# Board of Health Meeting Minutes May 24, 2023

- I. Meeting called to order by Dr. Blair at 7:00pm
- II. Approval of Minutes from Previous MeetingsMotion to approve minutes made by Dr. Blair, seconded by Ms. Matta. Motion passes 3-
- III. Molly Ettenborough Recycling and Energy Manager, update board on contracting process and timing. Discuss possible scenarios for waste collection.
  - a. Ms. Ettenborough read Sec. 8-94. Responsibilities of collector.
    - i. The collector shall be required to comply with all responsibilities as required in the most recent contract or amendments there to between the City of Newburyport and said collector. If the City of Newburyport directly assumes the responsibility of collector then the city through its board of health shall develop a scope of responsibilities to identify all responsibilities of the city in collection of recyclables.
  - b. Ms. Ettenborough:
    - Newburyport currently has a contract with Mello that will end in June
       2023 and will increase 50% at that that time.
    - ii. City will sign a 1year contract and then go out to bid after that 1year contract ends.
    - iii. City council will have to review a new 5 year contract
    - iv. At this time, it appears that wind waste is asking for an additional 5% increase
    - v. Will have more information when bids are received
    - vi. Provided two handouts (see attached)
    - vii. Discussed possibly going to carts

- viii. Discussed possibly going to trash pickup every other week
- c. Dr. Tilson questioned what percent of our current trash is organic waste. Ms. Ettenborough responded with 18% not counting what is personally dropped off at the recycling center and what individuals compost at their homes.
- d. Dr. Blair stated he is in favor of weekly trash pick up
- e. Ms. Matta stated she is also in favor of weekly trash pick up
- f. Ms. Vlasuk stated that Everett has been using a cart program for approximately 15 years. Ms. Ettenborough stated she would be happy to reach out to Everett and will provide the board with additional information.
- g. Dr. Tilson agreed that weekly trash pickup is his preference and is worries about an increase in rodent activity.

#### IV. Shari Wilkinson and David Hall – Farmer Market fees

- a. Discussion took place over the 22 locations that would be attending the farmers market this year.
- b. Ms. Wilkinson discussed that Bob Bracy charged her \$900 two times per year and that was for summer and winter market, with the understanding that Ms. Wildinson collected all the paperwork.
- c. Mr. Hall inquired what the cost would be to cover the time the Health department spends on paperwork, permits and inspections?
- d. Ms. Matta asked what the cost to the vender is this year, it was stated that the cost is a onetime \$200 registration per vendor with an additional cost of \$50 per food vendor and \$45 per noon food vendor per week in addition to the Health Department cost.
- e. Ms. Matta asked if a discount was given by the Health Department would the cost to the vendor be reduced? Ms. Willinkson replied that the vendor price would not be reduced the price to cover the Health Department fees are in addition to her fees and must be covered by the vendor.
- f. Further discussion insured regarding the fees for the vendors.
- g. Dr. Tilson proposed that we track the time and cost of office labor and inspections during the 2023 farmers market and review the numbers at the end of the season to set the price for next year.
- h. Ms. Wilkinson agreed and advised the board that she would contact the Health Department to discuss fees on the agenda in January 2024 so she can start advising the vendors of the price.
- i. Dr. Blair motioned to charge the vendors a fee of \$950 for the 2023 farmers market and revisit the cost for next year in January. Dr. Tilson seconded the motion. Motion passed 3-0

- Northeast Massachusetts Mosquito Control and Wetlands Management will conduct helicopter application of biological larvicide between June 3 to June 10
- Health department is looking into offering a food drive. Would you like to hold the food dive from both the Health Department and the Mayor's office? We will deliver to the food pantry
- Cluster of Chicken-pocks at a school in town all protocol and follow up has been conducted. No further cases to date
- Vlasuk and Harris have started camp inspections
- Health department will be inspecting al AED machines in all town public buildings in June
- Vlasuk has started Animal regulations
- Request for CPR classes has come from the Senior Center. Health Department is working on booking a class before the summer ends.
- Package regarding a waiver for 8 Doyle Drive from Lisa Mead was handed out and Ms.
   Vlasuk asked that the board review and be prepared for discussion at next Board of Health meeting.

