We respectfully request that the City Council review and adopt the City's updated Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP) 2020. The City and its consultant the BETA Group, supported by a CPA grant from the Community Preservation Committee and the City Council, have worked with the community during recent months to develop the plan.

A comprehensive Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP) is required by the Commonwealth for the City to be eligible for a number of grant funding opportunities for park improvements and open space preservation. The structure and content of an OSRP is highly regulated by the state. Eligibility for grant programs include the Parkland Acquisitions and Renovations for Communities (PARC) program, Local Acquisitions for Natural Diversity (LAND) program, and the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund, which are administered by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs Division of Conservation Services. The OSRP also serves as a guidance document for the City's Parks Commission, Open Space Committee, Community Preservation Committee, and other City Boards and Departments. Approved OSRPs are valid and eligible for DCS grant programs for up to seven years, and Newburyport's 2012 OSRP has expired.

Based on outreach through the newspaper, the City's website, emails, and postings on social media, we received input from over 450 citizens on an online survey in April and May regarding existing conditions and priorities for open space and recreation in Newburyport. The planning process also included multiple discussions with a variety of stakeholders. In general, the 2020 OSRP demonstrates the <u>continuity</u> of the community's previously stated interests, concerns, goals, and objectives for parks and open space and related initiatives to enhance the community's quality of life. The 2020 OSRP updates current conditions and accomplishments, and focuses on the protection and enhancement of our heritage landscapes, wildlife habitat, recreational opportunities, public drinking water supplies, and overall sustainability and climate change resilience.

The state's Division of Conservation Services (DCS) is reviewing the draft final OSRP 2020 plan this summer for approval based on completeness and conformity with state requirements. It is our intention to incorporate changes requested by DCS and/or the Council into a final plan suitable for adoption by the Council, posting to the City website and implementation during the next seven (7) years - a term established by DCS requirements. We anticipate that the final draft plan will be forwarded to the Planning and Development (P&D) Committee for review and recommendation to the Council in the coming weeks, similar to the Master Plan and other long-range plans. We will attend any relevant Council meetings along with our consultant. In its review the Council may wish to focus on two (2) key chapters which speak to the City's policies and priorities moving forward:

- Section 8: Goals and Objectives
- Section 9: Seven-Year Action Plan

While much of this new plan is consistent with the prior 2012 plan, these two chapters outline the key plan recommendations and strategies for implementation by various city officials during the next seven (7) years.

(AND ORDER: IMPLEMENTING CHAPTER 96 OF THE ACTS OF 2020 WHICH DISSOLVED THE NEWBURYPORT REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

WHEREAS, Chapter 96 of the Acts of 2020 (hereinafter referred to as "Chapter 96") effected the dissolution of the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority (hereinafter referred to as the "NRA"), and

WHEREAS, Chapter 96 provides that the transfer of the NRA lands, and all other property and funds shall be to the City of Newburyport (hereinafter referred to as "City"), and

WHEREAS, the City now shall, for all purposes, be the successor of interest to the NRA under the stipulation filed in Land Court on or about March 31, 1980, and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, the entirety, without exception, of all monies, and personal and real property are hereby transferred and conveyed to the City with all lands whatsoever, including, without limitation, tidelands, whether flowed or filled, to be held permanently for the purposes of park and conservation uses; and provided, however, that public parking shall not be an excluded use and all existing public rights for fishing, fowling and navigation within said tidelands shall be preserved in their entirety, and

WHEREAS, Chapter 96 provides that the City of Newburyport shall design, fund and construct an extended waterfront park and on a best-efforts basis, said design shall be consistent with the principles and references documented in the Order 067, adopted by the City Council on May 30, 2017, a copy of which is attached hereto (hereinafter referred to as the "May 2017 Resolution"), and

WHEREAS, the City may execute and deliver a certificate in a form suitable for recording of real property heretofore owned by the NRA, and

WHEREAS, the City shall, for all purposes, be the successor of interest to the NRA including, without limitation, as to all outstanding obligations thereunder, and

