ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is a good example of the large homes built in Newburyport during the Federal period. The three story building with hipped roof and symmetrical five bay facade, is typically Federal in form. The dentil cornice is worthy of note. The front entrance has been altered and retains little of its original character.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The original owner and builder of this house has yet to be documented. According to the 1872 "Plan of the City of Newburyport", William B. Goodwin was the owner of the property. Goodwin was a blacksmith.

This house has been divided into apartments and presently contains six dwelling units.
