ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is one of the earlier houses built on High Street. Stylistically the house could have been built as early as the second quarter of the eighteenth century. The large central chimney, the nine lights over six in the double hung window sash and the heavy architrave surrounding the windows are all indicative of an early construction date. The entrance porch of the front door could easily date from the second quarter of this century. It may have been added to the house after the initial construction period.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The original owner and builder of this house are unknown. It certainly dates from the second or third quarter of the eighteenth century and is an excellent example of the large home of the period.

The earliest owner of this house that has been documented is Francis Lord. Lord lived in the house in 1872 and stayed there until at least 1884. Lord was a blacksmith and his blacksmith shop was located on the lot adjacent to the house.
