Development

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This building is a good example of the Georgian Revival in Newburyport. It has several features typical of the style including the rectangular plan, hipped roof, and use of Palladian window. Originally the flat deck at the roof's ridge was surrounded by a balustrade. This too is a typical feature of the Georgian Revival as are roof dormers. Another significant alteration has been made to this structure. Originally the front porch area was surrounded simply by a baluster. The doorway had a classical portico an unusual feature in the Georgian Revival but one that did occur.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

In 1886 Eliphalet Griffin and several other Newburyport citizens organized a society that was incorporated under the name of the Newburyport Society for the Relief of Aged Men. In 1890 Griffin contributed a sum of money and a lot of land in the vicinity of the "Three Roads" to the Society. In 1896 he built at his own expense the foundation for a brick building completed several years later by the trustees.

In 1902 four aged men were admitted to the home. The building has contributed to the care of Newburyport's elderly residents since that date.
