



The *Janet* Marie capsized leaving the Captain in an air pocket under the boat. It took him 10 minutes to extradite himself from the capsized boat. Arriving at the scene, Capt. Hogg and his crew threw out a lifeline for him. The Capt. responded that he was entangled in rope and too weak to grab onto the ring. Without thought of his own safety, Tim Wareham jumped into the water, cut the rope that was holding the Captain down and rescued him. On behalf of our City it is with great pride that I present to you this Commendation.



Dear Members of the Newburyport City Council,

The 2018 Newburyport Housing Production Plan provides clear documentation of the City's pressing need for affordable housing for seniors. The redevelopment of the Brown School presents a rare opportunity for the City to step up and address this need.

As stated previously in writing and though testimony at several public hearings, the Newburyport Affordable Housing Trust remains opposed to the proposed Brown School Overlay District as amended on September 11, 2019. Rather, we believe the best approach is to issue an RFP that expresses a preference for affordable rental housing for seniors with a preferred range of number of units and parking spaces, and which does not set a specific limit on the number of units and parking spaces. An RFP would allow for a more informed process that has a better chance of attracting proposals from experienced and qualified affordable housing developers. We believe that the ordinance as drafted is likely to result in a project similar to the Kelly School with only *one additional* affordable unit than what is already required by the City's Inclusionary Zoning.

With only a handful of affordable units, the rest of the development under the proposed Overlay District would offer expensive, luxury units like those at the Kelly School. Waterfront West will also bring more high-end housing to Newburyport. Is this the legacy the City wants for the Brown School? Wouldn't we prefer a nice, well-maintained, reasonably-priced residential community that is a benefit to our neighbors, rather than another luxury condominium development?

Furthermore, *if* the proposed Brown School Overlay District is adopted, we request an amendment to the heading on the column "Minimum Senior Affordable Units" to delete the word "Senior" so that it reads simply: "Minimum Affordable Housing." Typically, mixed income housing developments seek to minimize any outward differences between the market rate units and the income-restricted units – with the goal of creating a harmonious residential community where lower income residents feel they are not marked as different from their more affluent neighbors. If the three to four affordable units are restricted to seniors, and the rest of the units are occupied by families, the seniors will easily be identified as different from their neighbors.

Finally, we request that the number of senior affordable units under the column Maximum Residential Density be changed from 20 to 24 units, to allow more flexibility for developers applying for funding for an affordable development project and to better respond to the pressing need for housing that meets the needs of Newburyport seniors.

Newburyport Tree Commission

The Newburyport Tree Commission is a volunteer group consisting of seven voting members and 2 alternates appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the City Council. The mission of the Commission is to select, plant, protect, maintain, plan for and increase the health, beauty, quantity, diversity and vitality of Newburyport Trees.

The Newburyport Tree Commission was granted funds by the city in fiscal year 2020 (began July 2019) to serve that mission and plant 30 new trees throughout the city. In June 2019, the Tree Commission was contacted by PCI Synthesis to fund approximately 63 new trees throughout Newburyport as part of a settlement of an enforcement action with the US EPA.

The Newburyport Tree Commission agrees to the following:

- The donation of \$40,732 will allow the planting of 63 additional trees in several Environmental Justice Areas across the city including low income housing projects and wetland areas. These areas may include:
 - o Sullivan Building, State controlled for the Elderly and Disabled
 - o Horton Terrace, Federal controlled for the Low income
 - o Kelleher Park, State controlled for the Low income
 - Individual houses controlled by the State for the Low income and disadvantaged on Milk, Simmons, Storey, Titcomb & Woodland Streets
 - o Wetlands at the Newburyport Business Park
 - o Plum Island
- The timeline would begin in Spring 2020 through Fall 2021
- The Commission only plants trees in Spring and Fall to ensure success
- The average cost of a tree for our program is \$650 including the cost to purchase and plant the tree.
- All trees would be planted in new planting sites and would not be planted over stumps of previous trees
- The Commission's policy is to plant trees of a minimum DBH (diameter at breast height) of 1.75" leading to a failure rate of less than 5% over the last 5 years
- The Commission only plants trees that are proven to be successful in our USDA planting zone and have shown to be sufficiently salt-tolerant to thrive on our streets. The Commission has a list of acceptable trees which can be found on our website below. All trees selected will be taken from this list.





NEWBURYPORT COMMUNITY PRESERVATION COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FY20 APPROPRIATIONS

The Newburyport Community Preservation Committee recommends that the City Council appropriate \$1,250,803 from Community Preservation Fund Revenues for the projects and bond payments, in the amounts, in the categories. and subject to the conditions hereinafter described.

The following CONDITIONS are common to recommended projects #1 through #11:

- Each recipient of funds is required to submit to the CPC a written report on the status of the project A. by each October 15, January 15, April 15 and July 15 following appropriation and until final completion of the project.
- If a project is not completed within twelve (12) months of appropriation, the grantee must submit a В. written request to the CPC for an extension of the grant. Otherwise, funds may be subject to recision and returned to Community Preservation Fund Reserves (applicable to appropriations, not to reservations).
- C. Full funding is conditioned upon the receipt of state matching funds, estimated to be 11.5% of local revenue, expected in November 2019.

- 3. Criteria for project evaluation adopted and published by the CPC.

Estimated Community Preservation Fund Revenues available for appropriation or reservation in FY 2020 total \$1,353,104.01. This figure includes estimated receipts of the local CPA surcharge through fiscal year end 2019, accumulated interest, the anticipated 11.5% state matching funds expected to be received in November 2019. current uncommitted and unreserved funds, and the returned funds from completed and closed-out projects.

PROJECT NO. 8 OPEN SPACE RESERVE FUND

The CPC recommends the reservation of \$100,000 from the FY 2020 Estimated Revenues to the Open Space Reserve Fund.

The CPA category for this reservation is Open Space.

Project Summary: Since 2014, through appropriations from the Open Space Reserve Fund, the City successfully protected 10+ acres of land on Curzon Mill Road and a significant portion of the Colby Farm land on Low Street (pending). The existence of the Reserve allowed the City to take the opportunities when they were presented. Recent CPC funding rounds have restored the Reserve to its current balance of \$729,966. The OSC continues to work on conserving open space based on goals and priorities described in the City's Master Plan and Open Space and Recreation Plan. This application is a "placeholder," with the intention of submitting supplementary application(s) about specific projects, as agreements are reached, outside funding and project partners identified, and we are otherwise able to provide the project-specific details for your consideration. No funds will be appropriated from the Open Space Reserve Fund without the CPC's review and recommendation, and City Council's approval of the specific projects.

