ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Though clearly Greek Revival this house has been altered and therefore is not the best example of a house from that period. The house does retain the gable roof with continuous cornice suggestive of a Greek pediment. The heavy fascia in the cornice is also clearly a Greek feature as are the building's cornerboards. The bay windows and the enclosed entrance porch were probably added in the later part of the nineteenth century.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built prior to 1851 and was at that time owned by Thomas H. Cutter. He could very well have been the original owner.

Cutter was a printer and his business was located at 46 Merrimack Street. Cutter served as an alderman from Ward Five in 1865. Cutter owned this property into the 1880's.

Between 1963 and 1980 this house was owned by the First Religious Society of Newburyport and was used as a parsonage.
