ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This two story brick house is vernacular Victorian in style. Although built late in the nineteenth century, this house has the square granite lintels associated with the earlier Greek Revival style. The front porch and oriel window in this house are later additions.

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HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The earliest known owner of this house is Laura E. Currier who willed the property to Joseph Currier. Joseph Currier was a mason who built several brick dwellings in Newburyport's North End. It is quite possible that Currier built this dwelling also.

This house remained in the Currier family until 1943 when it was sold to Raymond Pillsbury.