PROJECT NO. 9 FULLER FIELD TRACK RENOVATION- PHASE 2

The CPC recommends to fully bond the continued renovation of the track and field facility at the Bradley Fuller Athletic Field on Low Street in the amount of \$694,820 on the condition that the annual debt service not exceed \$55,000.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation.

Project Summary: Project Summary: Phase 1 of this project saw construction of a new, collegiate level track and multipurpose sports field at the existing track facility on Low Street. Phase 2 got underway with the installation of a new fence that allows gating off the facility in order to charge admissions for events. Continuation of the project includes installation of a 500 to 1,000-person grandstand, completion of electrical connections throughout the facility for the sound and timing systems, installation of a new sound system, and renovation of the interior of the existing field house to include expanded restroom facilities. Future phases include improving the parking and drop off area, and installing new concrete walkways and lighting and upgrade of the turf infield.

PROJECT NO. 10 RIVERFRONT TRAIL GAP PROJECT/ CLIPPER CITY RAIL TRAIL- PHASE 2

The CPC recommends the appropriation of \$250,000 from the FY 2020 Estimated Revenues to the City of Newburyport Office of Planning & Development for the construction phase of the Riverfront Trail Gap Project.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation.

Project Summary: The construction phase of the Clipper City Rail Trail's Riverfront Trail Gap Project will establish a crucial trail link along a 1,200' section of the former B&M railroad corridor along the Merrimack River shoreline, and fill a critical gap in this well-used trail network. The project will clean up soil contamination and significantly improve the resilience of this unprotected stretch of shoreline to sea level rise and storm surge events. The riverfront trail section between Joppa Park and the American Yacht Club will connect over three miles of the City's existing Rail Trail/Harborwalk network. The trail will be raised several feet above existing grade in order to be at or above the

The fiscal year 2019 year-end financial report is presented to the Mayor and City Council as a preliminary look at the City of Newburyport's financial performance over the past year prior to the release of the audited financial statements. This report compares original and revised appropriations/estimates to actual expenditures and collections for the General Fund, as well as, Water, Sewer and Harbormaster Enterprise Funds for the year-ending June 30, 2019.

FY2019 Expenditures

Expenditures within the General Fund and Enterprise Funds were made within the budgetary appropriations approved by the City Council. Remaining and unrestricted appropriations from fiscal year 2019, totaling \$1,544,984, will be a positive factor in the Free Cash and Retained Earnings calculations as of July 1, 2019. Below is a summary of the year-end expenditures by fund, which is broken out in greater detail in the reports that follow:

FY2019 Revenue

Total revenue for the budgetary funds exceeded estimates for FY2019 with collections at 100.3% of estimated revenue. The General Fund and Water Enterprise Funds exceeded their estimates, while the Sewer and Harbormaster Enterprise Funds fell short. At the start of FY2019, the Water and Sewer Enterprise Funds used a portion of retained earnings (reserves) to build their budget; \$100,000 and \$375,000 respectively. As such, it was expected that both of those funds would miss their estimate as a result of the projected drawdown on fund balance. The fact that the Water Enterprise Fund did not draw down on fund balance and the Sewer Enterprise Fund drew down only \$74,932 of the \$375,000 budgeted is a positive outcome.

The shortfall experienced by the Harbormaster Enterprise Fund is largely driven by poor operating results at the end of the fiscal year caused by higher than average rainfall during the month of June 2019; 1.47" above average, according to the National Weather Service, raining 14 of the 30 days in the month. Fluctuations are expected in this fund due to changes from season to season. The fund currently has a strong fund balance to cover any years where revenues do not cover annual expenditures. The preliminary closing fund balance as of June 30, 2019 was \$501,817.

Once the Massachusetts Department of Revenue verifies and certifies the City's year-end financial results later this fall, funds will be available for any legal expenditure at the recommendation of the Mayor and approval of a majority vote of the City Council. All financial information contained in this report is presented on an unaudited basis and, as such, is subject to further adjustment until finalized. The audited financial statements will be filed with the City Clerk no later than March 1, 2020 in accordance with the City Charter.

PROJECT NO. 9 FULLER FIELD TRACK RENOVATION- PHASE 2

The CPC recommends to fully bond the continued renovation of the track and field facility at the Bradley Fuller Athletic Field on Low Street in the amount of \$694,820.

The CPA category for this appropriation is Recreation.

Project Summary: Project Summary: Phase 1 of this project saw construction of a new, collegiate level track and multipurpose sports field at the existing track facility on Low Street. Phase 2 got underway with the installation of a new fence that allows gating off the facility in order to charge admissions for events. Continuation of the project includes installation of a 500 to 1,000-person grandstand, completion of electrical connections throughout the facility for the sound and timing systems, installation of a new sound system, and renovation of the interior of the existing field house to include expanded restroom facilities. Future phases include improving the parking and drop off area, and installing new concrete walkways and lighting and upgrade of the turf infield.

Dear Newburyport City Councilors,

The Historical Society of Old Newbury (HSON) is pleased to offer its support for Phases 3 and 4 of Newburyport High School's (NHS) project to restore its historic woodwork and cupola.

The HSON has reviewed a draft preservation restriction for NHS, and has found its guidelines sufficient to ensure preservation of the building's historic integrity. The preservation restriction stipulates that the building's historic, cultural, and architectural features will not be significantly altered during restoration or routine maintenance. Repair work will be undertaken with sensitivity to the building's historic nature and in accordance with *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Building*.

Phases 3 and 4 of the NHS's current restoration project fall within the guidelines of the preservation restriction. Based on plans provided by NHS, the work will not compromise any historic elements in the building's façade or cupola. Rather, the work will address deterioration issues that threaten to irreparably damage the building's exterior and that would alter its appearance significantly if allowed to happen. The work includes restoration of existing elements where appropriate, and replacement with comparable materials when necessary.

With these considerations in mind, the HSON offers its support for the NHS restoration project and its request for funding from the Newburyport Community Preservation Committee.

