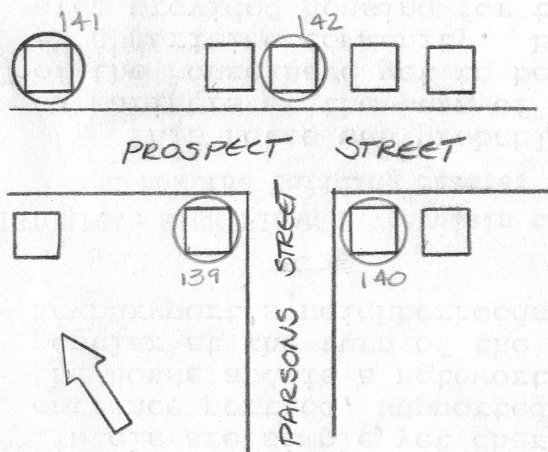

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This house is a fine example of the Federal style. The three story form with hipped roof and decreasing window size in the upper stories is typically Federal. The cornice, cornerboards, and window lintels are simple, yet characteristic of the period. The pedimented entrance portico, supported by Doric columns, is probably original to the house and is a noteworthy feature. The Federal style was very popular at the turn of the nineteenth century and is seen in all of Newburyport's neighborhoods.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was probably built by one of Newburyport's merchants or mariners at the turn of the nineteenth century. The earliest owners of the house have yet to be documented. The South End was first settled as a maritime community. By the middle of the nineteenth century this area provided housing for the people working in adjacent industrial complexes.

In 1851 Nicholas R. Brown was the owner of this house. Brown was listed as an operative in the city directory of that year. Brown was probably employed in one of the nearby textile mills.

Between 1872 and 1884 the house was owned by a Mrs. Alter. Today the house is a multiple family dwelling.
