Bellies. *Disposal of Animal Waste: Section 3-2: All persons owning or in custody of an animal will be responsible for removal and disposal of that animal’s waste. The fine for violation of this provision for the first offense shall be \$50.; for second offense \$75.; third subsequent offenses \$100.*

Public Health

The Public Health Department provides health education, disease surveillance and investigation, health screenings, referrals and immunization clinics for the Newburyport community.

City Wide Flu Clinics are offered by the Health Department each year. Dates, times and locations of Clinics are published in the newspaper, City Website and on Cable News. Flu vaccines are also available at the Health Department by appointment. To schedule an appointment, call 978-465-4410.

Shingles Vaccines are available by appointment to eligible residents. In order to qualify to receive the vaccine, residents must be age 60 and older and demonstrate financial need (annual income less than \$46,680 for individuals or \$62,920 for couples) or a lack of insurance coverage for the vaccine. To schedule an appointment, or to check eligibility, call the Health Department at 978-465-4410.

Blood Pressure Checks: The Public Health Nurse is available by appointment to perform blood pressure checks in the Health Department Office, at no charge. Free Blood Pressure Clinics (open to all, without appointment) are held the first and third Tuesday of each month at the Newburyport Senior Center, 331 High Street.

CPR and First Aid Training: American Heart Association CPR and First Aid Training classes for adults and youth (ages 14—17) are taught by the Public Health Nurse at various times throughout the year. Class schedules, fees and registration forms can be found in the Youth Services brochure and on the City website.

Disease Investigation and Surveillance: The Health Department investigates and follows up on a list of infectious diseases. Collaborating with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health and health care providers, the Public Health Nurse assists with enforcement of state isolation and quarantine regulations.

Substance Abuse Services: Contact the Mass Substance Abuse Information and Education Helpline at **1-800-327-5050** or at **www.helpline-online.com** for free and confidential information and referrals for alcohol and other drug abuse problems and related concerns. Counseling and treatment options for substance abuse are also posted on the City Website.

Over 6.2 million people age 12 and older report abusing prescription drugs. Due to the fact that prescription drugs, when used as prescribed, can improve one's health, many teens believe they are a safe way to get high.

Every day, 4,047 children and young adults begin experimenting with prescription drugs. Only 4.7% of children who abuse prescription drugs say they get the medication from a stranger, a drug dealer or the internet. Prevent your children from abusing your own medication by securing your meds in places your child cannot access.



Help protect young people by safeguarding your prescription medications with 3 easy steps

1. **MONITOR** : Keep track of the amounts of your prescriptions, control your kids' medicines and encourage your friends and relatives, especially grandparents, to monitor and secure their own.
2. **SECURE YOUR MEDICINE:** Keep prescription medicine secure, preferably locked, in a place that your kids and visitors to your home will not easily find.
3. **DISPOSE OF YOUR UNUSED MEDICATION PROPERLY:**



Tablets and Capsules: Prescriptions and over the counter medications can be disposed of 24 hours a day at the Newburyport Police Department, 60 Green Street.



Syringes: Massachusetts General Law prohibits the disposal of "sharps" such as hypodermic needles, syringes and lancets in the trash. These items may be disposed of in the Sharps Collection kiosk at the Health Department at City Hall and at the Fire Station at 4 Greenleaf Street (available 24 hours a day.) Sharps must be placed in rigid plastic containers, such as laundry detergent bottles.



To dispose of liquid medication: 1. Mix the medication with an undesirable substance, such as coffee grounds or kitty litter. 2. Place the mixture in a sealable bag. 3. Dispose of it with your trash.
