



### Limitations

- (a) "Procedure" All road racing, walkathon, bicycle, or swimming events shall, through that event's organizer, board of directors, charity foundation or designee apply for authorization to hold the event through the Office of the City Clerk. The City Clerk upon review of the completed form will place the application on the regular City Council agenda. Upon following the procedures of the Council, as deemed appropriated in the sole judgment of the Council, the application will be considered approved if the Council votes favorably by majority. The event will name one person responsible on the application and shall provide contact information to include name, address and telephone number.
- (b) "Exemptions" Each event organizer or organization shall comply with this ordinance and no exemptions will be permitted.
- (c) "Course map", All applications shall be accompanied by a course map showing the event route, water stops, refreshment stops, and so-called "porta-potties". The course map shall also include any road closures, detours and parking areas. The course map shall be approved by Police, Fire, Department of Public Services, Parks Commission and Harbormasters Departments prior to submission to the City Clerk.
- (d) "Electronic Amplifier" Electronic amplifiers, loudspeakers and bullhorn use shall be requested at time of application. Under no circumstances will they be used for public address announcements or music before 8:00 A.M. except for Sundays when electronic amplifiers, loud speakers or bullhorns will be used for public address announcements or music before 9:00 AM. This shall be deemed a requirement for all permitted events regardless of type or location.

- (e) "Road Closure" No ways, public or private, boat ramps or parking lots controlled or patrolled by the city shall be closed without authorization. Authorization shall be considered granted only if said closure(s) are contained in the approved permit. It is the sole responsibility of the race organizers to notify residents ten (10) days in advance that neighborhood roads will be closed if no alternate route is available to those residents.
- (f) "Insurance" All events shall have an insurance policy or rider in effect for the event naming the "City of Newburyport" as an insured. The policy shall be no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- (g) "Event termination" If in the judgment of the City Marshal, Fire Chief or Department of Public Services (DPS) Director or designees thereof determine that an event is unsafe due to existing conditions, that event may be stopped, terminated or suspended. In the case of a multidiscipline event such as a triathlon, the Harbormaster or his/her designee may likewise stop, terminate or suspend the swimming portion for cause.
- (h) "Event and traffic Security" The City Marshal, Fire Chief, DPS Director or in the case of a triathlon, the Harbormaster can require special duty personnel to oversee the safety and security of the event. All special duty assignments will be paid by the event organizers.
- (i) "Clean-up" The event organizers shall be responsible for post event trash collection, removal of signage, directional arrows, advertisements or other promotional material associated with the event.

### 13-101 Enforcement

- (a) "Regulations" Consistent with this ordinance, the city shall promulgate regulations to enforce and otherwise implement the provisions of this ordinance upon passage by the City Council. Any event previously approved by City Council shall be deemed permitted.
- (b) "Warning" In the circumstance that this ordinance is violated, the enforcement may consist of a warning. Any warnings issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and may be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.
- (c) "Noncriminal Disposition" If the city determines that a violation has occurred in which a noncriminal violation is issued, the named event organizer shall be penalized by a non-criminal disposition as provided bin Massachusetts General Law as adopted by the City of Newburyport as a general ordinance in Subsection 1-17 of Chapter 1 of the Code or Ordinances of the City of Newburyport in the amounts set herein in 13-101(d)
- (d) "Violation" The non-criminal violation shall be \$100.00 for the first offense and \$250.00 for second and subsequent offenses. Any non-criminal citations issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and shall be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.

### Limitations

- (a) "Procedure" All road racing, walkathon, bicycle, or swimming events shall, through that event's organizer, board of directors, charity foundation or designee apply for authorization to hold the event through the Office of the City Clerk. The City Clerk upon review of the completed form will place the application on the regular City Council agenda. Upon following the procedures of the Council, as deemed appropriated in the sole judgment of the Council, the application will be considered approved if the Council votes favorably by majority. The event will name one person responsible on the application and shall provide contact information to include name, address and telephone number.
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- (f) "Insurance" All events shall have an insurance policy or rider in effect for the event haming the "City of Newburyport" as an insured. The policy shall be no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- (g) "Event termination" If in the judgment of the City Marshal, Fire Chief or Department of Public Services (DPS) Director or designees thereof determine that an event is unsafe due to existing conditions, that event may be stopped, terminated or suspended. In the case of a multidiscipline event such as a triathlon, the Harbormaster or his/her designee may likewise stop, terminate or suspend the swimming portion for cause.
- (h) "Event and traffic Security" The City Marshal, Fire Chief, DPS Director or in the case of a triathlon, the Harbormaster can require special duty personnel to oversee the safety and security of the event. All special duty assignments will be paid by the event organizers.
- (i) "Clean-up" The event organizers shall be responsible for post event trash collection, removal of signage, directional arrows, advertisements or other promotional material associated with the event.