WHEREAS, The City shall all reserve any monies transferred to the City pursuant to Chapter 96 in addition to no less than one-hundred percent (100%) of any ongoing meter revenues generated from parking on the land solely for the purposes of design, construction, maintenance or operation of an extended waterfront park and related infrastructure, and

WHEREAS, the City shall place said monies into a separate, designated receipts reserved for appropriation fund for these purposes as improvements to the public realm, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire and intent of the City to implement the obligations and responsibilities placed upon it pursuant to Chapter 96,

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council hereby orders the following:

- 1. Any and all valid contractual obligations of the NRA shall be assumed by the City through the appropriate and necessary contractual amendments, updates, and other documentation, forthwith, and
- 2. To effectuate design and construction of the expanded park consistent with the May 2017 Resolution, including, without limitation, the final disposition of all public ways to the river, there shall be established by the City Council President an *ad hoc* committee of the City Council whose stated purpose is to oversee a request for proposals (hereinafter referred to as the "RFP") to be issued by the Office of Planning and Development, to review responses to the RFP, and to recommend a preferred bidder to the City Council and the Mayor for their approval no later than December 31, 2020, which *ad hoc* committee may include City officials other than members of the City Council, serving as *ex officio*, non-voting members, and
- 3. No later than August 31, 2020, said *ad hoc* committee shall, in consultation with the Mayor and the Director of Planning, develop and present to the City Council a proposed, tentative schedule for the design, construction, and transfer of the completed park to the Waterfront Trust contingent upon its reorganization, consistent with the terms of the May 2017 Resolution.

AD HOC CENTRAL WATERFRONT COMM. - PROPOSED AMENDMENT, MAY 30, 2017

The .-Id Hor Central Waterfront Committee was charged to develop policies and objectives regarding a longterm vision for the Central Waterfront, including number of parking spaces, land ownership, and operational and maintenance responsibilities, subject to full Council approval. The Committee recommends that the City Council endorse the following terms of a final settlement.

Executive Summary of Proposed Settlement:

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- NRA grants all parels to Waterfront Trust for public park and waterside uses, *except* Firehouse Patio (City leases to Firehouse Ctr.) and Custom Hse. land (City leases to Custom Hse.)
- City takes exclusive easement to operate public parking at West & East Parking Lots
- Submerged lands equitably split between City and Waterfront Trust
- · Construction of expanded park contingent upon raising capital funds
- 1. Master Plan reconciling Sidford-Uhlig Plan + COW Plan + Andy Port Plan
 - a. Expanded Market Landing Park, including widened shoreline berm
 - b. Reconfigured and smaller West Parking Lot and East Parking Lot
 - --c. Dimensions and locations of "Ways" settled for all time, with all ways perpendicular to shore, and non-vehicular Central Wharf Way aligned with Unicorn Street
 - d. Clipper City Rail Trail passes through as a "loop"
 - e. Firehouse Center lease with City adds patio as facility of public accommodation
 - f. Custom House lease with (now) City adds land back to bulkhead, subject to current public uses
 - g. Harbor Master operates all water-dependent uses (docks), as today
- 2. Waterfront Trust reorganizes, such that:
 - Board of Trustees increases to seven (7). Mayor appoints four (4) and City Council appoints three (3). First two appointed by Council = 1 NRA member + 1 Settlor.
 - b. One trustee serves ex-officio on Harbor Commission, and one Harbor Commissioner (or Harbor Master) serves as ex-officio on Waterfront Trust.
 - c. No further role for 1980 litigants (Settlors) or the NRA
 - d. Primary mission = stewardship of "public park and waterside uses"
 - e. Acts as City commission: open meeting, conflicts of interest, & public records laws
 - f. Can grant easements solely to government agencies for public purposes, at below market
 - g. Duty to charge reasonable usage fees for public park and waterside uses
 - h. Audit and enforcement rights by City Council and citizens
 - i. Amendments require 2/3 Trustees + 2/3 City Council + Attorney General

 - b. City to assist in identifying grants to fund construction of capital improvements
 - c. Waterfront Trust obliged to build capital improvements only once funding in place

CITY OF NEWBURYPORT AND TOWN OF WEST NEWBURY

INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT FOR THE ADMINSTRATION OF SHARED ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

Article 1. Purpose

This agreement is entered into, pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40, Section 4A, by and between the City of Newburyport, as authorized by its City Council and approved by its Mayor, and the Town of West Newbury, as authorized by its Board of Selectmen.