# **Recycling & Trash Collection**

For Residents and Businesses with Municipal Trash Collection

**Collection Schedule:** Trash is collected weekly.

Recyclables are collected every other week.

See pages 8-9 for street listings and schedule.

#### Recycling:

Residents are required to separate recyclable material from trash. (On City website, search for "Ordinances," then see Health and Sanitation Ordinance, Chapter 8, Article III, Division 1.)

The materials which must be recycled are lid (see photo on page cardboard, paper, glass bottles and jars, metal cans and aluminum foil/foil pans, and plastics with recycle numbers 1-7. (Sec. 8-93 Enforcement & Penalties. Failure to comply with recycling ordinance carries a \$100 fine.)

#### **Household Carts:**

Every household has one 64-gallon recycling cart. It is

black with a hinged 2).

#### Please label it with vour address.

The carts belong to the house and must be left at the house in the event of a move. If the cart is missing, residents may use any barrel which is clearly marked "Recycle." The City Health Department can

provide you with such labels.

#### **Cart Placement:**

Please remember to place the recycle carts three feet from other objects, with the wheels toward the house. Do not overfill barrels and please clean up after pickup.

# **Trash Reminders**

Bulk Items: for furniture and carpet (cut in 4-foot sections) must have a bulk sticker attached. No construction debris, large appliances or metal items allowed. Fees subject to change. Only one bulk item per week. Bulk stickers can be purchased at the customer service windows at Shaw's, Market Basket and at Richdale's on Pleasant Street or online for \$5.

Bulk stickers can also be ordered online. Visit

www.cityofnewburyport.com/ payments. Cost is \$5 per item, one item out per week.

#### **Mattresses and Textiles:**

items such as old clothes and fabrics are banned from trash disposal in Massachusetts. All must be recycled. Textile bins can be found near Nock/Molin or Bresnahan school driveways.

Mattress Recycling: so long as a mattress or box spring is dry, it can be recycled by UTEC for \$20 (will be \$30 come July 1st). Call 978-499 -0413 to register for a UTEC pick-up, or call to arrange to drop it off at the Newburyport Recycle Center. loosely. Use kitty litter for Futon mattresses are considered trash and should

be disposed of with a bulk sticker.

#### Mattresses and Box Springs:

if in good condition, they may find a new home via Newburyport Virtual Yard Sale, FreeCycle, or NextDoor.com.

#### **Construction Materials:**

(including toilets and sinks) must be taken to a disposal site and are not allowed in the trash. See list on page 4.

Latex Paint: dry it out, set up to 4 paint cans next to your trash, and put the lids on fast drying.

Trash is limited to 6 15gallon bags or 3 (32 gal) barrels per household each week. Barrels 64 gallons and larger will not be picked up.

Do not fill the barrel above the rim. Please bag all trash and clean up after your pick up. Put trash out after 5 PM the day before and before 7 AM the day of pick up. Bring empty barrels back in by 6

If your trash barrel does not have a hinged lid, please consider finding a way to attach the lid to the barrel.

# **Curbside Recycling Reminders**

- Recycling is mandatory and will be enforced.
- Recycling is single stream; place all recyclables in the same container. Set recycling carts and trash out by 7 AM on collection day.
- No plastic bags of any kind in recycling carts, even if they have a recycle number. The place to recycle plastic bags is in a supermarket's specially marked bin in front of the • Paper; recycle all your clean, non-food type paper!
- Large cardboard must be cut and folded so it is no more than 3 feet wide or tall. It must be bundled, tied, and left next to your container.
- No textiles; (i.e. fabric, clothing) must be put in recycling carts. Take to a thrift store or textile bin (see page 4).
- Containers must be rinsed or wiped out, but do not have Pizza boxes are recyclable or compostable as long as to be completely clean.
- No clothes hangers in recycling carts. Wire hangers may be taken to dry cleaners. Plastic hangers can go to the Recycling Center.
- No electronics, batteries, cell phones, oil, oil-based paint, fluorescent bulbs (including CFLs), appliances (large or small), plant containers, plastic bags or Styrofoam in recycling carts. These items can be recycled at the Recycling Center (see page 3).
- Glass bottles/jars must be clear, green, or brown in a curbside recycling bin. No broken glass or other glass such as light bulbs, window or auto glass, dishes, glasses or Pyrex (see page 4).
- Metal items other than food cans may not go in curbside carts. Other metal (e.g. pots and pans, grills) may be taken to the Recycle Center (see page 3).

