ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is an excellent example of a Second Empire style home. It is one of several on High Street built during the latter half of the nineteenth century. Though provincial in style the house has several noteworthy features of the Second Empire style. The mansard roof and arched and pedimented dormers ornamented with consoles are several of these. The projecting central pavillion is also typical of the style and helps to create the bold three dimensional effect seen here. The bracketed cornice and portico as well as the rusticated facade detailed with quoins are all features of the style as are the window lintels.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was owned by William D. Hervey in 1872. Hervey opened a bathing house on Water Street where the custom house now stands. On June 12, 1827, he notified the public that he had purchased the building on "Jackson's Wharf" and had remodeled it for the use of ladies and gentlemen desiring hot or cold baths.

In 1833 Hervey sold the lot of land on Water Street to the United States Government. In 1835 the government erected the custom house on this site.

The house at 88 High Street remained in the Hervey family until 1879. At that time it was purchased by Emily C. W. Page who owned it until 1922. The house remained in the Page family for several decades.

Subsequent owners were David P. Page, Samuel N. Bloom and Milton Frebach.
