ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This two story house with pitched roof and symmetrical five bay facade is Georgian in style and probably dates from the mid-eighteenth century. Features indicative of the style include the interior endwall chimneys which allowed for a large central hallway. The front entrance of this house has been altered.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This is one of the few early houses on the outskirts of Newburyport. It clearly dates from the eighteenth century. The original owners have yet to be documented but they were probably farmers as were the nineteenth century owners of the property.

In 1872 the house was owned by Joshua Newhall. He was listed as a farmer in the City Directory of that year. The house remained in the Newhall family until well into the twentieth century.
