

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This building is vernacular Greek Revival in style. The building has recently been rehabilitated. During the rehabilitation, the original cornice was replaced as were the windows in the building's facade. The entablature and the flanking pilasters of the doorway are probably original.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The early owners of this building have not been documented. The house was apparently built between 1851 and 1872. It does appear on the 1872 Map of Newburyport although the owner is not noted.

In 1924 the house was owned by N. Arakelian.