This letter is to advise the City that the trustees have deliberated over the projects presented at the Newburyport Senior Center Meeting on September 7, 2018. We have reviewed the proposed options for allocating the \$110,000.00 available for distribution in 2019.

I would first like to express my appreciation to Mrs. Lise Reid for the time and effort she applied this summer in clarifying and striving to move forward on a number of pending projects.

We are in agreement on the following with certain noted stipulations:

- Repair of Historic Gravestones at St Paul's Episcopal Church \$2000.00.
   It is to be noted that the money is only to be applied to Historic stone restoration for individuals who played a significant role in the City of Newburyport and the establishing of our Country.
- Oak Hill Cemetery Tree Planting Project \$2500.00. The money is to be applied as requested with the planting of 6 saplings 12 foot high using 12 bags of Coast of Maine Compost. On a personal note the trustees appreciate the ongoing interest, efforts and expertise of Ghlee E. Woolworth.
- 3. Bartlet Mall Historic Restoration \$15,000.00. The monies allocated for 2018 and the additional funds for 2019, are to be applied to restoring the original access to Frog Pond from Auburn Street. This will include tree and stump removal and stones, at the base, and reestablishing the slope per Charles Elliot's design for the rest of the mall. The trustees applaud the City for utilizing the leadership skills of Kim Turner and Chuck Griffin, both Architects, and the economic benefits of the Newburyport Conservancy Fund to further restore this Historic Landmark.

- 4. Cushing Park Improvement Project, Planters and Interpretive Panels \$15,000.00. The work this year on the floral border garden is significant and should be appreciated in the years to come. With this in mind, establishing a specific summer activity area with granite blocks and floral planters seems appropriate. The trustees noted that the monies requested for the planters seems excessive and have requested that alternative sources be explored. The excess funds can be used to refurbish the three existing benches facing Kent Street. Any remaining funds can be reallocated.
- 5. Newburyport High School Learning Center \$75,500.00. The trustees are grateful for the combined efforts of Mayor Holaday, Lise Reid, Kim Turner and the Newburyport High School Administration for their determination in recognizing Mayor Gayden W. Morrill, 1932 -1935. By laying the cornerstone, he saw his vision, and advocacy brought to fruition as the founder of Newburyport High School. The learning center will be an encouragement to all.

I know that the City Council will have to formally accept these funds at its December meeting. After notification of their acceptance to all trustees, and the turn of the year, The Mayor Gayden W. Morrill Charitable Foundation will send a check to The City.







#### Limitations

- (a) "Procedure" All road racing, walkathon, bicycle, or swimming events shall, through that event's organizer, board of directors, charity foundation or designee apply for authorization to hold the event through the Office of the City Clerk. The City Clerk upon review of the completed form will place the application on the regular City Council agenda. Upon following the procedures of the Council, as deemed appropriated in the sole judgment of the Council, the application will be considered approved if the Council votes favorably by majority. The event will name one person responsible on the application and shall provide contact information to include name, address and telephone number.
- (b) "Exemptions" Each event organizer or organization shall comply with this ordinance and no exemptions will be permitted.
- (c) "Course map", All applications shall be accompanied by a course map showing the event route, water stops, refreshment stops, and so-called "porta-potties". The course map shall also include any road closures, detours and parking areas. The course map shall be approved by Police, Fire, Department of Public Services, Parks Commission and Harbormasters Departments prior to submission to the City Clerk.
- (d) "Electronic Amplifier" Electronic amplifiers, loudspeakers and bullhorn use shall be requested at time of application. Under no circumstances will they be used for public address announcements or music before 8:00 A.M. except for Sundays when electronic amplifiers, loud speakers or bullhorns will be used for public address announcements or music before 9:00 AM. This shall be deemed a requirement for all permitted events regardless of type or location.


