

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is a fine example of the two story Georgian dwellings built in Newburyport during the mid-eighteenth century. The house is, in fact, two attached dwellings. If detached, each would have a symmetrical five bay facade. The building is two stories in height and has a hipped roof. Each of the dwellings has a central chimney. The doorways have been altered and retain little of their original architectural character.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The earliest owners of this house have yet to be documented. It is quite possible that this house was owned by Offin Boardman. Boardman laid out a way through his land in 1754. It was thereafter called Boardman's Lane. Offin Boardman was the owner of several Merrimack-built vessels.

In 1851 this property was owned by Mrs. Judith Boardman. Also in residence at the time was Greenleaf Boardman who ran a livery stable on Herrimac Street. Prior to 1872 the property was conveyed to Mrs. Hannah T Marshall. Also in residence at that time was Henry O. Marshall mariner, and Offin B. Marshall, carpenter. Later Offin B. Marshall willed the house to Alice V. Goodwin who owned it until 1927.