The Newburyport Historical Commission (NHC) wishes to convey its strong support for the proposal made by the Historical Society of Old Newbury (HSON), to undertake a major upgrade to the electrical system for the Cushing House Museum, and their request for FY 2020 CPA funding.

The Cushing House Museum (CHM) is currently under a Preservation Restriction (PR) between the Massachusetts Historic Commission (MHC) and the Historical Society of Old Newbury (HSON), owner of the property. This PR is for a period of ten years, starting in 2017, and includes the standard language stating that major work must be reviewed and approved by the MHC. We explained to HSON staff that a new PR will be drawn up which will be substantially similar to the existing PR except it will be between the HSON and the NHC, and will remain in effect in perpetuity.

NHC staff met with representatives of the HSON to tour the property and discuss the planned work. NHC staff were favorably impressed by the knowledge of the HSON staff and their sensitivity to the need to ensure that all work that is done has minimal adverse affect on the historical attributes of the structure, including the interior, which is key to the historic value of this property. We discussed the requirement that the NHC review the project in detail, and approve alterations prior to the start of work. The urgent need for the proposed electrical work was amply confirmed during this inspection. The staff shared their plans as to how they will execute the work with minimal adverse affect on the historical attributes of the structure.

The Cushing House is a unique cultural asset, being such a well preserved example of 19th century life in Newburyport. In addition, the museum has an extensive collection of artifacts representing local history and items from the extensive maritime trade to and from Newburyport. So not only the structure itself, but also these many artifacts are are risk from danger of fire the inadequate wiring currently in place. The museum also cannot supply effective lighting for many of the displays, nor adequately power office equipment used for museum administration.

Therefore, the NHC strongly supports this project and the request for FY2020 CPA funds required to accomplish it. We will review the final plans before work commences and continue to monitor the project.

The Newburyport Historical Commission (NHC) wishes to convey its strong support for the proposal made by the Newburyport Maritime Society, Inc., to install air conditioning (HVAC) equipment in the Newburyport Customs House, and request for FY 2020 CPA funding.

There is no question as to the historic value of this structure, given its age, architectural significance and its role in Newburyport's maritime trading history. Beyond these, the Newburyport Maritime Society has acquired an extensive collection of valuable, one-of-a-kind artifacts, many of local origin and many from 19th century trade voyages that cam and when from Newburyport. At present, these artifacts are suffering deterioration due to the lack of adequate temperature and humidity control within the building. These factors also make it difficult, if not impossible, for the museum to borrow items from other collections whose owners fear they will also suffer from this environment. Further, the museum is often forced to close, or limit admission to visitors, due to excessive temperature within the building, especially on the upper floor.

The Newburyport Maritime Society has shared with the commission its plans to accomplish the needed improvements with minimal adverse impact on the structure and consistent with the terms of the existing Preservation Restriction. The NHC will continue to review the detailed plans as they develop to enforce the terms of the existing PR and any new, revised or updated PR. We hope that this project will go forward so that this Custom House's unique characteristics are preserved while its operation as a publicly accessible Maritime Museum are enhanced and expanded by this improvement.

FY2020 Supplemental Budget Request

I hereby submit a FY2020 supplemental budget request totaling \$179,101 in proposed expenditures. This request is funded by available revenue following the passage of the FY2020 budget, as well as, an increase in estimated state aid based on the final FY2020 budget signed by Governor Baker earlier this month. The supplemental budget request is as follows:

Travel/Training (General Administration)

Amount: \$10,000

Rationale: This account is used to fund professional development for all City staff, except for training required to maintain specific licenses (e.g. OSHA, CDL, water/sewer operators). Travel/training was consolidated into one line item back in FY2007 to allow for better oversight by the Mayor's Office. The original budget back in FY2007 was \$28,075. This request will bring the FY2020 appropriation to \$30,000.

Overtime (Animal Control)

Amount: \$1,000

Rationale: Funding is needed so that an Animal Control Officer can respond to after-hours calls. . .

Zoning Administration/Enforcement Officer (Planning & Development)

Amount: \$13,621

Rationale: Funds 25% of the annual salary for the Zoning Administration/Enforcement Officer. This position was previously fully funded by the electrical, gas and plumbing revolving funds; those funds will now cover 75% of the salary for this position. This change is needed to preserve enough revenue in those revolving funds to pay for the inspections and related costs.

School Budget (School Department)

Amount: \$59,480

Rationale: The Superintendent and School Committee recommend staffing increases totaling \$38,980 to include a 0.1 increase to High School English from 0.9 to 1.0 FTE (\$5,480), a student activities coordinator to assist with events (\$3,000), an increase to the art teaching section at

the Bresnahan School (\$9,000) and a 0.3 FTE increase to Nock/Middle School Reading Intervention to assist with special education accommodations (\$21,500). In addition to staffing, the district proposes rolling out "A World of Difference" programming based on the model developed by the Anti-Defamation League in order to address bullying, discrimination and harassment. The estimated cost of this program is \$20,500.

Overtime (DPS-Highway)

Amount: \$10,000

Rationale: The public restrooms budget request totaling \$15,000 was cut during the FY2020 budget approval process. We recommend reallocating these funds to the DPS Highway Division in order to maintain the City's public restrooms.

Facilities Maintenance Supplies (DPS-Highway)

Amount: \$5,000

Rationale: The public restrooms budget request totaling \$15,000 was cut during the FY2020 budget approval process. We recommend reallocating these funds to the DPS Highway Division in order to maintain the City's public restrooms.

Sidewalk Repairs (DPS-Highway)

Amount: \$60,000

Rationale: The sidewalk at the corner of Titcomb Street and Merrimac Street, at the gateway to the City's downtown district, is in poor condition and represents a safety hazard for pedestrians. The estimated reconstruction cost is \$60,000 to be completed in the spring.

Legal Expenses (DPS-Water)

Amount: \$10,000


Rationale: The legal expense line item was eliminated during the FY2020 budget approval process. This line item funds the Water Enterprise Fund's share of KP Law's services as City Solicitor. Legal expenses for the water division include contract review, assistance with collections matters, consultation on federal/state regulatory matters, permitting, etc.