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury are each obligated to provide animal control services to their residents; and

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury have determined that their residents can more efficiently and effectively be served with such services through a joint undertaking between the communities; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury have determined to join together to establish and administer a program of shared Animal Control Services.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties agree as follows:

Article 2. Definitions

Participating Governmental Units: the City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury. Animal Control Services: Any and all services as required of an Animal Control Officer under applicable Massachusetts Laws and regulations, including but not limited to MGL Chapter 140, Section 151 et seq. and MGL Chapter 129, Section 15 et seq.

Article 3. Term

This Agreement shall take effect on the 1st day of July 2020, for a three year term that may be extended by up to two additional one year terms commencing on July 1, 2023 and July 1, 2024. Any such extension term shall be subject to approval by the City of Newburyport, as authorized by its City Council and approved by its Mayor, and the Town of West Newbury, as authorized by its Board of Selectmen. The Participating Governmental Units shall give each other notice of whether or not they wish to extend this initial one year term at least ninety days prior to the annual Town Meeting of the Town of West Newbury but no later than ninety days prior to June 1st of the then-current term, unless another date is mutually agreed upon in writing. Should the parties fail to extend this Agreement by written addendum hereto, the agreement shall terminate upon the last day of the then-current term.

Article 4. Lead City

The City of Newburyport shall act as the "lead city" for the Participating Governmental Units, by employing the necessary officers and providing the necessary equipment, vehicles and kennel to perform said Animal Control Services. Said officers shall be considered employees of the City of Newburyport and be accorded all applicable benefits enjoyed by other Newburyport municipal employees as they are or shall be established. Each such officer must be a Massachusetts certified Animal Control Officer (excepting that new employees may acquire such certification within two years of the commencement of employment). Said certification must be maintained during the term of this Agreement. The office where such officers shall be primarily located will be in Newburyport.

Article 5. Funding Contribution

During the Fiscal Year 2021 (July 1, 2020- June 30, 2021), the Town of West Newbury shall pay the City of Newburyport for animal control services a total sum of \$25,073 to be paid in four equal quarterly payments of \$6,268.25 on or before August 1, November 1, February 1, and May 1 (provided that such sum will be prorated as of the date of approval of this Agreement by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of West Newbury and the Mayor of the City of Newburyport).

During the Fiscal Year 2022 (July 1, 2021- June 30, 2022), the Town of West Newbury shall pay the City of Newburyport for animal control services a total sum of \$25,898 to be paid in four equal quarterly payments of \$6,474.50 on or before August 1, November 1, February 1, and May 1 (provided that such sum will be prorated as of the date of approval of this Agreement by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of West Newbury and the Mayor of the City of Newburyport).

During the Fiscal Year 2023 (July 1, 2022- June 30, 2023), the Town of West Newbury shall pay the City of Newburyport for animal control services a total sum of \$26,858 to be paid in four equal quarterly payments of \$6,714.50 on or before August 1, November 1, February 1, and May 1 (provided that such sum will be prorated as of the date of approval of this Agreement by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of West Newbury and the Mayor of the City of Newburyport).

These payments shall include all applicable expenses incurred by the City of Newburyport in providing Animal Control Services on behalf of the Participating Governmental Units, including, but not limited to, salaries, group health insurance, workers' compensation insurance, and all other applicable benefits. Nothing herein shall prevent the parties from mutually agreeing in writing to change the funding contribution during the initial term or any extended term of this agreement, subject to available appropriation.

Article 6 Financial Safeguards

Under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 40, §4A, the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health shall provide to the Town of West Newbury periodic financial statements that shall include: accurate and comprehensive records of the services performed under this agreement; the costs incurred; and the reimbursements and contributions received. Such reports shall be compiled and distributed by the Health Director on a quarterly basis. In addition, all bills and payrolls submitted for work done under this regional agreement shall be plainly marked to indicate that the work was done under the authority of this agreement.

