### Harmony sought between trees, power lines

NEWBURYPORT — Power lines and trees don't make for a good mix, and a new plan will see to it that both get their own space along the city's streets.

Newburyport will receive a \$15,000 grant to plant trees throughout designated parts of the city. The work will involve transplanting young trees along major streets and in municipal cemeteries. The money comes from National Grid, which has created a "releafing" program.

Officials of National Crid say the intent of the program is to transplant young trees from the "wrong" locations (under overhead wires) to sites that are the "right" locations, sectors that are not near utility lines.

Forestry volunteers in Newburyport will help implement the transplanting.

Edward M. Lambert, commissioner of the Department of Conservation and Recreation, made the presentation yesterday to Mayor Donna Holaday.

"Newburyport submitted a well-researched proposal," Lambert said. "The trees that are planted will provide shade cover in the future in areas that are best suited for trees."

Holaday said, "Newburyport is a city that values its trees and landscaping. This grant will be helpful."


Several students from the River Valley Charter School attended in recognition of the fact the school has been planting trees in the city for close to seven years.


State Rep. Mike Costello, D-Newburyport, said, "This is a beautiful city, and programs like this will help it to maintain its attractive appearance.

\*Over the last two decades Newburyport has reinvigorated our tree-planting program, and this grant will help foster the continued growth.\*

The award was part of \$80,470 in state urban forestry grants.

Other communities or nonprofit organizations that received grants include the city of Beverly, the town of Rutland, the Worcester Tree Initiative in Partnership with the Worcester Youth Center and the Boston Natural Areas Network.





### MANAGING THE URBAN FOREST FOR MASSACHUSETTS MUNICIPALITIES

### A White Paper by Jeff Esche

Public trees are a fixture of city life, required, on an almost subconscious level, by most citizens. Planting trees is a reflexive civic activity and is too often the first activity of only two city activities, the second activity being cutting them down when they become hazardous or cleaning them up when they fall on their own.

City trees are city assets, as are buildings and police cars. All return benefits to the city, all have acquisition. Maintenance and disposal costs. For trees in Newburyport these costs are not identified and as a result the asset is ignored, acquisition is haphazard, no maintenance is provided and the asset, after decades of providing ecological benefits, is scrapped, at the cities' expense, with no recovery.

Historically, this present practice of city tree management in Newburyport is a severe step backwards from the practices of the past 3000 years in which communities managed their forests as sustainable working assets.

Settlers in Massachusetts applied the laws and customs of the English practice, including that of community property including commons, rights-of-way, and natural resources, such as deer and trees with a system of responsibility invested in Wardens. Massachusetts, indeed, founded the first Tree Warden Association in 1913, a time when scientific study of trees and forests were relatively new. The old wardens worked from "handed down" knowledge and "hands on" experience of their forests, wild or urban.

However, the growing urban infrastructure, new challenges from imported pests and pathogens, including Dutch Elm Disease and now the Asian Longhorn Beetle, raised the challenge level for wardens. The  $20^{\rm th}$  century marked the rise of large scale challenges in forestry and the entry of higher levels of government into the fray, but the community tree warden continued to be the "front line" of Urban Forestry – until Proposition  $2 \frac{1}{2}$ .

The old wardens are gone, municipalities feel they cannot afford qualified Wardens and today designated Wardens, often operating without working knowledge of the urban forest are reactively engaged in removing the aging assets.

However, larger government units both demand and support urban forest management. These agencies consider the community Tree Warden still to be the 'front line" in the urban forest.

Following are excerpts and Web links describing the requirements and the support roles of various agencies and organizations engaged in shaping and supporting municipalities in managing the urban forest.

### Massachusetts General Laws, Part I, Title VII, Chapt 41, Section 106

Section 106 (excerpt)

In any city or in a town which exceeds ten thousand inhabitants and which provides by vote, by-law or by ordinance that the tree warden shall be appointed, such appointment shall be made by the mayor, with the approval of the city council or by the board of selectmen. In such city or town, the tree warden shall exercise the duties of tree warden and of insect pest control. Such tree warden shall be qualified by training and experience in the field of arborculture, and licersed with the department of food and agriculture in accordance with the provisions of section ten of Chapter 132 B. The term of such appointment shall be for three years."

### Massachusetts General Laws, Part I, Title XIX, Chapt 132, Section 16

Section 16. Any city or town, which has a public shade tree inventory, not more than five years old, a public shade tree management plan approved by the state forester, and is in compliance with all requirements of law as well as any rules and regulations of the chief superintendent pertaining thereto, may apply to the bureau of shade tree management and pest control, for partial reimbursement of total expenditures made during the calendar year for the care, control and management of their public shade trees. Compensable activities include, but are not limited to, the planting, pruning, and removal of public shade trees.