Legal Expenses (DPS-Sewer)

Amount: \$10,000

Rationale: The legal expense line item was eliminated during the FY2020 budget approval process. This line item funds the Sewer Enterprise Fund's share of KP Law's services as City Solicitor. Legal expenses for the sewer division include contract review, assistance with collections matters, consultation on federal/state regulatory matters, permitting, etc. The City's NPDES permit will be renewed during FY2020, which may require further legal funding beyond this request.

I look forward to discussing these funding needs in further detail when this request has been referred to the Budget and Finance Committee for their review. Thank you for your consideration.

ORDINANCE REGARDING APPOINTMENT AND DUTIES OF CITY SOLICITOR

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newburyport as follows:

WHEREAS, Section 1-7 of the Newburyport Charter further provides that the term "City officer," when used without further qualification or description, is defined to mean "a person having charge of an office or department of the City who in the exercise of the powers or duties of that position exercises some independent statutory authority;"

WHEREAS, Section 2-10 of the Newburyport Charter provides that the Mayor must submit to the City Council the name of each person the Mayor desires to appoint "to any city office as a department head or as a member of a multiple-member body," but not including any position which is subject to the civil service law.

WHEREAS, the position of City Solicitor is neither a "multiple member body," nor a "department," nor a "division" of the City, but instead constitutes a "city office;"

WHEREAS, the position of City Solicitor is not subject to the civil service law;

NOW, THEREFORE, Section 2-246 of Division 7 of Article IV of the Code of Ordinances, City of Newburyport, Massachusetts, is hereby amended to read as follows, with deletions in **bold and double-strickenthrough**, and additions in **bold and double-underlined**:

Sec. 2-246. - Appointment; qualifications; term; removal.

Annually in the month of January, the Mayor shall appoint a City solicitor who shall be an attorney and counselor-at-law of the courts of the commonwealth to serve in the office of City Solicitor, the legal department of the City, which appointment shall be confirmed by the City Council pursuant to Section 2-10 of the Newburyport Charter. HeOnce so appointed and confirmed, such attorney and counselor-at law shall hold office until his or her successor is appointed and qualified confirmed, and he or she may be removed at any time by the Mayor pursuant to subsection (a) of Section 3-4 of the Newburyport Charter.

AND FURTHER, THEREFORE, subsection (6) of Section 2-249 of Division 7 of Article IV of the Code of Ordinances, City of Newburyport, Massachusetts, is hereby amended to read as follows, with deletions in **bold and double-strickenthrough**, and additions in **bold and double-underlined**:

Sec. 2-249. - General duties.

...

(6) Settle any suit against the city <u>solely</u> upon approval of the <u>terms of such settlement by order of the City Council, after receiving the recommendation regarding such terms by its committee on general government, and subject to veto by the Mayor under Section 3-7 of the Newburyport Charter.</u>

ORDINANCE REGARDING MANAGEMENT, AND AUTHORIZING LEASE, OR CONVEYANCE BY DEED, OF THE FORMER G. W. BROWN SCHOOL PROPERTY

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newburyport as follows:

WHEREAS, in 1922, the Newburyport City Council voted to acquire by eminent domain certain real property with the current street address of 42 Milk Street (Assessor's Map 21, Parcel 26), and including a ten- (10-) foot wide strip leading to Prospect Street, for municipal purposes (the "1922 Eminent Domain Order," Southern Essex Registry of Deeds, Bk 2525, Pg 171); and

WHEREAS, subsequently, the City acquired and cleared the property of its improvements, and constructed there a three-story, masonry schoolhouse, and schoolyard, named in honor of George W. Brown, which schoolhouse building was altered over time, including through multi-story additions constructed in 1970 and 1975; and

WHEREAS, in 1974, the Newburyport City Council voted to acquire by eminent domain a certain parcel of land adjacent to the G. W. Brown School, with the current address of 99-101 Prospect Street (Assessor's Map 21, Parcel 3), for municipal purposes (the "1974 Eminent Domain Order," Southern Essex Registry of Deeds, Bk 6107, Pg 582), which parcel subsequently was added to the schoolyard (altogether, the "Brown School Site"); and

WHEREAS, in 2013, the Newburyport City Council ordered that upon the removal from service as a public school of any portion of the Brown School Site, the City shall dedicate and hold permanently for public park and playground uses under the meaning of General Laws Chapter 45

an area of such site at least equal in size to the schoolyard then located on the southeasterly portion of the Brown School Site, including the mulched area for play equipment, the basketball court, and the so-called amphitheater (the "2013 Playground Order"); and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Newburyport Office of Planning and Development issued a request for qualifications for architectural services regarding the adaptive reuse of the Brown School Site, accounting for the 2013 Playground Order (the "2014 RFQ"), which resulted in the Brown School Feasibility Study (the "2014 Feasibility Study"); and

WHEREAS, also in 2014, the Newburyport Youth Services ("NYS") department relocated to the Brown School Site from the former Elbridge G. Kelley School, located at 151 High Street, and since that time NYS has operated there continuously within the gymnasium and the ground floor of the schoolhouse building, together, as the "Newburyport Rec Center;" and

WHEREAS, in 2015, the Brown School Educational Reuse Sub-Committee submitted its report to the Newburyport School Committee recommending that the school district retain the Brown School Site while allowing compatible, non-educational uses (the "2015 Reuse Report"); and

WHEREAS, in 2016, pursuant to General Laws Chapter 40, Section 3, and Newburyport Charter Section 4-5, the Newburyport School Committee voted to designate the Brown School Site as surplus property, no longer required by the School Department, with express reference to the 2013 Playground Order (the "2016 School Committee Order"); and

WHEREAS, in 2017, informed by the 2013 Playground Order, the 2014 Feasibility Study, the 2015 Reuse Report, and the 2016 School Committee Order, the Newburyport Office of Planning and Development solicited proposals from developers to adapt the schoolhouse building to residential (including affordable housing) and/or artist studio uses, retain the public gymnasium, comply with the 2013 Playground Order, and contribute significantly toward construction of new space on site for use by NYS (the "2017 RFP"); and

WHEREAS, upon reviewing the responses to the 2017 RFP, and with the advice of an appointed selection committee, the Mayor rejected all such responses on behalf of the City; and

WHEREAS, according to the Newburyport Tax Assessor, the appraised value of the Brown School Site for Fiscal Year 2018 is approximately 5.5 million dollars (\$5,500,000), of which approximately six-hundred and three thousand dollars (\$603,000) is attributed to the land, and the remainder to the existing improvements at the property; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has evaluated all of the foregoing information, taken testimony from City officials and the public, and determined the terms upon which to authorize interim use and future lease, or conveyance by deed, of the Brown School Site, or portions thereof, all in furtherance of the following goals to serve the inhabitants of the City of Newburyport:

- 1. Enable the Newburyport Youth Services department to serve City residents, consistent with its departmental mission;
- 2. Authorize the lease, or conveyance by deed, of the Brown School Site, or portions thereof, as surplus to the needs of the City, at such time as NYS has no further use of it;
- Satisfy the statutory obligation of the City Council to set the minimum amount to be paid for any conveyance;
- 4. Ensure compliance with the 2013 Playground Order;
- 5. Protect the historic exterior features of the schoolhouse building;
- Mitigate negative impacts upon the neighborhood from changes in use of the Brown School Site, with particular concern for quality of design, traffic, and parking;
- 7. Provide for a diverse, balanced, and inclusive community, with housing for people of all income levels as a matter of basic fairness and social responsibility, and to promote economic stability within the community; and
- Identify public monies to improve those public uses to remain at the Brown School Site, and to enable NYS to continue to serve Newburyport residents after it relocates from the Brown School Site;

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED THAT, pursuant to General Laws Chapter 40, Section 15A, and Newburyport Charter Section 2-5, the care, custody, management, and control of the entirety of the Brown School Site is hereby transferred to the Mayor for specific municipal uses by the Newburyport Youth Services department of the gymnasium, the first floor of the schoolhouse building, and the schoolyard; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED THAT, pursuant to General Laws Chapter 40, Section 15, General Laws Chapter 30B, Section 16, and Newburyport Charter Sections 2-5 and 2-9(b), the Brown School Site is hereby deemed as surplus to the needs of the City, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to lease, or convey by deed, such property, or portions thereof, to a qualified bidder, upon the following required terms, and such additional terms that consistent with this order as the Mayor considers necessary and proper:

i.	dollars (\$) for the schoolhouse building
	improvements, which exclude the gymnasium improvements;
ii.	dollars (\$) for the gymnasium improvements (if conveyed); and
iii.	Six-hundred and three thousand dollars (\$603,000) for the approximately 1.2

- (b) On behalf of the inhabitants of Newburyport, the City shall retain a perpetual easement over the Brown School Site to preserve public park and playground uses as they may be reconfigured consistent with the 2013 Playground Order.
- (c) On behalf of the inhabitants of Newburyport, the City shall retain a perpetual easement to preserve from demolition or substantial alteration the historic facades of the schoolhouse building, excluding the 1970 and 1975 additions.
- (d) As a condition of any lease, or conveyance by deed, residential uses at the Brown School Site shall be limited to no more than 20 units per acre in the aggregate (*i.e.* no more than

24 units), with no fewer than one (1) parking space provided on site for each such dwelling unit exclusively occupied by persons 62 years of age or older, and no fewer than one and one-half (1.5) parking spaces provided on site for every other dwelling unit.

- (e) As a condition of any lease, or conveyance by deed, no less than forty percent (40%) and no more than sixty percent (60%) of the total number of dwelling units at the Brown School Site shall be dwelling units that meet the requirements of a subsidized housing unit for purposes of listing in the subsidized housing inventory (SHI) under General Laws Chapter 40B.
- (f) The net proceeds (which shall exclude transaction costs) to the City from any lease, or conveyance by deed, of the Brown School Site, or portions thereof, shall be dedicated to the following specific municipal purposes: (i) reconfiguration and improvement of the public park and playground uses at the Brown School Site; (ii) renovations to the gymnasium at the Brown School Site; and/or (iii) securing a new location and constructing facilities for use by NYS, consistent with its departmental mission.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWBURYPORT, MASSACHUSETTS RELATIVE TO THE FORMER G.W. BROWN SCHOOL PARCELS

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Newburyport that the following be inserted into the Newburyport Zoning Code (NZO):

SECTION XXXII. - BROWN SCHOOL OVERLAY DISTRICT (BSOD)

XXXII-A - Purpose.

Due to the distinct features of land use, architecture, history and property area of the Brown School Property located at 40 Milk Street the Newburyport City Council finds it necessary to enact the Brown School Overlay District (BSOD) under M.G.L c. 40A § 5 for the following purposes:

- To preserve and enhance the former George W. Brown School, which was completed in 1925, and added onto in 1954, 1970 and 1975, on land that was had been acquired by eminent domain for municipal purposes;
- 2. To protect the heritage of the city through preservation and adaptive reuse of this Beaux Arts historic structure, which is listed as contributory to the federal and state Newburyport Historic District, which was listed on the National Register of Historic Places and the State Register of Historic Places on August 2, 1984;
- To prevent adverse influences to this purpose;
- To foster appropriate use, scale, setbacks, height, design and density of this property and structures that is consistent and complementary to the overall neighborhood character;
- 6. To encourage attractive and viable development project;
- To encourage affordable housing within an overall density that is generally consistent with the zoning ordinances, including the rezoning of this area from R-3 to R-2 in 2017, and the immediate neighborhood; and
- 8. To protect the public park and playground uses to which the property was partially dedicated by order of the Newburyport City Council dated September 30, 2013, and signed by the Mayor on October 16, 2013. For reference, a copy is shown in Appendix A.

XXXII-B - Establishment.

The BSOD is hereby established as an overlay district. The BSOD shall include the buildings and property situated on approximately 54,090 S.F. of land comprising Assessor's Parcel ID Nos. 21-26 (49,135 S.F.) and 21-3 (4,955 S.F.), and commonly known as 42 Milk Street and 99-101 Prospect Street, as shown on the plan on file with the City Clerk. These parcels are extraordinary and distinct due to its size, historic use pattern, and existing structures and merit an overlay district to handle these special considerations. Within the BSOD, the provisions of the underlying R-2 district shall remain in full force and effect except where a special permit is issued under X-H.7.

XXXII-C - Multifamily senior living residential uses.

