ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This building is interesting architecturally because it is one of a very few similar buildings in the City of Newburyport. The triple decker style, popular during the early twentieth century, is seen several residential structures. Features that are characteristic of the style include the three story form with porches in the rear of each story. The simple classical revival details and the variety of surface texture are also typical of triple deckers.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This building was built in 1908 by J. B. Pickard. From that time the building has been used for a mixture of uses, residential and commercial. For a brief period the first floor was used by the Polish Club for functions.

Today this building contains an antique shop and several apartments.