- Plastic containers which have recycle symbols 1 7 are allowed. No un-numbered plastics. Leave plastic caps/ lids on plastic bottles.
- No Styrofoam, even if labeled "recyclable." Put in trash or take non-food types to Colby Farm Lane Recycling Center (see page 3).
- Styrofoam peanuts and bubble wrap can go to Pak Mail.
- Tin, steel, and aluminum: Food cans and lids, deposit and non-deposit beverage cans (can be flattened), clean aluminum foil and foil pans, and empty aerosol cans are okay. No cans which contained hazardous material or paint.
- there is no food, food residue or plastic inside the box.
- You may use an overflow barrel if clearly marked and placed close to recycling cart.

# **Bagged Leaves & Christmas Trees**

- Bagged leaf collections will take place on the following Saturdays: November 4, November 18, December 2, 2023, then April 27 and May 11, 2024.
- Leaves and trees must be curbside by 6 AM
- Place leaves only in brown leaf bags or loose in a marked barrel. Please fold bags over at the top.
- Leaves will be going to a farm for composting so please keep trash out of the leaf bags.
- Christmas tree collections will take place during the month of January only.
- Do not bag or leave any materials on trees.
- Trees over 6 feet must be cut down in size.
- Trash pick up may be delayed during Christmas tree weeks.
- Bring wreaths to Colby Farm Lane Yard Waste Facility or Recycle Center.

# Hard to Dispose of Items and Where to Bring Them

Colby Farm Lane Recycling Center is open the first Saturday of every month, 8 am to 12 pm.

