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



Assistance to Firefighters Grant Match

The Newburyport Fire Department was awarded a federal grant through FEMA and DHS Assistance to Firefighter Grant Program. The total project award is \$91,100.00. The Federal share is 95 percent or \$86,545.00 of the approved amount and the city cost is 5 percent or \$4,555.00.

This annual grant process is highly competitive. The Newburyport Fire Department has been very successful in obtaining these grants to assist in purchasing capital items for the department. In the past the grants received have purchased the 4x4 Forestry firefighting vehicle, emergency generators for each station, reflective highway safety vests, new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA's) and new portable radios for our personnel.

This grant is for the purchase of safety related equipment. This equipment includes the purchase of Thermal Imaging Cameras and four gas detectors for each of the apparatus. Also it includes the purchase of Personal Alert Safety Devices (PASS Alarms) and high intensity flashlights for each firefighter to wear on their protective gear.

The department is in the process of getting pricing and evaluating different brands of equipment for the above purchase.

Before the department can purchase this equipment and receive the Federal share of the grant the city must place into the grant account the city share of the grant.

I have attached a transfer request for \$4,555.00 for this purpose.

THAT the City Council authorizes the Mayor to acquire and accept on behalf of the City such easements, long-term leases and/or other interests in land in the Town of Newbury from National Grid and the Town of Newbury as are necessary to provide for the construction and public use of the Harborwalk/Clipper City Rail Trail, the approximate location of such trail in Newbury being shown on a conceptual plan prepared by Stantec entitled: "Preliminary Path Alignment, Clipper City Rail Trail – Phase 2, City of Newburyport, MA, 03-27-12", and further authorizes the Mayor on behalf of the City to seek such approval of the General Court as may be necessary for said acquisition, as set forth below, provided that the General Court may make clerical and editorial changes of form only to the bill unless the Mayor approves amendments to the bill prior to enactment by the General Court, and to authorize the Mayor to approve such amendments which shall be within the public purposes of the petition.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF NEWBURYPORT TO ACQUIRE INTERESTS IN LAND IN THE TOWN OF NEWBURY

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding section 16 of chapter 30B of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, the city of Newburyport may enter into a lease agreement with National Grid to provide for the public use of the inhabitants of Newburyport of the land located off Parker Street in the town of Newbury and shown as Parcels 5, 6 and 7 on a plan recorded with the Essex County Registry of Deeds, Southern District, in Plan Book 57, Plan 84. The term of the lease shall be for not more than 99 years and for such terms and conditions as the city of Newburyport and National Grid deem appropriate.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding section 16 of chapter 30B of the General Laws or any other general or special law to the contrary, the city of Newburyport may acquire and hold for the public use of the inhabitants of Newburyport an interest in land on Parker Street in the town of Newbury described as Parcel 1 in a deed

recorded with the Essex County Registry of Deeds, Southern District, in Book 25956, Page 212, and may hold such land in common with the town of Newbury.

SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

In order to comply with state and federal requirements for funding the construction of the Clipper City Rail Trail Phase II, the City needs to secure a long-term lease on parcels owned by National Grid off of Parker Road in the Town of Newbury, as well as ensure the use of the adjacent parcel of land owned by the Town of Newbury for the Rail Trail. Due to the location of these parcels across the municipal boundary in Newbury, the City needs special legislation approved by the state legislature to authorize our securing a property interest in this part of the corridor. We respectfully request your authorization to seek this legislative approval and secure property interests that will be satisfactory to the state and federal transportation authorities.

The proposed City Council Order and draft legislation have been prepared by the City Solicitor. We have coordinated with Representative Costello's office on this matter, as well as the Chief Counsel of the House of Representatives, and MassDOT's Right-of-Way Compliance Administrator.

Phase II of the multi-use Clipper City Rail Trail will extend and build upon the very successful first phase of the Rail Trail, and will 1.5 miles travel along the waterfront and through the South End. Phase II will provide Newburyport with additional opportunities for recreation and transportation, physical activity, neighborhood sociability, and connections to parks, the downtown, and neighborhoods. The pathway will travel east from the central waterfront through the existing waterfront land uses, past the Coast Guard and the Newburyport Art Association, along the waterfront of the utility substation, and then along the shoreline with gorgeous views across the tidal flats to the mouth of the Merrimack River. Connecting with Joppa Park, the trail will turn inland and follow the old rail corridor through the South End, providing multiple neighborhood access points. Travelling through the High Street underpass and making a connection with March's Hill park, the pathway will then wind through the 10 acres of woodlands acquired from B&M Railroad to Parker Street in Newbury, largely avoiding the overhead utility lines. (A connection south from Parker Street across the Route 1 highway to the MBTA commuter rail station will need to wait until Phase III.) The contiguous pathway will have a diverse and interesting character, shifting between the busy waterfront, the South End residential neighborhood, and forestland.