The accounting records of the Newburyport Animal Control Services, working under the direction of the Newburyport Director of Public Health, shall be subject to the City's annual audit process and shall be subject to periodic audit by the Newburyport City Auditor as is current practice.

Article 7 Hours of Services and Service Requirements

The City of Newburyport shall provide Animal Control Services under this Agreement on an as-needed basis, seven days a week, twenty four hours a day. Animal Control Services shall be provided on an equal basis between the communities.

Article 8 Vehicle Usage

The Town of West Newbury shall provide a 2015 Ford Explorer. This vehicle shall be made available for the use of the Animal Control Officers. Collision and liability insurance for the vehicle shall continue to be paid by the Town of West Newbury. The City of Newburyport shall be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of West Newbury's vehicle.

Article 9 Fines

Any fines, exempting boarding fees, collected will be collected on behalf of and returned to the Participating Governmental Unit from within the municipal boundaries of which the animal was taken, or in the case of an animal not taken, returned to the Participating Governmental Unit in which the animal resides or is kept.

Article 10 Indemnification

In the event that any claims, demands, suits, causes of action, costs, and expenses arise with respect to the services provided pursuant to this agreement, and to the extent permitted by Massachusetts General Laws chapter 258 and other applicable law, a Participating Governmental Unit shall indemnify,

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defend and hold harmless the other participating Government Unit from and against any such claims, demands, suits, causes of actions, costs and expends, including reasonable attorneys' fees and legal costs, but only to the extent that they arise from or relate to the negligent acts or omissions of the first Participating Governmental Unit, or its agents, servants, or employees, or from or in relation to actions taken by the Animal Control Officer on behalf of or at the direction of the first Participating Governmental Unit. By entering into this Agreement, neither of the parties has waived any governmental immunity or limitation of liability or damages which may be extended to them by operation of law. This Agreement is for the benefit of the parties hereto and is not intended to confer third party beneficiary status on any other person or entity.

Article 11 Operation of Animal Shelter Facilities

The City of Newburyport shall maintain and operate an Animal Shelter Facility under the following terms and conditions.

- I. OPERATIONS:
- A. The Animal Shelter Facility shall be accessible to the citizens of each Participating Governmental Unit for the retrieval of impounded animals during normal business hours, Monday through Wednesday 8AM to 4PM, Thursday 8 AM to 8 AM, and Friday 8AM to 12PM by appointment. Weekend hours will be provided by appointment only. Notice shall be posted conspicuously and in a readily accessible format in the main municipal building of both Participating Governmental Units which states the hours of operation and an emergency telephone number for use by residents to retrieve their pets. Such information shall also be made available on each respective Participating Governmental Unit website. The animal shelter shall be able to accept impounded animals 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
- B. Newburyport will provide daily supervision, food, water and humane care to animals boarded at the shelter.
- C. All Animal Control Officers will log in each time they enter the Animal Shelter Facility. The sign-in sheets will be submitted monthly to the Director of Public Health.
- D. The Animal Shelter Facility is to be solely used for the impounding of animals and to be used by Animal Control Officers only. There shall be no entry of other persons in the shelter without the consent of the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health.

- E. Newburyport will be responsible for the Animal Shelter Facility cleaning/sanitizing supplies, maintenance, heat, water, electric and other utility costs incurred in connection with the operation of the Facility.
- F. Newburyport will be responsible to keep the Animal Shelter Facility and associated kennels maintained, clean, and sanitary on a daily basis. Excreta and food waste shall be removed from primary enclosures daily and from under enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the animals contained in the enclosures, and to reduce disease, hazards, insects, pests, and odors. The condition of the kennels and quality of care is to be of a high caliber and performed to the standards established by the City of Newburyport Director of Public Health.
- G. Boarding facilities shall include a sheltered kennel unit with cages and/or runs that protect the animals from precipitation, and extreme hot (100°F or greater) and cold (45°F or less) conditions. Except in emergency situations, as determined by the Newburyport Animal Control Officer, no more than one adult animal shall be kept per cage.
- H. Newburyport will be responsible for ensuring that an ill or injured animal is treated promptly by the respective Participating Governmental Unit's contracted licensed veterinarian, depending on the nature and/or seriousness of the illness or injury, and that any prescribed medication is promptly obtained and administered.