Call for additional weekday hours at 978-499-0413 \*Fees subject to change

- Air Conditioners: contain Freon. Bring to Recycling Center. Fee applies.\*
- Antifreeze: bring to Recycling Center. No fee.\*
- Appliances: bring to scrap metal dealer or to Recycling Center. Fee applies.\*
- Asphalt, Brick, Concrete, or Clean Fill: Miles River (978-356-2290) or asphalt only, Brox (978-356-7475).
- Automotive Fluids: some (motor oil, brake fluid, hydraulic oil, transmission fluid and antifreeze) can be brought Recycling Center.\* Others, especially flammable liquids, will be accepted on Household Hazardous Waste Days (see p. 3).
- Batteries: rechargeable, car, and boat batteries can be brought to the Recycling Center.\*
- Bicycles: bring to Recycling Center.
- Boat Flares: bring to Fire Department.
- **Books:** donate to local libraries for book sales, or offer to Jabberwocky Bookstore for credit. If books are not accepted, drop in Recycle That containers at Bresnahan School entrance off N. Atkinson Street.
- Cardboard: take large amounts to Recycling Center\*. For Mello curbside, it must be no more than 3 feet long or wide, must be flattened and bound by string, twine or tape.
- Carpets and Rugs: put out with bulk sticker that can be purchased for \$5 at grocery stores or Richdales or on city website .
- Cartons: milk, juice, and broth cartons now go in trash.
- Cell phones and Ink Jet Cartridges: bring to Recycling Department in City Hall or to Recycling Center.\*
- Clothing/Textiles: old clothing, shoes, blankets, stuffed animals, etc. leave in white recycling bins at Nock/Molin School or Bresnahan School driveway, Recycling Center or Yard Waste Facility.
- Tires: bring to Recycling Center. \$3 fee per tire.\*
- Computers, Monitors, Laptops, Keyboards, Mice, Chargers, Cords: Recycling Center\*. Fees for computers/monitors.
- Confidential Material: save for next shredding day; Saturday, September 9, 2023 (16A Perry Way).
- Construction Material, Toilets and Non-Metal Sinks and Doors: Call G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Cooking Grease & Oil: never put grease or oil down the drain. Bring used oil to the Recycling Center. Cool or freeze grease in a waxed container and throw it away in your trash.
- Dehumidifiers: bring to Recycling Center. Fee applies.\*
- Electronics: bring to Recycling Center. Fee applies for larger items.\*
- Fluorescent Light Bulbs: bring to Recycling Center.\*
- Foam Plastics: #6 (Styrofoam,) white only. #4 "squishy" foam packaging (LDPE), any color. Bring to Recycling Center.\*
- Food Waste: see page 5 for all options.
- Furniture (Nonmetal): if you can't donate it to a drop off or pick up service or an online site, put on trash day with bulk sticker that can be ordered on the City's website under "Make A Payment" or at customer service at Shaw's, Market Basket or Richdale's.
- Gas Grills: remove propane tank and rocks; bring to scrap metal dealer or Recycling Center for drop off.
- Glass: jars and bottles go in curbside recycling. Incandescent bulbs go in the trash. Fluorescent bulbs to Recycling Center.\* Wrap broken glass with tape for the trash. Glasses, Pyrex, and dishes for re-use. See page 2.
- Grease/Oil: never put down the drain. Bring to Recycling Center or cool and put in your trash.
- Gutters: aluminum gutters may be brought to scrap metal dealer or brought to Recycling Center.\* Wood gutters may be brought to disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Helium Tanks: bring to Recycling Center. Fees apply.\*
- Latex Paints: for curbside pick up, dry paint completely (use kitty litter), set next to trash with lid on loosely. Only four cans per week.
- Lumber: call disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581 or Pearson 978-465-3649.
- Mattress and Box Springs: see page 1.
- Medical Syringes/Lancets: must be disposed of properly. See page 7.
- Mercury Products: such as thermostats and thermometers, blood pressure cuffs, barometers bring to Recycling Center.\*
- Metal Goods: appliances, bikes, water heaters, etc. go to scrap metal dealer or Recycling Center.\* Fees may apply.\*
- Microwaves: bring to Recycling Center. Small fee applies.\*
- Mirrors: cover most of the surface with tape to keep glass from shattering. If it doesn't fit in a trash can, purchase a bulk sticker.
- Motor Oil (Used): bring to Recycling Center. Fee applies.\*
- Needles/Syringes/Lancets: must be disposed of properly. See p. 7.
- Oil-Based Paint: bring to one of Household Hazardous Waste Days (see p. 3). Fee applies.
- Plastics: rigid items such as trash cans, play equipment, etc. No metal parts. Can be brought to Recycling Center\*.
- Plastic Bags: all plastic bags must be recycled at supermarkets.
- Propane Tanks: bring to Kelly's Ace Hardware in Newburyport or Stop & Shop in Amesbury. Fees apply.\*
- Recyclables: large quantities of recyclable containers and newspapers may be brought to G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Refrigerators and Freezers: see National Grid website for pick up or call 1-877-889-4761 for pick-ups and possible rebate.
- Smoke Detectors: bring to City Hall Recycling Department or Recycling Center\*.
- Solvents, Chemicals, Pesticides, Etc.: bring to next Household Hazardous Waste Day (see page 3). Fees apply.\*
- Styrofoam: WHITE packing forms only. Please remove stickers/tape. No food containers. Bring to the Recycling Center.\* Peanuts go to Pak-Mail.
- **Televisions:** working flat-screen TVs that were made within the last five years can be donated to Goodwill in Seabrook. Best Buy accepts some TVs (call to verify). Any TV can be dropped off at the Recycling Center\*. Fees apply.
- Toxic/Hazardous Chemicals: bring to Household Hazardous Waste Day on Saturday, September 9, 2023-see p. 3. Fees apply.
- Windows: disposal company like G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.
- Wooden Items: large wooden items will not be accepted at the curb. Call G. Mello Disposal, 978-352-8581.

# **Burning**

The season for open burning is from January 15 to May 1 from 10 am to 4 pm. Property owners must obtain a valid permit from the fire department (978-465-4427) before conducting any open burning. Permits allow the burning of brush, cane, driftwood, and forest debris but prohibit the burning of grass, hay, leaves and tires. Keep fire suppression tools handy and monitor the burn closely until it is dead out.

