ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This vernacular two story house with pitched roof and three bay facade is typical of the small Georgian homes built in Newburyport during the eighteenth century. Much of the building's architectural detail has been lost. The original doorway remains however. The door is flanked by pilasters supporting a classical entablature above. This is a typical late eighteenth century front entrance.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The earliest owners of this house have yet to be documented. It was probably built by one of the shipbuilders in the North End or by a farmer on the outlying area of the shipbuilding district.

In 1912 Admlia R. Church sold this house to George W. Hodgdon who owned the property until 1919. At that time the house was purchased by bert L. Lowe.
