ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is a vernacular example of the Second Empire style popular during the later decades of the nineteenth century. The house has the mansard roof and dormer windows associated with the style. The turned brackets along the cornice and at the doorway are also typical of the period. Unfortunately the doorway has been extensively altered in the present century.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built between 1866 and 1871. The original owner was quite possibly Hiram Leach who was living in the house in 1871. Leach was a ship carpenter and built his home in the North End to be close to the shipbuilding industry which prospered on the banks of the Merrimack until the end of the 19th century. As the industry grew the men involved in the shipbuilding and its allied trades built homes on the streets extending from Merrimac Street to High Street. The homes on the streets like Broad, Oakland and Tyng Street were tied to the shipbuilding industry until its decline at the turn of this century. Hiram Leach lived here until that time.