II. FEES:

- A. Owners who reclaim animal(s) shall make payment to the City of Newburyport prior to reclaiming their animal(s) for all boarding fees (\$35.00 per day for each animal) and all other fees related to shelter services provided per day per animal.
- B. Newburyport shall provide invoices, collect monies and keep records of all required fees received from owners. Invoices provided to owners who are retrieving their animal shall include the date that the animal was delivered to the shelter, the per day shelter rate, the number of days that the animal was sheltered, medical bills as applicable, and total fee due and collected.
- C. Each Participating Governmental Unit shall be responsible for the direct costs to care for the animals which originate from said community, including but not limited to flea treatments and any veterinary costs. For the purposes of this agreement, "veterinary costs" shall include rabies vaccinations, health evaluation, treatment of minor curable diseases and euthanasia.
- D. Each Participating Governmental Unit shall pay any additional costs associated with the transport and removal of animals from their community if an animal is not claimed or is injured.

- E. Newburyport may add a surcharge of up to ten (10) percent (not to exceed \$25.00) to medical bills to cover certain incidental costs relating to transportation of an animal to a veterinarian's office, telephone expenses incurred in connection with medical treatment, and any special care involved. Bills must support all medical charges and receipts bearing the name of the veterinarian or firm from whom they were obtained.
- F. Fees for animals that are unclaimed by the owner at the end of the maximum seven (7) day holding period shall be paid by the Participating Governmental Unit where the animal originated.
- G. All fees and receipts from boarding and all other services related to the shelter shall be submitted monthly to the City of Newburyport Health Department.
- III. RECORD KEEPING: Each Participating Governmental Unit's Animal Control Officers shall maintain an impound record on each animal delivered to the Animal Shelter Facility. The impound record will be prepared and filled out by the appropriate Animal Control Officer and delivered to the Facility with the animal.

Upon discharge, one (1) copy of the animal's completed record shall be provided to the person claiming the animal and one (1) copy of each discharged animal's record shall be provided to Newburyport. If the agreement is terminated, all impound records shall be transmitted to the appropriate town.

IV. DISCHARGE:

A. Claimed animals: Each Participating Governmental Unit will require the person claiming the animal to show identification (preferably a driver's license). In the case of a dog, a certificate of license is required of all dogs six (6) months of age or older for release.

In the event of non-licensure of a dog, the owner or person claiming the dog will be required to show proof of licensure prior to release by the Animal Control Officer. The Animal Control Officer will not be responsible for ensuring licensure of the dog.

In addition, the Animal Control Officer will provide the person claiming the animal with a full disclosure of any medical treatment rendered by a veterinarian and/or the Animal Shelter Facility and by whom it was rendered and a complete identification of any prescription or non-prescription medicine(s) administered to the animal while in custody. Finally, the Animal Shelter Facility must obtain the signature and the driver's license number of the person to whom the animal is released on the Impound Record.

B. Unclaimed animals: Unless requested by the Newburyport Director of Public Health or West Newbury Police Chief to retain the animal for a longer period (2 to 4 additional days), animals will be picked up on or immediately following the seventh (7th) day of confinement by the Animal Control Officer. The written notice to extend shelter services from the Newburyport Director of Public Health or West Newbury Police Chief must accompany the reports to the city or town. The shelter may place such animals as are deemed suitable up for adoption in accordance with MGL Chapter 140, section 136A.