- (e) "Road Closure" No ways, public or private, boat ramps or parking lots controlled or patrolled by the city shall be closed without authorization. Authorization shall be considered granted only if said closure(s) are contained in the approved permit. It is the sole responsibility of the race organizers to notify residents ten (10) days in advance that neighborhood roads will be closed if no alternate route is available to those residents.
- (f) "Insurance" All events shall have an insurance policy or rider in effect for the event naming the "City of Newburyport" as an insured. The policy shall be no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- (g) "Event termination" If in the judgment of the City Marshal, Fire Chief or Department of Public Services (DPS) Director or designees thereof determine that an event is unsafe due to existing conditions, that event may be stopped, terminated or suspended. In the case of a multidiscipline event such as a triathlon, the Harbormaster or his/her designee may likewise stop, terminate or suspend the swimming portion for cause.
- (h) "Event and traffic Security" The City Marshal, Fire Chief, DPS Director or in the case of a triathlon, the Harbormaster can require special duty personnel to oversee the safety and security of the event. All special duty assignments will be paid by the event organizers.
- (i) "Clean-up" The event organizers shall be responsible for post event trash collection, removal of signage, directional arrows, advertisements or other promotional material associated with the event.

#### 13-101 Enforcement

- (a) "Regulations" Consistent with this ordinance, the city shall promulgate regulations to enforce and otherwise implement the provisions of this ordinance upon passage by the City Council. Any event previously approved by City Council shall be deemed permitted.
- (b) "Warning" In the circumstance that this ordinance is violated, the enforcement may consist of a warning. Any warnings issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and may be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.
- (c) "Noncriminal Disposition" If the city determines that a violation has occurred in which a noncriminal violation is issued, the named event organizer shall be penalized by a non-criminal disposition as provided bin Massachusetts General Law as adopted by the City of Newburyport as a general ordinance in Subsection 1-17 of Chapter 1 of the Code or Ordinances of the City of Newburyport in the amounts set herein in 13-101(d)
- (d) "Violation" The non-criminal violation shall be \$100.00 for the first offense and \$250.00 for second and subsequent offenses. Any non-criminal citations issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and shall be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.



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

We are writing to respectfully request the City Council's approval of the proposed federally-funded "Safe Routes to Schools" (SRTS) High Street project in its conceptual form. The project will provide approximately \$2 million in federal construction funding for Newburyport in addition to covering the cost of engineering.

The SRTS project is focused on the section of High Street between Tyng and Buck Streets. The project and the SRTS program are intended to encourage students to walk and bicycle to school safely through physical infrastructure improvements such as sidewalks, crosswalks, traffic calming, signals, and bike lanes. The original 2005 federal legislation creating the SRTS program identified the purposes as: (1) To enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school; (2) To make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative, thereby encouraging a healthy and active lifestyle from an early age; and (3) To facilitate the planning, development, and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools.

The roots of this particular project go back to 2013 when the City applied to the state SRTS program for an infrastructure assessment, the required first step, with a particular focus on the Nock-Molin schools. Consultants mapped student residency information, met with staff and community members, observed school arrival and dismissal patterns, reviewed collision histories, and collected traffic counts in order to identify improvements that will make walking and bicycling safer and more attractive modes of travel for children traveling to and from school, as well as everyone else. The assessment report was issued in 2016 and proposed the High Street project. Nearly half of the students in the Nock and Molin Schools – in addition to students at the High School and River Valley Charter School – reside within two miles of the schools on the north side of High Street, the street identified as having the greatest concentration of school-related walking and bicycling trips. School staff, officials, parents, and consultants have long identified safety concerns for students walking and bicycling to school across High Street due to the high volume and speed of motor vehicles, sight lines obscured by parked cars, wide crosswalks, relatively narrow bicycle lanes, as well as poor sidewalk conditions and noncompliant wheelchair ramps. The state considers the section of High Street between Tyng Street and Summit Place to be a high risk crash location for bicyclists within the region.

