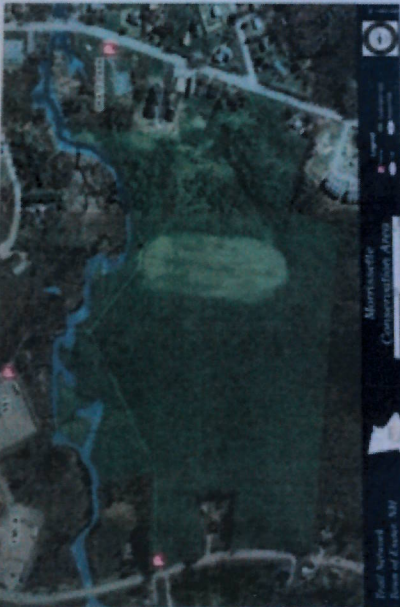
MORRISSETTE CONSERVATION AREA

NATURAL RESOURCES

The Morrisette Property is comprised of a 16-acre parcel with a small trail system connecting Union Street to Earl's Street and south side of the Little River. A small pond is also located on the property under the Little River. The property is adjacent to the Rensselaer School of Technology and the Great Bay Charter School, providing opportunities for youth in learning experiences.

The property protects a unique habitat of naturalistic, wooded, riparian, open meadow and wetland areas. The property is also a great field, supporting a wide variety of species for food cover and breeding - all within a short walk from downtown - in order to keep the birds open. The Conservation Commission conducts late season mowing of the field. This allows time for birds to nest and their young to disperse and grow before the field is mowed. The property also contains a small pond and stream that flows to the street. Protecting a vegetated buffer along the shoreline of the Little River is also an essential component to keeping the river healthy.

Grassland and shrublands are declining habitats in the Northeast. Preservation of these areas is important for riparian and wildlife such as the yellow throated and the American woodcock, whose nesting rights is a recommended right with nesting.