# S.O.S. Save Our Sewers

Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) are a major cause of plumbing back ups in homes and in the City sewer system that YOU can help prevent.



Never pour grease or other household oils down sinks or toilets. Pour cooled cooking fats, oils and grease into a waxed food container and dispose of it in the garbage or bring to Recycle Center.

# Massachusetts is an Idle Free Zone

Massachusetts law prohibits unnecessary and unattended engine idling. Violators can be punished by a fine up to \$100. Turning off your engine, protects:





- The environment. Idling engines contribute to smog and global warming.
- Our health. Exhaust pollution is harmful to people and animals.
- Your money. The less fuel your engine consumes, the more money you save.
- Your engine. Idling gradually wears out components such as engine oil, spark plugs, and the exhaust system.


Turn off the engine as soon as you end your trip. You'll be protecting the environment, your health, and saving money. Idling gets you nowhere.

# Don't Waste Food Waste

Conserve nutrients in food scraps and reduce your trash up to 40%. There are three options in Newburyport to compost:







- 3. Drop off your food waste in paper or compostable bags at any of these three sites:
  - 115 Water Street, past parking area on left
  - Buck Street (Cushing Park)
  - Yard Waste Facility, at gate, Colby Farm Lane

#### Purchase a Discounted Composter

The City of Newburyport sells backyard composters, known as the Earth Machine, designed to compost food (no meat, cheese or bones) and yard waste. It will provide an all-natural nutrient-rich supplement for gardens or lawns. The 80-gallon bins are sold at the Colby Farm Lane Yard Waste site for \$35 for residents, and \$46 for non-residents.

# Animal Control Services, 978-465-4410

- **Dog Licenses:** All dogs six months of age or older must be licensed with the City through the City Clerk's Office by April 1 each year (after June 1, late fees will apply.)
- License Fees: Neutered/spayed dogs; \$10. Reproductively intact dogs; \$15.
  - Fee is waived for Senior Citizens age 65 and over; and for individuals who are blind, deaf or mobility impaired.
- **Lost & Found Pets:** To report a lost or found pet, call 978-465-4410 . On nights and weekends, contact the Police Department at 978-462-4411.
- **Leash Law Section 3-26:** No person shall own or keep in the City, outside the confines of the owner's or keeper's property, any dog which is not held firmly on a leash. Failure to comply with subsection (a) shall be punishable by the following schedule of fines: First offense is \$50.00; second offense is \$75.00; third offense is \$100.00.
- Dogs On Beaches & Rail Trail: Dogs are NOT allowed on any part of the public beach between May 15 and September 15. From September 16 through May 14, dogs are allowed on beach; however, they **must** be held firmly on a leash at all times. Dogs are allowed on the Rail Trail (year round) but must be held firmly on a leash (including on the portion of the Rail Trail between Cashman off-leash area and the river).
- Pet Waste Disposal: Dog waste must never be thrown in someone else's trash or in Recycle Containers Disposal of Animal Waste: Section 3-2: All persons owning or in custody of an animal will be responsible for removal and disposal of that animal's waste. The fine for violation of this provision for the first offense shall be \$50.; for second offense \$75.; third subsequent offenses \$100.

#### ANIMAL RELATED EMERGENCIES

An emergency complaint is one that requires immediate action from the Animal Control Officer. Incidents qualifying as an emergency complaint are those in which there is imminent threat to human life or an injury to a domestic animal. Examples of emergency complaints include:

- Domestic animal hit by car and injured
- Canine bite, attack or mauling in progress
- Potentially rabid animal having contact with human or domestic animal
- At large dogs acting vicious or posing a threat to a human or other animal
- Large dead animal disrupting traffic flow

**NOTE:** Loose dogs or dogs in custody are **NOT** an emergency. The on-call ACO working nights and weekends cannot respond to loose dogs or dogs in custody.