In addition to uses permitted in the underlying zoning district, multifamily residential use is permitted within the BOSD by special permit, as provided in the following table:

- 3. For the purposes of clarity, the necessity of off-street, on-site parking is the chief determinant of the appropriate intensity of development at the Brown School Property. Therefore, parking requirements are not waivable or alterable under any circumstances, such as by variance under section X-H.6, nor may proponents provide mitigation (financial or otherwise) instead of adhering to the provisions on required parking prescribed by this overlay district.
- Except in the case of catastrophe or fire, the original 1920s schoolhouse structure shall be not be demolished or razed.
- 5. Demolition of accessory structures or additions, such as the those added to the schoolhouse in 1954, 1970 and 1975 may be permitted through the special permit granted by the planning board.
- 6. A specified area of the Brown School Property shall be reserved for public park and playground uses under the meaning of General Laws Chapter 45, with such area being at least equal in size to the schoolyard located on the southeasterly portion of the Brown School Site, including the mulched area for play equipment, the basketball court, and the so-called amphitheater, as it existed on September 30, 2013.

XXXII-D - Dimensional regulations.

- 1. Vertical additions to the original 1920s schoolhouse structure shall not be permitted.
- 2. New or replacement structures shall not exceed 35 feet in height measured pursuant to this ordinance, and shall be set back from all exterior lot lines by a distance of at least ten (10) feet.
- Screening and space buffers shall be required for any parking areas from abutting lots and public ways.
 - a. Such buffers shall contain a screen of plantings of vertical habit not less than three (3) feet in width and six (6) feet in height at the time of occupancy of such lot. Individual shrubs or trees shall be planted not more than twenty (20) feet on center, and shall thereafter be maintained by the owner or occupants so as to maintain a dense screen year-round.
 - b. At least fifty (50) percent of the planting shall consist of evergreens and they shall be evenly spaced. A solid wall or fence, five (5) to six (6) feet in height, complemented by suitable plantings, may be substituted for such landscaped buffer strip.
 - c. No screen shall be closer than ten (10) feet to a public way.

XXXII-E - Special permit procedure and criteria.

1. Using the review procedures listed in section X-H.8., an applicant may request a special permit from the planning board pursuant to this Section XXXII, including by submitting the following materials:

- a. A site plan, scale 1" = 20 feet, of the existing conditions, including a dimensional footprint of all existing buildings, parking areas and driveways shall be shown;
- b. A plot plan, scale 1" = 20 feet of all proposed construction, parking and driveways, fence lines, landscaping, lighting, sidewalks, pathways and park areas:
- Exterior building elevations, including building and roof materials, cupolas, roof decks, height, colors and fenestration;
- d. A traffic impacts study, which shall consider the surrounding system of public streets adjoining the Brown School Property, the existing and projected future vehicular trip volumes, the number and location of proposed access points to public streets, and existing traffic controls and management measures.
- 2. The planning board may approve such special permit application provided that all of the requirements of section X-H.5. and, also, the following criteria are met:
 - a. The project complies with all provisions of this Section XXXII;
 - b. A deeded, perpetual preservation restriction approved by the city council and mayor, to be held by the city, acting by and through its historical commission, to ensure that any changes to the entire exterior of the original 1920s schoolhouse structure, conform to the United States 'Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Properties With Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring & Reconstructing Historic Buildings,' as they may be amended from time to time, including all related guidelines, bulletins and other official guidance promulgated by the National Park Service (Secretary's Standards)
 - c. The city council and mayor have approved as to form a proposed, perpetual use restriction to be held by the city acting by and through its parks commission to reserve for public park and playground uses under the meaning of General Laws Chapter 45 an area of the BROWN SCHOOL PROPERTY at least equal in size to the schoolyard located on its southeasterly portion of the Brown School Site, including the mulched area for play equipment, the basketball court, and the so-called amphitheater, as it existed on September 30, 2013.
 - d. The project is consistent in design, style, height, materials, scale, massing, setbacks and general character with the neighborhood and abutting properties.

XXXII-F - Severability.

SUBJECT: BROWN SCHOOL ZONING

Honorable Members of the Newburyport City Council,

I am writing to you today with regards to Ordinance #33 (Dated May 13, 2019), which proposes to create a zoning overlay district for the Brown School. As sponsor and with due respect to the members and Chair of the Committee on Planning Development, I want to let you know that it is my intention for this Ordinance to be brought to the Council floor for discussion and a vote on September 30th, 2019.

The Brown School has been the subject of much debate over many years. Here is a timeline to remind you of those efforts:

2013	The City Council and Mayor adopt an Order protecting the area that holds the playground, basketball court, and so-called amphitheater as a public park and playground under state law
2014	 School closes its doors to its last class, after 90 years After public meetings, Office of Planning and Development issues RFQ in summer 2014 for feasibility study of Youth Services at ground level with housing/artist studios above Winter Street Architects submits Feasibility Study in fall 2014 at a cost of ~\$40,000
2014-2015	School Committee's Brown School Educational Reuse Subcommittee studies and reports on possible non- classroom uses of the property.
2016	School Committee votes in March 2016 to decommission the Brown School and surrender custody and control, while expressly including, by reference, the City Council's 2013 order protecting the playground
2017	 After further public meetings, an RFP is issued (without a proper disposition by the City Council) for redevelopment of the site Over six months spent by selection committee including the Mayor, Planning staff, Youth Services Director, and Ward 1 and 2 City Councillors, resulting in the unanimous selection in October 2017 of Stone Ridge Partners for further negotiations, over Diamond Sinacori and YWCA of Greater Newburyport At the end 2017, Mayor unilaterally withdraws selection and scraps the RFP
2018	 Ward 2 Councillor Jared Eigerman proposes Order #8, seeking to dispose/surplus the Brown School under certain conditions After public hearings, including testimony by Youth Services and the Affordable Housing Trust, Committee on Planning & Development votes in March 2018 to hold the order pending analysis of six scenarios by City staff

The work has continued into the current year with meetings being held as recently a week ago from the date of this memo to discuss this endeavor and the current proposal:

Present (2019)

- City Council funds a ~\$65k feasibility study to purchase National Guard property leased for Emergency Services at which to relocate Newburyport Youth Services from the Brown School
- Pursuant to the study above, wetlands have apparently been discovered on the site, though no update has been provided to the Council
- Office of the Mayor issues a preliminary budget of \$4.5 million for Youth Services relocation, funded in part by sale of Brown School property for \$3.0 million
- · City Council passes an order assuming custody and control of Brown School property, given its release by School Committee

- Ordinance #33 Brown School Overlay District introduced in May of 2019
 - o Council's Committee on Planning and Development met on June 6th to discuss the proposal
 - A joint hearing with the Planning Board/Committee on Planning & Dev took place on July 17th
 - Council's Committee on Planning and Development met on August 6th to discuss the proposal and take further public testimony regarding amendments by the sponsor
 - o Additional meetings may be held at the discretion of the Committee and its Chair

I have left out of this timeline the multitude of public meetings held at the Brown School over the past five and one-half years to engage with stakeholders.