The City's goal for any work along High Street is to provide a safer, universally accessible, pleasing streetscape and transportation corridor that is sensitive to and compatible with the historic resources and character of the area. The SRTS project is consistent with the goals, objectives and primary strategies of the 2004 High Street Master Plan, which was adopted by the City Council in 2008 "in order to encourage the phased and long-term implementation of the Plan's recommendation, as amended and supplemented from time to time." The \$2 million project is focused on:

- reconstructing the sidewalks (new brick sidewalks where they are brick and new concrete sidewalks where they are asphalt and concrete) plus wheelchair ramps at intersections and crossings;
- adjusting locations and shortening the length of four crosswalks in order to reduce pedestrian exposure
  to motor vehicle traffic, including installing pedestrian-activated flashing beacons, and two pedestrian
  refuge islands for the crosswalks near the High School where the road is wider from the turning lanes;
- adjusting the curbing and creating bump-outs (similar to downtown) to reduce the excessively wide portions of the street, calm traffic, and open up the sight lines at crosswalks and intersections;
- installing drainage improvements, and resurfacing the pavement.

The design was initiated in early 2018 and included a public hearing in June 2018. Recently, the Newburyport Historical Commission voted to approve the project as not having an adverse effect on High Street. The High Street corridor has evolved incrementally over the course of centuries and reflects different time periods, architectural styles, and historic and contemporary needs. The public portion of the corridor has evolved markedly from the nineteenth century in order to meet contemporary needs (e.g., asphalt pavement, roadway markings, utility poles and lines, piecemeal evolution of sidewalks and curb cuts, etc.). Today the street carries some of the highest volumes of vehicular traffic in the Merrimack Valley with 18,000-19,000 vehicles per day. We are carefully considering numerous design choices and balancing many factors including historic resources, pedestrian safety, multiple stakeholders, controlling laws and regulations, etc. The project is supported by abutters along High Street, and by the Newburyport Livable Streets citizens group. The evolving plans are currently at a draft final stage, and we are continuing to work with MassDOT and other stakeholders to revise various elements of the plans.

Temporary construction easements are required for this federally-funded project on the abutting property owners' land in order to integrate the new sidewalks with driveways and walkways and restore adjacent grass areas, etc., as well as potentially some very small permanent easements at corners. The right-of-way process is similar to the Rail Trail projects, and we are currently reaching out to abutters and will be returning to the City Council in the coming months to approve the easements. At this point, the project is intended to be bid out by the Commonwealth in 2019 for construction.

The Newburyport Historical Commission (NHC) has been asked to provide feedback on the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) project along a portion of High Street in Newburyport, which is within the Newburyport National Register Historic District. We recently received more information about the project, held a public meeting on 10/24/18 and conducted several votes on this matter. We are consequently providing revised comments from our previous letter to the Massachusetts Historical Commission dated September 2018 (received 10/11/18) on this project. The NHC's Section 106 advisory review of this project has been solicited under the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended.

Overall, the NHC finds that this project will <u>not</u> have an "Adverse Effect" on the surrounding historic assets. Please see our further comments and recommendations below regarding certain details of the project.

Sidewalks: While removal and replacement of the older brick sidewalks is not optimal from a historical perspective, we recognize and accept the pedestrian benefits of reconstructing the sidewalks with new wirecut brick. We also recognize that reconstructing the deteriorated sidewalks will potentially enhance the setting and views of the district's historic assets, and acknowledge the positive impact of similar projects such as the reconstruction of brick sidewalks along Green Street in Newburyport. We appreciate that the sidewalks along High Street will continue to be varying widths, that concrete and asphalt sidewalks will be replaced in-kind with new concrete, and that abutters will have an opportunity to pay for the installation of brick if they can afford it and so desire. If there are any remaining Works Progress Administration (WPA) plaques, we strongly recommend that they be salvaged for potential interpretation.

Raised curb pedestrian refuge islands: We recognize the pedestrian safety benefits of installing two pedestrian refuge islands with raised 6" granite curbs at crosswalks across the wider portions of the roadway in this busy high-volume thoroughfare. We also are cognizant that raised curb pedestrian refuge islands have been installed other historic/National Register districts in the Commonwealth. We strongly recommend that the appearance of the refuge islands be improved by laying in granite cobbles rather than concrete or brick inside the curbed non-walking surface.

