

Johnson had a clothing store at 52 State Street. In 1883 Johnson served as mayor of the City of Newburyport. Johnson owned the house at 54-56 Atwood Street until his death in 1922. His wife owned the property until 1927.

In 1833 the house was acquired by Captain Joseph P. Russell, a merchant and master mariner. Russell was part-owner of the sloop, "Satisfaction". When Russell died in 1852 he bequeathed one third of his estate to the Newburyport Marine Society. After Russell's death this house was purchased at auction by John J. Scott. One year later he sold the property to George W. Hale, a sailmaker. Hale owned the house until 1872. In that year William A. Johnson bought the house.

The Atwood house was built by Robert Hale who acquired the property on March 1, 1809. Hale was a bricklayer and he spent the next year building the three story brick house. In July 1810 Hale sold the house to Margaret Atwood, widow of Zachariah Atwood. Mrs. Atwood was born in Newbury in 1754. In 1793 she was married to Zachariah Atwood. Atwood was a sea captain who had invested in several vessels. In 1796 Zachariah Atwood died. His wife continued to live in the house and invested heavily in real estate. By the time of her death in 1832 Mrs. Atwood owned several houses on High Street and a store and wharf, as well as the house on Lime Street. Mrs. Atwood was a strong supporter of many of Newburyport's charities. She was a co-founder of the Newburyport Female Charitable Society. Mrs. Atwood willed this property to her son, whose death preceded hers. The house was sold and her estate bequeathed to the poor of the town of Newburyport.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The Atwood house is a fine example of the Federal homes built by Newburyport's wealthy mercantile class around the turn of the nineteenth century. The brick house is three stories in height with hipped roof and decreasing window size in the upper floors. Exceptional architectural features include the arched doorways and the modillioned cornice. The front door is flanked by sidelights and surmounted by a semi-circular fanlight. Early photographs indicate that this house originally had a widow's walk.