The residents of the South End, all other city residents, affordable housing advocates, and Newburyport Youth Services advocates all deserve answers. I hope this memo will serve to eliminate any surprises when this matter comes to the floor.

To the City Council, City of Newburyport, Massachusetts

Over the last year a group of concerned residents on Plum Island has worked on a public/private initiative to install public access Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's) on the Island. We believe these life-saving devices are a critical supplement to the public safety efforts of the city of Newburyport. The proposal called for two AEDs – one at the Center in Newbury and another at Plum Island Point in Newburyport.

All funds for the purchase, installation and initial maintenance of the proposed AEDs were raised privately and are on hand; once installed, the equipment will be gifted to the city. However, the City of Newburyport, while initially supportive, has now refused to install and maintain the unit which was acquired for them. In contrast, the town of Newbury has installed and launched the unit acquired on their behalf by the group. Additionally, Newbury police have conducted three CPR/AED training sessions, teaching close to 30 residents as well as PI restaurant personnel how to use the equipment. Ongoing training and community education is planned.

We request that the City of Newburyport honor the original promise made by the Mayor in July 2018 to install and maintain the device. We ask that the City of Newburyport recognize the importance of this safety device to residents and visitors alike.

To demonstrate citizen support for our initiative, we present to the City Council a petition signed by over 200 people. Of those signing, nearly 80% are residents of Plum Island and 90% are residents of Newburyport. Gathering this evidence of support was an easy task; citizens were happy to sign and puzzled as to why the city would not happily accept this essential equipment at no cost to the budget.

We hope that this cross section of broad support will be taken seriously into account and that the City of Newburyport will reconsider its stated position to oppose installation and maintenance of this important safety equipment on Plum Island. Please work with us to find an optimal solution for the city to add this equipment to its public safety arsenal.

Newburyport already owns and maintains at least 28 AEDs, but none is located year round on Plum Island. We ask that the city accept this gift of a 29th AED and install and maintain it at Plum Island Point for the health and safety of all who live and visit there

Position Statement

Why Should We Have an AED at Plum Island Point?

Newburyport is designated a Heart Safe Community¹ and already owns at least 28 AEDs, but none is located on Plum Island year round. While nothing would make us happier than to have emergency services arrive at the side of a victim of cardiac arrest before the public access AED, the evidence is clear: AEDs have been shown to save lives. Every minute counts. For every minute that passes without CPR and defibrillation with an AED, chances of survival drop 5-7%.

- Residents and visitors on Plum Island especially Plum Island Point are at the furthest point from emergency services in the city.
- Plum Island Point is 5.2 miles from Newburyport EMS. The proposed new Fire Station will be approximately 7 miles from Plum Island Point.
- Victims of cardiac arrest on the Newburyport part of Plum Island may face delays in getting the immediate help they need.
- Cell phone coverage is often spotty, delaying calls to Emergency Services.
- During the summer months, winter weather, active emergencies (fires) and special celebrations (Plumfest), traffic delays may slow down emergency services.
- · AED and CPR use while waiting for EMS has been shown to save lives.

A Few Comments Shared By Those Signing The Petition

- One of our neighbors, a cardiac physician, is so supportive he said AEDs should be as common as "fire hydrants" in our communities.
- Other medical professionals concur: no reason not to have this equipment available.
- Teachers who have been trained in CPR and the use of AEDs strongly supported the project, saying that they are easy to use and important to have nearby.
- "What a great idea! Newburyport High School trains students in CPR/AED and my son really appreciated that."
- "It takes too long for emergency services to get to PI. Two years ago, during the fire on 59th St it took 18 minutes for EMS to arrive."
- "Last fall when we needed an ambulance for my husband, it took over 15 minutes and three different dispatchers before we were connected to the correct person who could send us help."
- "My mother suffered a life threatening illness and it took 20 minutes for EMS to arrive"

Proposed Installation: Components and Configuration

Our recommendation for Newburyport closely mirrors the set up at Center Island in Newbury, but we recognize that there may be special circumstances at Plum Island Point that would necessitate some adjustments. Therefore, we look forward to working with the city to examine and resolve any special needs presented at the Point.

In brief, we recommend placing an AED in a locked, climate-controlled box to protect the unit from the elements and vandalism and installing it on the side of the Lifeguard Shed in the parking lot at Plum Island Point. Next to the lock box would be a call box connecting directly to emergency services who would provide the code to unlock the case and start the process of emergency services dispatch, if not already underway.

All installation costs and the equipment itself would be gifted to the City. The specific components of the proposal include:

Zoll AED Unit
Pediatric Pads
Key Lock Case (customized)
Tracking Device
Push-button Emergency Call Box
Analog Line for the Call Box installation plus one year monthly fees
Zoll Maintenance Package (5 years)

The proposal also includes continued public education on CPR techniques and operation of the AED equipment. As noted, three such sessions have already been completed, training some 30 people, conducted by Sergeant Jenkins of the Newbury Police Department. In addition, future sessions may be conducted by certified volunteers that we have identified. We would welcome Newburyport Emergency Services participation in these events.

Estimated Value of the Proposed Gift: \$4000

Timeline of the Initiative

Below find a brief overview of the initiative – why it was initiated, initial conversations with municipal officers, steps taken to secure government and citizen support, and where we stand today.

<u>Summer 2017.</u> An individual on 14th St in Newbury was found unresponsive in his home. Attempts to reach emergency services on cell phones proved difficult. The idea that access to an AED on Plum Island might prove beneficial to residents and visitors was born.

<u>Early 2018.</u> Citizen Committee of residents with experience in public health, safety, and law began meeting to discuss the idea of public access AEDs. Researched what other communities have done, evidence of value, considered locations both private/public, and explored costs and types of equipment. Developed proposal for Newbury and Newburyport.