<u>Traffic calming</u>: We appreciate that no over-road signaling beacons shall be used and that the Rectangular Rapid Flash Beacons (RRFBs) shall have black ornamental bases and poles.

<u>Curbing</u>: We are pleased that the project incorporates removing and resetting as much of the existing granite curbing as possible, and accept that it is appropriate to use new granite curbing (particularly radius pieces) for the new bump-outs and similar relocated curb areas. We acknowledge that it is appropriate to shift the curbing to reduce the width of the roadway at excessively wide areas in order to promote pedestrian and bicycle safety, and that reduction of the expanse of asphalt will likely enhance the district's historic assets.

<u>Signage</u>: We prefer a minimum of signs, and acknowledge that the engineer has reduced unnecessary signage in the proposed plans, and that "pedestrian crossing" and arrow signage is warranted at the crosswalks as well as others such as stop signs, one-way signs at the school driveway, turning lane signs, and others. We continue to believe that street signs should be of a size no greater than their current dimensions in the project area.

<u>Greenway</u>: We understand that the green strips that separate High Street from the public sidewalk in various areas will remain, and will be expanded in the section between Kent and Buck Streets where the asphalt pavement area is being reduced.

As noted earlier and in light of the new information and clarifications, we find that this project will not have an "Adverse Effect" on the surrounding historic assets in this portion of the Newburyport National Register Historic District.


## **High Street Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Project**





#### ARTICLE 2. - DOGS

Sec. 3-27. - Licensing of Dogs and Kennels.

(c) The owner or keeper of an unlicensed dog after June first shall be fined twenty five dollars (\$25.00) ten dollars (\$10.00) per dog in addition to the license fee. The owner or keeper of an unlicensed dog after July first shall be fined fifty dollars (\$50.00) twenty dollars (20.00) per dog in addition to the license fee. The owner or keeper of an unlicensed dog after August first shall be fined one hundred dollars (\$100.00) thirty dollars (30.00) per dog in addition to the license fee. All monies collected for licenses and fines shall be retained by the city.



For Fiscal Year 2019, we recommend establishing a tax rate of \$13.08 per \$1,000 based on a tax levy of \$57,458,764 and a city-wide valuation of \$4,369,487,756. This tax rate represents a 1.84% increase to the levy limit out of the 2.50% maximum increase allowed under Proposition 2 ½. This results in a decrease to the tax rate of \$0.18 per \$1,000 compared to the FY2018 tax rate of \$13.26.

Based on the FY2019 valuation, the average single family home in Newburyport is now assessed at \$595,000, compared to \$560,300 in FY2018. This results in an average single family tax bill of \$7,783, which represents a 4.8%, or \$353, increase over FY2018's average single family tax bill. By defraying the increase to the tax levy by 0.66%, the average single family home would experience a \$42 savings from what would otherwise be a \$395 increase.


The average single family home value continues to be driven up by a strong local economy that continues to encourage new development and improvements or additions to existing homes. As a result, we have added \$985,930 in value from New Growth for FY2019. Yet, while the economy is strong, I am ever-mindful that many property owners struggle to keep up with an increased cost of living, including higher taxes. As such, given that we built the FY2019 budget on a new growth estimate of \$700,000, I do not recommend taxing the additional \$285,930 that is available to be levied under Proposition 2 ½ as a result of the higher than projected new growth.

I realize that defraying the tax rate by 0.66% is not enough to help many struggling in our community, especially seniors. As such, I will continue to move forward with providing additional tax relief for those with the greatest need, while remaining cognizant of the city's responsibility of providing the public services and education that our community deserves and expects. In the coming weeks, I will be establishing an ad-hoc committee to study and recommend available tax relief options, including the expansion of Clause 41C, adoption of Clause 41C½ and other potential alternatives. I look forward to working with the Council in finding the right solution for our City.