#### **NON-EMERGENCY COMPLAINTS**

All other complaints are non-emergency complaints. Non-emergency complaints are those that do not pose a threat to life, public safety or danger of serious injury to the public or animals. Non-emergency complaints do not require immediate action from the Animal Control Officer and shall be investigated during normal business hours. Examples of non-emergency complaints include:

- Dead animals on the side of road or in public areas not disrupting traffic
- · Loose or lost domestic animals
- Stray domestic animals
- Violations of animal control ordinances which do not pose a threat to public safety

Three important steps to prepare for an emergency at the power plant is to:

- 1. Sign up for Code Red notifications for radiological emergency at Seabrook Power Station on the health department website.
- 2. Plan your evacuation route and have an emergency plan for you, your family, and your pets.
- 3. Pick up your KI tablets free of charge during normal business hours at the Health Department.

# North Shore Mother Visiting Partnership

The nurse will visit a mother or caregiver, ideally within 12 weeks (but up to one year) of giving birth or adopting a baby, regardless of the mother's age, insurance, income or number of children. The visit will last approximately 1 ½ hours and will take place in the mother's home or at a mutually agreed upon location. Please be assured that COVID precautions will be taken to protect the health of you and your little one. The visit includes a weight check for baby, breastfeeding and newborn care support, local resource guide, and an infant CPR/ choke saving demonstration. Caregivers will also receive a giftbox filled with items for mom and baby. All services provided by the Public Health Nurse are free and confidential. # Department of Public Health advises consumers to discard mung bean sprouts from Chang Farm

Company recalls product due to ongoing Listeria contamination

**BOSTON** — The Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) is advising consumers that Chang Farm in Whatley, MA is recalling mung bean sprouts because of the possible presence of *Listeria monocytogenes* contamination. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced last week that Chang Farm has voluntarily recalled all 10-pound bulk bags, as well as 12-ounce retail bags with a sell-by date of May 7, 2023. Affected products are sold under the brands Chang Farm and Nature's Wonder.

Based on preliminary State Public Health Laboratory results, DPH suspects mung bean sprouts with a sell-by date **beyond** May 7, 2023 may also be contaminated and advises that individuals not consume **ANY** mung bean sprouts from Chang Farm until further notice. Chang Farm is cooperating with state authorities and has agreed to suspend operations and distribution of this product pending further investigation of the source of this contamination.

*Listeria monocytogenes* is an organism that can cause serious and sometimes fatal infections in young children, frail or elderly people, people who are pregnant, and those with weakened immune systems. Although healthy individuals may suffer only short-term symptoms such as high fever, severe headaches, stiffness, nausea, abdominal pain, and diarrhea, *Listeria* infection can cause miscarriages and stillbirths among people who are pregnant.

The products were distributed to retail stores and wholesalers throughout Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, and New Jersey.

If mung bean sprouts from Chang Farm were or are in your home:

- Dispose of products in a closed plastic bag placed in a sealed trash can to prevent people and animals from eating the products.
- Wash the inside walls and shelves of the refrigerator, cutting boards, and countertops; then sanitize these items with a solution of one tablespoon of chlorine bleach to one gallon of hot water.
- Dry these items with a clean cloth or clean paper towel.
- Wipe up spills in the refrigerator immediately and clean the refrigerator regularly.
- Always wash your hands with warm water and soap after cleaning and sanitizing.

#### AERIAL APPLICATION TO CONTROL MOSQUITO LARVAE

#### ON COASTAL SALT MARSHES AND UPLAND HABITAT.

The Northeast Massachusetts Mosquito Control and Wetlands Management District will conduct helicopter applications of the biological larvicide, VectoBac12AS (EPA reg. 73049-38) to control mosquito larvae over salt marshes in Salisbury, Newburyport, Newbury, Rowley, and Ipswich, and any other new subscribing community if requested.

Applications will be conducted as necessary during daylight hours from June 3rd through June 10th, 2023.

The material to be applied, is a natural bacterium found in soil and water. VectoBac12AS is a very selective larvicide with little or no effect on humans, pets, wildlife, pollinators, and most other beneficial insects. VectoBac12AS targets mosquito larvae and a few other closely related aquatic insects in the fly family. The VectoBac12AS will be applied by helicopter flying low and directly over the salt marsh and or upland habitat.

Residents need not take any special precautions due to the safety of VectoBac12AS and because the application will occur directly over wetlands.
