ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

Architecturally this building is of interest because it was once attached to a twelve bay brick row which has been destroyed. The house is two stories with a pitched roof. It is Federal in style although this is evident only in the splayed window lintels and the arched front doorway. The wooden cornice is simple yet Federal in style.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was probably built about 1815. The earliest owners of the structure have yet to be documented.

In 1851 Samuel Stevens, a merchant, was the owner of this house. Stevens was part owner of the steamer, "C. B. Stevens" built in 1851. In 1863 Stevens contributed to the public library fund. He moved to Boston about 1863.

By 1872 the house had been sold to Rufus Cook. He and his wife owned the house for several decades. In 1924, Marcia L. Field, a shoeworker, owned and occupied 36 Middle Street. This house is still a single family residence.