June - July 2018. Discussions were held with municipal representatives in both Newbury and Newburyport to outline the idea of a public/private initiative to place two AEDs on Plum Island. Response was positive. Newbury Board of Selectmen unanimously approved the proposal in late June. Discussions in Newburyport included Mayor Donna Holaday, City Marshall Mark Murray and others.

<u>July – October 2018.</u> Based on the positive feedback and assurances from officials² in both Newbury and Newburyport, fundraising was undertaken to purchase the equipment, with the Plum Island Foundation acting as fiscal sponsor. This effort included three grant applications to local foundations, personal appeals, and six fundraiser events sponsored by local businesses and restaurants. Results of the fundraising exceeded expectations and the committee quickly garnered funds in excess of the targeted amount.

<u>November 2018 - January 2019.</u> With funds on hand, the AED equipment was ordered and delivered. Final specs and plans moved forward apace in Newbury. But in early November 2018, when we approached Newburyport to finalize the configuration and equipment needed, problems emerged and support appeared to wane.

January – February 2019. Primary efforts in this period focused on a successful installation of the AED and call box at Center Island in Newbury. All was in place in time for a celebratory AED Kick-off on February 28 at PITA Hall, which was attended by some 35 people, including Newbury Fire Chief Doug Janvrin, Sergeant Steve Jenkins, Tracy Blais, Town Administrator, and Damon Jespersen from the Board of Selectman. Although invited to the event, Newburyport's Mayor and EMS officials did not attend. Mayor Holaday and Marshall Murray explained to the Daily News that, although they applied the AED effort for Plum Island, they had concerns about maintenance and liability.³

<u>Spring 2019.</u> Disappointed that we were unable to fulfill the initial promise to supporters and donors to install two AEDs on Plum Island, we decided to approach Newburyport City Council with a petition showing broad citizen support for the initiative. We hope that the Council will work with City officials to reassess their withdrawal of support and accept this gift of life-saving equipment for the residents and visitors on Plum Island.

The City of Newburyport is pleased to support the grass roots Health and Safety Committee of Plum Island residents and their sponsor, the Plum Island Foundation. The aim of this group is to install Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's) at each end of the Island for public access emergency use.

The Plum Island residents have researched the need and met with police and fire officials to identify cases and emergency call boxes that best meet the requirements of residents and police personnel. The residents have written a proposal which defines their role as well as that of the City's.

When the AED devices, weather proof cases, and emergency call box or antenna are purchased, the City will install the equipment on the Life Guard shack at the 78th Street parking lot. The City will be responsible for checking the boxes during routine police rounds and will assume the responsibility of maintaining these boxes after the 5-year maintenance warranty expires. The Public Health Nurse for Newburyport will conduct two CPR and AED usage classes for the residents of Plum Island.

Along with the work already completed, the Plum Island residents will seek additional funding and assist in community outreach and education.

The City believes this safety enhancement will benefit both residents and visitors and very much appreciates your consideration in this matter.

Limitations

- (a) "Procedure" All road racing, walkathon, bicycle, or swimming events shall, through that event's organizer, board of directors, charity foundation or designee apply for authorization to hold the event through the Office of the City Clerk. The City Clerk upon review of the completed form will place the application on the regular City Council agenda. Upon following the procedures of the Council, as deemed appropriated in the sole judgment of the Council, the application will be considered approved if the Council votes favorably by majority. The event will name one person responsible on the application and shall provide contact information to include name, address and telephone number.
- (b) "Exemptions" Each event organizer or organization shall comply with this ordinance and no exemptions will be permitted.
- (c) "Course map", All applications shall be accompanied by a course map showing the event route, water stops, refreshment stops, and so-called "porta-potties". The course map shall also include any road closures, detours and parking areas. The course map shall be approved by Police, Fire, Department of Public Services, Parks Commission and Harbormasters Departments prior to submission to the City Clerk.
- (d) "Electronic Amplifier" Electronic amplifiers, loudspeakers and bullhorn use shall be requested at time of application. Under no circumstances will they be used for public address announcements or music before 8:00 A.M. except for Sundays when electronic amplifiers, loud speakers or bullhorns will be used for public address announcements or music before 9:00 AM. This shall be deemed a requirement for all permitted events regardless of type or location.

- (e) "Road Closure" No ways, public or private, boat ramps or parking lots controlled or patrolled by the city shall be closed without authorization. Authorization shall be considered granted only if said closure(s) are contained in the approved permit. It is the sole responsibility of the race organizers to notify residents ten (10) days in advance that neighborhood roads will be closed if no alternate route is available to those residents.
- (f) "Insurance" All events shall have an insurance policy or rider in effect for the event naming the "City of Newburyport" as an insured. The policy shall be no less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- (g) "Event termination" If in the judgment of the City Marshal, Fire Chief or Department of Public Services (DPS) Director or designees thereof determine that an event is unsafe due to existing conditions, that event may be stopped, terminated or suspended. In the case of a multidiscipline event such as a triathlon, the Harbormaster or his/her designee may likewise stop, terminate or suspend the swimming portion for cause.
- (h) "Event and traffic Security" The City Marshal, Fire Chief, DPS Director or in the case of a triathlon, the Harbormaster can require special duty personnel to oversee the safety and security of the event. All special duty assignments will be paid by the event organizers.
- (i) "Clean-up" The event organizers shall be responsible for post event trash collection, removal of signage, directional arrows, advertisements or other promotional material associated with the event.

13-101 Enforcement

- (a) "Regulations" Consistent with this ordinance, the city shall promulgate regulations to enforce and otherwise implement the provisions of this ordinance upon passage by the City Council. Any event previously approved by City Council shall be deemed permitted.
- (b) "Warning" In the circumstance that this ordinance is violated, the enforcement may consist of a warning. Any warnings issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and may be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.
- (c) "Noncriminal Disposition" If the city determines that a violation has occurred in which a noncriminal violation is issued, the named event organizer shall be penalized by a non-criminal disposition as provided bin Massachusetts General Law as adopted by the City of Newburyport as a general ordinance in Subsection 1-17 of Chapter 1 of the Code or Ordinances of the City of Newburyport in the amounts set herein in 13-101(d)
- (d) "Violation" The non-criminal violation shall be \$100.00 for the first offense and \$250.00 for second and subsequent offenses. Any non-criminal citations issued for violation(s) will be reported to the City Clerk and City Council and shall be used as a factor in future application approvals and denials.