Approximately 95% of the Phase II Rail Trail will be in Newburyport and about 5% will be in Newbury. The connectedness of such a trail to neighborhoods and the existing transportation network is key to its functionality, and Parker Street in Newbury is a commonsense trailhead on the southern end of the trail with

opportunities for on-street parking, as opposed to staying only on City property and dead-ending in the middle of the forest at the town line. The Town of Newbury has been consistently supportive of the City developing the Rail Trail and making the connection to Parker Street, as expressed by Town Meeting, the Select Board, and the Town Administrator.



We are currently in the process of developing the preliminary design of Phase II of the Clipper City Rail Trail, and anticipate a public meeting at the end of June and a 25% plan submission in late summer or early fall. MassDOT and the Merrimack Valley Metropolitan Planning Organization have categorized the project as a statewide Transportation Enhancement priority, and are recommending construction funding for the trail in 2015. It is possible that construction funding could be made available earlier if we complete design, permitting, and all approvals in the next year and are "shovel-ready." Based on the legislative and electoral cycle, Representative Costello's office has recommended that we seek this special legislation now, or we will have to wait another year.



AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED LICENSES, PERMITS AND BUSINESS REGULATIONS

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newburyport as follows:

Chapter 9 Licenses, Permits and Business Regulations

Article V Junk Dealers and Collectors

Sec. 9-61, 63, 66

Sec. 9-61(a). - Definitions

Junk. Old or scrap copper, brass, rope, rags, batteries, paper trash, rubber debris, waste or junked, dismantled or wrecked automobiles or parts thereof, iron, steel and other old scrap ferrous or nonferrous material as defined by MGL Chapter 140B Sec 1 as amended.

Old Metals. Any object constructed of or electroplated with gold, silver or platinum regardless of its form, weight or appearance.

Sec. 9-61(b). - Licenses conditional.

All licenses which shall be granted according to law to any persons to be keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals or secondhand articles, or dealers therein, shall contain the conditions and restrictions set forth in this article. (Code 1971, § 13-1)

Sec. 9-62. - License fee.

Every person receiving a license issued pursuant to this article, at the time of receiving the same, shall pay the following fee therefor:

- (1) Junk dealer or collector. For each license to be a dealer in and collector of junk, old metals and secondhand articles, a sum of ten dollars (\$10.00).
- (2) Keeper of a secondhand shop. For each license to be keeper of a shop for the purchase, sale or barter of secondhand articles other than junk and old metals, the sum of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00).
- (3) Keeper of a junk and old metals shop. For each license to be a keeper of a shop for the purchase, sale or barter of junk and old metals, the sum of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00). (Code 1971, § 13-2)

Sec. 9-63. - Purchase records book to be kept; inspection of book.

- (a) Every keeper of a shop licensed under this article shall keep a book in which shall be written at the time of every purchase of any article of junk, old metals or secondhand articles the following:
 - (1) A description of the article or articles purchased including the weight and current market value.
 - (2) The name, age and residence of the person from whom, and the day and hour when such purchase was made.

- (b) Such book shall at all times be open to the inspection of the mayor and city council of the city, and to any person by them respectively authorized to make such inspection. Every such shop keeper shall require a person from whom he or she makes a purchase to provide positive identification (positive identification shall mean any picture identification card by a governmental agency) to ensure the aforementioned information is accurate.
- (c) Every shopkeeper licensed pursuant to this article shall fill out and deliver to the Office of the City Marshall each week or more often if requested, a legible and true copy of all entries made the preceding week in the record required to be kept by this article. The form of such delivery shall be pre-arranged through each shop and the Office of the City Marshall. (Code 1971, § 13-3)

Sec. 9-64. - Name and occupation of licensee to be posted at place of business and on vehicles.

Every keeper of a shop licensed under this article shall put in some suitable and conspicuous place on his shop a sign having his name and occupation legibly inscribed thereon in large letters, and each licensed person using a team or other vehicle in his business shall have his name and the number of his license inscribed on the vehicle in like manner, and such shops and vehicles, and all articles of merchandise therein may be examined by the mayor and city council, or by any person by them respectively authorized to make such examination at all times. (Code 1971, § 13-4)

Sec. 9-65. - Purchase, receipt from minors.

No keeper of a shop licensed under this article shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive by way of barter or exchange, any of the articles regulated by this article of any minor. (Code 1971, § 13-6)


Sec. 9-66. - When material may be sold.

No article purchased or received by a shop or a person licensed under this article shall be sold until a period of at least two (2) weeks from the date of its purchase or receipt shall have elapsed. (Code 1971, § 13-7)

Sec. 9-67. - Penalty

Any person who acts as a dealer in or keeper of a shop for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals or second hand articles without a license, or in any other place or manner that is designated in his/her license or after notice such license has been revoked or violates any such rule, regulation or restriction of the article, shall forfeit \$200.00 for each said violation.
