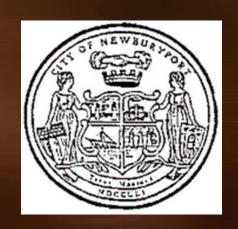

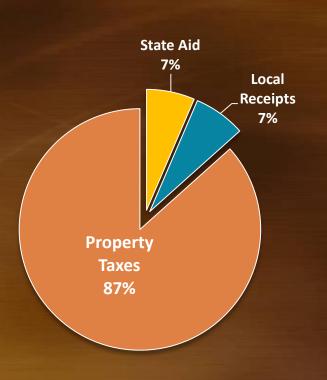

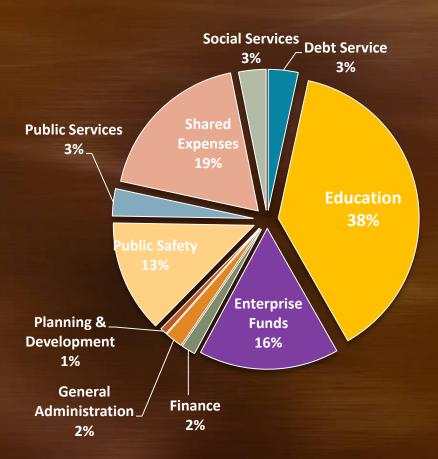

EXPENDITURES



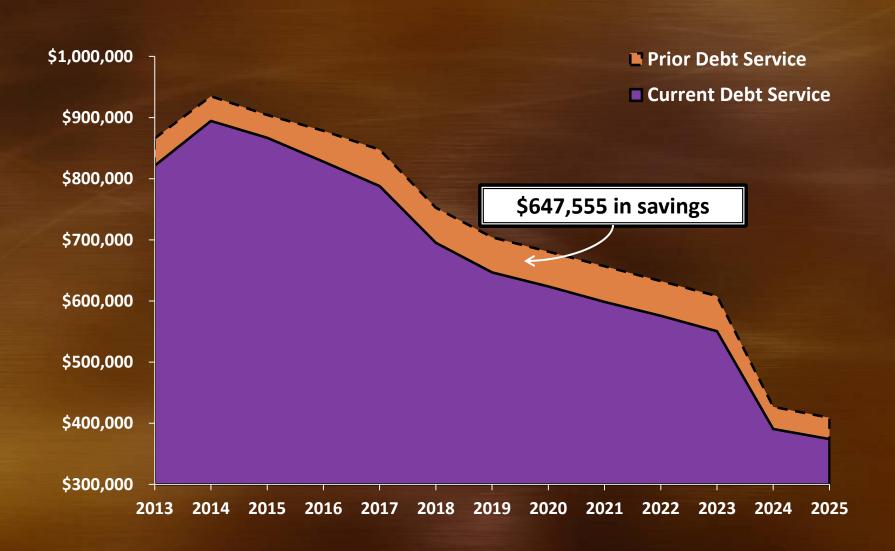

Funds key infrastructure needs throughout the City and downtown area.