## MINIMUM RESIDENTIAL FACTOR

- A Residential Factor of 1 and raising the levy by 1.84% as opposed to 2.50% would yield a single tax rate of \$13.08 per thousand of value.
- Tax Levy: \$57,152,899 / Value: \$4,369,487,756 = (0.01308) X 1000 = Single Tax Rate of \$13.08.
- Chapter 200 allows Newburyport to select a factor less than 1 thereby shifting more of the tax burden onto the CIP classes of properties.
- Since 1918 Newburyport has chosen to adopt a MRF of 1 except for Fiscal Year 1986 when a shift to 1.50 of the CIP class was adopted.

## TAX LEVY NOTES

- The Mayor has proposed raising the Levy by 1.84% instead of the full 2.5%.
- By not raising this additional \$285,930 of tax levy, the tax rate is reduced by \$0.18.
- It translates into a \$42 savings for the average single family residential taxpayer.

## NEWBURYPORT COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FY19 APPROPRIATIONS

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee recommends that the City Council appropriate from Community Preservation Fund Revenues [as follows]:

The following CONDITIONS are common to [all projects]:

- A. Each recipient of funds is required to submit to the CPC a written report on the status of the project by each October 15, January 15, April 15 and July 15 following appropriation and until final completion of the project.
- B. If a project is not completed within twelve (12) months of appropriation, the grantee must submit a written request to the CPC for an extension of the grant. Otherwise, funds may be subject to recision and returned to Community Preservation Fund Reserves (applicable to appropriations, not to reservations).
- C. Full funding is conditioned upon the receipt of state matching funds, estimated to be 11.5% of local revenue, expected in November 2018.

## PROJECT: CLIPPER CITY RAIL TRAIL AND HARBORWALK PHASE II

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$175,000 from the FY 2019 Estimated Revenues to the City of Newburyport (Planning Office) to support completion of the Rail Trail along the 1200' riverfront between Joppa Park and the American Yacht Club.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation and Open Space.

**Project Summary:** The City of Newburyport needs to address riverfront erosion, remediate contaminated soil, and complete the Clipper City Rail Trail Phase II project along the 1200 feet of riverfront between Joppa Park and the American Yacht Club. Time is of the essence due to increased costs and risks associated with delay. The project includes: A) managing the completion of an interim detour; B) managing time-sensitive temporary shoreline stabilization work to address erosion and scouring and reduce the risk of migration of contaminants, including providing reports to the EPA and DEP; C) hiring a coastal engineer and managing design and permitting for a revised approach that will raise the trail, protect the shoreline, and provide resiliency to future sea level rise and storm surge; and D) bidding and managing the permanent shoreline trail construction project.

We are writing to respectfully request the City Council's approval of the Community Preservation Committee's recommendation of Community Preservation Act (CPA) funding of \$175,000 in support of the completion of the Clipper City Rail Trail Phase II project – addressing riverfront erosion, remediation of PCB contaminated soil, and construction – along the 1200 feet riverfront between Joppa Park and the American Yacht Club. Additional funding is necessary due to significant unanticipated changes on the ground and consequent changes in the scope of work necessary for design, permitting, construction, and completion of this critical section of the new facility. The City's existing project and contingency funding has been fully consumed by the development of the remediation plan, the temporary shoreline stabilization plan, and the interim Water Street detour plan. Additional funding is required now in the fall of 2018 as time is of the essence due to increased costs and risks associated with delay.

The remaining steps in the project include: A) managing the completion of an interim detour; B) managing time-sensitive temporary shoreline stabilization work to address erosion and scouring and reduce the risk of migration of contaminants, including providing reports to the EPA and DEP; C) hiring a coastal engineer and managing design and permitting for a revised approach that will raise the trail, protect the shoreline, and provide resiliency to future sea level rise and storm surge; and D) bidding and managing the permanent shoreline trail construction project.

