

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This late nineteenth century lighthouse is unusual in form. It is square and of brick. Architectural detail in the structure is extremely simple and is limited to a square granite lintel over the entrance. This is the only lighthouse in Newburyport except for one on Plum Island. The light is also unusual in that is is located in a densely built up area of the city.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

On April 5, 1873, this parcel of land was sold to the United States Government, for use as the site of a new range light. The lighthouse was erected in the following years and was owned by the government until 1964. At that time the light was discontinued and, in accordance with the original deed the land reverted to the Bayley heirs.

The Bayley heirs conveyed the property to Biaggio DeMaggio. In 1971 the property was again sold. Gordon Hall and Mike Masconi purchased the lighthouse and are the owners at present.
