ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This one and a half story house with mansard roof is vernacular in style. It exhibits features of several of the Victorian styles popular toward the end of the nineteenth century. The mansard roof is characteristic of the Second Empire style. The pedimented dormers were inspired by the popular Italianate styles. The dentil cornice, bay window, and simple entrance porch are classical in nature and may be early twentieth century additions to the structure. The ottagonal cupola is worthy of note and probably dates from the original period of construction.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The original owner of this building has yet to be documented. The structure was built at the end of the nineteenth century. The original owner could very well have been Horace A. Hawkes. At his death Hawkes willed the property to his daughter, Mary A. Gooch. In 1927 she sold the house to Joseph A. Gagnon.
