ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This one and a half story house with pitched roof and symmetrical five bay facade is Greek Revival in style. Interesting features of the house include the center chimney and the front entrance. The doorway is typically Greek Revival in style. The door is flanked by sidelights and pilasters supporting a heavy entablature above.

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HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was probably built by a member of the Jackman family. In 1872 the owner was H. Jackman. According to the City Directory of that year this could have been Henry Jackman, house carpenter or Humphrey Jackman, shoemaker. The house remained in the Jackman family for over fifty years. In 1924 Ada Jackman was the owner. She sold the property to Minnie Snyder in 1930.

This house is a fine example of a mid-nineteenth century dwelling as built by working class residents of the community.
