ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This two and a half story building is vernacular Victorian in style. The architectural detail indicative of the Victorian influence include the bracketed cornice and the front entrance, which is ornamented by scrolled brackets.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built during the third quarter of the nineteenth century. The original owner may have been Charles Peabody, the owner of the property in 1871. Peabody had a shop at 15 State Street. He sold boots and shoes. The shoe industry became very important in Newburyport's economy during this period.