Construction of the Phase II Rail Trail in the South End began in 2016 and is approximately 85% complete. The remediation plan for the soils discovered to be contaminated with PCB's in a section behind the Wastewater Treatment Facility was finalized and reported to the federal and state regulatory authorities in the spring of 2018. However, as the state contractor began to mobilize to address this area, the riverfront was hit by significant storm surge and high tides which caused increased scouring of the shoreline. It was concluded that temporary shoreline stabilization needs to be implemented in the scoured areas prior to any soil remediation work or trail construction, and that a coastal engineer needs to develop a revised plan to raise the trail higher and harden/improve the resiliency of the shoreline to future sea level rise and storm surge. MassDOT has determined that their part of the project will be completed after the interim detour and temporary shoreline stabilization is constructed this fall. While the interim Water Street detour will be functional in the near term to connect the trail, it is not a desirable long-term connection due to the narrowness of the road and sidewalks, the speed and proximity of motor vehicles, and the length of the section. The permanent trail along the riverfront cannot be constructed until the shoreline is temporarily stabilized, a revised design is developed, additional funding is secured, and the contaminated soils removed.

The City has already secured a state Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Grant to support coastal resilience planning that includes development of several alternative conceptual revetment/shoreline protection approaches for this section of riverfront during the next two months. Additional funding is needed to contract with a coastal engineer to further develop a revised plan and secure permitting, and then subsequently remediate the contaminated soil area and build the riverfront section of trail. We are seeking construction funding through Lieutenant Governor Polito and the Baker Administration based on the Commonwealth's Environmental Bond Bill which was recently signed by the Governor and includes a \$750,000 legislative authorization earmark for this project. We need to secure additional funding to support the project now or the City will incur additional costs for mandatory reporting to the state and federal regulatory authorities regarding the contaminated soils, we will lose another construction season and push out completion of the trail for the public's use by two years, and we will risk additional storm events and associated riverfront erosion and scouring that could allow migration of the PCBs into the water and add complications and additional costs. CPA funding is vital to the timely and successful completion of this important public facility.

#### AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWBURYPORT

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newburyport as follows:

THAT the Zoning Ordinance, Appendix A of the Code of Ordinances, City of Newburyport, Massachusetts, is hereby amended pursuant to Section XII-B "Adoption and Amendment" as follows:

Section III-C: Zoning Map.

The Zoning Map of said Zoning Ordinance entitled "Zoning Map of the City of Newburyport," referenced in Section III-C (entitled Zoning Map) is hereby amended pursuant to Section III-D "Changes to Zoning Map" as follows:

- a) Add a so-called "Colby Farm Lane Residential Overlay District" (CFL-ROD) as depicted on the attached map entitled "Colby Farm Lane Residential Overlay District," prepared by the Office of Planning & Development, dated August 7, 2018;
- b) Eliminate the existing "IB-ROD" Overlay District, which is referenced in Section XIV entitled "Open Space Residential Development (OSRD); and
- c) Change the entire existing I-1B District located north of Colby Farm Road and west of Low Street to an R-2 District.

Section XIV: Open Space Residential Development (OSRD)

Section XIV-A: Purposes and intent.

Trelete subsection (5) of Section XIV-A, entitled "Purposes and intent," in its entirety, and replace said subsection with the following:

(5) To further the goals and policies of the City of Newburyport Master Plan, Strategic Land Use Plan and Open Space & Recreation Plan, as amended from time to time:

Section XIV-B: Applicability

Delete subsection b. of Section XIV-B. entitled "Applicability." in its entirety, and replace said subsection with the following:

#### ODNC025 08 13 18

b. Zoning elassification: Only those tracts located in the following districts shall be eligible for consideration as an OSRD; AC, R1, R2, R3 and the Colby Farm Lane – Residential Overlay District (CFL-ROD). Residential Overlay Districts, such as the CFL-ROD, are intended to provide added incentives for open space protection due to the unique ecological, cultural, and or aesthetic characteristics of the properties within the overlay district.

Section XIV-G:

Conventional subdivision yield plan - Basic maximum number of lots/dwelling units.

Insert a new subsection b. under Section XIV-G, entitled "Conventional subdivision yield plan – Basic maximum number of lots/dwelling units," as follows:

b. Determination of yield within CFL-ROD: Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, properties within the CFL-ROD are required to establish a determination of yield based on the requirements listed in Section XIV-G(a) using dimensional regulations applicable to the R-2 District.

