

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house, though large, is vernacular in style with features of several of the Victorian style. The turret and the building's irregular massing is reminiscent of the earlier Queen Anne style. The dentil cornice in the turret and the classical columns supporting the side porch are typical early twentieth century features.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

In 1896 this parcel of land was sold to Adelaide, Georgianna and Maria Currier. It is possible that the house was built on speculation and sold to the Curriers or that they had the house built after acquiring the land.

The Curriers owned the house until 1920 when it was sold to William Doherty.
