ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This two story building with pitched roof is vernacular in style but was clearly influenced by the Georgian style. The assymetrical facade is an indication that this house may have been built in several phases. The architectural details of this building are simple. It is concentrated in the front entrance which has been replaced and is presently Greek Revival in style. This home is like many of those destroyed when Route 1 was built through this neighborhood in 1934.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The earliest owners of this house have yet to be documented. The house was probably built by one of the families associated with the trades that prospered on the banks of the Merrimack River during the eighteenth century.

In 1851, John B. Mansfield, an operative, probably working in one of Newburyport's textile mills was a boarder here. It is possible that this tlding served as a boarding house during the mid-nineteenth century.