Article 12 Miscellaneous

- a. This agreement may be amended in writing by vote of both of the Participating Governmental Units. Should additional municipalities seek to join this program of shared Animal Control Services, the terms agreed to herein, including apportionment of expenses, for such additional municipalities shall be negotiated and approved by both of the Participating Governmental Units.
- b. This agreement represents the entire understanding of the parties with respect to its subject matter.
- c. This agreement shall be governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- d. If any of the provisions of this agreement is declared to be illegal, unenforceable, or void, then both parties shall be relieved of all obligations under such provision, provided, however, that the remainder of the Agreement shall be enforced.



THAT Sections XXVII-E and XXVII-F of the Zoning Ordinance be amended pursuant to Section XII-B (Adoption and Amendment) to read as follows, with deletions **double stricken-through and in bold**, and additions **double-underlined and in bold**:

XXVII-E - Exclusions.

Consistent with the city's intent for the DOD under subsection XXVII-A, a DOD-SP shall not be required for any of the following categories of work, which are hereby excluded from review by the SPGA under this section, upon a written determination by the zoning administrator:

...

 Any (i) alteration, demolition, or replacement of windows, doors, signs, and/or awnings, or (ii) construction, alteration, demolition, or replacement of <u>fences or site walls</u>, that is reviewed and approved by the office of planning and development under subsection XXVII-F.5(d);

XXVII-F Procedure and criteria.

•••

- 5. Procedure, requirements, and criteria for review of proposed new construction and alterations:
 - d. Staff-level review: The office of planning and development may review and approve for consistency with this section (i) the proposed alteration, demolition, or replacement of windows, doors, signs, and/or awnings, or (ii) the proposed construction, alteration, demolition or replacement of fences or site walls, when such work is unaccompanied by any other work subject to this section over a period of three (3) consecutive years, in which case exclusion 3 shall apply under subsection XXVII-E and no DOD-SP shall be required. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any proposed new window or door, and any proposed new, altered, or structure for a window or door, and any proposed new, altered, or methods.

...

. . .

i. Fences and site walls: <u>New fF</u>ences and site walls <u>anywhere within the</u> <u>DOD, whether newly constructed, altered, or replaced, require either</u> <u>staff-level review and approval by the office of planning and</u> <u>development or a DOD-SP. All such fences and site walls</u> shall be appropriate in scale, materials and architectural style to the historic buildings and structures located on the same lot, to the lot itself, and to its setting.


Fences or site walls that will be visible from a public way, public park or playground, or the Merrimack River warrant additional scrutiny for appropriateness, as provided herein. New fences and site walls shall not substantially block significant views from any street, way, <u>public park or</u> <u>playground</u>, or the Merrimack River, of the primary facades of historic buildings and structures located within the DOD. <u>Placement of fences and</u> <u>site walls along lot lines confirms historic lot patterns of</u> <u>neighborhoods, as opposed to placement along arbitrary lines, and is</u> <u>favored</u>.

<u>Historic materials such as wood, wrought-iron, and masonry shall be</u> <u>used, but not contemporary materials such as plastic, vinyl, and</u> <u>aluminum. Where a more ornate style of fencing or site walls can be</u> <u>documented as having been present at the subject property, then such</u> <u>historic style may be replicated. In other cases, simpler historic</u> <u>designs, such as wood-picket, wrought-iron, or masonry shall be used</u> <u>instead of contemporary styles, such a unfinished, pressure-treated</u> <u>lumber, dog-eared, or chain-linked fencing.</u>

<u>Fences and site walls shall be at a height from grade that is</u> <u>proportional to the structure(s) they accompany and the area they</u> <u>enclose, and, if within the required front yard setback, shall not be taller</u> <u>than three feet (3'-0") unless the visible surface area of such fence or</u> <u>site wall has a visual porosity of at least fifty percent (50%).</u> In all cases, solely the SPGA may approve heights in excess of five feet (5'-0") for those fences or site walls visible from a public way, public park or playground, or the Merrimack River.





All revenue from meters collected from the former Newburyport Redevelopment Authority Lots (socalled "East and West Lots") shall be deposited into this fund. For the purposes of these receipts only, this Order shall supersede any prior Order of the City Council.