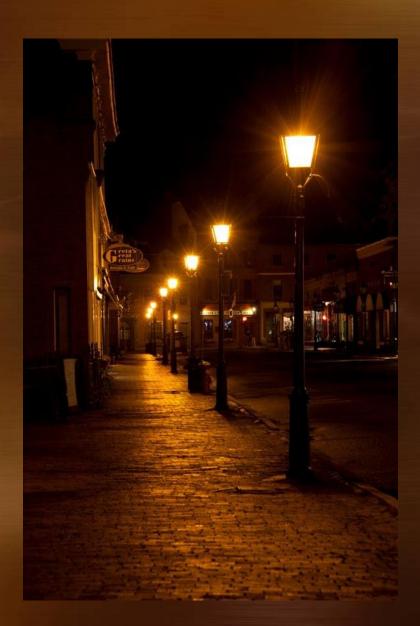
Reduction in Energy Costs

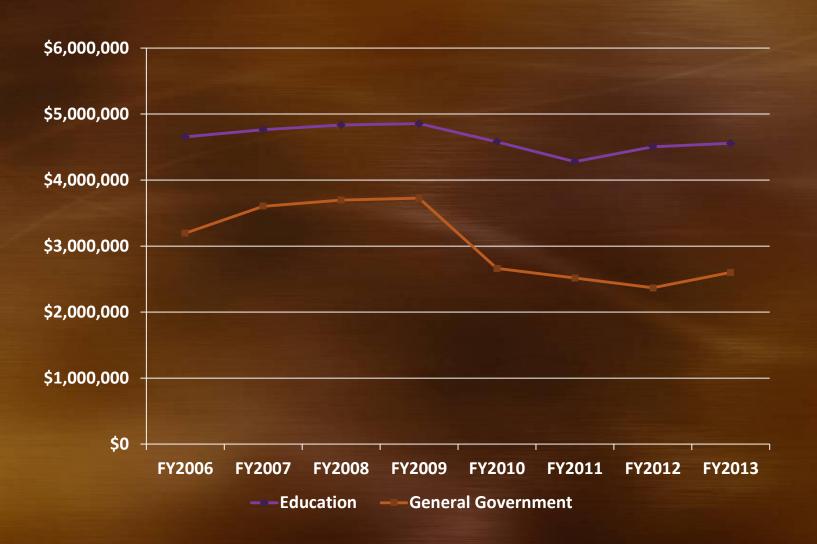

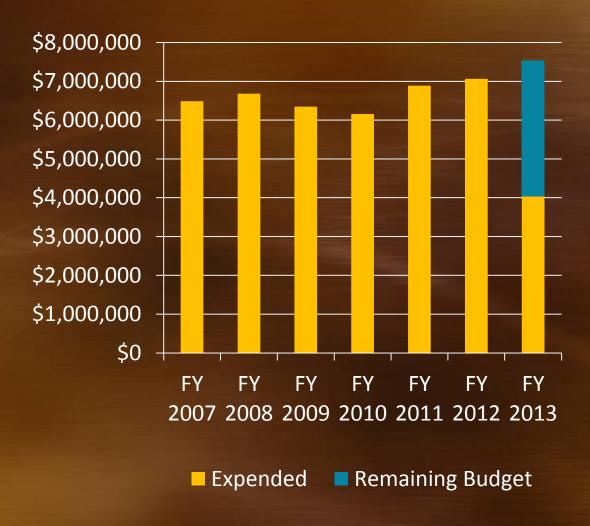
Average Tax Bills Across Essex County

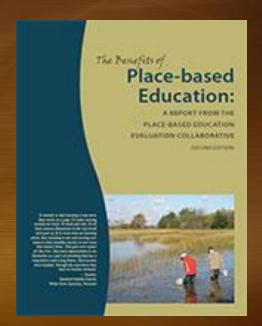

Students lag behind their peers by one or more years, demonstrate very weak progress on screening measures, and require intensive intervention.

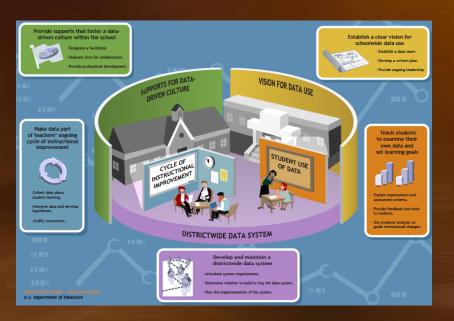
Tier 2

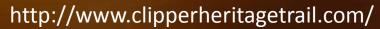

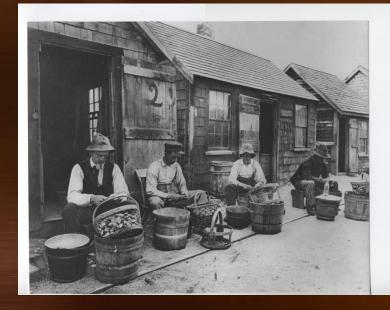

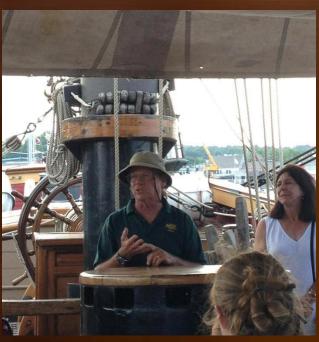