## Section XIV-I: Open space requirements

Delete subsection (i)(d) of Section XIV-I, entitled "Open space requirements," in its entirety, and replace said subsection with the following:

d. In the CFL-ROD a minimum of eighty (80) percent of the tract shown on the OSRD-SP plan shall be open space and must be preserved as such in perpenuity in accordance with this subsection.

Delete the first two (2) sentences of subsection (vii)(3) of Section XIV-I, entitled "Open space requirements," and replace said sentences with the following:

3. A corporation or trust owned individually (for agricultural or conservation purposes only) or jointly or in common by the owners of loss within the OSRD. If such corporation or trust is utilized, ownership thereof shall pass with conveyance of the lot(s) in perpetuity.

## Section XIV-J:

## Design standards

In subsection (a)(i)(1) of Section XIV-J, entitled "Design standards," replace the word "it" with "its".

In subsection (a)(i)(3) of Section XIV-J. entitled "Design standards," replace the word "compliment" with "complement".

## Section XIV-K: Decision of the planning board

In subsection (a)(v) of Section XIV-K, entitled "Decision of the planning board," delete the phrases "(2001)" and "(2004)".

Replace the text of subsection (a)(viii) of Section XIV-K, entitled "Decision of the planning board," in its entirety, and replace said text with the following:

viii. Whether the proposed construction of housing, landscape and streetscape is in harmony with the overall architectural heritage and historic character of the City of Newbox port; and

Delete subsections (b) and (c) of Section XIV-L, entitled "Increases in permissible density," in their entirety, and replace suld subsections with the following:

- b. In the CFL-ROD district, the planning board at its discretion may award a density bonus for an OSRD to increase the number of dwelling units beyond the basic maximum number. All projects within the CFL-ROD which provide either: 1) at least eighty-five (85) percent protected open space; or 2) deeded public access to, and improvements on, the protected open space, may be permitted an increase in permissible density of twenty-five (25) percent beyond the basic maximum number to a maximum density of twenty-five (25) units excluding the required percent of affordable housing units.
- c. In the AC, R1, R2, R3, and CFL-ROD districts, excluding units required under the Inclusionary Affordable Housing Ordinance, for every one dwelling unit restricted to occupancy for a period of not less than ninetynine (99) years by persons or families who qualify as low or moderate income, as those terms are defined for the area by the commonwealth's department of housing and community development, the planning board may award a density bonus of two (2) market-rate dwelling units; provided, however, that this density bonus, in aggregate with other density bonuses, shall not exceed twenty-five (25) percent of the basic maximum number.



Colby Farm Lane Residential Overlay District (ODNC025 08 13 18)


As members of the Council's Planning & Development (P&D) Committee already know, the Planning Board recommended adoption of the above referenced amendment to the Newburyport Zoning Ordinance. This amendment is intended to encourage so-called "cluster development" under the City's existing Open Space Residential Development (OSRD) Ordinance by modifying the method in which density is calculated using a so-called "yield plan" in the underlying Residential 1 (R1) zoning district. Our discussions with the landowner and developer during the past year have culminated in a public-private partnership to preserve the majority of land at Colby Farm under a Conservation Restriction (CR), with the fee interest in this land being held by the City of Newburyport itself. The developer's new homes would be clustered along Colby Farm Lane where the old barns currently stand, set back from Low Street behind the existing farm house. This will help to preserve a substantial portion of the scenic viewshed from Low Street.

Attached for your reference is a copy of the schematic site plan for the proposed OSRD development. In accordance with recent approvals from the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) and City Council a Purchase and Sale Agreement has been executed memorializing the developer's commitments to ensure that Lots 6B and 7, as well as the larger "Proposed Protected Open Space" (at rear) are preserved collectively. Additionally, the developer has agreed, as part of this Purchase and Sale Agreement and as mitigation for the proposed development, to construct a large storage barn for the Parks Department further down Colby Farm Lane, on land owned by the City. At this time it is anticipated that permitting for the proposed development will proceed this winter, and that closings, property transfers and construction will begin in Spring 2019.

Combined with the above referenced Purchase and Sale Agreement, and prior approval for the use of limited CPA funding, this zoning amendment will help the City to preserve a significant portion of agricultural and conservation land here along Low Street, without expending in excess of a million dollars to do so. I now recommend adoption of the proposed zoning amendment.