This fund, upon recommendation of the Mayor and approval of the City Council, shall be used solely for the purposes of design, construction, maintenance, or operation of an extended waterfront park and related infrastructure on: (1) the lands described in Home Rule/State Law referenced above (H.4545); provided, that the lands shall be protected under article 97 of the Constitution, and (2) adjacent property as deemed necessary by the city of Newburyport for the purposes of integrating the waterfront park expansion with adjacent public parks, ways and infrastructure.

FURTHER ORDERED THAT, all proceeds from the dissolution of the Newburyport Redevelopment Authority be transferred into the *Waterfront Park Paid Parking Fund* forthwith.

Agreement By and Between The City of Newburyport and the Town of West Newbury Regarding Allocation of Costs for Evaluation, Design and Repair of The Plummer Spring Road/Middle Street Bridge

This Agreement is made as of this _____day of ______, 2020, by and between the City of Newburyport, a Massachusetts municipal corporation with its main office at City Hall, 60 Pleasant Street, Newburyport, MA 01950 (hereinafter referred to as "Newburyport") and the Town of West Newbury, a Massachusetts municipal corporation with its main office at the 1910 Office Building, 381 Main Street, West Newbury, MA 01985 (hereinafter referred to as "West Newbury").

RECITALS

Whereas, Newburyport and West Newbury in accordance with M.G.L. c. 40 §4A are authorized to enter into an agreement with another governmental unit to perform jointly or for that unit's services, activities or undertakings which any of the contracting units is authorized by law to perform; and

Whereas, Newburyport and West Newbury desire to enter into an Agreement to share the costs to evaluate the condition of the Plummer Spring Road/Middle Street Bridge over the Artichoke Reservoir (the "Bridge") situated on the border between Newburyport and West Newbury, and to share the costs of designing, bidding and making necessary repairs to the Bridge (the" Bridge Project"); and

Whereas, Newburyport and West Newbury both desire to work cooperatively in order to complete the repairs to the Bridge in the most expeditious fashion; and

Whereas, Newburyport has been authorized to enter into this agreement by vote of its City Council and approval of its Mayor; and

Whereas, West Newbury has been authorized to enter into this agreement by vote of its Board of Selectmen.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, Newburyport and West Newbury agree to the following terms, conditions and provisions.

1. **Effective Date and Term; Renewal:** This Agreement shall become effective when fully executed by Newburyport and West Newbury on the day first above written and shall continue, if

renewed in accordance with the provisions hereinafter contained, until the completion of the Bridge Project.

The initial term of this Agreement shall be one year from the date first written above. The parties shall review the status of the Bridge Project on an annual basis and may renew this Agreement with such amendments as are mutually agreed upon; provided, however, that in no event shall the term of this Agreement, including any renewal thereof, exceed five (5) years. Any renewal shall be executed by the Mayor of Newburyport on behalf of the City of Newburyport and the Town Manager of the Town of West Newbury on behalf of the Town of West Newbury.

2. **Cost Sharing; Estimated Project Cost:** Newburyport and West Newbury mutually agree that costs for all aspects of the Bridge Project, including but not limited to, the costs of evaluation, project design, permitting, bidding, scheduling, oversight, construction, and contractor payment, to the extent that work is not undertaken by employees of Newburyport or West Newbury (all of whose costs and expenses shall be paid by their respective employer) shall be divided equally between Newburyport and West Newbury, with each municipality responsible for fifty percent (50%) of such costs. To that end, Newburyport and West Newbury shall obtain the authorization of the other prior to incurring any such costs. Cost sharing shall pertain solely to work directly related to the Bridge Project, and shall be subject to appropriation.

The estimated Bridge project cost is contained in Appendix A attached to this Agreement. Funding, including any additional funding sources as described herein, shall be provided to address the costs as listed in Appendix A. Should additional funds for the Bridge Project in excess of this estimated cost be required, such additional costs shall be expressly subject to appropriation by both parties and any such additional costs shall be memorialized in an amendment to this Agreement authorized in Newburyport by vote of its City Council and approval of its Mayor and in West Newbury by vote of its Board of Selectmen. Periodic financial statements shall be issued to both parties with respect to expenditures undertaken for the Bridge Project.

Notwithstanding anything set forth above, each party reserves the right to petition for an apportionment of the costs associated with the Bridge Project in accordance with the provisions of M.G.L. Ch. 84 §2.

3. **Cooperation:** Newburyport and West Newbury agree to work together to complete the Bridge Project design, bidding and repair as expeditiously as possible. Newburyport and West Newbury agree to use diligent efforts to obtain without undue delay, any required local, state or federal permits, clearances, approvals, and/or waivers for the Bridge Project. Newburyport and West Newbury acknowledge that each party has received grant funding for the completion of the Bridge Project, Newburyport having received a MassDOT grant and West Newbury having

received a MassWorks grant, the terms and requirements of such grants being incorporated herein by reference. In the interest of complying with such grant requirements, the Bridge project is intended be completed by June 30, 2023, provided, however, that the parties may seek extension of such deadline from MassDOT.

4. **Liability**: Each party hereto shall be liable and responsible for the negligent or intentional acts of its employees, agents and contractors with respect to the Bridge Project, and shall hold each other harmless from any claims arising therefore, to the extent permitted by law.

5. Additional Funding Sources: Newburyport and West Newbury agree to use their best efforts to secure such grants, reimbursements or other sources of funding for the Bridge Project. All such additional funding sources for the Bridge Project, whether received prior to or after the date of this Agreement shall reduce each party's obligations for costs by one half of the amount secured. The parties agree to comply with all terms and conditions set forth in such grants, reimbursements or other sources of funding.

6. **Notice and Change of Circumstances**: Each party shall promptly notify the other of any legal impediment, change of circumstances, including but not limited to changes in funding availability, insurance requirements, city or town approvals, or any condition or event which may adversely affect each party's ability to carry out any of its obligation, under this Agreement. Any request, demand, authorization, direction, notice, consent, waiver or other document provided or permitted by this Agreement to be made, given , furnished or filed with one party by another party shall be in writing and shall be delivered by hand or by certified mail, return receipt requested, or by overnight delivery service, in an envelope addressed to:

7. **Governing Law:** This Agreement is to be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

8. **Severability:** If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in force and unaffected to the fullest extent permitted by law and regulations.

9. **Modification and Amendment**: This Agreement may be modified or amended only by written mutual agreement of the parties as authorized in Newburyport by vote of its City Council and approval of its Mayor and in West Newbury by vote of its Board of Selectmen.

10. **Designation of Project Coordinator**: Newburyport and West Newbury shall each designate an employee to act as the Project Coordinator who will be the point of contact for all aspects of the Bridge Project for that party. Each Project Coordinator shall be copied on all correspondence or other communication with any third party involved in the Bridge Project. In the event of the temporary absence or unavailability of a Project Coordinator, the parties may designate a temporary Project Coordinator for the duration of such absence or unavailability.

11. **Oversight**: Newburyport and West Newbury agree that their respective employees, agents and officials shall have access to the Bridge during the pendency of this Agreement. Newburyport and West Newbury agree to promptly notify the other in the event that such party considers any work connected with the Bridge Project to be not in compliance with this Agreement, the Bridge Project contract issued pursuant to the joint IFB, or applicable federal, state or local laws and applicable regulations.

12. **Joint Invitation for Bids ("IFB")**: Newburyport and West Newbury shall prepare and advertise for a joint IFB for the construction of the Bridge Project and shall jointly open and evaluate bids and award a contract to the selected eligible and responsible bidder.

13. **Entire Agreement:** This Agreement, including all documents incorporated herein by reference, constitutes the entire integrated agreement between the parties with respect to the matters described. This Agreement supersedes all prior agreements, negotiations and representations, either written or oral, and it shall not be modified or amended except by a written document executed by the parties hereto.

- and S3-TL4 bridge rail
- Overall width 32'-6"
- Integral abutment on piles
- Preliminary Cost Estimate = \$2.6 M

The preliminary cost estimate does not include a contingency. For budgeting purposes, the two communities may find it prudent to include a contingency. At this preliminary design stage MassDOT usually includes a 20% contingency for bridge projects of similar magnitude.




